The ice is out now to the middle of The neighbor next to me she was actually stuck, couldn't get out. I witnessed myself two cars literally coming down the road sliding across where the ice is because it goes out into the middle of the road now and hit the embankment next to me where the Brozettis are.

A lot of people walk down that road.

1 Somebody's going to get hurt. I'm bottoming 2 out. I need some help here. 3 MR. AMICO: I know we've reached out 4 to Mr. Judge in the past --5 MR. EVANGELISTA: I was talking to him today. He came up there. 6 7 MR. AMICO: Do you mind sending 8 somebody up tomorrow to check it out? 9 MR. JUDGE: I go up every day. water is still coming down. This freeze, once 10 11 it builds up on the road, it's bad. 12 MR. HALLINAN: Is the road that 13 keeps coming down -- keeps coming off the 14 mountain? 15 MR. JUDGE: It's coming off the 16 mountain. 17 MR. EVANGELISTA: This is where --18 this is going -- my driveway here. This is 19 probably literally up this high now (indicating) and going out into the middle of 20 21 the street. 22 MS. OVEN: Where's it coming from? 23 MR. HALLINAN: From the mountain. 24 MR. AMICO: Didge, what have you 25 guys done in the past --

MR. JUDGE: You know what we did, we 1 got a grader up there. 2 3 MR. HALLINAN: We got to get a 4 grader. 5 MR. JUDGE: It's going to come back. That's about the only thing you could do. 6 a foot thick. I hit that every morning with 7 8 salt. But you know what, the salt -- it just 9 refreezes in this weather. That's why it's so 10 bad because of the cold. But there's a problem 11 up there. 12 MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, wasn't that 13 problem looked into before though? 14 MR. JUDGE: Thirty years, it's 15 getting worse every year. It gets worse and 16 worse. 17 MR. EVANGELISTA: I have like this 18 much water sitting from the whole length right 19 across. It's been getting worse every year. 20 MR. AMICO: I guess the only other thing we could reach out to Mr. Lopatka to 21 22 look for a solution. 23 MR. JUDGE: A drain. Even if you 24 put a pipe under the road and put it right down 25 to the creek.
