- with about hiring somebody to research our --19
- whether we have a say or not on the sale of the 20
- Scranton Sewer Authority. I did talk to two 21
- people who helped -- from Gary getting me the 22
- 23 paralegal number. She gave me two different
- numbers, Mike. 24
- 25 I talked to -- one was \$175 an hour.

- 1 One is \$185 an hour. The one -- the 175 said
- if we can get more information from the Sewer
- Authority, like, the contract, past contract
- when they did privatization or you know, things
- like that, of course, it would be a lot
- cheaper, anything that we can get without 6
- having to go through a Right to Know. 7
 - That is up to Council if they would
- like to pursue it. I would like to pursue it
- because like I said, I would like to know if --10
- 11 before the Sewer Authority is sold if we had a
- chance to stop it or give advice and it passes 12
- without us, you know, finding out later that we 13
- had a say and we could have stopped it or, you 14
- 15 know, you know, we let it go.
- But I would like Council's approval 16
- to, you know, to decide on who they want to 17
- 18 hire to pursue this. I'll make a motion we
- hire somebody to look up the information. 19
- 20 MR. MCHALE: Who?
 - MR. BURKE: Well, either one. I
- 22 could go with either one. I mean, we go with
- the best price which is 175. But I make a 23
- motion that we hire to find out before the 24
- 25 Sewer Authority is sold find out if we have a
- say on the sale of the Scranton Sewer
- 2 Authority.
- MR. MCHALE: \$175, do you want to 3
- cap or we'll just watch it you and I? 4
 - MR. BURKE: Okay.
- MR. MCHALE: Do you want to do that? 6
- MR. BURKE: That's sounds good. 7
- 8 MR. MCHALE: Tommy, I can't make a
- 9 second.
- 10 ATTY. CUMMINGS: You need to go to
- 11 public comment.
- 12 MR. MCHALE: Do I need a second
- 13 though first, Tom?

- second. If you don't, then it just dies. 16
- MR. MCHALE: I have a motion. Do I 17
- 18 have a second?

- MR. MCHALE: I have a motion and a 20
- 21 second. Now on the question. Laurie Valunas
- again. 22
- MS. VALUNAS: I'm sorry, yeah,
- Laurie Valunas, 1721 Madison. I caught the end 24
- of the Scranton Council meeting. And I didn't 25

1 get a chance to look at the whole thing. But

2 the part that I saw was that they were talking

about the Sewer Authority. And they said

Dunmore has a say. 4

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And I think they said what are they going to do and they said we haven't heard.

7 They did specifically say Dunmore has a say.

MR. MCHALE: We own 20 percent of

9 that. And I'm the -- I sit on that Board as

10 the Dunmore representative. And my vote is

going to be Council's vote.

MS. VALUNAS: Okay.

13 MR. MCHALE: So whatever ends up 14

happening, a sale, a lease, or nothing, that

15 asset is still Dunmore's up until a sale.

MR. BURKE: And the thing we're 16

looking for I know privatization we do have a

vote that could stop it or let it happen. We 18

went through it before. But now they are 19

talking about a sale, which we haven't been 20

21 able to find out for sure or I would just like

22 research done because this is happening in

23 other boroughs across the United States. And

24 I'd like to know if we do have a say.

25 MR. MCHALE: For the record -- I

Cummings has and the attorneys -- the two

3 attorneys who sit for the Board at the Sewer

Authority have looked into it and haven't found 4

8 Now, if there's nothing there,

you're never going to find anything. If 9

16 ATTY. CUMMINGS: The response that I

17 issued was that the Dunmore Borough has a

representative on the Sewer Authority which is 18

a one-fifth vote being one of five and that the 19

conveyance of the property and/or the 20

21 termination of the Authority is covered under

the Municipal Authorities Act. 22

It's my understanding that that was

24 deemed an insufficient answer. So I contacted

the two solicitors for the Sewer Authority. 25

1 Both reviewed it and came up with the same

response to the Borough of Dunmore that we have

a one-fifth vote. And it is by majority rule.

But it has to be within the confines of the

Municipal Authorities Act as to how and what

6 the Authority does.

7 That was also referred by the Sewer

Authority attorneys to the Pennsylvania 8

9 Association of Municipal Authorities. They did

10 not respond because they found nothing

11 different. That is the answer that has been

provided. You're free to hire somebody else to 12

13 find a different answer, if you wish.

MR. DEMPSEY: So there is three 14

15 lawvers that said we have a one-fifth vote or

one-fifth percentage, 20 percent. 16

ATTY. CUMMINGS: Correct.

MR. DEMPSEY: And, Tim, is that an

insufficient answer? I'm not sure -- why are 19

20 we hiring a paralegal to --

MR. BURKE: The answer if you

22 remember took me a year and a half to get that

23 answer.
