MR. AMICO: Seeing none.

MR. RUGGIERO: Number four is a motion to adopt Ordinance #2022-3, which is pave cuts. The purpose of this Ordinance amends Chapter 229 of the Borough Code entitled "Sidewalks and Streets." Article IV Pave Cuts, regulated the work performed on streets within the Borough and requiring permits and inspections thereof.

Ordinance #2022-3 will require that a permit must be obtained before any opening can be made in any paved thoroughfare, cartway, sidewalk, or tree lawn in the Borough. Any excavations in cutting in these areas are classified as a pave cut.

MR. AMICO: I'll look for a motion to adopt Ordinance 2022-3, Pave Cuts.

MR. HALLINAN: I'll make that motion.

MR. DEMPSEY: Second.

MR. AMICO: I have a motion and a second. On the question? Anyone on the question?

MR. O'MALLEY: On the question, I'm looking for to this because there's so many

1 pave cuts. It seems as soon as the paving project is done they come right in and they, 2 3 you know, they have these pave cuts and they're 4 sinking. And this will help make sure that the 5 quality of the paving that is replacing the pave cut is of, I guess, top quality. 6 7 MS. BRIER: And we're having it 8 inspected, right, Trip? 9 MR. O'MALLEY: Yes. 10 MS. BRIER: Yeah, we're going to 11 farm that out. 12 MR. AMICO: Yes, we'll have a pave 13 cut inspector. 14 MR. BRIER: Yeah, that's good. MR. O'MALLEY: Make sure all the 15 16 levels of, you know, each part of it is to 17 specifications. 18 MR. AMICO: Anyone else? All those 19 in favor say aye. 20 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 21 MR. AMICO: Opposed? 22 (No response.) 23 MR. AMICO: Ayes have it. 24 MR. RUGGIERO: There's an addendum

to the agenda. I apologize, number five is our

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financial report, Mark Burton, our Treasurer.

MR. BURTON: Good evening Council, brief snapshot of our financial report for the month of March. Our net income for the month of March is \$691,593, which produced a net income for the year, year to date of 1.1 million dollars.

Overview of the income for the month was a significant increase in our tax revenues as anticipated. We received our yearly Adams billboard lease for 2022 of \$25,000; our liquid fuels rebate, \$407,000. And we received approximately \$28,000 in insurance rebates.

On the expense side, we made our third of five annual installments for our 2020 six police cruisers. That was \$63,000; purchased rock salt, \$32,000. The TAN has been repaid in full that we borrowed off in the beginning of the year of \$175,000. And we're even with the TAN, paid in full. We made a partial MMO payment of \$60,000.

And we also made a payment of \$57,000 for our property and liability insurance. That was the second of the four quarterly installments. And the net income for

1 the month, \$691,000. 2 MR. BRIER: Mark, I just had a 3 question about Central Square Technologies. We 4 paid them \$5,600. 5 MR. BURTON: Oh, that's the police It's the annual software. It's a 6 7 maintenance fee. 8 MR. BRIER: Oh, okay. I just never 9 saw that one before. 10 MR. BURTON: Yeah, it's once a year 11 that we pay that. It's a yearly installment. 12 MS. BRIER: And I want to 13 congratulate you on the half marathon, came in 14 top 20. MR. BURTON: Thank you. 15 16 appreciate that. Still recovering. 17 MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Mark. 18 MR. BRIER: Thanks, Mark. 19 MR. AMICO: Thank you. 20 MR. RUGGIERO: Number six, another 21 addendum, my apologies, motion to pay the 22 unpaid bills. 23 MR. AMICO: I'll look for a motion 24 to pay the unpaid bills. 25 MS. ZANGARDI: I'll make that

1 motion. MR. AMICO: I have a motion. I'11 2 3 look for a second. 4 MR. DEMPSEY: Second. 5 MR. AMICO: Motion and second. Anyone on the question? All those in favor. 6 7 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 8 MR. AMICO: Opposed? 9 (No response.) MR. AMICO: Ayes have it. 10 Thank 11 you. 12 MR. RUGGIERO: Public comment. 13 MR. AMICO: Would anybody from the 14 public like to address Council this evening? 15 MS. JUDGE: Sally Judge, 166 Winton 16 Street Dunmore. I'm here this evening tonight 17 with John McKenna who is the union steward for 18 the DPW and Ryan Zarkesh. He's our 19 representative for the UFCW. 20 We're just here tonight -- I was 21 here back in January and discussing a little 22 bit about our contract being held up, stuff 23 like that. And I know you had given us some 24 information about PEL coming in and doing this

and doing that.

