MR. BURTON: Good evening Council.

I'll be brief with the update with the February financials. We have a net income for the month of February of \$148,000. And that makes our year-to-date net income of \$409,000 through first two months of the year.

February's gain was driven mostly due to the fact that there was a significant increase in the real estate taxes and local enabling taxes which we budgeted for and anticipated. The tax revenues are starting to roll in for the year.

As far as revenues are concerned, again, the large influx in real estate taxes and local enabling taxes. We received a Comcast fourth quarter 2021 franchise fee of \$59,000. Miscellaneous revenue item, Dunmore School District fourth quarter reimbursement for their expenses, that's \$21,000.

And as far as expenditures were concerned, there was quite a few repairs as far as the DPW with the plows and the other issues that we had with the equipment. That came to about \$20,000. We made our initial debt

interest payment for the 2021 refinance general obligation bond, and that came to \$65,000. And finally we made a retirement and pension a partial MMO payment of \$60,000.

We bump that up a little bit because we didn't make the initial payment in January.

We're going to try to get that caught back up.

That's about it.

MS. BRIER: Mark, this is Janet, I apologize. Did you say we're paying back the TAN?

MR. BURTON: We did in March. We paid 100,000 of the 175 that was borrowed. And we'll pay the balance off by the end of this month.

MS. BRIER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. BURTON: Yep.

MR. AMICO: Thank you, Mark.

MR. RUGGIERO: Chief DeNaples?

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening. I'm just going to go over my report that was submitted to Councilman Amico and Secretary Ruggiero this past Friday, the 11th.

There's still a couple amendments to it. We had a couple breakdowns over the

weekend, some calls and some stuff that were used on so I'll go over that. This month we didn't have until this weekend, so really no big expenditures except \$500 expenditure for the emergency reporting, the occupancy inspection module -- that's the software we're going to be doing our fire safety inspections with. So all the information's going to be entered into that.

I checked the status of that.

That's about three weeks out to get that module. There is a little bit of personnel issues at emergency reporting. So they are a little bit slow. We had a headset jack with the ladder truck that the radio headset, that was only \$65.00. This was in the report.

And we had a hand light battery that we need to replace for 21,000. Now, this past weekend our ladder truck, the engine temperature swiped on it on Sunday during a training exercise. So we had to shut that down. We called and reached out to Glick Fire Equipment, and they said to try to overfill the coolant a little bit to see if it dropped down. That didn't work so we had about \$59 coolant

1 from Advanced Auto.

We later had to have Glick Fire
Equipment come out because the truck -- that
didn't correct it and the truck was out of
service. They found out there was a Cummins
diesel issue. So the truck has to go to a
Cummins diesel dealer, which is going tomorrow
to Kenworth.

There's an unknown cost on that right now until they evaluate it. But for Glick to come out, it was \$1,051.25. They had to hook their software and their laptop up to the truck to diagnose what was going on with it. So that was an emergency call. It was a Sunday, plus the computer.

Industrial Electronic was in today to replace a microphone on the pumper truck that was \$150 for the radio. That is pretty much the expenditures for the month as of this point. We had -- when the report was submitted we had 45 hours of overtime. That was on Friday.

Today we had one firefighter that's out injured. We had to cover his shift and another one that called off sick. So up to

today, that brought our overtime is up to 69 hours from the first of the month to the current. So that is pretty much that.

We have out of 15 full-time firefighters we're working with 11. There are four out on injury at this point. There is no scheduled events for the month of March that the fire department is participating in. The inspection program, the holdup on that now is the software and one personnel item that we're working out with Councilman Amico on that.

The concrete ramp in front of fire headquarters is deteriorating pretty bad over the last probably about five, six years. So I know that we were, you know, over the last four years we're looking at different pricing on that and then kind of was in a lull.

So that's something that's really going to need to be taken care of sooner than later. It's way overdue. We had a couple fall there, etc. So that's another item that's on there the report. We formed a -- we formed a truck committee last year to try to get and vendors in to replace the rescue pumper which is a 2006.

There's a lot of breakdowns on it lately. The truck is worn out pretty bad. That's the truck that's only a couple months old and hit the bank in 2006. So we formed a committee. We got down to one truck that was very fair on price for the market right now.

