3 ATTY. PERRY: Item number four, roll  
4 call. Mrs. Zangardi.

5 MS. ZANGARDI: Here.

6 ATTY. PERRY: Mr. Hallinan.

7 MR. HALLINAN: Here.

8 ATTY. PERRY: Mrs. Brier.

9 MS. BRIER: Here.

10 ATTY. PERRY: Mrs. Oven.

11 MS. OVEN: Here.

12 ATTY. PERRY: Mr. Amico.

13 MR. AMICO: Here.

14 ATTY. PERRY: And Trip.

15 MR. O'MALLEY: Here.

16 MR. RUGGIERO: Mr. O'Malley, sorry.  
17 drew a blank there.

18 MR. O'MALLEY: Here.

19 ATTY. PERRY: Mayor Conway.

20 MAYOR CONWAY: Here.

21 ATTY. PERRY: Okay. Item number  
22 five, public comment on agenda items.

23 MR. AMICO: Would anyone from the  
24 public like to comment on agenda items only?

25 (No response.)

1 MR. AMICO: Seeing none.

2 ATTY. PERRY: Number six, motion to  
3 approve the minutes.

4 MR. AMICO: I'll look for a motion  
5 to approve the minutes, please.

6 MS. BRIER: I'll do that.

7 MR. AMICO: I have a motion. I'll  
8 look for a second.

9 MR. O'MALLEY: Second.

10 MR. AMICO: Anyone on the question?

11 (No response.)

12 MR. AMICO: Seeing none, all in  
13 favor.

14 ALL MEMBERS: Ayes.

15 MR. AMICO: Opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 MR. AMICO: Ayes have it.

18 ATTY. PERRY: Number seven, motion  
19 to approve and pay the open bills.

20 MR. AMICO: I'll look for a motion  
21 to approve and pay the open bills.

22 MR. HALLINAN: I'll make that  
23 motion.

24 MR. AMICO: I have a motion. Do I  
25 have a second?

1 MS. OVEN: I'll second.

2 MR. AMICO: I have motion and a  
3 second. Anyone on the question?

4 MS. BRIER: I just have a question  
5 about the \$15,000 expenditure to Bucktown Truck  
6 and sales. Is that repairs or is that --

7 MR. BURTON: There is 12 invoices  
8 total.

9 MS. BRIER: 12 invoices. Mark and I  
10 talked about some of the others, so I'm fine.  
11 Thank you.

12 MR. AMICO: Anyone else on the  
13 question?

14 (No response.)

15 MR. AMICO: Seeing none, all those  
16 in favor.

17 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

18 MR. AMICO: Opposed? Ayes have it.

19 ATTY. PERRY: Number eight,  
20 Treasurer Financial Report, Mr. Burton.

21 MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.  
22 Brief analysis for the month of April. As  
23 expected and budgeted, we end the month of  
24 April with a net income of 1.3 million dollars.

25 MS. BRIER: That is year to date,

1 right, Mark?

2 MR. BURTON: That's just for the  
3 month of April.

4 MS. BRIER: Just for the month of  
5 April, oh, okay.

6 MR. BURTON: But that includes most  
7 of the collections for the real estate taxes at  
8 the end of March which is the end of this time  
9 period. So that is when we received our  
10 highest for the year. And year-to-date net  
11 income we have 2.4 million dollars.

12 Some of the highlights as far as the  
13 revenue is concerned again, continue to  
14 increase in real estate tax revenues. Special  
15 assessments we received the first quarter of  
16 2022 landfill fee of \$707,000. Proceeds from  
17 the general fixed assets, the sale of 1311  
18 Green Ridge Street, which grossed 141,000.  
19 Again, that was the gross.

20 It's not taking into consideration  
21 the expenses that were entailed as far as the  
22 sale of the property. It's not included in  
23 that number.

24 And Schautz Stadium the revenues --  
25 the field rentals are in season right now. And

1           there was approximately \$13,000 in revenue in  
2           the month of April. As far as expenses, it was  
3           a three pay period payroll period for the  
4           month.