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Well, still to this day we still -we filed a ULP which you all know. And we're
just trying to figure out are you backing the
Borough on this? Are you moving forward with
it? We've heard nothing. To this date, our
union still has not received anything from the
attorneys that was put out to him two months
ago.

So either he's not doing his job or you guys are with him. So I don't -- we just don't know where we stand. We'd just like to get some information if we can.

MR. AMICO: We'll, I don't want to discuss contract issues at a public meeting. So we're not going to discuss contract issues at a public meeting.

MS. JUDGE: I understand that. But when you don't get anything as we sit around and do our work every day, prepare everything for you guys to move forward. You're moving forward with paving projects. You're moving forward with somebody coming in and doing your pave cuts and somebody coming in and doing your potholes and somebody coming in and doing this, you're spending money to figure out how to save

money.

In the meantime, your employees are sitting there working for you and we're getting nothing. And again, if we want to discuss this, I would prefer somebody contact me and say let's get a meeting together.

MR. AMICO: Okay. Let's go with that.

MS. JUDGE: Okay. All right. Fine. Thank you.

MR. AMICO: Thank you.

MS. JUDGE: Thank you.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Sally.

MR. AMICO: Anybody else from the public like to address Council this evening?

(No response.)

MR. AMICO: Seeing none.

MR. RUGGIERO: Public officials.

We'll start with Mr. Kearney from the Community

Center.

MR. KEARNEY: Hi every one. This is a report for the next couple weeks here. It's going to be busy. Wednesday we have a meeting with Jog for Jude people in here. I'll get a more final information of the meeting Wednesday

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night about numbers and stuff like that.

Thursday night there's a rental for -- we've been renting to River Front the entire gym, their AAU Program. Friday we have a party rental in here and in the court -- in one of the courts in the gym.

Sunday we're closed for Easter.

Then next week there's the final meeting with the Jog for Jude people Wednesday. Right now tentatively right now we're looking that we are going to have to shut here down. They're going to start loading stuff in on Thursday.

Thursday night they start bringing in tables. Tents come Friday. They're going to do their race packet pickup Friday night. Saturday they're bringing food and stuff like that. I'm going to get all the details the next two meetings about shutting down parking lots.

And Rich Barth is always with us shutting down the roads and all of that logistical stuff. And then Sunday we're looking at a cleanup day as of now because as they said, they're going to -- they're planning on being out of here at 9:00 on Friday night

with fireworks or whatever.

And they're not going to be interested in cleaning up Friday night. So we're going to do it Sunday. But any more information I have if you need to know it, just let me know.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chris.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Chris.

MR. RUGGIERO: Mr. Lorince.

MR. LORINCE: How are you doing? I gave you my reports. I handed everybody a report. I'll just give a brief -- the health licenses we're still doing our inspections. We have to do Drinker Street to complete that.

Our permits, we have electrical, addition renovations, pools and heat pumps.

And we have a -- the renovations at Capital Health and Meade Street, they're actually building some offices. You could see our letters went out on the different complaints on nuisance properties. Citations are out there.

And planning and zoning we had meetings on planning and zoning, the O'Neill Highway for fast food service drive through and the zoning for the storage on Meade Street.