But we reached out to Marywood
University to try to help us with maybe some of
the costs for that truck. We were very
unsuccessful with that even getting a meeting
with them. So that's kind of where we're at
with that. So any suggestions from Council -I know last year when I went with Mr. Burton
and Councilman Amico, we tried to build that
into a capital budget. So, you know, something
has to be done sooner rather than later.

I attended a Homeland Security
training March 2nd and March 3rd. It was a
free training put on. It was called Medical
Preparedness and Response to Bombing Incidents.
It was held down in Pittston. It was a pretty
eye opening training, very valuable, brought a
lot of information back to the department on
that as far as responding to those type of
incidents.

As far as individual COVID in the department, we're still updating and following all the COVID-19 policies put out by CDC, the Department of Health. Right now there is no firefighters out currently with COVID.

And two other things that I'll be mentioning in my reports coming up the next couple months, I just want to make mention of to Council in case they hear on the street about these events. About two years ago and three years ago, we did smoke detector campaigns with the American Red Cross.

We went around to different neighbors. The one time we did this part of town, Larch Street, all down in this area. Basically what we did was set up here and we put 150 smoke detectors and went door to door with some volunteers from the American Red Cross, some of our staff and other volunteers through the community.

We basically went out and we installed smoke detectors. We did another one a year later. We used St. Mary's School as a staging area. We did all that area of town. I believe at that time we only did 80 smoke

detectors.

So we plan to do another one on the 7th of May from 10 in the morning until 2 in the afternoon from Reilly Street all the way up to Tigue Street, both sides, all the streets going up on both sides. Holy Cross is allowing us to use their facility for the staging area and for lunch and stuff with that.

So all the smoke detectors are free through the Red Cross. The other thing is, the fire department and I believe the police department will get involved with this a charity bowling event that's going to be held on April 13th from 6 to 8 up at Idle Hours.

And all the proceeds will go through a benefit, a charity of the choosing winner.

So if the fire department wins, whatever charity they choose to give the proceeds through it will go to them. But I'll bring that up as the months get closer. But just in this case anybody hears it on the street I want to make sure you were aware. Any questions?

MR. HALLINAN: What kind of truck are you looking at? How much are we --

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CHIEF DENAPLES: So that truck believe it or not the beginning of last year until the end of the year, it went up probably \$80,000 because of goods, materials, metals, So you're looking at about \$800,000 probably in excess of that now since we last got numbers on it.

> MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.

CHIEF DENAPLES: No problem.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chief.

MR. RUGGIERO: Chief Marchese.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Calls for service. this is for the month of February. We had 823 calls for service. This number is up about 154 calls from last month. Arrests for the month, are our department made 10 criminal arrests. We had eight citations that were issued for non-traffic offenses, 28 citations for motor vehicle violations.

Personnel matters, we have currently four officers that are off on heart and lung. And one was on COVID long term for the month. The gentleman that was on COVID is back on shift now. So at this now we have three officers that are off for sure.

Scheduling, we have five shifts this month were sent out for overtime. It goes out for overtime if can't get any part-timers to work. And our part-timers were maxed. We couldn't get anybody to work. So there was five shifts that went out for overtime. Our part-time officers work a total of 600 hours, 75 shifts during the month of February.

Full-time officers used 20 vacation days, nine holidays and 31 sick days of the month. We had a training here February 8 and 9th, 16 officers full time and part time for our department. It's going to be mandatory for next year. It's a mental health and first aid training class.

Sixteen of us went. And it's covered under our training allowance for this year -- or training pay. We had an issue with our cell camera. It wasn't working properly. And with that being said, our interview room needs to be video and audio recorded as per the D.A.'s office.

So in that end, we lucked out.

Northeast had come before and there is a camera in the interview rooms. So we don't

have to go with a whole new system. All we have to do is they're going to try to hook a microphone in, recording button and we'll be good to go with the system we have.

So I'm waiting for the price. A guy from Northeast came up last month. And I'm just waiting for him to come and give me the official price and I'll forward it to you and hopefully at a minimal cost.

