So hopefully this 21 will cut down on our overtime. 22 MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mr. Ehnot. 23 Same thing, I mean, we keep losing guys to, you 24 know, getting full-time jobs. You know, I'm 25 happy for those guys. But it does hurt us. Ιt

makes our guys work longer hours and paying them overtime and filling the schedule so we have a full roster on the road to protect everybody.

So I'm happy again to see some more names on here. So I appreciate all the work by Chief Marchese and the police department as well. Anyone else on the question? All those in favor?

ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

MR. DEMPSEY: Opposed?

(No response.)

MR. DEMPSEY: They ayes have it and so moved.

MR. RUGGIERO: Number seven is Treasurer financial report, Mr. Burton.

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.

Okay, well, as of this month March 31st, it

might appear that we're running at an operating
deficit of 1.3 million dollars. That may be
the truth. But there's one major qualifying
event that occurred in March which caused the
deficit was to pay off the 2013 pension bond
with People's Bank. That was 2.6 million
dollars.

Okay.

Yep.

1 So if we were to subtract that and reduce it from the total packet we would be 2 3 operating at a 1.3 million dollars surplus. 4 paying off that particular loan, the Borough 5 would save approximately \$375,000 of interest expense over the next seven years, which is 6 7 about \$54,000 per year in interest savings. 8 that was the big --9 Mark, I have a question MS. BRIER: 10 about that. Why didn't that hit the balance 11 sheet instead of the income statement? 12 know what I mean? 13 MR. BURTON: Because we operate on a 14 cash basis --15 MS. BRIER: Oh, right. 16 Thank you. 17 MR. BURTON: That's the biggest swing from 1.3 million dollar surplus to 1.3 18 19 million dollar deficit essentially. 20 Thanks for explaining MR. DEMPSEY: 21 that. 22 MR. BURTON: So that was the big 23 agenda item for March. Some other highlights 24 for the month, another strong real estate tax 25 collection for the month of March. We're

actually -- it's not reflected in the numbers because March's deposit would be made in the beginning of April.

But right now we're operating at about 73 percent of revenue collected for the year through three quarters which is outstanding. It's much higher than we anticipated. Also we received our liquid fuels payment. That was \$410,000 for this year. That's based on a couple different scenarios of population, amount of roads you have and the amount that the state is allocated to distribute to its municipalities. So it's a little bit less than last year.

MS. BRIER: Mark, is that under the line state shared revenue --

MR. BURTON: State shared revenues, yes. As far as the expenses are concerned, we made our annual lease payment for our police cars that were \$65,000; \$40,000 to our MMO payment, an additional \$56,000 in rock salt for February's invoices that we paid in March, which is higher because of the rough winter that we had; and again, the 2.6 million dollars to pay off the People's loan.

1 There was no need to draw on the TAN again this month. So that's still fully in 2 3 As far as the budget to actual, again, 4 real estate collections, a little higher than 5 anticipated. We weren't sure with the pandemic how quickly people would be paying. 6 But they 7 seem to be responding pretty well. 8 MR. DEMPSEY: Mark, we were 9 expecting -- or maybe not expecting, but health 10 care reimbursement. Did we receive that yet, 11 any portion of that? 12 MR. BURTON: Not yet. That will 13 come in two portions. There's going to be one 14 in May or June and another in October. MR. DEMPSEY: I wasn't sure if it 15 16 was March or April. It's May. 17 MR. BURTON: Right. It's May or 18 June and then in October or November for the 19 second portion. MR. HALLINAN: Mark, that 1.6 that 20 we're supposed to get --21 22 MS. BRIER: Tell everyone what 23 you're expecting. 24 MR. BURTON: It's approximately 25 \$900,000.

1 MS. BRIER: Really? I think we only budgeted six. 2 3 MR. BURTON: We budgeted six. It's 4 going to be closer to nine. 5 MS. BRIER: Yay. MR. HALLINAN: Mark, that 1.6 6 American Cares money, are we seeing any of that 7 8 yet or what's going on with that? 9 No, that will be --MR. BURTON: 10 MR. RUGGIERO: I'm sorry? 11 MR. HALLINAN: The 1.6 that we're 12 supposed to get from the government. 13 MR. RUGGIERO: That's 1.28. 14 that will go through Lackawanna County. They 15 haven't finalized how they're going to do that. 16 It might come in two or three different 17 tranches. But the Borough is expected 1.28 in 18 return for the essential employees that we 19 employed during the pandemic. MS. BRIER: That could be spread 20 21 over a couple of years. 22 MR. RUGGIERO: It could be spread 23 over two or three years or possibly one. 24 county doesn't know yet. 25 MR. HALLINAN: Did they give what it

24

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MR. RUGGIERO: No, it's just to deal with COVID expenses. So my example to them was we employed our police department from when President Trump on the 13th of March declared a national pandemic all the way to 31, December.

Our police department alone was about 1.5 million dollars worth of payroll. So if we're allocated 1.28, I asked if the payroll records would cover that and I got the answer The county doesn't know if it's going to be that easy and simple. But we're hoping that's all it takes.

MR. HALLINAN: Can we use it to pave

MR. RUGGIERO: It goes back into our operating expense.