5                         Financial administration installment  
6           to PEL of 18,000. And 9,000 to Zelenkofske  
7           Axelrod who is our ARPA consultant, which we  
8           did use in filing our April mandatory report.  
9           Personnel and administration, there was an  
10          additional \$19,000 resulting from the 2021  
11          comp audit.

12                        Highway maintenance, the final  
13          delivery of rock salt of \$30,000. And our  
14          pension and retirement, another partial MMO  
15          payment of 60,000. That's a nutshell for  
16          April.

17                        MR. AMICO: Thank you. Anybody have  
18          any questions for Mr. Burton?

19                        MS. BRIER: I just have one  
20          question, Mark, the proceeds from General Fixed  
21          Assets, we're over budgeted \$142,000, which is  
22          awesome.

23                        MR. BURTON: Well, that's the  
24          proceeds from the sale that I mentioned of  
25          Green Ridge Street. We didn't anticipate that.

1 MS. BRIER: Okay. So that's almost  
2 all of that.

3 MR. BURTON: Right.

4 MS. BRIER: All right. Thank you.

5 MR. AMICO: Anyone else? Thank you.  
6 Thank you very much.

7 ATTY. PERRY: Number nine, municipal  
8 administration, Mr. Kearney.

9 MR. KEARNEY: Good evening. A  
10 couple weeks ago we had Jog for Jude. And with  
11 over 2,000 entrants, we estimated there were  
12 close to 3,000 people that day. I'd like to  
13 thank the DPW, especially Didge and Pat Judge,  
14 Chief DeNaples and the Fire Department, Sal  
15 Marchese and the Police Department, especially  
16 Rich Barth and my staff.

17 With that many people on site and  
18 all the things that go on involved with running  
19 that event, there's a lot of things that could  
20 go wrong easily. Because of all of your help,  
21 we got through it. So I just want to thank you  
22 guys.

23 This week at DCC we have the River  
24 Front rental all day Saturday. There's an AAU  
25 event. And on Sunday, the thing that I just

1           passed down to you, I guess that says Darshana.  
2           A local Indian community is hosting a traveling  
3           exhibition, an educational event all day  
4           Sunday. I think they told me 12 to 5. It says  
5           2 to 5 on there. They rented the entire  
6           building, they'll present speakers,  
7           demonstrations and seminars to inform the  
8           general public about their culture and beliefs.

9                         It's not going to be a bonfire  
10            thing. That's what I was told. They explained  
11            it to me during the bonfire so I'm not real  
12            clear about what's going on. But they told me  
13            it was a more sedate celebration or  
14            informational event. So that's going on  
15            Sunday.

16                        Beyond that, we're gearing up for  
17            the election next Tuesday. And so far the heat  
18            and air conditioning are working fine. So  
19            knock on wood. That's all I have.

20                        MR. AMICO: Thank you, Chris.

21                        MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.

22                        ATTY. PERRY: Mr. Lorince.

23                        MR. LORINCE: How you doing? I gave  
24            everyone my reports. I just want to tell you  
25            in the Code Office we're starting to get a



1           little busy on cleaning up properties and  
2           cleaning backyards and ripping some garages  
3           down, the basic stuff.

4                       The Planning Commission was  
5           postponed this month. They didn't have their  
6           plans ready. So that will be next month. And  
7           we're still waiting for the plans for the  
8           storage facility on Meade Street. I met with  
9           Mike Kelly. Mike Kelly is still working on the  
10          plans for Chestnut and Calvin Street.

11                      And they're still looking for the  
12          funding for Apple and East Drinker. That's  
13          supposed to come out in July or August they're  
14          supposed to get the funding for that. That's  
15          what he was talking about. Health Department,  
16          I'm just doing the school.