MR. DEMPSEY: Chief, would he be able to give us a price on just replacing the system as well while he's there instead of doing the microphone and cameras somewhat separate? Can he come and give us a price to replace the whole thing?

is actually pretty nice. I think it's only two years old. When they did it, there's a lot space for expansion which is good. So we don't need to put anything else in. As per our collecting bargaining agreement, our body armor is expiring this year.

So we're in the process right now of getting bids for the body armor. I just got two in. I will be forwarding that to Council

very shortly. Our ENRADD machine because of COVID was not calibrated. We just got it calibrated two weeks ago. And we ran it last Saturday. We will be able to run it when we have enough guys on a shift, the guys that are actually certified to run it. That's the only problem we have. If we have three guys on, it takes two guys to run the ENRADD. I think that's it.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Chief.
MR. AMICO: Thanks Chief.

MAYOR CONWAY: Chief, are more people getting trained on the ENRADD?

CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes, we talked to ENRADD after we got certified. They're going to run a class for us. So whoever was not certified, we can get them certified, yes.

MR. HALLINAN: And just to clarify, ENRADD is only allowed to be used, if I'm still right, on state roads, right? You can't run that on the Marion Street here.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes.

MR. HALLINAN: So you're going to be able to on Blakely, Green Ridge, Harper --

CHIEF MARCHESE: Wheeler, Drinker.

MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. I just wanted to clarify that. Thanks.

MS. BRIER: Wasn't there an issue with the police phones? Vince?

MS. ZANGARDI: Sal, did you hear
Councilwoman Brier? Is there anything new with
the phone system for the police department?

CHIEF MARCHESE: No, I haven't heard anything.

MR. JUDGE: So far as the salt goes, we have 300 ton left. That's what we got in the beginning of the year. We used 506 tons so far this month. And I just ordered another 10 trailer loads today. So I hope that will get us through the rest of this winter.

About 40 ton of cold patch for the roads. We ordered 10 cutting edges for the plows because you have to get them in 10. And we installed -- we bought three handicap signs and two no parking signs and the flashers on the new signs on Jessup Avenue and down by the UGL down there. We have one garbage truck still down about a month now.

MR. HALLINAN: That's the recycling truck, right?

1	MR. JUDGE: That's the recycling
2	garbage truck. And McKenna's truck went down
3	today. When I leave here I will drive it back
4	over. That's fixed. The other truck you got
5	to give me an answer on whether we're going to
6	fix it, okay?
7	MR. HALLINAN: Yeah.

25	by Burger King.

MS. ZANGARDI: I know where Jessup is. I live at that stop sign. Where is the stop sign over here?

MR. HALLINAN: No truck traffic.

That's coming off Green Ridge Street.

MR. JUDGE: Oh, that's what it was.

There's two of them, two no truck signs.

MS. ZANGARDI: Got it. Okay.

MR. JUDGE: That's about it.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Mr. Judge.

MR. RUGGIERO: Next is Mr. Lorince.

I help Mr. Lorince put this together. So I'll read it for him and he'll answer any of Council's questions. Under Code Office, he had five violations. All the owners were identified and letters were sent, violations such as abandoned vehicles, garbage. And Council was made aware of all of those violations.

Next Planning Commission meeting is scheduled for April 7th. It was advertised. The neighbors were notified for the O'Neill Highway, the Dunmore Shopping Center. Also on the 7th is land development for the Dunmore Shopping Center on the O'Neill Highway.

Zoning Hearing Board meeting is advertised on 3/31 for a special exception.

That is for a Meade Street storage unit project. There was some concerns so there was an informational meeting that took place on 2/24 here. The residents and neighbors' questions were addressed.

Joe did go out to four different locations for health licenses. There was no violations in any of those lotions and all the results were sent to the USDA. There were 13 total permits issued between February and March, three electrical, five renovations, one new garage, one addition, one roof and two new signs.

The utility cuts were addressed.

There was a bad one on Grove Street, on Reeves Street, Blakely Street, and Allen Street.

Mr. Lorince did talk to all PA American Water and sewer divisions. There were two multifamily inspections or commercial inspections, one on the O'Neill Highway.

There were violations noted. They were given 60 days and NEIC which is a third party inspectors are going to come back and the

other one was on Elmhurst Boulevard. They were given 30 days and NEIC was going to come back.