MR. HALLINAN: We can't do infrastructure with it.

MS. BRIER: You can't do paving

MR. BURTON: Back to the budget to actual, again, the liquid fuels is about \$40,000 less than anticipated. That is just again a calculation that fluctuates from year to year.

Landfill fees are about \$75,000 less than anticipated. And again, no draw on the TAN. With the rough winter another -- \$56,000 in rock salt and again the People's payoff. But overall, budget to actual going into the first quarter, we're operating a surplus of 1.3 million dollars which is about \$350,000 ahead of budgeted numbers for the first quarter of 2021. So all and all, things are looking pretty good.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Mark.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Mark.

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Mark.

MR. RUGGIERO: Number seven, public comment.

MR. DEMPSEY: Would anyone like to address Council tonight? Mr. Jordan. Billy, would please just state your name and address for the record?

MR. JORDAN: Yeah, hi, I'm Bill

Jordan. I'm the President of the Dunmore

Police Association. The reason I'm here

tonight is I wanted to address an issue I heard
a possible -- it's possible that the school

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resource officers are going to be pulled out of the school come June permanently.

And, you know, as a parent I would want to know if that's the case what is the game plan going forward? And I would also like to, you know, we have an important election coming up next month. And I would like to, you know, find out the position of the people running on their position whether or not they are going to vote to take the police out of the schools.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Billy. We have not had any specific conversations with regard to taking school resource officers out of the school district. It certainly has been talked about in the past when the school district was getting back on its feet once they're able to afford certain protection.

But I have two children in the school district. I know Mr. Amico does. I know some of the people have grandchildren in that school district. Me talking for myself, I would never pull any officer out of the school district without another officer or some form of school resource officer in place at that

time.

MR. JORDAN: Okay, so basically, like, is there a possibility that may happen down the road?

MR. DEMPSEY: I mean, anything is possible. But we haven't discussed about anything --

MR. JORDAN: Okay, I mean, I was told by our Chief that it's a possibility that come June they are done in June.

MR. DEMPSEY: There's no specific decision that has been made. Like I said, me personally and anybody else could answer, me personally, I would never pull officers out of that school district without other officers, SRO officers being placed in the school district.

That's my personal opinion, whether it's a Dunmore Police Officer or a trained school resource officer in that building that --

MR. JORDAN: I mean, me personally,
I would rather have a Dunmore Officer there
and, you know, like going forward, like I said,
we have an important election coming up. And

I'd like to know the positions of some of the people running come June. Maybe if you guys could make that public before the election on how you feel if you feel that the Dunmore Police should be at the school or if you're open to the idea of having a private sector come in instead of the police department.

That would probably be a lot of -- a lot of people would probably want to know that before the election. All right. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Anyone else like to address Council tonight? State your name and address for the record.

MR. O'MALLEY: Good evening. Trip
O'Malley, 623 East Warren Street. I just have
two questions this evening. How much did we
spend on Schautz Stadium in total? Did any
outside donations or sources pay for anything
for Schautz Stadium or was it totally funded by
the taxpayers?

And the second question, with only
4.2 million of the 18 million left from the
Sewer Authority sale, what's the plan to pay
for the upkeep of the storm drains, the piping
that we are now responsible for?

And how much of the 13.8 million that was spent from the Sewer Authority sale was actually spent on storm water related projects?

MR. DEMPSEY: You're first -- at least I can answer your first question. I don't know specifically. I think we took a loan for Schautz for 1.5 million. And the other was received through donations -- a donor. So that is how I could tell that is how Schautz was paid for. I believe it was 1.5 and, Janet, you might be able to --

MS. BRIER: Yeah, when I looked at it, it was a -- the loan was 1.5. We took 700 out of the Sewer Authority account -- 700,000. And then there was a payment for the land off Blakely Street another 250 so over -- close to 3 million. I don't know if anybody donated anything.

But I know that Dunmore spent close to 3 million, like the Borough. But I don't know if -- I wasn't here then. I don't know if anybody contributed anything. But I know what we spent as taxpayers. We spent almost 3 million dollars on that.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, and I do know that some of it was donated. I don't know the specific amount. But all the invoices are I'm assuming public.

MR. O'MALLEY: Okay. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: You're welcome.

Anyone else like to address -- just your name and address just for the record again, please.

MS. MEDINA: Crystal Medina from
Third Street. I was actually looking for an
update on the light that was put in. It was
put in. We were just waiting to see back from
PP & L. I know when Stacey called there was a
case number or something that was needed. I
don't know if anybody had called in reference
to that?

MR. RUGGIERO: The girls in the office did take care of that. The case number that they were referencing there was a purchase order needed for that. We are on the list. It can be unfortunately an extended period of time just based on PP & L. And they give a ballpark of, you know, the next 90 to 120 days.

