1 And the last name was taken off. MS. ZANGARDI: Okay. All right. 2 3 MR. HALLINAN: On the question, anybody else? This is our summer program. 4 We 5 run it every year. It's a six-week summer program that Mr. Kearney runs. And we bring in 6 some, you know, kids over 18 that also help 7 8 out. And it's a nice program for the 9 community. 10 It gives the kids something to do. 11 And I'm glad we're having it. And I hope we 12 could move forward with everything in life 13 since COVID. But I'm looking for a vote, 14 All in favor? please. 15 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 16 MR. HALLINAN: Those against? 17 (No response.) 18 MR. HALLINAN: So moved. 19 ATTY. PERRY: Ten is Treasurer financial report, Mr. Burton. 20 21 MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council. 22 The month of June, it turns out it wasn't a 23 very favorable financial month. But that comes 24 as actually no surprise. It's -- it was 25 actually budgeted as a nonprofitable month.

The major driving force was the real estate taxes. The collection pretty much comes to a halt in the summer months. And it was mostly revenue driven. The average revenues for the first five months was 1.4 million. Revenue for this month was \$375,000. So that's quite a big dip.

There was no outstanding -- no out of the ordinary landfill fees or franchise fees or any insurance rebates or anything out of the normal revenuewise for the month. So net loss for the month of June was \$498,000.

Again, there was no major expenses driving the loss. It was just a revenue shortfall. So through six months we're actually showing a 1.2 million dollar loss. But that again is due to the fact that we're a cash basis accounting.

And People's loan payoff or the pension loan was paid off in March. So if we add that back in, we're actually running 1.2 million dollars net profit for the year.

Again, this month there was no out of the ordinary revenues to report.

A sharp dropoff on the tax

1 collections. There was no draw on the TAN. And as far as expenses, nothing major. 2 3 make our \$40,000 MMO payment. Nothing out of 4 the ordinary, just your basic payroll benefits 5 and basic repairs and maintenance. MS. BRIER: What did you say we did 6 7 make the MMO? 8 MR. BURTON: We did make the MMO of 9 \$40,000. 10 MR. HALLINAN: Mark, would you --11 did I interrupt you? Are you --12 MS. BRIER: No, I'm good. 13 MR. HALLINAN: How much money do we 14 have in liquid fuels tax approximately or do 15 you just want to get me that number if you 16 don't have it off the top of your head? 17 MR. BURTON: Off the top of my head I think it's close to \$750,000, somewhere in 18 19 that ballpark. 20 MR. HALLINAN: So it would be good 21 to get some money --22 MR. BURTON: We did make one draw on 23 it last year, maybe two. So with the surplus 24 last year coming into this year -- and we did

receive maybe \$450,000 I think it was.

MR. HALLINAN: Do we have any more coming in this year from liquid fuels or no?

MR. BURTON: I don't --

MR. HALLINAN: Okay. And just so the audience knows, liquid fuels taxes -- money that we get from the gas usage and a formula that is used with the roads that we have and have to maintain that the state reimburses us for.

So that money could only go back into roads whether it's through salt or paving which is my point of I'd like to take a couple hundred thousand and do some blocks at least, you know, some small street because, I mean, I don't know about the rest of Council, the biggest complaint -- I mean, one of the biggest complaints I get is the streets need to be paved. It's horrible.

I mean, like, I looked into a few, like, Grove Street from, you know, Clay Avenue down to Madison because the water company is supposed to do some coming up. I'd love to tie into that so at least we have one main artery that's, you know, paved or, you know, certain things that -- I'm sure we could talk about it.

1 But that is something that I want 2 out there. We have that money. We should use 3 it. 4 MR. BURTON: I'll get you an exact 5 number. MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, I just want to, 6 7 you know, I would say in my mind -- I'm sure 8 Council has to decide on it. Like, there would 9 be nothing wrong with taking \$200,000 out of 10 that and do some roadwork somewhere, do a 11 little bit each year. It means a lot more than 12 doing nothing at all. So thank you, Mark. Do 13 you have anything else? 14 MR. BURTON: No. 15 MR. HALLINAN: Anybody have any 16 questions for Mark? Thank you. 17 ATTY. PERRY: Number 11, public 18 comment. 19 MR. HALLINAN: Anybody have any 20 public comment? Anybody want to address 21 Council at this time? Yes, sir. Just state 22 your name and address for the record. 23 MR. BARTOS: What time do you start, 24 6:00? 25 MR. HALLINAN: 7:00.