I do know that Mr. Lorince spoke with Mayor Conway regarding blighted properties on that spreadsheet and roads that need to be paved resulting in what was the budgeted number. He's also going to utilize that sheet for the streets that need hot stuff or hot tar. Mr. Lorince?

MR. LORINCE: I was working with Maxie Conway to actually get some of the blighted areas. And I think Electric Street would be a good one for the next one on our list which is the old Electric Superette.

So I think that would be a great one to -- it's out in public. It's in the -- you know, I think that's the next one that is in bad shape that we should actually look at.

MS. OVEN: The ones that were up in sport hill, those properties, any luck with those?

MR. LORINCE: No, we're going to probably have to end up doing title searches on them because one is opened by Capooci. The other one is owned by one of our firemen. And

1 they're just not -- the fireman is still under the mom's name so they're going to have to --2 3 MS. OVEN: It just takes longer to 4 do. 5 MR. LORINCE: Takes longer and we're going to have acquire the property, tear it 6 7 down. We're going to have to do the same thing 8 that we did --9 MS. OVEN: With the other one. 10 MR. LORINCE: We got about a dozen 11 homes that are in bad, you know, that are 12 condemned. But it's all ones that have 13 problems. Like, people just -- we have one on 14 Adams Avenue. The guy is still paying the 15 mortgage and the taxes, but we can't find him. 16 He's nowhere to be found. So we're just going 17 to have to acquire that one. 18 MS. OVEN: So are those -- the ones 19 in Sport Hill condemned? MR. LORINCE: Yes. 20 21 MS. OVEN: You just can't go in and bulldoze them? 22 MR. LORINCE: 23 No, I tried it with 24 CDBG funds to actually do Capooci's to actually 25 have the property knocked down. But the county

backed off on it because there's too many names 1 on the deed. They can't get clearance on it. 2 3 So Mickey has to do his magic and then we can 4 come back and tear it down. 5 MS. OVEN: Okay. Thank you for explaining the process. 6 7 MS. ZANGARDI: Joe, before you --8 what about the two at the top of Drinker 9 Street, the 900 block of Drinker? MR. LORINCE: 10 960 and 962 came in 11 for building permits. 12 MS. ZANGARDI: No, okay. Boy, 13 that's about five or six years at least. 14 MR. LORINCE: Yes, the 962 just 15 bought it off a sheriff's sale a couple months 16 So they came in. And 960 already came in 17 for permits. 962 is coming in for permits too 18 to do little renovations on it. 19 MS. ZANGARDI: Great. Thank you. That's awesome. 20 21 MS. OVEN: Joe, one question on the 22 pave cuts. When you contact the utility companies, is there a timeframe that they have 23 24 before you can --25 MR. LORINCE: Usually they go right

out and do it. The problem with the cold stuff is, we went out and did Reeves Street, Allen Street; and what happens now we had the snowstorm, so I'm going to have to do it all over again because mostly when we plow, we take all the cold patch out and everything. It's like starting over. We're just waiting for, like, steady hot days that we can do our permanent.

MR. HALLINAN: Once April comes, they'll open --

MR. LORINCE: I'm waiting -- the plants are going to open up soon.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Mr. Lorince.
Thanks, Vito.

MR. RUGGIERO: Mr. Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: At the start of

November we finally wrapped up Biddy March 6th.

We're still also hosting practices for several

Dunmore teams that are involved in different

tournaments. But there's only a couple left.

So right now we're transitioning into -- we host indoor baseball because the weather is bad. So we have batting cage stuff coming up in a couple of days. We're also

renting to Riverfront Sports for the next five Thursdays. I think there's a skip -- they're not doing it this Thursday because of St. Patrick's Day.

But they're going to do it the following couple of Thursdays. So that's what takes -- on Thursday nights. And obviously we're open after school and on the weekends for all our Dunmore residents to use the place.

We returned to renting this room for parties. We hadn't done it because of COVID.

Last weekend we had one party. The weekend before we had two. This weekend we have two and the following weekend we have two. There's a lot of people that want to use the place.