So we installed it, obviously. We paid for it already. We're just waiting for

1	them to power it up. We're at their disposal
2	and their mercy.
3	MS. MEDINA: So would it be better
4	for to us keep calling?
5	MR. RUGGIERO: You can. I don't
6	know in this case if the squeaky wheel gets the
7	grease. You can absolutely. We've called
8	there. And they kind of, you know, tell us the
9	same thing they're going to tell you, yeah,
10	we're going to get to it. When they actually
11	get there is a different story.
12	MS. BRIER: Can we make a call
13	just one more call?
14	MR. RUGGIERO: Yeah, we can call
15	again. We'll keep calling. Sure.
16	MS. MEDINA: Even if they give us a
17	close estimate.
18	MR. RUGGIERO: Joe, last time you
19	spoke to them, what did they say?
20	MR. LORINCE: They said four to six
21	weeks.
22	MS. BRIER: When was that?
23	MR. LORINCE: The day we put the
24	light up.
25	MR. RUGGIERO: Two, three weeks ago.

MS. MEDINA: Now, another major concern is a resident on our street right now is -- there's what we believe is, you know, some drug activity going on in the property that's right across from me. It's the only rental property on the street.

And, you know, when he first moved in it really wasn't a problem. Since approximately January there's been, you know, over 15 times the cops have been called to this property, you know, for domestic violence that spilled out in the streets that our kids are now seeing.

I mean, this is really becoming, you know, an issue now for us. The landlord has been contacted in regards to this and, you know, on her end, he's paying his rent on time. But, you know, that's the reason why she hasn't moved forward with anything because, you know, he's paying his rent. But at the same time now our kids are seeing a woman being battered in the middle of the street.

MR. HALLINAN: Don't we have an ordinance where after so many phone calls the police documented if something could happen

before where he could get evicted; am I right?

CHIEF MARCHESE: I can't hear you.

MR. HALLINAN: I said is there an ordinance that we have that after so many incidents with certain people that they could be evicted.

CHIEF MARCHESE: I have to look at it.

MS. MEDINA: We want to know what can we do or what can be done from this end? I mean, if they've been there several times -- I mean, the girlfriend -- there's already been I don't know how she put it through but something with the landlord had said the girlfriend couldn't come back to the property because of the domestic violence between the two of them.

And instead, what she's doing is hopping fences through other backyards because the landlord did put up cameras, you know, on the property. So she's hopping fences to avoid being seen by the cameras to get into his property which he's claiming -- the tenant is claiming he doesn't want her there any longer but is still allowing her to come back into the property which then is spilling into another

domestic violence over and over again. You know, it does seem to be drug related.

MR. HALLINAN: Joe, can you check an ordinance? I'm almost positive there is something about --

MR. LORINCE: Yeah, what's the address?

MS. MEDINA: This would be 512 Third Street, but it's on the second floor. There's a single woman that lives downstairs by herself and has been afraid to call the cops because she's afraid of retaliation, you know, from the tenant upstairs and from her actual landlord at this point because the landlord is saying there's nothing she could do about it because he's paying his rent.

But again, you have a single woman that's terrified living downstairs. And now you've got the rest of us on the street that are worried because the drug activity is happening between 9 p.m. and 2 a.m. I mean, the cops --

MS. BRIER: Where would the streetlight be?

MS. MEDINA: Right in front of that

1 So it's directly across from mine and house. 2 it's right above. So, I mean, the street light 3 is there but --4 MS. BRIER: It doesn't light up. 5 MS. MEDINA: It doesn't light up I mean, I don't know if that is even 6 yet. going to slow anything down. This woman does 7 seem to be determined to consistently get into 8 9 this house. You know, she was caught breaking 10 in a couple of times now. 11 The cops come and can't arrest her 12 because they said that they can't. She's not 13 trespassing because there is -- nothing has 14 been filed officially against her to be on the 15 property from what I understand. But I mean --16 MS. BRIER: When is the activity 17 basically 9 a.m. -- p.m. 18 MS. MEDINA: 9 p.m. to about 2 a.m. 19 roughly. MS. BRIER: Maybe the Chief could 20 21 send a car to just drive by. 22 Sal, can you get MR. EHNOT: 23 increased patrol over that neighborhood? 24 CHIEF MARCHESE: We're aware of the 25 problem there. I've been over there many

times.

MR. EHNOT: If you could show a little bit more police presence.

MR. JORDAN: The ordinance that Mr. Hallinan is referring to I do believe there was something on the books a year ago. I thought it was enforced through the Code enforcement. The landlord will be cited if there was X-amount of police calls or nuisance calls.

The landlord could be cited and then he wouldn't be able to rent the property for three or six months. I don't know offhand.

MR. HALLINAN: Joe will check into it. Thank you very much, Billy.

MS. MEDINA: Well, what does it to our property if this is deemed a nuisance property? Does that affect the rest of us as far as our --

MR. HALLINAN: I think it's just a tool we can use if it fits that. Then the zoning officer could have them tell the guy that they have to go.

MR. DEMPSEY: It's not a condemnation of the property.

