2	to provide advertising opportunities on Borough
3	properties, the website and social media.
4	MR. DEMPSEY: I'll make that motion.
5	MR. HALLINAN: I'll second it.
6	MR. MCHALE: I have a motion and a
7	second. On the question. For everybody in the
8	audience, this is a new company a Dunmore
9	company that's not going to cost us anything.
10	But it's newer but they have a lot of
11	experience in creating advertising
12	opportunities for the Borough.
13	And we'll get a large percentage of
14	that revenue, whether it be on the walls in the
15	gymnasium, on, you know, Didge's building up
16	the DPW headquarters, so on and so forth,
17	anything that we can do we'll get some revenue
18	out of that.
19	So it's a kind of a win/win
20	situation. It's a Dunmore based company with a
21	couple gentlemen who have been extremely
22	successful in their personal business that are
23	coming together to do this. So we're excited
24	for the opportunity. Like I said, it's no cost
25	to us, just advertising revenue. So anybody

10	So if, you know, "X" bank wants to
11	come in and put a sign on a wall or something
12	like that, you know, they'll pay the Borough to
13	put the sign on the wall. And the Home Field
14	Advertising takes basically a cut or a
15	percentage of that and they go out and do all
16	the work. It doesn't cost us anything.
17	Obviously it will be done
18	tastefully. We'll have a say. There's not
19	going to be 45 signs in here of different
20	companies so just to add to what Mike said.
21	MR. MCHALE: Anybody else on the
22	question?
23	MR. VERRASTRO: Yeah, it's more or
24	less for like our street light polls, stuff
25	like that going through the corners, walkways

14	adding to that revenue stream.

And one of the things that came up 19 last time Didge was a request for new 20 signage over at Jessup and Reeves Street. Did 21 we order new signs for over there? 22 MR. LORINCE: Yeah, the signs came 23 in today. 24 MR. DUNCAN: I want to thank you 25 again for getting the tree at Warren and Ward

1       taken out. Again, that was really a lot of         2       people weren't happy with that situation so         3       thanks.         4       The dumpster behind Nina's we talked         5       about it briefly. I continually hear from         6       people them. I know I went by the one day and         7       it was overflowing.         8       MR. LORINCE: We talked to them         9       about picking up more.         10       MR. DUNCAN: Can they get another         11       dumpster in?         12       MR. LORINCE: One's enough. They         13       just need to pick it up more often.         14       MR. DUNCAN: Okay. You spoke to         15       them about it. I talked to Richie Barth about         16       the PP & L truck down on Larch Street. The         17       problem down there with the branches still, the         18       utility lines. I didn't hear back from Rich.         19       Sal, if you see him, can you ask         10       him if he told me he was going to drive by         20       him if he told me he was going to drive by         21       and double check it. A couple of days later         22       there was men at work signs. There was no men		
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	23	working. So that said, can you check with him
25 to do a drive by. They are still up in the	24	and ask him to get back with me? He was going
	25	to do a drive by. They are still up in the

10 1 power lines. The branches and everything are 2 growing through there. And that was something 3 that came up at the meeting. Speed bumps over at Warren Street 4 5 over by the high school. I don't know if they were repainted or who we have to get in touch 6 7 with with that. That was a concern. 8 MR. JUDGE: They are the schools. 9 MR. DUNCAN: I'm just asking about 10 it. It came up at the meeting. MR. MCHALE: We'll talk to the 11 12 school about it, Didge. MR. DUNCAN: Thank you. 13 14 MR. MCHALE: I agree. I go there 15 every day. If you don't know that they're 16 there --17 MR. DUNCAN: Yeah. 18 MR. JUDGE: We painted all the other 19 ones down there. If you want them painted too, 20 no big deal. 21 MR. MCHALE: Just add it to your 22 list, Didge. Yeah. 23 MR. DUNCAN: Thanks. And then as is 24 always the case down at Ferguson Place, you 25 know, Adams and Larch, that neighborhood,

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1	Ferguson Place 2, 4, and 6, those are the
2	numbers Ferguson Place. The brushes are still
3	grown over. The bushes rather, are still grown
4	over and everything down there.
5	So just that's it for the
6	neighborhood watch stuff. I have a question
7	for you. On the person that was hired part
8	time to full time, was that for a person
9	somebody retired or are we just short a person
10	or just down one or what was that?
11	MR. BURKE: We were working short,
12	Gary, the DPW for probably last 8 to 10 years.
13	We made cuts and never replaced retirements for
14	probably 10 years.
15	MR. DUNCAN: I just wondered
16	MR. VERRASTRO: We actually did a
17	layoff in 2010 and we haven't replaced anybody
18	since then.
19	MR. DUNCAN: Okay.
20	MR. MCHALE: And it kills us, Gary,
21	when we get into hunting season, heavy vacation
22	season because then we're down to
23	MR. DUNCAN: Sixth ward we're always
24	running behind. So I just when I heard I
25	was just curious about that. The Borough