So coming up we have Jog for Jude in April. I have coordinated with some of Zayacs and those people. And so we're going to start meetings down here just going over the logistics of the whole thing. It's something we've done before. This is their -- I think this will be their sixth time here.

And the last time that they had a full thing. There was over 3,000 people here. So there's a lot to do with that. And coming

up in May, we have the election. So I've already been in contact with the election people about their deliveries and all that stuff. That's all I have.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chris.

MR. HALLINAN: Mr. Kearney, I got a question about -- because of the election committee -- or the election. The heating and air conditioning, the last thing we need is another complaint.

MR. KEARNEY: Well, right now it's very warm. Whether that -- I'm going to -- I actually thought about it today. I have to get ahold of the guy and see if that is going to -- when -- he's got it set so it's warm. We have to see if it automatically -- it's supposed to automatically come down depending on the air temperature outside and everything like that and the sensor that picks up the gym temperature. So that's --

MR. HALLINAN: Is the system on life support?

MR. DEMPSEY: Yes.

MR. KEARNEY: One of them does not work. One is powering that whole gym.

1 MR. HALLINAN: How many should it 2 take? 3 MR. KEARNEY: Well, they originally 4 put two up there. And we've been cannibalizing 5 various units up there that don't work to keep this one going. Now the guy that Mr. Dempsey 6 7 got us from Valley, amazing because we had 8 people in there a couple of times. And this 9 guy came in here and did three things and --10 MR. HALLINAN: Did he ever give you 11 a price on what it would take --12 MR. KEARNEY: What he's doing is --13 one of the things we talked about was getting 14 one new unit up there while the other one was 15 still running instead of buying both of them 16 because it's fairly expensive. It's pretty 17 expensive. So but, I mean, those units are 16 18 years old now. So they're running to the end 19 of their lifespan. 20 MR. HALLINAN: I mean, every 21 election cycle we seem to take a beating. 22 MR. KEARNEY: I know, every election 23 It will probably be 90 degrees in May. day. 24 MR. HALLINAN: And there will be no 25 air conditioning or it will be a freezing day.

1 We can't win. Thank you, Chris. You will check into prices. 2 3 MR. KEARNEY: Oh, yeah. 4 also involved in this also. So we're going to 5 have to go a bidding thing. So I already put out to Trane that we're going to be looking for 6 7 some. 8 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. 9 MR. AMICO: Thank you, Mr. Kearney. MR. RUGGIERO: 10 Mr. Chairman, that 11 will conclude the Treasurer/finance report and 12 department heads. Number ten, Public Comment. 13 MR. AMICO: Would anyone from the 14 public like to address Council this evening? 15 MR. DUNCAN: Gary Duncan, 117 Barton 16 Just a few things, first, at our last Street. 17 Council meeting I spoke to everybody about the 18 Older Adult Protective Services Act. I want to 19 thank Councilman Dempsey for his assistance with that as well. 20 21 We both heard from Representative 22 Mullins two Thursdays ago. I was lucky enough 23 to be with Representatives Kosierowski, Mullins 24 as well as County Commissioner Chris Chermak. 25 That bill continues to sit in

committee in Harrisburg. I was with the
Secretary of Ageing last week and with some
other administrative personnel from Ageing. So
there is still a push in Harrisburg to get that
bill out of committee so we can get it through.

So I want to thank the members of Council and the members of the public that may have written letters regarding that bill because it's important for everybody in this Commonwealth over the age of 60. I've been coming to these meetings -- I think my first meeting Jerry Hart was on Council. So I'm going to date myself and say that might have been the year 2010.

And I want to thank the department heads tonight. They were the finest reports I've heard at a council meeting since at least that date. I appreciate whoever put that in action. It's rewarding as a taxpayer, as a citizen to hear how each and every department is doing.

It is nice to hear what problems you are running up against. And it's great to hear resolution. I was even glad to hear Councilman Hallinan talk about the situation for voting

Just a couple questions, I'm not trying to single anybody out. Chief, for an old guy with bifocals and gray hair, when it comes to ENRADD, you said it takes two officers to run it? And two officers are currently trained and two officers are going to be trained?

than two trained. We need two officers to run it. And I'm not sure of the exact number of guys that have it now. We have a few that are able to run it.