1 anything to your property. You'll be fine. just got to do our job. 2 3 MS. MEDINA: It's the only rental on 4 the street. And, you know, we haven't had any issues like that until he moved in. And once 5 again, you know, the activity with our cars 6 being broken into and all of that just, you 7 8 know, elevated again which is why we requested 9 the light and also the cars that go whizzin up 10 and down the alley back there. I mean, our 11 kids are riding their bikes there. So there's 12 just a lot going on all of a sudden. 13 MS. BRIER: Maybe if we can step up 14 the patrol by her house on Third Street. 15 MS. MEDINA: Yeah, Third Street. 16 MR. JORDAN: What hours does it 17 happen, the cars going through the alley? 18 MS. MEDINA: That would be even 19 during the daytime when the kids are riding their bikes around. 20 21 CHIEF MARCHESE: They are doing a 22 lot of construction work on Dudley Street so a 23 lot of them are --24 MS. MEDINA: Yeah, and that's to be 25 expected with something like that.

know, it's even, you know, before and after that, those cars go whipping up. I don't even know how you could drive that fast. That alley is so small. But they do. And we try to yell at people to slow down because the kids are on their bikes and, you know, we yell at our own kids to make sure that they're looking.

But they're kids. They won't. They just dart out in front, you know, so we're trying to keep on top of them too. But if we can get extra patrol in the area we would appreciate it.

MR. JORDAN: Yeah, we'll have patrols in that area.

MS. MEDINA: Yeah, but to actually drive down that street. I know that they go down Dudley but they don't come down Third Street that I noticed. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: You had your hand up,

21, line 9 begins with Kim Nole. I'm going to

start with line 16. That's where it starts

with me.

"The lady that owns the house is constantly feeding all the stray animals. She stands on her porch, opens the can and flips the food from the lid. It goes on her property, kerplunks it on the porch. But twice she's already flicked it into my driveway.

I asked her not to do that and, of course, comments went back and forth. But she's -- it's like never ending. She's feeding them daily. I know Joe Lorince had been at the house and was totally appalled with the porch.

Our mailman has filed a report with

the post office last year that he refused to go on the property on the porch because of how disgusting it is. I've spent close to \$200 this summer trying to reenforce our backyard so that the cats stop going in it cutting through to go to her property."

And I'd like to address that. I may be unconventional but I am exhausted of the never-ending deceit that I have stopped all communications with 319 and 319 and a half Oak Street, Dunmore, Pennsylvania in May of 2020 when they told me they put rocks in my yard for storage. I'm just done with my neighbors.

However, since 2018 I trapped,
neutered and returned 11 community cats, almost
13. Two have escaped from my trap; eight to
homes; working on the ninth, three to the vet
to be put to sleep when ill; three dead in the
road were taken to Veterinary Referral and
Emergency Center, 318 North Boulevard, South
Abington Township to be screened for a chip, if
none, cremation at no cost.

You just have to call before going so room could be prepared for the dead cat's arrival. That is a total of 25 community cats

that will not be reproducing. If each of these community cats have one litter of five kittens, that would be 125 additional cats in the community.

If each of the cats had average of three liters of five kittens in a season, that's a total of 375 new cats in the community. That's 375 kittens not born in the community in one season thanks to T and R. I do not have seven cats.

Page 22, line 3 where Miss Nole states about the mailman, I have attached a letter from the US Postal Service dated March 24th. To clarify the e-mail I spoke with Lelis Sheets, manager of customer service of the Dunmore Post Office, 114 North Blakely Street, Dunmore, March 21 at 11:25 a.m.

Her first words were, "Don't belief everything you hear." She continued to say she has not seen nor heard anything about my property. She asked me if the mail courier continued to deliver my mail. I said, yes. She said, "There you have it. If there was a complaint, the post office would step in to rectify it." And attached is a letter from --

e-mail letter from the US Post Office with apologies to me regarding the mail carrier. So that statement itself proves that statement made back in November is false.

Nole states, "In her backyard I like to call it the cat condo contraption. But if we're on our deck, that's all we see. It's a constant annoyance." Nole has supplied supplies to help create this cat condo contraption and knew the purpose of the box given. And the Noles never sit on their deck long before I built this.

So I have pictures attached so you could see the box. And you could see the rear of my house. And the back of my house right next to it is their garage. So obviously there is no deck right there to be a constant nuisance or an annoyance to them. My deck -- or my basement where it -- it's no longer there.

It's basement level. And their deck is first floor level. So for them to see that on their deck -- and I have a picture of the view of their deck from my -- where the contraption was located and as you could see in

the photos, half of their deck is blocked off.

You can't see.

But you have to go to the side rail of their deck, look down all the way to the right and see down by Mr. Lorince's feet because that's where it would have been located. And then I took a picture of the view that we have. We have a gorgeous view because we live on a hill.

Nole speaks line -- page 23, line 13 through 15, Nole speaks of keeping her areas nice, nice, presentable. 319, 319 and a half Oak Street, Dunmore, Pennsylvania, residence of William, Kathy and Kim Nole has two different colored -- two different types of siding which is hideous. Their house is bringing down the property value of the 300 block of Oak Street, Dunmore, Pennsylvania.

Their front yard lawn is constant dog urinated, muddy rotted brown grass, if any, which according to Nole is nice and presentable. It's nauseating when walking by.

And I have the pictures to show that.

Page 23, line 17 through 19, she also put private property signs right

everywhere, you know, directed toward us.

