DEMPSEY: Hi Mark. 22 MS. BRIER: Hi Mark. 23 MR. BURTON: I have just a brief 24 analysis for you from the month of May. It's 25 another pretty standard month financially.

net income for the month of May was \$157,000.

Finance statements, this actually shows a loss. But again, we got the People Security loan that was paid off back in February or March. We would actually show a profit of 1.7 million dollars in the first five months.

Some of the highlights from May on the revenue side we received our Comcast first quarter franchise fee. That was \$59,000.

One of two of our health surplus distribution, \$457,000 which was nice.

Expenses, we had our large FNCB loan \$330,000. The second and final installment of our of property liability insurance of \$114,000. And we made our monthly \$40,000 MMO contribution. And that's about all.

MR. DEMPSEY: Great.

MS. BRIER: Mark, we're almost \$150,000 last year in terms of our revenue.

And yet we did receive a one-time revenue from the health insurance of \$450,000. So that would put us up over 600 grand less than last year through the first five months of this year. Am I reading that right?

MR. DEMPSEY: Well, the health 1 2 reimbursement isn't the -- that's the first 3 aspect. That's the first --4 MS. BRIER: But it wasn't in the 5 prior year. MR. DEMPSEY: I don't know what it 6 7 was last year. 8 MS. BRIER: We didn't get one last 9 year. MR. BURTON: No, we did. 10 11 MS. BRIER: We did? MR. BURTON: Yeah. It was quite a 12 13 bit less. 14 MS. BRIER: Okay. So, I mean, if 15 you look at January to May budget, we're --16 have \$148,000 less than anticipated. And, you 17 know, add that 457 -- I'm just concerned that 18 is that a timing issue, is --19 MR. BURTON: Well, the budget actually includes a \$150,000 draw on the TAN. 20 MS. BRIER: 21 Oh, there it is, yep. Ι 22 That's it. Thank you. And we did see that. 23 make some payments toward the MMO for the 24 pension, correct? Thank you. 25 MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Mark. Anybody

1 else have any questions? 2 (No response.) 3 MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Mark. 4 MR. RUGGIERO: Number 15, public 5 comment. MR. DEMPSEY: Mr. O'Malley. 6 7 MR. O'MALLEY: Good evening Council, 8 Tripp O'Malley, 623 East Warren Street. I'd 9 like to know if there's any wording in the 2014 10 Host Municipality Agreement pertaining to any 11 sale of the landfill. Would a sale enable us 12 to open up the agreement or are we locked into 13 that disgrace of a contract for the next 45 14 years? 15 In 2045, we'll still be getting less 16 than Throop was getting in 1999. Absolute 17 disgrace. Thank you. 18 MS. BRIER: So, Tripp, who are you 19 addressing that to? 20 MR. O'MALLEY: Just to the Council 21 in general if anyone has an answer. 22 MS. BRIER: Do we have an answer for 23 that? 24 MR. DEMPSEY: I don't know it off 25 the top of my head. But it's probably in the

like for him to explain to you exactly what happened.

And then maybe we could have Mickey look into the insurance situation. It's really not a good insurance. They left this family, you know, with children with raw sewage. And I tried to tell him, you know, it says it's for emergency services. It say emergency services 24/7.

It's not just for the daytime. You know they have children. But if it's all right with Council if he could come and explain to you what happened.

MR. DEMPSEY: Was this home insurance?

MAYOR BURKE: I have the same insurance but I never had to use it. I'm scared now -- the snake got stuck in the line. And they left the job. And so he was left with raw sewage in the cellar with children in the house.

I was on the line with the contractor -- what it is, American Water hires a private contractor to do this. But they said, you know, we can't do nothing about it.

It was a total nightmare. I was out there three hours. Like I said, the workers from American Water were good. But they could only go so far because it's a private contractor. It's the private contractor that's not reliable that American Water hired.

MR. DEMPSEY: This is just me, but I think that would be -- he would need his own attorney to represent his interest. He's welcome to come here and explain to us. But I think he needs to get --

MAYOR BURKE: Well, I mean, it's going to happen to any one of us. Believe me at one time or another your pipe is going to break. And believe me, you wouldn't want this nightmare and have them tell you there's nothing they could do about it.

MS. BRIER: Well, Tim, you know, if the American Water Company hires this -- hires the contractor, then they are responsible for what the contractor --

MAYOR BURKE: That's what I say.

But they say no. They're pushing him aside.