MR. DUNCAN: And bear with me, so that will be -- so that runs seven days a week then if it's possible with the staffing.

CHIEF MARCHESE: No. We're shorthanded on a lot of shifts. Like I said, we have probably four guys out now long-term. We're scraping.

MR. DUNCAN: And then both full time and part-time officers ideally would be trained to do this.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Correct.

MR. DUNCAN: Thanks for that. I

1 appreciate it. The list of blighted properties I was behind you so I couldn't hear you real 2 3 clearly. And I know you were speaking to Mrs. 4 Brier. But just for those of us that might 5 have been behind you and also not heard too clearly, the list of blighted properties --6 7 I'll address this to Council as well as to Mr. 8 Lorince. 9 Does the public have access to those 10 blighted properties? Are they listed on 11 Dunmorepa.gov site or --12 MR. LORINCE: No, I have a list in 13 my office. 14 MR. DUNCAN: Yeah, I'd be interested 15 in it just from the old days with the 16 Neighborhood Watch and those types of things. 17 I appreciate that. And then, Chief, one last 18 time. The smoke detectors, what is the date on 19 that? May 7th? 20 CHIEF DENAPLES: May 7th. 21 MR. DUNCAN: And then from --22 CHIEF DENAPLES: 10 until 2:00 from 23 Reilly Street to where you get on 84. 24 MR. DUNCAN: Okay. All right. And, 25 Didge, the same as always. Tell the guys

thanks again with the snow removal and that storm Saturday and everything else. And I guess last but not least, I'm the historian with the parade association.

God willing, there is a parade this Saturday, so 10:00 mass, 11:00 parade -- 11:45 is the parade. And I'll see you tomorrow at the executive meeting. Thanks everybody.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Mr. Duncan.

Anybody else from the public like to address

Council? Ma'am?

MS. SMITH: Dorothy Smith, 1631

Electric Street, Dunmore. So I was here a

month ago and we talked about some issues with
the bridge and that we were going to possibly

make contact with anybody. I'm here to find
out has anything developed in that month?

MAYOR CONWAY: Since the last time you were here I met with -- along with Vito and Joe Lorince, we had a meeting with PennDOT shortly after our meeting here. And I had a call with Senator Casey's office as well. And in our PennDOT meeting, I thought one of the bigger takeaways that we had was PennDOT agreed that instead of an annual inspection, they

would be willing to come out every six months just -- they'd send their engineer out just to ensure that they are keeping a closer eye on it.

But again, the ownership is still an issue. And it's a bigger problem. It's going to take some time to come up with the answer there.

MS. SMITH: So it was due to be inspected. Did they inspect it in --

MAYOR CONWAY: I believe the day of the inspection is March --

MR. HALLINAN: Monday, the 21st.

MAYOR CONWAY: Yeah, so that's that inspection. And then again, they said they would be willing to come out every six months. But the engineer said that he would work with us as best he can. So I was pretty happy to hear that they would do it every six months.

MS. SMITH: And do we have -- were the commissioners at that meeting also, the county commissioners?

MR. RUGGIERO: Not at our PennDOT meeting. They were not. Representative Mullins Office was at the PennDOT meeting.

MS. SMITH: That's the state, okay. So once again, the question is who owns the bridge. So if the county owns the bridge, is the borough stepping away from this?

MAYOR CONWAY: No, I think we would still push the county to do something. But again, like I said the last time you were here, in all of our talks even if we had a check, it's going take a long time to get it going. So I know our solicitor -- Attorney Perry is going to talk to the county as well to again, even if ownership is not declared, my understanding from talking to Senator Casey's office was we could still kind of get the ball rolling on it where -- whether it's plans or something else.

So I'm pretty hopeful in the next couple months we could at least, you know, start pushing the rock up the hill a little bit.

MS. SMITH: Because obviously, it's going to take two years at least to build a new bridge. It's not going to happen over night if we're lucky.