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1	Manager I did see the advertisement for Borough
2	Manager in the newspaper. I just wondered how
3	that if that is progressing, if we have
4	applicants or where we're at with that one?
5	MR. MCHALE: We do. We closed on
6	Friday. I don't know if any on Council have
7	reviewed the resumes. But we'll have probably
8	a personnel meeting in the very near future to
9	discuss what we're going to do there. But
10	there's approximately 12 applicants.
11	MR. DUNCAN: Thanks. Just a few
12	more, on the website the new Dunmore dot org
13	website, I know we can pull up the ordinance
14	and everything on it. But the whole thing is
15	downloaded. And I was scrolling through it and
16	it's really hard to follow.
17	I don't know if there is anything we
18	can do to break it down and make it more user
19	friendly or what. You're scrolling through to
20	look for small subsections of it and
21	MR. DEMPSEY: The ordinances?
22	MR. DUNCAN: Yeah.
23	MR. DEMPSEY: On my computer you
24	just hit find button control F.
25	MR. DUNCAN: Right. I did that.

1	But you're scrolling page by page by page by
2	page, ask if there is anything they can do to
3	make it more user friendly. The ordinance for
4	the town then for quiet time, can I get a
5	specific time what the official time is for
6	parties and everything?
7	MR. MCHALE: Chief?
8	CHIEF MARCHESE: I think it's 11.
9	MR. DUNCAN: Well, 11? That's what
10	I tried to pull up. And I can't even find it
11	in there. I scrolled and scrolled, everything
12	that you said and we just can't get to it.
13	Halloween on our block over there, I'm here
14	tonight to talk to you about all the neighbors
15	that were concerned.
16	I have church on Barton Street.
17	There's three private driveways on that street.
18	Last week it was shut down for a party. We
19	have a burn pit there. We have disco music
20	blasting and other rock and roll music blasting
21	until 2:30 in the morning.
22	I have my one neighbor that was
23	upset about it has an adult son with special
24	needs. And her tenant has a 18-month-old baby
25	and they're pregnant with their second child.

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1	Mrs. Lam{sic} is probably about 85 years old.
2	Mr. and Mrs. Roche, she's in bed. She's in bed
3	right now with a fractured shoulder. My
4	neighbors next to my house have a tenant who
5	has to go to work at 4 a.m.
6	The party went until 2:30 a.m. It
7	was loud. It was unbearable. I know the PD
8	were called. Whatever happened, no shutdown in
9	noise. And they had other parties, but this
10	one was out of control. A lady on Delaware
11	Street asked me what the noise was on Barton
12	Street. So it was a loud, loud party.
13	And I understand a party but until
14	2:30 a.m. to have that many people. If the
15	people that had the party went to Barton Street
16	they would have been assassinated. It was that
17	bad and it was that loud. It was that unruly.
18	So before the party happens next
19	year for Halloween, I'd like at least the
20	people that are responsible the people in
21	charge of the Borough to realize there's people
22	that have to have access to that street. They
23	put men at work signs up on that. There were
24	no men at work.
25	The barriers were still up the next
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1	morning. People that live on the street had to
2	move the barriers to get into their driveways.
3	So I'm here tonight to tell you, I'm the one
4	that was asked to come and speak about it.
5	Most of my neighbors are elderly.
6	But it certainly adversely affected
7	the quality of life. And I just wanted to
8	bring it up for my whole neighborhood. I hope
9	it doesn't happen next year.
10	MR. VERRASTRO: Who shut the street
11	down? Did they get a permit to do it?
12	CHIEF MARCHESE: I think that's the
13	one Didge called me about.
14	MR. JUDGE: He called me, Sal. I
15	was away. I didn't give them the barricades.
16	I called Sal.
17	MR. DUNCAN: They put their own
18	barricades up.
19	MR. MCHALE: In the future, any road
20	that
21	CHIEF MARCHESE: If it was that bad,
22	it should have been shut down.
23	MR. MCHALE: Any time a road gets
24	shut down, Council has to get it shut down.
25	MR. VERRASTRO: What we did last