Private property signs were put everywhere due
to the following incidents:

One, 319 Oak Street's garage, the

Noles built past variance onto my property, 321

Oak Street, by one foot. The garage is 6 feet
too wide. When addressed, Mr. Nole asked Miss

Rasalla for a dollar amount for the land. The
next day William Nole rescinded the offer
saying we're just going to say we're renting
the land from you for a penny a year. What is
that? I was dumbfounded and intimidated.

Number two, the privacy fence by the Noles; again, see photos. William Nole asked Miss Rasalla if she wanted the flower bush in the rear of 321 Oak Street which was planted by Kathy Nole to be taken out when digging for the post for the fence or leave it there. Miss Rasalla said, "Take it out."

The next day Mr. Nole said, "We decided not to do that." "Bill said Kathy said, it's life. We will maintain the bush." See photos of the bush. They're out of control. They're taller than the privacy fence. And years later they just decided to

poison the bush until dead. And I have pictures of how it was left.

And then I had to remove it and I can't plant anything there because there's years' worth of poison soil. As they said they to reenforce the property. There's a picture of the two by four. They put two by fours under their fence and they also used chicken wire in their front yard.

Number three, I came home to find a ladder in my yard. I phoned Kim Nole to ask her why is there a ladder in my yard. Nole giggles and said, "We had a new roof put on and they had to climb on top of the garage to get to the house." I asked again, "So why is there a ladder in my yard?" I told Kim to move the ladder and put it between her house and her garage.

This is number four. This was the deal breaker for me with my neighbors. They put rocks on my property. I confronted Mr. and Mrs. Nole asking, "Why are there rocks in my yard?" Mr. Nole stated it was for storage for me because I have a hole in my backyard that he's been taking care of for three years.

Mr. Nole had stated that the grass cutter had twisted his ankle very badly and supposedly he didn't tell me because I'm never home. I could just go grab a rock and put it in the hole.

Kathy Nole then stated that the grass will grow over the rocks and stated that the hole was from water runoff from snow and rain. At that point I told her the snow -- the snow was from their snow being plowed into my yard. Kathy said that he would never. I showed her the proof on the pavement, which you guys have proof that snow is being snowplowed in my yard.

I told the Noles to remove all the rocks and that I would contact the Borough and the grass cutter. The next day after the rocks were finally removed, I put down dirt where the rocks were. I went into my house to get a view from upstairs to see the end result, only to see Mr. and Mrs. Nole stomping on the dirt I just placed, which again there's pictures.

The Noles for 23 years have paid and directed someone to shovel snow into my yard for several years. Barry Lindemuth, the hired help has plowed their snow into my yard with

1 his truck. I never gave permission for the snow to be put in my yard. 2 3 I'm always afraid of retaliation but 4 yet, here I am. Again, pictures of the plowed 5 pavement and pictures of the snow when the Borough plows it up and how they just keep 6 7 going up the alley. And then when I have my 8 snow cleaned. So when Mr. Lindemuth goes by, 9 the excess snow that comes off his plow is not cleaned up and then I have to shovel again. 10 11 MR. DEMPSEY: Mrs. Rasalla, can I 12 cut you off for a second? 13 MS. RASALLA: Sure. 14 MR. DEMPSEY: You sent us a pretty detailed document. 15 16 MS. RASALLA: Yes. 17 MR. DEMPSEY: I'm following along 18 with you as you're reading it. In the interest 19 of time, I know other people want to speak --20 MS. RASALLA: Okay. 21 MR. DEMPSEY: Would it be okay if we 22 attach your notes as part of our record? 23 MS. RASALLA: Is it going to be on 24 the meeting minutes? 25 MR. DEMPSEY: Yes.

MS. RASALLA: That would be fine. That would be fine. I would like to say that I was brought to the magistrate because of something that was said on November 9th and I --

MS. BRIER: Can you clarify what was said?

MS. RASALLA: Well, that -- all of this was said. All of that I have attached, these photos, you know, line -- whatever the line number, page number, line whatever, those were things that were said at November 9th.

So what I'm saying is what has happened. So in my closing, I have about feeding bans, about trap, neuter, return. I have about how they give people permission to go on my property. I have all that listed here. And I'm trying to say, no, it's not okay. This is my property.

And in doing so, I feel that the retaliation is what happened on November 9th. I did not break any laws. I did not do anything to anybody. And I feel that their complaint against me was 100 percent false.

If you saw that about the skunks.

You say -- you can't, you know, accuse me of something and then yet, you have it on Facebook how cute they are and you're going to name them. That's not right. So there's a lot of false allegations here.

And I just want to be left alone by the Noles. I don't feel the Noles should ever complain about anybody again because they have a lot of deceit in their grievances. And it's not just me. There was other addresses she included. And we all feel the same, a lot people are -- think it's commendable for cat neuter and return. And it makes a difference everywhere.

And we just want to be, you know -there shouldn't be retaliation. So anyways, I
had to pay for fees. There's obviously
property damage done to my yard. And I feel
the Noles should be responsible for that
because they're the reason for it. So I would
like that to be however you handle that. I
don't know how you handle that.

MR. DEMPSEY: That wouldn't be something that we would handle. That would be a civil issue between you and the Noles.