MAYOR CONWAY: It's going to take

longer that than. 1 2 MS. SMITH: I could see you looking. 3 MAYOR CONWAY: It's going to take 4 probably five years. 5 MS. SMITH: It's probably going to take longer. 6 MAYOR CONWAY: Yeah, but again, I 7 8 now met and Vito has as well with Senator 9 Flynn, Representative Mullins, PennDOT, Senator Casey -- his office. So again, we're doing the 10 11 best we can. But again, it's been --12 MS. SMITH: Do we know when the 13 infrastructure money is going to be released? 14 MAYOR CONWAY: They sent us a couple documents. I'm not sure when it will be 15 16 released though. 17 MS. SMITH: Okay. But they're all 18 on it. They all know we're --19 MAYOR CONWAY: And they did say that there's going to be 147 million dollars set 20 21 aside for offset bridges I think is the term 22 they used. So again, they're --23 MS. SMITH: Okay. So at the next 24 meeting we'll know what the inspection was all 25 about too. Do they meet with you guys for the

1 inspection? 2 MR. RUGGIERO: I don't know if we'll 3 have that at the next meeting. I don't 4 remember the turnaround time once they inspect 5 it and get us the official report. I believe it's 90 days. 6 7 MS. SMITH: Do they take one of you 8 with them when they inspect? 9 MR. RUGGIERO: We're making it a 10 point to go. I believe Mayor will be there, 11 our Solicitor will be there, our code guy and 12 I'll be there. I also invited our fire chief 13 and our police chief there. So if there is an 14 issue and there has to be an alternate route, 15 everybody's on the same page. 16 MS. SMITH: All right. Thank you 17 very much. 18 MR. AMICO: Thank you. Anybody else 19 from the public like to address Council this 20 evening? Seeing none? MS. SMITH: So is the loop light 21 out -- I'm sorry. I just thought about that. 22 23 Is the loop light out? 24 MR. HALLINAN: It's just so 25 expensive when we checked into it.

MR. RUGGIERO: We checked into it and I mentioned last meeting about possibly Mr. Judge having the means for it to do it. But right now it's not solving the problem. The problem is you can't go over there with 5 ton.

So it will give you a single lane.

But at the end of the day, the ultimate thing is, you can't technically get any vehicles above 5 ton over it. So whether you have a light or not, it's not going to help that situation.

So the situation is, the infrastructure of that bridge is collapsing. We could put a light up for, you know, one way purposes. But until -- right now there is -- that is a two-way bridge.

MS. SMITH: It's supposed to be, yeah.

MR. RUGGIERO: Well, when we did it,
Captain Barth's police Excursion and
Mr. Judge's truck was side by side and drove up
the street. So that's how we ensured it was a
two lane. I don't think certain vehicles look
at it that way now. But it is in theory a two

lane. So the whole thing with that bridge is the 5 ton as I believe the Mayor and all of Council said.

That's the problem we have to rectify. We have to look at that like Councilman Hallinan said, the expense of it. We're trying to get a box a timing panel for the information that we have. The materials that we have we need a box to time it on both ends. So that is still up in the air as well.

MS. SMITH: I know people do like to walk over it. I mean, we have people that like to -- she walks to -- she doesn't walk it anymore.

MR. RUGGIERO: The reason the walking barriers are there, the engineer did develop those water barriers for that area because span -- that beam is no good. So to walk on that sidewalk is very dangerous.

That's the beam on that bridge that is bad.

So, obviously, there is no sidewalks. On the other side of the bridge you would have to walk down the middle of the road. And that is unfortunate right now and we can't control of that because of that beam that is at

issue.

MR. HALLINAN: And, Dorothy, let's get through the March 21st inspection because that could tell us a lot more. There could be anything from it's going to stay the same weight limit or they could shut it down. So let's see what happens on March 21st.

And then I guess another -- the next big thing too is like, I mean, they could move forward with the money through Senator Casey's office but who owns the bridge.

MS. SMITH: We don't need to kick the can on this anymore.

MR. HALLINAN: I understand that.

And in my world, I would love to see the county and the borough take ownership of the bridge.

But I don't know where that's going. That's just one opinion.

MS. SMITH: Your residents live in the borough and in the county. Do we need the county commissions -- do people need to go down and talk to the people at the courthouse?

MR. HALLINAN: The county level, I would go to a county meeting also -- the more the merrier. I hate to say that. But, you

know, you got to let them aware of the problem also. I mean, we told them and sent them letters. But, you know, it's a pretty serious situation over there.

