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1	ATTY. CUMMINGS: We did roll call,
2	the Pledge of Allegiance, public comment.
3	No one stepped up for public comment on
4	agenda items. There was a motion to approve
5	the open minutes.
6	Now we're on item No. 5, which is
7	motion to approve and pay the open bills.
8	MR. HALLINAN: I look for a motion
9	to approve and pay the open bills.
10	MR. EHNOT: I'll make a motion to
11	pay the open bills.
12	MR. HALLINAN: Second?
13	MR. AMICO: I'll second.
14	MR. HALLINAN: On the question? All
15	in favor? Eye.
16	MR. EHNOT: Aye.
17	MR. AMICO: Aye.
18	MR. MCHALE: Aye.
19	MR. HALLINAN: Opposed?
20	ATTY. CUMMINGS: Item 5A, personnel
21	matters. A motion employing Angelo Petitto
22	as a crossing guard to fill the vacancy.
23	MR. HALLINAN: I'll look for a
24	motion to approve Mr. Petitto as a crossing
25	guard.

MR. AMICO: I'll make that motion. 1 MR. HALLINAN: Second? 2 3 MR. EHNOT: I'll second it. 4 MR. HALLINAN: On the question, Mr. 5 Petitto will be filling in for numerous vacancies that we have for crossing guards. 6 All in favor? Aye. 7 8 MR. EHNOT: Aye. 9 MR. AMICO: Aye. 10 MR. MCHALE: Aye. 11 MR. HALLINAN: None opposed. A11 12 approve. 13 ATTY. CUMMINGS: No. 6, public 14 comment on non-agenda items starting with 15 Gerard Hetman of Lackawanna County. 16 MR. HETMAN: Good evening, ladies 17 and gentlemen. Gerard Hetman from 18 Lackawanna County Community Relations 19 department. 20 Couple of items coming up for the 21 end of summer, start of the fall season. 22 First, McDade Park will host a car seat 23 safety check on Friday August 16th, 9:30 24 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. It's at pavilion one 25 when you first pull in, on the right side.

If it's not there just go to the second pavilion. It's sponsored by the Traffic Injury Prevention Project. That's a consortium of local public safety agencies supported by the local police departments. Anyone who uses car seats in their vehicle, parents or grandparents, can come, have it properly installed and get a demonstration on the right way to install and maintain car seats.

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Also, our two fall events in the month of September coming up, our annual senior health fair is Friday, September 20th, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at PNC Field. We'll have approximately 60 different exhibitors, a variety of senior health and wellness giveaways, health checks, information. Lots of good services available. We'll also have refreshments. The event is free, free parking, free admission, and it is indoors on the suite level of the second floor of the facility, so rain or shine, inclement whether we can open to the public.

Our other item in the fall month of September is our annual Heros Day public

safety fair. That takes place the Saturday before the health fair. Saturday, September 14th. It starts at 11 a.m. and wraps up at 2 p.m. at the Lackawanna County Center for Public Safety, better known as the 911 center. We've got free guided tours of the 911 facility. You can see behind the scenes exactly how the setup works, and then in the parking area we'll have displays available. Fire, police, EMS, military and other public safety vehicles and equipment will be available. We'll also have certain county community departments and agencies with Penn State extension, Lackawanna River Corridor Association, a variety of other programs and activities to check out. That's Saturday, September 14th, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. There's a few other ones. Friday, August 16st, also at McDade Park, the ADA Day takes place. It's run by the Center for Independent Living. It's from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Pavilion two. Our Veterans Affairs office asked us to share information on the Women Veterans

Town Hall Expo. That comes up August 24th,

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9 a.m. to noon at the Wilkes-Barre VA Medical Center. It's sponsored in part by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, Pennsylvania Department of Military Veterans It's a multi-pronged event. Affairs. We see more and more women serve in our military. Their service is coming to the forefront now, so we're happy to see that programming in place on a regional basis. Then we have a number of EMA and other related items here. The deadline for non-profit organizations to apply for economic injury is later this month relating to the flooding from last August. Also, PEMA is putting on the

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individual assistance workshop. It's over two days at the end of October at the 911 Center in Jessup. It's 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. October 29th and 30th.