MS. BRIER: I mean --

ATTY. PERRY: They are responsible

for who they hire. But that's a private matter for mister -- whoever it is to get a lawyer and sue them for whatever they've done. The Borough can't really do anything about it.

MAYOR BURKE: Right. But, I mean, when you guys start getting more people complaining about it, believe me, you're going to want to do something about it because, like I said, American Water -- we could put pressure on American Water on hiring a reliable person is what I'm saying for a contractor that actually lives up to the word of the contract.

ATTY. PERRY: I don't think the
Borough has anything to say about who
Pennsylvania American hires to do their
contracting. We just don't have any standing
to be able to do that. Each individual has to
take care of their own issues if they have
issues with American Water or whoever the
contractor is.

It's a simple process that people go through all the time. They get their lawyer and do what they have to do. The Borough just can't do anything. What -- I don't know that there is any avenue that the Borough could

pursue to do anything in Pennsylvania American.

MAYOR BURKE: What I would like to do is if Council would listen to the person's story.

MR. DEMPSEY: Sure. Of course, yeah.

MAYOR BURKE: That's all I'm asking.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah.

wouldn't want to be in this person's shoes for that night. Believe me you wouldn't. And I personally I believe they hired them -- if it's even sending a letter from Dunmore Council saying we're not happy with the service our resident received, just something to get it started to make American Water look for somebody more reliable.

I've gotten calls from other people on the situation. And like I said, if you have children and you have raw sewage in your cellar and emergencies only in the daytime I don't believe that. I think emergencies should be 24/7. That's me.

ATTY. PERRY: Who is the contractor?

MAYOR BURKE: I don't even know,

Mick. They have gone through different contractors now. But I'll get the name and number and everybody. Even if it's just sending a letter if that could help out.

Believe me, you wouldn't want this.

MR. DEMPSEY: That is something that we can do. We just don't have any standing to help him out legally.

MS. ZANGARDI: Right.

MAYOR BURKE: I will bring him to an executive session so for you to listen to him.

MR. DEMPSEY: Absolutely, yeah, we'll listen to him.

MAYOR BURKE: Okay. And also congratulations to Myron Fedor, one of our DPW workers, great worker, great guy, wish him all the best. And also, congratulations to my granddaughter's team, going to Penn State Friday. And good luck to Mid Valley and all the other high schools that are still alive in the tournament.

PERRY: I don't think we have 18 to have another public hearing. 19 MR. DEMPSEY: No, I don't think so. 20 MS. SCRIMALLI: That was the 21 question, okay. All right. 22 MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you. 23 MS. SCRIMALLI: Thank you. That's 24 all I have. Good night. 25 MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you. Mr. Amico?

MR. AMICO: Yeah, I just wanted to talk real briefly about the expansion of the landfill. And I wrote this down because I didn't really want to wing this.

To say that I was disappointed that DEP approved Keystone Sanitary Landfill's 40-year expansion is an understatement. I'm disappointed but I'm not surprised. This expansion faced tremendous backlash from the community and from elected officials since it was announced in 2014.

But it was approved anyway. The announcement was made one week after the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office announced that KSL was under investigation. According to the Scranton Times and I quote, the AG's Office declined to cite the specifics of the investigation though it appears to relate to leachate, end quote.

Leachate is a liquid that forms in waste and breaks down in the landfill for those of you that don't know what leachate is.

Keystone's 40 year approval was made without thorough air, water, soil or sediment testing protocol being conducted.

No deep data dive was ever done by the state to give the residents of Northeastern Pennsylvania reassurances that the air we breath and the water we drink will be safe for the next 40 years.

The state will say that they are short-staffed and underfunded and that they are doing the best they can with the resources that they have. That may be true but that's not enough. No expansion should have been granted until there was enough funding to conduct thorough testing of our air and water.

Not only should the expansion not have been granted without this data, it should not have even been considered. The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection's mission is and I quote, to protect Pennsylvania's air, land and water from pollution and to provide for the health and safety of its citizens through a cleaner environment, end quote.

I believe that they failed the people of our community miserably by approving this expansion. Thank you. That's all.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mr. Amico.

And they have -- the application has been submitted. So we're on pace to receive that money as well. And I just wanted to thank the two of them for making sure that that was submitted in a timely manner. So that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mrs. Brier.

I also want to congratulate our neighbors and

Timmy's granddaughter on a great game today, great season. The Mid Valley Girls Softball will be playing in the State Championship at Penn State. So that's great for them.