17                      There was 14 permits. I gave you  
18          copies of all the permits. The multi-families  
19          we did inspections on different ones. Tall  
20          Trees we had a fire. We had to go in there and  
21          do an inspection after the fire. Water  
22          company, everybody starting tomorrow they'll  
23          start paving Grove Street and Wheeler Avenue --  
24          on Grove Street down to Blakely Street and out  
25          to the city line there. Thank God.

1 MS. BRIER: Are you going to do  
2 Williams Street too?

3 MR. LORINCE: Williams.

4 MS. BRIER: It says Williams.

5 MR. LORINCE: Yeah.

6 MS. BRIER: Williams -- all Williams  
7 Street too?

8 MR. LORINCE: No, not -- up to  
9 Williams and then all the way down to the city  
10 line. I think it's Poplar.

11 MS. BRIER: Poplar.

12 MR. LORINCE: Right. And then  
13 there's a company that came in. I guess they  
14 are doing all over the municipalities about a  
15 seminar teaching people how to take care of  
16 their animals since we have so many problems  
17 with animals.

18 So they'll do it free of charge as  
19 long as we allow them to use the Community  
20 Center. And they will come in and give  
21 pointers. And they would advertise it if  
22 everyone is okay with that. That's about it.

23 MS. OVEN: Where are they from?

24 MR. LORINCE: I have it in the back  
25 of the sheet. The last sheet you'll see the

1 company. I think they are doing it all over,  
2 all the different municipalities.

3 MS. ZANGARDI: Do we have a date on  
4 that one, Joe?

5 MR. LORINCE: We don't have a date  
6 yet. He just wants to know if he can use the  
7 Community Center. So I just want Council if  
8 it's okay with them, then we'll set up a date  
9 that they could come in and do a little  
10 seminar.

11 MS. BRIER: What does Big Lots want  
12 to do?

13 MR. LORINCE: That's -- what they're  
14 looking to do is put that retail in front of --  
15 you know where Joey's Pizza is, they're looking  
16 to put two retail spots in there.

17 MS. BRIER: Oh, okay.

18 MR. LORINCE: Maybe a coffee place  
19 and another place. I don't want say.  
20 Everybody drinks it. And up the road I just  
21 want to tell you they're working on -- they  
22 sold Fidelity Bank at the Price Chopper and  
23 Starbucks is going in there.

24 MS. ZANGARDI: Oh, wow. Nice.

25 MR. LORINCE: They're working on it

1 right now.

2 MS. OVEN: There's a coffee place  
3 where Joey's Pizza is and then Starbucks?

4 MR. LORINCE: Yes.

5 MS. OVEN: That's interesting.

6 MS. BRIER: Thanks, Joe.

7 MR. AMICO: Thanks, Joe.

8 MS. ZANGARDI: Thanks, Joe.

9 ATTY. PERRY: Mr. Judge.

10 MR. JUDGE: Got cold patch in.

11 Friday is now, we're doing Friday picks. We  
12 have a pick truck out every Friday for the  
13 bigger stuff, a lot of brush. And that's about  
14 it. We're out cold patching --

15 MS. BRIER: What's the brush? Where  
16 are you doing the brush?

17 MR. JUDGE: This week is recycling,  
18 next week is brush. But I usually put a brush  
19 truck out, an open truck every day to just get  
20 the -- especially the sixth ward.

21 MS. BRIER: How about the sewer?

22 MR. JUDGE: The basins?

23 MS. BRIER: Yeah, the basins.

24 MR. JUDGE: We got to see where they  
25 want -- there's a lot of them needed. I think

1 all of them in Swinick's need it. And there's  
2 quite a few besides that. But Swinick's are in  
3 rough shape.

4 MS. BRIER: Yeah, what do we do?

5 MR. JUDGE: We got to rebuild them.  
6 They're done with cinder blocks. And the older  
7 ones are done with bricks. Now you just get a  
8 50 foot piece of galvanized steel. And then  
9 you cut it to fit the thing and pour -- they're  
10 easier to rebuild now because we wouldn't do  
11 them with brick or stone.