Also, the one that we're really proud of here is the Lackawanna Ready Business Workshop. It's hosted by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency, Federal Emergency Management Agency, Lackawanna County Emergency Management

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1	Agency, and the Greater Scranton Chamber of
2	Commerce. The workshop focuses on business
3	continuity for business for any size.
4	Mostly small business, but any business
5	operation. You can learn useful strategies
6	for planning ahead in order to continue
7	operations.
8	Last, but not least, is our
9	commissioners' blood drive in the fall.
10	That takes place Friday, September 13th, 10
11	a.m. to 3 p.m. in the lobby of the
12	Lackawanna County Government Center. That's
13	all we have.
14	ATTY. CUMMINGS: Gary Duncan,
15	Neighborhood Watch?
16	MR. DUNCAN: Gary Duncan, 117 Martin
17	Street, Dunmore. I re-sent the minutes from
18	last month's meeting again today. I didn't
19	get a response from everybody, so I don't
20	know if they got them.
21	MR. HALLINAN: I got them.
22	MR. DUNCAN: Obviously our monthly
23	meeting is next Monday, the 19th. Believe
24	it or not, next Monday is going to be the
25	sixth anniversary for us. We're going into

I	our sixth year. It was different council,
2	but Mr. McHale was here when we started
3	this, Vito, Tim Burke Mayor Burke was on
1	council, and those folks have been with us
5	since day one. I have to thank a few guys
5	just because of it's the sixth anniversary.
7	But the Dunmore Police Department,
3	we had Bill Springer at the time, Captain
)	Springer, and then Tom Richardson. Tom
)	Richardson is still our police liaison.
l	After six years we still get Tom at the
2	meetings, and Mike Igoe comes with him now.
3	It means a lot to me to have the Dunmore
1	Police liaison.
5	Chris DeNaples isn't here tonight
5	from our fire department, but I have to say
7	thanks to the fire department because every
3	October they come and they do fire safety
)	month for us. They've been instrumental in
)	getting out the smoke detectors across the
l	length and breadth of the borough. We saw
2	what happened over the weekend with five
3	children that died out in Erie. For our
1	guys to do that locally, what a wonderful
5	service. The kids that died, they had a

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1	smoke detector in the attic and it just
2	wasn't enough.
3	And I have to thank our policemen.
4	Tomorrow night is our National Night Out in
5	Dunmore, and to think that we have liaisons
6	and representatives, it really does take a
7	village. But boy, what a village I live in.
8	So I hope everybody can make it next Monday
9	at 7:00.
10	This past Saturday we had the
11	Dunmore Cross-Country Alumni Race. I just
12	bring it to everybody's attention. This is
13	Vince Fedor's 50th year coaching Dunmore
14	cross-country. I was fortunate enough to be
15	with him for six years and help the program.
16	At one time I had two daughters and anywhere
17	from three to four nieces and nephews
18	running. So I hope we can think of doing
19	something for Vince. Fifty years at
20	Dunmore. I mean, my daughter's 25. He's
21	coaching as long as my oldest daughter's
22	alive. That's mind boggling to me. Again,
23	I live in a heck of a village, thank God.
24	So thanks to everybody. Thanks for
25	helping us make six years. For all

the people involved. Like I said, Vito, Mike McHale, Tim Burke and the folks here. Vince Amico, God bless you. Even if he's not at a meeting he sends me a text to tell me he can't make it and he wants to know what's going on. So I do appreciate it. I think the whole town does. Thanks, guys.

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ATTY. CUMMINGS: Other members of the general public on non-agenda items?