1 And then I did meet with the water company to actually go over Grove Street, 2 3 Blakely Street and some of the pave cuts. Thev 4 said after April 18th is when the plants open 5 up full time and then they'll address all those and they'll start doing their paving program. 6 7 MS. BRIER: Like, before the summer 8 you think? 9 MR. LORINCE: Definitely before the 10 summer. 11 MS. BRIER: How long has it been, 12 two years? 13 MR. LORINCE: Yeah, two years. Thev 14 said once the plants open full time, we're 15 number one on the list. 16 MS. BRIER: And, Mike, wasn't there 17 something we're going to get in exchange for 18 letting them park on that property we own on 19 Blakely Street behind Schautz? Are they going 20 to pave something? 21 MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, they did. Ι mean, they're doing it. 22 It's ongoing. It's 23 that they're levelling. If you go back there, 24 they've levelling off that whole area back 25 there so that eventually there'll be -- if we

1 just put some stone down or something you'll be 2 able to park back there. They carved in a road 3 actually as well so you could enter in there as 4 well. 5 MS. BRIER: I did see that. I thought they were going to do some parking up 6 7 there. MR. DEMPSEY: It is. 8 It's a parking 9 lot. 10 MS. BRIER: And then on the other 11 side of Schautz like on the Prospect Avenue 12 they're not doing anything with that parking 13 lot there. 14 MR. DEMPSEY: No, not that I'm 15 The existing parking lot? aware of. 16 MR. BRIER: Yeah. 17 MR. DEMPSEY: No. They're putting 18 in the parking lot in the back. 19 MS. BRIER: Okay. 20 MR. RUGGIERO: Mr. Judge. 21 MR. JUDGE: Let's see. March, we 22 just got our last load of salt, 236 tons. 23 went through about 1,200 tons so far this year. 24 That should be it for the salt. The yard waste 25 Next week will be yard waste. starts now.

1 This week is recycling. We got banners up for 2 Jog for Jude and the other banners for the 3 summer. And --4 MS. BRIER: Did you have the 5 sewers -- are you going to clean out any of the -- there seemed to be storm --6 MR. JUDGE: Right, the water company 7 8 cleans them out with the jet. They have to be 9 sucked out. I just gave them a list Friday of the ones that I know that are really bad. 10 11 they could call the office to Sally or Jeanie. 12 MS. BRIER: I just noticed some of 13 them are really blocked. 14 MR. JUDGE: There's one blocked 15 right by your house. I saw it. That's on the 16 list. 17 MS. BRIER: Thanks for doing that 18 patching that you are doing around town. 19 MR. JUDGE: The guys are out every 20 day patching. 21 MR. HALLINAN: Do you know where I 22 Question for you, with the banner live? 23 that's -- usually we have two banners. But you 24 said the one came down. And we need to 25 restring. How much would we need to do and get

1	that because we have such a demand for banners.
2	We only have the one spot right on
3	MR. JUDGE: We could put a we
4	have to see the power company, PPL to get
5	permission and we could put it up. Last time
6	they put it up for us.
7	MR. HALLINAN: Okay.
8	MR. JUDGE: Other than that
9	MR. HALLINAN: Whatever we have to
10	do, okay?
11	MR. JUDGE: Okay.
12	MR. HALLINAN: Because, I mean,
13	we're getting demands now for
14	MR. JUDGE: Yeah, we can do that.
15	MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.
16	MR. JUDGE: And that's about it.
17	Every day they are up putting the pitcher mound
18	up up at Schautz getting that ready every day.
19	MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you for that
20	too, by the way. That's bad, real bad. I
21	appreciate it.
22	MR. JUDGE: Well, that's about it.
23	MR. HALLINAN: You're on top of the
24	patching, which the rain storms just
25	MR. JUDGE: So far we went through

1,200 tons. That's a lot of patch.

MR. HALLINAN: All the guys did a great job. And like I say if anybody knows, a lot of the patch is staying. But with these torrential downpours, it really eats a lot of them right back up again.

MR. JUDGE: The 15th the black top plant opens.

MR. HALLINAN: Good. Thank the guys for helping. Appreciate it.

MR. RUGGIERO: Chief DeNaples.

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening. Just a couple small updates from last month's meeting, not a whole lot going on in the Fire Department. The biggest expenditure for the month of April is going to be \$1,587 for service for our Amkus rescue tools. There's a couple other small purchases.