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1	time was, it had to go through the Chief to
2	be approved and the Chief
3	MR. MCHALE: I'd rather so everybody
4	knows about it put it in public.
5	MR. VERRASTRO: Because the fire
6	department won't know the road was shut down
7	either.
8	MR. MCHALE: That's my point, yeah.
9	MR. DUNCAN: This lady's son has
10	epilepsy. So if we have to get emergency
11	vehicles through there, it's a situation. The
12	fire burned until 2:30 in the morning. I
13	thought there was a no burning ordinance in the
14	Borough as well.
15	And I know we talked about it at
16	Neighborhood Watch meetings at and other
17	meetings where I had Council members in
18	attendance who verified that. So there are a
19	lot of red flags with this one.
20	I'm asking in advance next Halloween
21	if it not occur because there are people that
22	have to use their driveways. And we have a
23	person with special needs medically. I'm in
24	health care 42 years so I understand that.
25	Okay. That's it for tonight. But please keep

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1	it in mind for next year. And somebody please
2	get back to me on what the ordinances are so I
3	have it in black and white. People are
4	hesitant to call the PD. They don't want
5	repercussions. There's no hesitancy in letting
6	me know.
7	But I really didn't need to know.
8	It sounded like I probably had Led Zeppelin
9	about 1977 playing in my house. So it was that
10	bad. Thank you.
11	MR. MCHALE: Thank you.
12	MS. SCRIMALLI: Thank you.
13	MR. BURKE: Sal, would you be able
14	to have one of the police officers at the
15	meeting inform Gary what time the noise
16	ordinance is?
17	CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah.
18	MR. BURKE: Thanks.
19	MR. MCHALE: Anybody else like to
20	speak tonight?
21	MS. CUFF: Hi, Sharon Cuff, Spring
22	Street, Dunmore. I wanted to talk about the
23	website a little bit. I didn't know I mean,
24	I wasn't sure. I used to e-mail Vito with
25	different things about it. I wasn't sure what

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1	the status was there. So I wanted to bring it
2	up here. I think we've talked about before
3	about what should be on the website and
4	uploading different things and user friendly
5	which Gary just brought up getting the agendas
6	for meetings put up, which today's was not.
7	The news, I know we talked about
8	that, the news stories and things like that
9	being put on the website. I'm just wondering,
10	who is in charge of deciding what goes on the
11	website?
12	MR. DEMPSEY: The news articles are
13	automatically uploaded. We have no access to
14	what news articles. It's usually the word
15	Dunmore populates in Google and they just
16	automatically go to the website. We have no
17	control over what news stories. Basically any
18	news story with the word Dunmore in it I
19	believe gets put on the website. That's how I
20	understand it.
21	We don't send them news stories.
22	And they don't put them on physically every
23	morning. It automatically populates.
24	MS. CUFF: Okay.
25	MR. LORINCE: Sorry, there's two

1       websites. I think that's what the         2       MR. MCHALE: There's three website.         3       MR. LORINCE: Dot com is gone now.         4       MR. LORINCE: Is it finally?         5       MR. LORINCE: Yeah, dot org and         6       there is Dunmore         7       MR. DEMPSEY: Dunmorepa.gov.         8       MR. LORINCE: PA dot gov. So I         9       don't know which one you're looking at but         10       there's two different websites.         11       MS. CUFF: Which is the newest         12       website?         13       MR. DEMPSEY: Dot gov.         14       MR. DEMPSEY: Dot gov.         15       MR. DEMPSEY: Dot gov.         16       feeds, that's the one I'm talking about.         17       MR. LORINCE: We also have org too.         18       Dunmoreborough.org is still a website though.         19       MS. CUFF: But do the newspaper         20       articles and news articles go up on that one?         21       I don't think so. I think it's only the new         22       one.         23       MR. 20 several reasons. The sewer line odor issue. 1 There's a stack of articles and not one of them 2 3 was on those news feeds, nothing. Again, we had two --4 5 MR. MCHALE: We had nothing to do 6 with that though. MS. CUFF: And I get that. 7 We've 8 clarified that. I know now. But that might be 9 something you could address with who you're 10 paying to do this website because I would think 11 that it's pretty newsworthy since these are all the news articles related to it that were not 12 13 on the website. 14 Again, I don't know that there's been any other time in Dunmore where two 15 16 facilities were evacuated in one evening to my 17 recollection. I'm living here a long time. Ι 18 don't recall. So again, I'm going to say this 19 is probably a pretty newsworthy event. Nothing 20 was on the website, nothing, not one article. 21 I've been checking. And again, there's a whole 22 slew --23 MR. DEMPSEY: Again, we don't have 24 control over that. 25 MS. CUFF: I see that now. I didn't