12 MS. BRIER: Do you guys ever clean  
13 them out?

14 MR. JUDGE: I call the water  
15 company, you know, because you can't get in  
16 them. You have to stick the hose down and  
17 flush them and --

18 MS. BRIER: I see.

19 MR. JUDGE: But they work with us.  
20 If I get -- they work with us. And if I get a  
21 call for a blocked one like the one on your  
22 street, I called that in. And when they get  
23 about ten of them, they come and do them all.

24 MR. LORINCE: Just so you know,  
25 we're only responsible for the storm drains.

1           The combinations are the water company.

2                   MR. JUDGE: Just the storm. That's  
3           about it.

4                   ATTY. PERRY: Chief Marchese.

5                   CHIEF MARCHESE: Okay, we had -- the  
6           month of April calls for services, we responded  
7           to -- we're down 257 calls so we have a total  
8           of 686 calls for the month. Our department  
9           made nine criminal arrests this month.

10                   Sixteen citations were issued for  
11           non-traffic offenses. Thirty-three citations  
12           were issued for motor vehicle violations. And  
13           seven written warnings were given out.

14                   We still have two officers currently  
15           out on Heart and Lung long-term. One officer  
16           came back. He is on restriction. And we just  
17           had another officer go out. And he got  
18           approved for Heart and Lung. So we're  
19           shorthanded.

20                   Scheduling, we had 11 shifts out for  
21           overtime this month because we couldn't get  
22           anybody to work. Training, April 4th through  
23           the 7th, Officer Richardson and Mentz  
24           participated and taught the SFST, Standardized  
25           Field Sobriety Test and Training at the Dunmore

1 Community Center here.

2 On April 25th, Officer Burgette  
3 managed to get the SWAT training. And April  
4 16th, Officers Richardson and Igo assisted the  
5 Rotary Club -- Lions Club with the yearly  
6 Easter Egg Hunt. I want to thank them for  
7 that. They did a good job.

8 April 23rd, I want to reiterate what  
9 Chris Kearney said. April 23rd, Captain Barth  
10 and Officer Richardson along with Reynolds  
11 assisted with the Jog for Jude marathon in  
12 multiple towns. Traffic control, I mean, it  
13 was a lot of work. Captain Barth spent a lot  
14 of time on this.

15 The race had over he said 2,200  
16 participants and everything went off without an  
17 issue. Officer -- April 29th, officers  
18 escorted the Little League for the start of  
19 Little League parade. And that's it. Oh, and  
20 one more thing.

21 August 24th this year, we haven't  
22 had our golf tournament, our National Night Out  
23 Dunmore Police Golf Tournament. We're finally  
24 back this year. It's going to be at Elmhurst  
25 Country Club, August 24th on a Wednesday.

1 Thank you.

2 ATTY. PERRY: Chief DeNaples.

3 CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening. This  
4 month there is not a whole lot to report. The  
5 biggest expenditure for the month is our annual  
6 pump testing for the area ladder truck, the  
7 rescue and the engine. That's approximately  
8 \$900. It's right around 905 to get them  
9 tested. That's supposed to be done annually.  
10 Seventy-nine hours of overtime to current date  
11 projected.

12 That's not counting any fires or any  
13 major incidents we have or any call-offs that  
14 we can't get a part-timer for. As far as  
15 events, upcoming events, the reserve engine  
16 with some members of the Fire Department  
17 volunteering their time are going to Touch a  
18 Truck at Nay Aug Park. And that's going to be  
19 May 14th.

20 It's a Saturday from 11 to 3. And  
21 that truck if something major happens they'll  
22 be able to respond back to town. But it's not  
23 one of our main pieces just so everybody knows.

24 MS. BRIER: What's the event, Chief?

25 CHIEF DENAPLES: Touch a Truck.



1           They have all different -- they have  
2           construction equipment. Scranton will have  
3           fire trucks. It will be police vehicles. On  
4           the 21st of May from 11 to 1, we're going to  
5           have our on-duty staff available for calls at  
6           the YMCA for the Children's Health Fair. We do  
7           that every year for them.