MR. BARTOS: Seven? And it's already getting to the questions? I haven't been here in a while. Joe Bartos, Sunset Drive, Dunmore, 110. This might be a stupid question. When are you going to pave the roads?

MR. HALLINAN: We just talked about that. I just spoke about that.

MR. BARTOS: Oh, you did?

MR. HALLINAN: Yes, sir. I'd like to get something in place and start doing things.

MR. BARTOS: Everybody like what he said? You have to pave them. You can't fix them. They're so deep. You know that, right?

MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, and there's different things we could look at. Like, you know, like, if a part of a block is ruined, why we would pave the whole street or if there's, you know, maybe we could look into a like oil and chip on alleys rather than, you know, doing a paving --

MR. BARTOS: Chestnut Street, the whole thing from Drinker to --

MR. HALLINAN: Mr. Bartos, so you

1 know, Chestnut Street is being done by the 2 water company. And then also after that we 3 have -- we've secured a grant a few years ago 4 which Council approved that we're going to be 5 doing curbing, sidewalks, and what do you call it --6 7 Stormwater. MR. AMICO: 8 MR. HALLINAN: Stormwater management 9 through that whole area. 10 MR. AMICO: Chestnut Street is being 11 done from the corners --12 MR. BARTOS: Last year we got that 13 answer. 14 MR. AMICO: If you're on Chestnut 15 Street now you could see heavy equipment there. 16 It's currently being worked on. They are 17 upgrading the stormwater system. They're 18 upgrading the water lines. 19 MR. BARTOS: But that doesn't help 20 the people that have to drive over it. You have to drive over them every day too. 21 22 Oh, absolutely. MR. HALLINAN: But 23 I said that that's one main artery that will 24 be --25 MR. AMICO: The work is being

1 completed right now. We can't expedite what --2 MR. BARTOS: All right. What road 3 are you going to pave this year? How many 4 roads? 5 MS. BRIER: We don't have --MR. HALLINAN: We don't have a plan 6 7 right now. MR. BARTOS: You don't have a plan 8 9 yet? 10 MR. HALLINAN: No, that's what I 11 just brought up and we'd like to sit down and 12 talk about it because obviously you have to do 13 something now to get into November. You'd have 14 to do a plan right now by the time the 15 engineers look it over and then you get into, 16 you know, the paving company bidding on it. 17 MS. BRIER: We received a grant from 18 the State of Pennsylvania for municipal 19 planning. MR. BARTOS: I'm getting old. 20 Ι can't hear. 21 22 MS. BRIER: We applied for a grant 23 from DCED. And we were approved for it. 24 we set it out to bid and PEL came in and said, 25 you know, that -- they replied to the RFP. And

then they came in and spoke to us.

So now we need to vote on whether we will hire PEL. It will cost the Borough about \$30,000. But I think it's money well spent.

That's my opinion because we never had a plan in Dunmore for paving, for anything.

MR. BARTOS: I believe that.

MS. BRIER: Well, we never had one that I knew of anyway. So my hope is we will get some, you know, professional support people who know municipal law. I don't know municipal law. I'm not an expert. I don't think anyone on this panel is.

But we need to get a plan. I totally, totally, utterly, completely agree with you that Dunmore needs to get a municipal plan that will include paving the streets, etc.

MR. BARTOS: Didn't we get any federal money from COVID or from what's going on that we could use?

MS. BRIER: The Rescue Plan. They won't let us use that for paving. But we have applied. Mark Burton applied for that money a month ago right, Mark? So the application is into the state because now it's a state thing

we -- Mark was able to get the -- pretty 2 3 complex application completed and in on time. 4 So now we're in a wait and see. We should get 5 over a million dollars over three years. MR. HALLINAN: I don't think it will 6 7 be for paving. We'll see. There's going to be 8 certain restrictions to that money, Mr. 9 Bartos. But I hope we have an answer for you and move forward with some kind of paving --10 11 MR. BARTOS: Before it snows? MR. HALLINAN: Yes, sir. That would 12 13 be the best part because we can't do paving in 14 the snow. 15 MR. BARTOS: Anybody live on Somers 16 Street or near it -- Somers Street going up the 17 hill to Smith? Nobody knows where that is? 18 MR. HALLINAN: I know exactly where 19 it is. 20 MR. BARTOS: The whole thing is 21 like --22 MS. BRIER: The whole town. We need 23 We need an overall plan. We can't say 24 someone comes in and complains so we do that 25 one and the next day. We need a plan.

that -- again, it's the DCED in the state and