MS. SMITH: And I understand what you're saying. It didn't happen overnight. I know that. I understand that. But we're at that point now. We're at the point where it's dangerous.

MAYOR CONWAY: In our meeting with PennDOT as well we did discuss alternate routes if there is an emergency how we can get the fire truck there faster, whether it was widening -- what's that street up there?

Sand Street.

MAYOR CONWAY: Not widening it but there's one point of Sand Street that --

MR. LORINCE:

MS. SMITH: They could just about make the turn. And you could ask Mr. DeNaples. I'm sure it's very hard to make the turn. Her mother's home was on fire -- her kitchen. Her mother had a kitchen fire. And they had to go all around. Thank God they had a fire extinguisher.

MAYOR CONWAY: Right. I'm very

sorry that happened. All I could say is I'm doing by best and Council is too. This has been a problem. The article I'm reading since 1982, so for me to come in --

MS. SMITH: I'm not picking on you.

MAYOR CONWAY: I understand. But again, I'm literally doing everything I can to meet with everybody I can to try to get things done. So any update I have I'll tell you anything you want to hear -- or anything I know.

MS. SANTARSIERO: Rosemary

Santarsiero, 205 Sand Street. If no one is
taking ownership of the bridge, like Dorothy is
saying, how long is it going to be? Like, are
we just going to go back and forth, like, we
don't own it? So then no one is going to take
ownership of it. Then what do we do? Where do
you go from there?

ATTY. PERRY: Ma'am, there's a concept it's called an orphan bridge. And that's what we believe this is an orphan bridge. There are bridges that were built over railroad right-of-ways in the Commonwealth.

And several of them have been

designated as orphan bridges, which would mean nobody owns it in which case the state would have responsibility to repair it or replace it and that's what we're working on now.

We talked to the county about that concept and they haven't gotten back to us as to what they think. Of course, they're not going to claim they own it either. So it's a complicated situation. But that should not affect the funding.

MAYOR CONWAY: That's what Senator

Casey's office told us as well. Even if there
is no ownership we could still start pushing

for funding and getting plans in place to where
we can replace that bridge. So it shouldn't

stand in the way of us starting to make some
progress.

MR. HALLINAN: I would tell you this and, Dorothy, I've been on Council -- this is starting my ninth year. This is the most traction I've seen this bridge get. And I'm welcoming it and thank you for pushing this bridge because it's hard getting into that section of town and it's a nightmare. It's an accident waiting to happen. So thank you for

your perseverance.
MS. SANTARSIERO: It gets a lot of
traffic. There's a lot of people that go up to
Mount Margaret. It gets a lot of traffic.
MS. SMITH: There's a restaurant.
MR. HALLINAN: It's a main artery up
there. So thank you.
MR. AMICO: Anyone else from the
public this evening?

MR. AMICO: Seeing none.
MR. RUGGIERO: Number 11, Public

I think it's a black eye. And I personally don't -- I'm on contract negotiations. I would like to see us as a community and labor relations treat our

employees a little more promptly. That's all I have about that.

Also, there was -- as a liaison for the police department and the clerical union, I'd like all paperwork complaints given to Janet and I. We're both on the -- liaisons for the police department. And for the clerical union, I would like Katherine and I to receive paperwork as it comes to fruition. That's all. Thank you.

MR. AMICO: Thank you, Beth.
Mr. O'Malley.

MR. O'MALLEY: I just want to thank everyone for coming. I want to thank the department heads for coming and giving your detailed reports. The DPW, Mr. Judge, I want to thank you and your men for the hard work over the weekend with the snowstorm that we just had.

I want to also thank our speakers.

Mr. Duncan, I did call Representative Mullins office to get your bill out of committee.

Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Santarsiero, the bridge is a mess and we're going to do everything we possibly can. It's in deplorable condition.

And lastly, I want to congratulate our Lady Bucks basketball team on their district championship. And they had an incredible win yesterday to move into the quarter finals in the state playoff. I wish them luck on Wednesday in their game against Jim Thorpe. And that is at Berwick High School, 7 p.m. Wednesday night. Thank you.