MR. JOHNSON: David Johnson, 601 Shirley Lane. I came before you in probably early January of last year about the condition of the road on Shirley Lane, the 600 block. You did patch it in the spring. I think there's a section of it there that's way past patching. It's seems to me that probably about four inches should be taken out and it should be paved. Everybody that comes up Shirley Lane ends up going on the other side. They just don't run over that spot anymore.

Then right across from that, on my side of the road, where the stop sign is, there's two petty good size sink holes. One in front of the stop sign and one behind the

1	stop sign.
2	The other thing I'd like to bring to
3	your attention and I talked to Gary about
4	it in the past. This is before I bought my
5	home last year. But the utility company,
6	where Swinik and Shirley Lane hits, they
7	must have put in a new line or a shutoff
8	line. The sidewalk at one point is sunk.
9	It's as high as two inches on one side up
10	and two inches down on the other side.
11	I have talked to UGI. They told me
12	they're going to send somebody up. I found
13	a gentleman surveying the line a week ago
14	and he took pictures of it, and I called UGI
15	the day before the meeting and they said
16	somebody else would get back to me, too.
17	But will they? I don't know.
18	MR. HALLINAN: Vito, will you check
19	on that, please.
20	MR. JOHNSON: Just an observation.
21	On Shirley Lane and Reeve Street my wife
22	and I sit on the porch quite often. I was
23	shocked the other day to actually see two or
24	three cars stop at those stop signs. They
25	just don't do it.

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1	And one other observation and I
2	don't know what you call it. If you call it
3	a silt fence or something. But they're
4	working on a new fence along the Jewish
5	cemetery right into the high school, and
6	nothing is there. You can look at the road.
7	With all the rain we've had all that silt
8	and dirt and everything else keeps coming
9	down in front of the high school. The
10	sidewalks are still not in, and I guess
11	we're expecting more rain. I think they
12	call them silt fences or something.
13	MR. HALLINAN: To hold the debris
14	back. Thanks.
15	MS. GILBRIDE: My name is Lisa
16	Gilbride, 1309 McKenna Court. I am the
17	owner of property and taxpayer of 1309
18	McKenna Court, Dunmore. My property is in
19	the rear of Madison Avenue. I have no
20	street access to either Monroe Avenue or
21	Madison Avenue. This house has been in my
22	family 90 years. In 2014 I invested \$49,000
23	in improvements to my property.
24	The closure of the 1300 block of
25	McKenna Court at the upper end, near the

former Price Chopper -- if it does happen. I've heard, I so I'm just putting this -somebody said they were planning on maybe closing it in the back of Price Chopper. Ιt creates a serious problem for me, since the only parking available on or near my property is a concrete slab that I had installed next to the house. Ιt accommodates one car that must be parked parallel to the house and parallel to McKenna Court. There is no room perpendicular or crosswise parking without jutting into the streets.

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It is not possible to back up or So with one entrance for West turn around. Grove Street it's necessary to travel in the same direction up the court to exit. If the upper entrance is blocked, the only way is to back down West Grove Street in reverse There's limited visibility entering gear. Grove Street due to cars parked on either side of the court. Under the best of circumstances, even when driving forward it can be difficult to pull out. In bad weather it's even more dangerous. Doing it

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1	in reverse will be almost impossible and
2	very dangerous.
3	The borough is responsible for snow
4	removal as well as trash removal and
5	recycling. I'm also concerned about the
6	ability of a plow or garbage truck to clear
7	or service McKenna Court. Lack of snow
8	removal would create an even more hazardous
9	condition not only for my property but also
10	for other property owners who park their
11	cars in garages on McKenna Court.
12	I currently lease the property, and
13	the closure of one end of McKenna Court not
14	only jeopardizes my current tenant, but it
15	also diminishes the value of my property for
16	future sale or lease.
17	I respectfully request that the
18	council deny closure, if it was going to
19	happen, of the court to provide a safe and
20	reasonable alternative for ingress and
21	egress for my property on McKenna Court.
22	Thank you very much. Lisa Gilbride.
23	MR. HALLINAN: I'm not aware of the
24	closing of McKenna Court. The only thing I
25	would say is, if I'm not mistaken, and we