MS. RASALLA: Yeah, but I went to the magistrate because of what was said here. So I'm saying something here. So if that needs to go to the magistrate, whoever filed the papers for me to go to the magistrate, do the same for that person.

MR. DEMPSEY: Okay. We can't just file a magistrate's action. There has to be a code issue. So that would be taken care --

MS. ZANGARDI: The Borough has rules we have to follow. So the rule has to be broken in order for us to take the Noles to the magistrate.

MS. RASALLA: False allegations.

MR. DEMPSEY: Again, that's a civil court issue. That is between you and the Noles. That has nothing to do with you and the Borough.

MS. BRIER: You could sue them. And we have all of this on the record which is good, you know. So we do have a record. And it's permanent, okay?

MS. RASALLA: Okay. And I'm going to continue to trap, neuter, and return. Thank you very much.

MS. BRIER: Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Would anyone else like to address Council tonight? Mr. Mendola, please state your name and address for the record.

MR. MENDOLA: My name is Matthew

Mendola. I am the Vice President of DGR. With

me tonight are three other board directors,

Vicky Scanlon, Bob Kopacz, and Mike

Pasqualichio. The reason I'm before you

tonight is a proposal to utilize Schautz

Stadium for the upcoming 2021 fall season for

soccer.

A little bit about DGR Soccer, we are nonprofit recreational soccer program for children between the ages of 4 and 17. We started out back in 1984. My own personal experiences were I have fond memories of the tank top reversible jerseys back in the 80s, even at half time having oranges, playing at Monroe Park. I'll never forget these memories.

But that's what we want to have for our children that are playing now. We want to give them the best that we can like what we had back in our day. Schautz Stadium, we played

there back in 2019. It was a great season. I know in the feedback we get from our surveys to the parents and players, everything good that they said.

They appreciated the facility offer, the turf, the kids enjoyed it. We didn't have any bug problems. If we went to other fields, grass areas. So that was all good. I also appreciated having meetings with Mike Dempsey this past year, year and a half ago. We got together trying to work out the 2020 soccer season.

Of course, difficult times we've had this past year with the pandemic. We didn't have the 2020 season. So that's why we're here tonight to try to work out a schedule where we propose the fall season August 7th through November 7th, weekdays Monday through Thursday 5 to 8 p.m., to utilize that field for practices.

On top of that, we're asking for Saturdays as well from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., for games to be played. Right now we're in the process of working out the affiliation with the Philadelphia Union Major League Soccer Program.

I think this offers many opportunities, not only for us as DGR but for the Borough and Schautz Stadium as well.

A couple of the ideas are to have camps that will be hosted by the union, clinics, training sessions and also bringing in outdoor talent to have tournaments that would generate money for the Borough. I appreciate the time tonight meeting with you all. And I appreciate your consideration with this proposal.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Matt.

MR. MENDOLA: All right. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: With me being the one that pretty much knows the most about Schautz and sort of scheduling and everything like that, just so I have it correct because we had texted back and forth and, you know, decided to come to a meeting so -- just so it's on the record and we have it. It's August 1st of 2021, correct the start --

MR. MENDOLA: August 7th.

MR. DEMPSEY: And it's November?

MR. MENDOLA: Yes, the first week of

November.

MR. DEMPSEY: So it's four months.

MR. MENDOLA: Three.

MR. DEMPSEY: You can see I'm bad at math. And it's 5 to 8 every night except Fridays; 9 to 1 Saturday.

MR. MENDOLA: Yes

MR. DEMPSEY: What I would propose rather than hashing it out here is you and I and some board members, maybe some Council members want to sit down and see if we can come up with a fair way that you guys -- we want you to play there. I mean, it's built for the kids.

You do have some kids that are from Scranton and Abington, I assume. But you do have a lot of Dunmore kids, from all over. So we want -- and I'm just speaking for myself. But I think I could collectively speak for everybody. We want to see at least our Dunmore kids play there.

If other kids from Scranton and Abington and wherever else they come from get to play there, it's a bonus. What I can tell you at least from scheduling purposes, we can't accommodate every day that you're asking for.

I already have commitments from other programs that are paying to rent those days. And they've already rented them. But what I would like to do is sit down with you guys and sit down with the board and maybe a couple Council members and see if there's a couple days a week, a couple of Saturdays a month that you can utilize the field.

I can't give you all of those dates just because it's -- I've already made commitments with other people for a lot of them. But we certainly want you to play some games there. I was -- maybe you could do a hybrid between there and Sherwood or wherever else --

MR. MENDOLA: We have a lease right now with Sherwood. And we'd like to keep that lease in case of schedule conflicts. And, of course, things come up where you have other schedules with other organizations. That's not unheard of. But what we're asking is priority just because we are majority Dunmore.

You know, and the parents, we don't want to raise the registration fee. We want to keep it as low as possible, especially after

this year that we've had. How do we come back out of this pandemic and ask for over \$100, \$125 just to pay off Schautz? It doesn't seem like a fair option, especially for the taxpayers and residents and parents and all of that.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yep. And so -- we have a large note on Schautz Stadium. We are renting it out now. I think we've made around \$15,000 just in March and a little bit of April. So it does generate a lot of funds. And, you know, we're not saying that you can't play there.