8                     The trucks are available. They're  
9           not blocked in. So if a call comes in, they  
10          just respond. But it is on-duty staff that  
11          participates in that. This past Saturday, May  
12          7th, we participated in a co-op event with the  
13          American Red Cross installing smoke detectors.

14                    They had 12 volunteers. We had our  
15          on-duty staff of four. And we did from Holy  
16          Cross High School all the way up East Drinker  
17          Street to the bridge -- the 81 bridge. On both  
18          sides we did the streets. We knocked on 51  
19          total doors. We installed 44 smoke detectors  
20          total.

21                    And 98 residents total were given  
22          fire safety material that's preprinted by the  
23          American Red Cross. This is the third event  
24          we did of this kind over the last five years.  
25          It was raining so I really want to thank the

1 American Red Cross for coming out and helping  
2 us with that.

3 Each smoke detector is with a  
4 10-year battery life. And if you go to Lowe's  
5 or Home Depot, they are about 25 to \$30  
6 approximately. And, you know, they're  
7 available. We still have about 40 left in the  
8 Fire Department.

9 So if anyone knows anyone that needs  
10 them, they can call and we could send the  
11 on-duty crew out to install them. And that's  
12 pretty much all I have if nobody has any  
13 questions.

14 MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chief.

15 ATTY. PERRY: Number 10, public  
16 comment.

17 MR. AMICO: Would anyone from the  
18 public like to address Council this evening?  
19 Mr. Duncan.

20 MR. DUNCAN: 117 Barton Street.  
21 I'll be real quick. Joe, the -- you talked to  
22 Mrs. Brier briefly about it. So where are we  
23 at with the Planning Commission for the Big  
24 Lots project the two -- I know it was cancelled  
25 last meeting.

1 MR. LORINCE: They're looking for  
2 next month. They are still working on their  
3 plans.

4 MR. DUNCAN: And then I have another  
5 question. And I don't know if it's Didge or if  
6 it's Joe. But the two storm drains, the one  
7 right in front of my house, Didge, and the one  
8 at the corner. Do you know where  
9 Mr. Treek{phonetic} lives? When you get out  
10 right at that corner, they're really  
11 deteriorating.

12 We had all that rain Friday into  
13 Saturday. The bricks are really coming out. I  
14 tried to get them pushed --

15 MR. LORINCE: They were out there  
16 the other day marking them. I was out there  
17 when the Sewer Authority was -- they're going  
18 to fix them.

19 MR. DUNCAN: Any date on that?

20 MR. LORINCE: They don't give dates.  
21 They just go out. They were out marking them.  
22 They're going to fix them soon.

23 MR. DUNCAN: Thanks. I didn't see  
24 anything when you said they marked them.

25 MR. LORINCE: Last week.

1 MR. DUNCAN: How?

2 MR. LORINCE: Maybe Thursday or  
3 Friday. You'll see green --

4 MR. DUNCAN: I didn't see any paint  
5 there. All right. I'll look when I go home.  
6 And then, Didge, I know you guys cold patched.  
7 And I appreciate the Church Street side. But  
8 right again, between my house and the house  
9 across the street, Nick Robinson lives in that  
10 house now.

11 There's a huge pothole going up if  
12 your guys are out cold patching, can you get  
13 that? You could hear the cars literally  
14 hitting it.

15 MR. JUDGE: Tomorrow.

16 MR. DUNCAN: And that's really it.  
17 Thank you. And I do want to thank Chief  
18 DeNaples with the smoke alarms and the fire  
19 detectors. He's been doing that really since  
20 like 2013 when we were doing them with the  
21 neighborhood watch.

22 October is fire safety month and  
23 your guys are just stellar. So thanks for  
24 doing that. You guys are so consistent. It's  
25 a big deal.