Up to this point, there's going to be 40 hours overtime for the Fire Department. That's pretty much the whole ball of wax. We had one residential structure fire on March 30th, which was after our last meeting was contained to an electrical panel and a little bit of damage on the first floor beside for

1 some smoke damage throughout the residence. No injuries on that. And that's pretty much it. 2 3 MS. BRIER: Chief DeNaples, I just 4 want to say, you know, you heard about the electrical contractor who went in there after 5 your department saying there was not any --6 7 never saw anything -- such a great cleanup of a 8 place for -- he said the firemen in Dunmore did 9 an unbelievable job. So tell that to them as 10 well. 11 CHIEF DENAPLES: I will pass that 12 Thank you. on. 13 MR. BRIER: I mean, this guy is a 14 pretty experienced contractor and he's seen a 15 lot of them and he said it was fantastic. 16 CHIEF DENAPLES: We try to keep as 17 much damage to a minimum. 18 MS. BRIER: And that poor family, they're out. They're out. 19 CHIEF DENAPLES: They're still out. 20 21 Thank you. 22 MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you, Chief. 23 MR. RUGGIERO: Chief Marchese. 24 CHIEF MARCHESE: Our calls for 25 service for the month of March, our department

responded to 943 calls for service. This is up 120 calls from the month of February. Arrests, for the month of March our department made 19 criminal arrests. We issued seven citations for non-traffic violations. We issued 30 citations for motor vehicle violations during the month.

We still have two officers off
long-term and Heart and Lung. We have one that
is actually pending. So we're strapped. We
have hardly any part-time officers at work so
we're hurting pretty bad. We did advertise. I
think we got one application. That was it so
far.

MR. DEMPSEY: Did we lose another guy too?

CHIEF MARCHESE: The one guy, he's also going to be working part time in another department and they scheduled him three or four days a week. So he's limited with us now. So we're in trouble part-timewise. Six shifts went out for overtime for the month basically because we had no part-time officer to fill in. You know, like I said, we're stuck.

Training March 7th through the 10th,

. .

Officers Ments, Sohns, Richardson and Bonavoglia participated in the ALERT Training. This was hosted by our department along with Marywood. The FBI ran it. It doesn't cost us a penny and they gave us four seats.

ALERT stands for Advanced Law
Enforcement Training for active shooters. So
it was a good training for them to go through,
especially with our school guys.

During the month of March, our day shift tagged over 35 vehicles that were abandoned on Borough streets. Out of the 35, six vehicles were towed. After tagging them we got phone calls. People say, "Listen, can you give us a couple of days, we'll get it out there."

And, you know, we obliged them. So far, six had to get towed out of the 35. So that was a pretty good success. From March 25th to 30th, our office participated in the PA Aggressive Driving Campaign. Officers conducted traffic stops and utilized ENRADD speed enforcement device during that detail.

This is a state-funded program and all the costs were fully reimbursed to the

1 During the detail, 32 traffic stops Borough. 2 were made resulting in 17 citations and 15 3 written warnings. 4 Estimates for a new body armor, I 5 submitted them to Mayor Conway. I don't know if he forwarded it to you yet but we got three 6 7 different quotes. And we actually -- our 8 officers like the ones that were the lowest 9 bid, which was good. And that's all I have. 10 MR. BRIER: Chief, when you say it's funded by the state, do they reimburse us for 11 12 payroll? 13 CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes. 14 MR. BRIER: So the number of hours 15 someone works. 16 CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes. I think it's 17 time and a half for guys and they pay us, 18 Public PA Aggressive Driving. 19 MS. BRIER: Okay. I saw them out 20 there. 21 MR. HALLINAN: Chief, with the 22 part-time officers there is just not a pool out 23 there? Are we competitive? 24 CHIEF MARCHESE: Every department in 25 the county is hurting. They're crying. Thev

have nobody. We just -- the guy we just lost was working a lot of shifts for us now. But we're down to like two guys. If something happens, we're in trouble.

MS. OVEN: Besides the advertising we're doing, is there anything else we can do? Can we help you with anything as far as trying to --

the message out there. And all of the other departments are in the same predicament. There is nobody there. We could have the next school that is coming through. They don't graduate until August.