I'm just saying -- I'm not even talking about the rental cost. If you want to -- if we can come up with something that is feasible for us and you to where we could rent it to the people that -- I've already committed. I wouldn't be able to call them back and say, you know, we're going to give it to DGR now. You don't have those dates.

So a lot of those dates are already taken. But maybe we can could go through the schedule and pick out a day a week, two days a week, a Saturday here, a Saturday there and

come up with a set schedule so that you have it for your parents and kids that want to have a set schedule and know where they're playing.

It's probably a headache if we call you and say, hey, it's open Friday come on up and play. But we could do that as well as long as having, you know, we try to get you a set schedule and try to come up with a fair rental price. You know, we're not -- I'm not looking to charge what we normally charge outside organizations.

MR. MENDOLA: I appreciate that.

MR. DEMPSEY: Something fair that we'll all agree to, not just me that everybody will agree to so that you guys are happy.

We're happy. The kids get to play there. You know, we still have our agreements with other places to rent the place. That's what I would propose going forward if you're okay with that.

MR. MENDOLA: Sounds good to me. We can always schedule a meeting, have board members and board members and we'll work something out.

MR. DEMPSEY: Absolutely. That will be great. If anybody else wants to comment,

Also, I just want to say we had a very successful drivethrough Easter bunny giveaway. And it was very nice. And I want to thank Gertrude Hawks for donating and also Mr. DeNaples. And I also want to thank everyone for coming tonight. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you,

Mrs. Scrimalli. Mr. Ehnot, do you have
anything?

MR. EHNOT: I have nothing.

MR. DEMPSEY: Mr. Hallinan?

MR. HALLINAN: You're going to kill me. I was wondering about a lot of road problems we have, our pave cuts. You know, and I'll been hashing on this for years. One, they're not properly filled. And I was wondering -- and it takes -- I think they have a limit of almost a year or two to get to them through the utilities.

I was wondering if there was something we can do with an ordinance if they don't reply to a utility cut within 30 or 40 days, something reasonable that we could come up with that we could have a contractor come in fix them correctly. And we have somebody watch them and do it right because a lot of times they're not -- when they backfill, they're not filling it correctly so that's what causes a sink.

So I'm just wondering if there's something we can do along those lines where we can contract out the pave cut and then bill them for the work being done instead of waiting and waiting and waiting. I mean, they're a big problem to the Borough with a lot of our roads.

Is that something you can look into, Mick?

ATTY. PERRY: Sure. We can draft something on that.

MR. HALLINAN: Okay. Would you look into that for me too?

ATTY. PERRY: Sure.

MR. HALLINAN: I got another thing up on when the state put in a turning lane on top of Drinker Street by Field Street there, it took away parking on the right-hand side, what limited parking there was. At least they were able to get somewhat.

Now they can't park there at all.

And they're gone up on their lawns and it looks terrible. But the thing is from my PennDOT experience, they did a traffic study probably justified, what do you call, the turning lane being there. But it probably -- done when there's a day care there.

Otherwise, I don't think you get 15 cars going back on Field Street a day. So my thing is, can we contact PennDOT somehow and change that?

ATTY. PERRY: The Borough has jurisdiction over the parking.

1 MR. HALLINAN: Yes, for them to get their parking back, they would have to take the 2 3 turning lane out. 4 ATTY. PERRY: Oh, I didn't 5 understand. I thought there was no parking signs. 6 MR. HALLINAN: No, we want to give 7 8 them -- I want to give them their parking back. 9 But to give them that parking back, they have to take out the turning lane. 10 11 ATTY. PERRY: Oh, I see. 12 MR. HALLINAN: So my question to you 13 is, could we go to PennDOT and would we be 14 liable for any kind of accident that happened 15 because we took that turning lane out? 16 ATTY. PERRY: Well --17 MR. HALLINAN: It is a state road. 18 ATTY. PERRY: If it's deemed unsafe 19 and there's an accident there and we changed it 20 or had PennDOT change it, we could have a 21 problem, sure. 22 MR. HALLINAN: Okay. So that's a 23 no. 24 ATTY. PERRY: Well --25 Could you look into MR. HALLINAN:

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it for me, please?

ATTY. PERRY: I could talk to --

MR. HALLINAN: Because I have a few neighbors up there that are pretty upset.

ATTY. PERRY: We'll definitely look into it.

MR. HALLINAN: Okay. Thank you. And also as -- Mr. Burton left -- said we have \$400,000 in what do you call -- our liquid fuels tax. Our liquid tax if anybody knows, that's supposed to go for any kind of, you know, highway maintenance, equipment, anything like that.

I'd like to get some roads paved this year somehow, some way and maybe use half that money, 200,000, see what we can come up with. But I think that is something we have to kick around because the roads are deplorable. And they really have to be addressed. doesn't necessarily have to be paving.