1 MR. AMICO: Thank you, Mr. Duncan.

2 ATTY. PERRY: Number 11, public  
3 officials.

4 MR. AMICO: Would anyone else from  
5 the public like to address Council this  
6 evening?

7 ATTY. PERRY: Number 11, public  
8 officials.

9 MR. AMICO: Mayor Conway.

10 MAYOR CONWAY: Just a big thank you  
11 to Captain Barth for everything he did with the  
12 Jog for Jude. It went off without a -- with  
13 3,000 people here it was mobbed. And Captain  
14 Barth did a great job pulling officers from  
15 other towns too. So a big thanks to him and  
16 Officer Richardson. That's all I have.

17 MR. AMICO: Mr. Perry?

18 ATTY. PERRY: I have nothing.

19 MR. AMICO: Anybody that spoke this  
20 evening want to add any other comments before I  
21 go to us? All right. I'll start with Miss  
22 Zangardi, please.

23 MS. ZANGARDI: Joe Lorince, the ten  
24 water company sewer drains, does the water  
25 company use ten in our town or ten before they

1 go out to clean them out?

2 MR. LORINCE: We would actually have  
3 to call them and see which drains are -- I  
4 usually -- when I get the kids for the summer  
5 program, I'll send like two kids out, check the  
6 basins, clean off the basins. If they're  
7 blocked, then we'll actually call the water  
8 company and give them a list and they could go  
9 out and do it. Instead of doing one at a time,  
10 they could go out and do 20 of them.

11 MS. ZANGARDI: Okay. The other  
12 thing I have and we talked about it at the last  
13 meeting and I don't know where we got with it  
14 was the advertising for the Schautz Stadium  
15 score board. Does anybody have any --

16 MR. AMICO: Mr. Dempsey would. I  
17 honestly don't know.

18 MS. ZANGARDI: I meant to talk to  
19 Vito. But I would like just to get it on the  
20 record to remind me to talk to them about that  
21 or mention it. But I was kind of -- meant to  
22 talk to Vito.

23 MR. AMICO: I'll reach out to both  
24 of them.

25 MS. ZANGARDI: Okay. And that's all

1 I have. Oh, great job on Jog for Jude.  
2 Awesome. Great community thing. That's all I  
3 have. Thank you.

4 MR. AMICO: Mr. O'Malley?

5 MR. O'MALLEY: First of all, I want  
6 to thank Chief Marchese and Dunmore Police  
7 Department for their patrolling down on  
8 Jefferson Avenue and the area around Marywood  
9 University. People were going through stop  
10 signs and there's speeding down there. And the  
11 residents are very thankful for your presence  
12 in that area.

13 We took part in the cleanup of our  
14 Borough. It was very well-attended. And it's  
15 a great event that I hope will continue every  
16 year. I want to thank Mayor Conway and his  
17 wife Allie and everyone who showed up  
18 volunteered in cleaning up our wonderful  
19 community.

20 And I want to say thank you to our  
21 department heads for coming out and for giving  
22 your detailed reports. Thank you.

23 MR. AMICO: Thank you. Mr.  
24 Hallinan?

25 MR. HALLINAN: I just have a few

1 things. Didge, would you make arrangements  
2 with the county about borrowing the brush hog  
3 again? At least set the date up. It hasn't  
4 come up yet on Meade Street and a couple other  
5 areas.

6 MR. JUDGE: Yes.

7 MR. HALLINAN: We'll be getting  
8 overgrown. So it's good to do it in advance.  
9 And I want to thank the DPW. We had an  
10 incident up on Helen Street, which the guys  
11 picked up on Friday in the pouring rain. And  
12 it was just -- it was just disgraceful.

13 MR. JUDGE: We have another one on  
14 Apple.

15 MR. HALLINAN: And again, I think  
16 that's something we'll have to address in the  
17 future because, I mean, your guys do pick up  
18 everything. As a borough we pick up almost  
19 anything that's out there. It's going  
20 overboard. I mean, this is -- it's out of  
21 control.