Officer Richardson actually teaches there. And he has a couple applicants that were interested in possibly working here. But, you know, by the time they get done in August with the paper, they won't be ready until the end of the year.

MR. HALLINAN: And on another note, when you get your new vests, I think there is a nice place we could donate them to. That would be a great idea. Have the men donate them.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Absolutely. We

1 have no problem with that. MR. HALLINAN: 2 Thank you. 3 MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chief. 4 MR. RUGGIERO: Public officials. 5 MR. AMICO: Mr. Ruggiero. MR. RUGGIERO: I have nothing. 6 ATTY. PERRY: I have nothing. 7 8 MR. AMICO: We'll start with Mr. 9 Hallinan this evening, please. 10 MR. HALLINAN: I think I said a lot 11 already. I just want to say Happy Easter 12 everybody and have a nice holiday and thank That's all I have. 13 vou. 14 MR. AMICO: Mrs. Oven? 15 MS. OVEN: I want to thank Didge and 16 his guys for being so responsive about the 17 potholes. It's certainly a big issue in the 18 Borough. So we're trying to come up with a 19 good plan so appreciate your patience. 20 MR. AMICO: Thank you. Mrs. Brier? 21 MS. BRIER: Nope, just hopefully 22 we'll have a spring some time this year and 23 wish everyone a happy holiday. 24 MR. AMICO: Miss Zangardi? 25 MS. ZANGARDI: Just a couple things

1 to follow up on, please. Joe Lorince, Lee Ann 2 and Johnny Perry's property with the telephone 3 pole in the middle of the width of their 4 property on the property, did you talk to PPL 5 about having that moved to the corner to the curb? 6 7 MR. LORINCE: We can talk to them. 8 I didn't know. Nobody called and complained --9 oh, you're talking about the one in --MS. ZANGARDI: On the property, the 10 11 new one. 12 MR. LORINCE: You're talking about East Drinker Street? 13 14 MS. ZANGARDI: Correct. 15 MR. LORINCE: No, they won't move 16 it. It's in their right-of-way. 17 MS. ZANGARDI: It's in the PP& L's 18 right-of-way? 19 MR. LORINCE: Yes. They looked at As a matter of fact, half of the building 20 21 is on the right-of-way. 22 Okay. And the other MS. ZANGARDI: 23 thing is 960 East Drinker Street, 962 is being 24 renovated. 960, if we could send them a letter 25 and ask them --

1 MR. LORINCE: 960 came here for a permit. 2 3 MS. ZANGARDI: 962 came in for the 4 building permit. 5 MR. LORINCE: 960 came in. MS. ZANGARDI: Did they really? 6 That's all I have. 7 That's awesome. Great. 8 Thank you. Appreciate it. 9 MR. AMICO: Thank you. 10 Mr. O'Malley. 11 MR. O'MALLEY: I just want to say 12 thank you to our Borough employees for coming 13 tonight. We appreciate your hard work and 14 dedication to our Borough. I want to thank 15 Mrs. Oven and Mr. Amico for their help with the 16 flooding in the backyards on East Warren 17 Street. Hopefully there could be an amicable 18 outcome for the residents there. 19 Dunmore's Quiz Bowl team 20 participated in the scholastic challenge, Ally 21 McNeff, Liam Ahern, Jessica Trauger, Kevin 22 Walsh and Cadie Lewis are part of the Dunmore 23 Holy Cross came in second place. 24 congratulations to all of them. Ciera Toomy 25 from Dunmore High School will be announcing

this evening where she will be attending school and playing basketball.

So we're all I'm sure looking forward to that. And congratulations to Ciera. And Dunmore High School Crimson Company will be putting on the Wizard of Oz next week April 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 28th, 29th and 30th at 7 p.m.

The 23rd is a 2 p.m. show because of Jog for Jude. So Jog for Jude is Saturday night, April 23rd. The Elite Bunny Hunt will be this Saturday, April 16th at St. Anthony's playground. I'm not sure what time that's at.