We could also do oil and chip on There's a lot of different some alleys. inexpensive ways to repair some of these roads instead of the old, you know, which is -- for the major roads you want to mill it. You want

to pave it, you know. But some of the other roads maybe crack sealed and then come back through with an oil and chip like -- sort of like what we did on PennDOT roads less traveled like alleyways and things like that.

They'll get 20 years out of it. You know, it's something we really got to look at.

Or not even pave the whole road. You pave the parts that are bad. Why rip up good stuff when you don't have to.

MS. BRIER: Can we buy that pot filler thing with that money or is that okay?

MR. HALLINAN: The only problem with buying a pothole patch is, the pothole patch is a great idea. You have to buy stone. The stone has to be stored in a dry area. Then you have to store the oil and which you would have to buy in a bulk price for it to be inexpensive.

So now you're getting into where you are going to store it over the winter because it would have to be a heated -- so going down that road isn't feasible. If you got a bunch of towns or the county, I don't think it is something feasible for the Borough of Dunmore.

We rent one out, they're very expense. I mean, I think we got quoted -- what was the quote we got, Vito, \$2,000 for 6 ton?

MR. RUGGIERO: Yeah, for 6 ton, it was 22 or \$2,400. So for a whole truck it would have been like \$12,000.

MS. BRIER: Will the fuels tax pay for that?

MR. HALLINAN: Absolutely.

MS. BRIER: It would.

MR. HALLINAN: But the only thing about that is, it's a step up from cold patch. It's not a -- it's not permanent. Cold patch is not a permanent solution and neither is what do you call the cold patch -- the hot patch machine. So the only good thing is asphalt. You have to do it the right way.

You know, either mill a road or even if you do partial repairs, jackhammer them out, seal them up, you know. Even half of these utility cuts aren't sealed properly. But it's something we have to look at. Thank you. I know it was a busy night. I'm sorry for tying up your time. Thank you.

ATTY. PERRY: Yeah, if you're selling to another municipality, there is no restrictions.

CHIEF MARCHESE: The other cars

MR. HALLINAN: Can't we just auction off the five cars?

MR. RUGGIERO: They would have to go to a public auction. Actually Ebay is considered a public auction, correct me if I'm wrong. So we can put them on there as is and whatever the bid is, the bid is.

MS. BRIER: You must need the space back there too.

MS. ZANGARDI: Vito, who did you say you sold them to?

MR. RUGGIERO: There was five or six cars. I believe, President Dempsey, you have that list. Archbald Borough bought one for \$3,500. And the County Drug Task Force bought one for \$4,000. When we bought the new police cars, that company came in and were going to purchase them and gave us a price on what they were worth.

So we actually sold two outright.

And the other ones there I think they are combined \$2,500 of what they're saying they're worth. We can put them online and see what we get as is.

MS. BRIER: Can you do that, Vito?

MR. RUGGIERO: Sure.

MS. BRIER: Thank you. That's all I have, Mike.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mrs. Brier.

One thing I want to bring up before we adjourn
is Officer Richardson had e-mailed Council with
regard to Dunmore Borough participating in the
American Heart Association's heart challenge,
right, Tom?

OFFICER RICHARDSON: Yes.

MR. DEMPSEY: So the police department and the entire borough and the fire department, all of our employees are going to be considered a team for that, correct, and the whole community?

OFFICER RICHARDSON: The community would be the main team and then it would be individual teams listed below that so you could sign up as a team and create -- so like the police department has a team. If the fire

department wanted to create a team, they could create -- we could almost make it like a friendly competition between each other.

MR. DEMPSEY: And you're all listed under Dunmore Borough as a whole --

whole. And it would also include if any private businesses or citizens who want to get involved in it also. And it would just be everything would be compiled together and then nationally we would be recognized as a major sponsor team. That's without anybody doing any type of donations. That would just be, you know, getting people up, active and doing 3 miles.

MS. BRIER: When it is?

OFFICER RICHARDSON: It runs from now until May 15th. And they're actually -- they said they are coming out with an app for it to make life a little bit easier on tracking your milage and stuff.

MS. BRIER: How do you sign up?

OFFICER RICHARDSON: Right on the

American Heart Association. There is an e-mail
that I sent to Mr. Dempsey. And it's also on

our Facebook page.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, we have the link. We're going to put it on all of our social media pages. I'd encourage everybody to click on it and share it so that it gets a lot of attraction.

And I'd obviously encourage
everybody to participate. I mean, it's a great
cause, promotes a healthy lifestyle. I think
it's great that the Borough is going to do it
as a whole. It's a great community event. So
I'd appreciate it. And I know Officer
Richardson would as well if everybody
participated, shared it and get the word out.

So I want to thank you, thank the police department again for always -- and the fire department, of course, and all of our employees for always being involved in the community. It just makes everybody look good and everybody is happy.

So I appreciate all the hard work you did. With that, I don't have anything else. So I think I'll look for a motion to adjourn.

MR. EHNOT: I'll make a motion to

adjourn. MR. DEMPSEY: I have a motion. Do I have a second? MR. AMICO: Second. MR. DEMPSEY: All those in favor? ALL MEMBERS: Aye. MR. DEMPSEY: Opposed? (No response.) MR. DEMPSEY: The ayes have it and so moved. And we're adjourned.