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3	will check into it, is that could be the
	Price Chopper property and not ours, up on
4	the top. We're not closing any streets.
	MR. MCHALE: Can they close that,
5	Price Chopper or whoever owns that?
6	ATTY. CUMMINGS: This is the first
7	I've heard of this, but I will check on it.
8	MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. Anybody
9	else want to address council this evening?
10	Seeing none.
11	ATTY. CUMMINGS: Public officials?
12	MR. HALLINAN: Mayor Burke?
13	MAYOR BURKE: Yes. Congratulations,
14	Gary, for doing an excellent job the last
15	six years. Happy anniversary. I hope many
16	more years.
17	Also, Gary mentioned National Night
18	Out tomorrow night. Starts at 5:30. There
19	is a parade and the parade will start at
20	6:00 at the high school and end up at the
21	high school. We'll also have a movie for
22	the children.
23	But also about the ATVs, Tommy's
24	still working on the ATV situation. I'd
25	like Tommy to send us an e-mail on what we

16 1 could do and can't do. Myself, Vito an e-mail on that. I would also ask permission 2 3 to do what Wallenpaupack has. Their police put up signs, no ATVs. I'm asking that now, 4 5 if you can make a motion -- call for a motion for signs on no ATVs like 6 7 Wallenpaupack has. I've been working with 8 officials on this. I'll keep on working 9 with higher officials on this until we come 10 up with an answer. I'd appreciate, Tom, if you can get 11 12 an e-mail, myself and council, everything we 13 could do or can't do to move this ordinance 14 and e-mail myself and council and Vito and 15 our police chief and fire chief. That's all 16 I have. 17 MR. HALLINAN: Vito? 18 MR. RUGGIERO: No. 19 MR. HALLINAN: Mr. Cummings? 20 ATTY. CUMMINGS: No. 21 MR. HALLINAN: Mr. Ehnot? 22 MR. EHNOT: Please attend National 23 Night Out tomorrow night. They put a lot of 24 time and effort into it. It's a great 25 See you tomorrow night. thing.

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1	MR. HALLINAN: Mr. McHale?
2	MR. MCHALE: No, I'm fine.
3	MR. HALLINAN: Just one thing, Tim.
4	I'd like you to ask the chief if he could
5	look into cars are up on the sidewalks on
6	numerous streets, but especially on Green
7	Ridge Street now people are parking up on
8	the curbs and on their lawns. I just want
9	to know if you can find out if it's legal or
10	illegal and see if something can be done
11	about that.
12	MAYOR BURKE: I'll print them up and
13	bring them up to Rich Barth tomorrow
14	morning. We're also going to try to get
15	crosswalk lines painted across, when DPW is
16	free, to get a crosswalk from Henry's Bar
17	across Green Ridge Street, here. The only
18	way we can get it done from PennDOT is if
19	they are doing new roads. Then they'll put
20	it in. Otherwise, we have permission to put
21	it across. They won't do it unless they're
22	putting in a new pave job.
23	Eventually I'd like to get some
24	crosswalks on other parts of Green Ridge
25	Street to try to cross that, especially with

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1	school starting now.
2	Do I have council's approval to get
3	signs for ATVs?
4	MR. HALLINAN: I don't see a
5	problem, but, I mean, the crosswalks, we
6	were working on those crosswalks. Correct?
7	MR. RUGGIERO: Right.
8	MR. HALLINAN: On Clay and Green
9	Ridge. I don't see a problem with the
10	signs.
11	MAYOR BURKE: I'll tell Rich to
12	order some. They know the areas where
13	they're going.
14	MR. HALLINAN: That's all I have
15	this evening. I look for a motion to
16	adjourn.
17	MR. EHNOT: I'll make a motion to
18	adjourn.
19	MR. AMICO: Second.
20	(Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