22 We got to set down boundaries  
23 somehow, someway to what we accept or don't  
24 accept because that house, it seemed like they  
25 cleaned out the whole house instead having a



1 dumpster. And, I mean, toilets, sinks,  
2 everything was there, right, Didge, and it was  
3 very --

4 MR. JUDGE: Yeah. Remember the one  
5 on the Apple Street?

6 MR. HALLINAN: And still that's big  
7 and it doesn't touch what was up on Helen  
8 Street. Unbelievable. And fire alarms, can we  
9 get that out the website if anybody has any  
10 smoke alarms --

11 CHIEF DENAPLES: Yeah.

12 MR. AMICO: I'll take care of that.

13 MR. HALLINAN: Okay. Thank you.  
14 That's all I have. The summer program, are we  
15 going to look into that?

16 MR. AMICO: Yeah, I'll put out an  
17 e-mail this week and we'll figure it out.

18 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. I  
19 appreciate that. That's all I have.

20 MR. AMICO: Mrs. Oven?

21 MS. OVEN: Nothing tonight.

22 MR. AMICO: Mrs. Brier?

23 MS. BRIER: I just want to talk  
24 about the Dunmore cleanup too. It was  
25 fantastic. Max organized that with Susan

1 Conway and Allie Conway. They got in touch  
2 with the department of -- PennDOT and they  
3 provided gloves and bags. And it was a great  
4 day.

5 And we went a quite a few places in  
6 the Borough. And I wanted to thank Chief  
7 Marchese too because he was out there picking  
8 up with all the rest of us. Thank you very  
9 much. And, of course, the Jog for Jude thing  
10 was wonderful. I'm sorry -- that's really it.  
11 I better stop talking.

12 MR. AMICO: The only I thing I had  
13 tonight --

14 MS. BRIER: Oh, I'm sorry. Didge,  
15 Gilroy Street, can you just take a quick peek  
16 on that one too? I got a call from a guy up  
17 there that said there's big potholes on Gilroy.

18 MR. JUDGE: On Gilroy, I'll check  
19 tomorrow.

20 MS. BRIER: Thank you.

21 MR. AMICO: I just want to give  
22 everybody a quick heads up as to what  
23 transpired last Wednesday night on Industrial  
24 Park Road. If you weren't aware, there was a  
25 pretty massive subsidence. Chief Marchese

1           called me at around 9:30 Wednesday night and  
2           said, you know, literally the road opened up in  
3           front of Maid-Rite.

4                       And I got there as quickly as I  
5           could. And when I got there Chief Marchese,  
6           members of the Fire Department, Didge, and  
7           three or four members of the Police Department  
8           were there basically shutting down the road,  
9           squaring traffic away.

10                      And the problem was fixed within 24  
11           hours. So, you know, just again, there's  
12           really not a lot of members of the public for  
13           me to brag to tonight, but these guys aren't  
14           just 9 to 5 employees.

15                      They showed up at night in not so  
16           nice weather. It as chilly. It was kind of  
17           drizzly, an ugly evening and made sure that  
18           everybody was squared away and that employees  
19           at Maid-Rite were safe, were able to leave work  
20           safely and that that busy road -- I never  
21           realized how busy that road is.

22                      But it's busy. And everything was  
23           squared away within 24 hours. So I just  
24           wanted, you known, again thank them for getting  
25           that taken care of.

1 MS. BRIER: It was huge.

2 MR. AMICO: It was pretty big, yeah.  
3 I thought about trying to jump it, like, leap  
4 over it but I thought better. I'm getting a  
5 little old so I decided against it. But it was  
6 big. Max is younger. He was going to do it  
7 but he's not as unintelligent as I. And that's  
8 all I have. I'll look for a motion to adjourn.

9 MR. HALLINAN: I'll make that  
10 motion.

11 MR. AMICO: And a second?

12 MR. O'MALLEY: Second.

13 MR. AMICO: I have a motion and a  
14 second. All those in favor.

15 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

16 MR. AMICO: Thank you.