1	know who did. But I would definitely address
2	that with whoever you're paying.
3	MR. DEMPSEY: I will see if they can
4	add the words like Scranton Sewer Authority to
5	see if that will upload it.
6	MS. CUFF: Perhaps, Keystone
7	Sanitary Landfill? Since that seems to be
8	pretty much a hot topic.
9	MR. MCHALE: Again, we're not
10	deleting those that have Keystone in it either.
11	We have no control over that.
12	MS. CUFF: No, I'm not saying that.
13	But, I mean, this is the website for the
14	Borough. So I think if you're going to do it,
15	and that's Vito, you know, we had talked about
16	a lot getting this up and running and being
17	MR. DEMPSEY: There's been a lot of
18	Keystone articles on the website.
19	MS. CUFF: You know what I mean like
20	to kind of make it user friendly so people can
21	access anything to do with the Borough by going
22	on to this one location.
23	MR. MCHALE: You could e-mail
24	Michael. You have my e-mail. You have my
25	text. You can send me messages. Please send

1	them to us. We'll try. And Vito too. Vito is
2	working as well.
3	MS. CUFF: Again, i wasn't sure.
4	And I'm not being I'm just saying I'm just
5	saying
6	MR. DEMPSEY: It seems like you're
7	accusing us of not putting newspaper articles
8	on there.
9	MS. CUFF: I'm getting to why I'm a
10	little bit upset. The Department of Health
11	actually contacted me because they did send
12	again, that's another thing that we can ask
13	your people who are doing it maybe the DEP, you
14	know, things like this are immediate released
15	press releases that have to do with Dunmore.
16	I think that would be beneficial to
17	have. This Environmental Justice, this DEP
18	news release that would be beneficial to have
19	on the website. Again, I didn't know who is in
20	charge. I'm asking. But I'm upset because the
21	Department of Health did say that they
22	contacted they sent this community health
23	update to the Borough and asked specifically if
24	it could go on the website.
25	And they contacted me because they

23         1       said maybe we don't have the right site. But         2       we don't see it up, could you reach out to         3       them. I said I certainly will. I was not         4       pleased that it wasn't on.         5       MR. DEMPSEY: No one contacted me         6       and asked me to put that on the website. But         7       if you did and you sent me that, I would         8       have         9       MS. CUFF: No, I didn't. This         10       was         11       MR. DEMPSEY: No, I'm saying in the         12       future I could have it put on the website.         13       That's not a problem.         14       MS. CUFF: Okay.         15       MR. DEMPSEY: I have no objection to         16       that. None of us do.         17       MS. CUFF: Right. So if we wanted         18       something on there we can go through you but         19       you guys aren't in charge of putting it on         20       there.         21       MR. CUFF: Going forward maybe these are things that you could kind of clue them in 2 3 and say look for any kind of press releases about Dunmore, Scranton, you know, things like 4 5 that I think would be helpful to be on there. MR. MCHALE: I don't disagree with 6 7 you. 8 MS. CUFF: And, I'm sorry, I don't 9 mean to be -- but I was a little bit of upset 10 and embarrassed. MR. HALLINAN: I also think that the 11 12 Borough as Michael had said we get in touch 13 with them, there also should be an 14 administrator on our side that, you know, just because the word has Dunmore in there or 15 16 Scranton Sewer Authority or something maybe 17 doesn't mean it gets up loaded either. 18 Somebody has to review this before it gets 19 posted. 20 MS. CUFF: Yeah, I guess --21 MR. HALLINAN: It could work either 22 way. 23 MR. DEMPSEY: I don't care what 24 stories gone go on. It's in the newspaper --25 it doesn't --

25 1 MS. CUFF: I know, Michael, but so 2 many people don't get the newspaper anymore 3 because they simply don't want to pay the cost of the Scranton Times. 4 MR. DEMPSEY: I don't blame them. 5 It's --6 Exactly. I mean --7 MS. CUFF: 8 MR. HALLINAN: On the question, can 9 I ask you a question? Does everything -- like 10 you said, do they pull from the newspaper or anything Googled no matter where --11 12 MR. DEMPSEY: It just goes 13 automatically. Anything with Dunmore in the 14 headlines it goes. 15 MR. HALLINAN: We got to have some 16 kind of oversight or God knows, what if it was 17 something and I hate to say pornography or 18 something with the word Dunmore in it. You 19 never know. 20 MS. CUFF: Right. But those weren't 21 up there. So it's not pulling everything up. 22 So again, it's just something to look at. And 23 again I know I could send everything. But it's 24 not my job to send everything to you guys to 25 review to get on the website. That's why you

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1	have the website administrator. So just
2	that's all I'm saying. We got this new website
3	on board for a reason. Let's utilize it to its
4	fullest potential. That's all I want.
5	MR. MCHALE: You had a list that you
6	sent me about things that you had. I had every
7	one of them changed. All of the board minutes
8	were up. And again, at the beginning of the
9	meeting, I apologize, I did the agenda tonight
10	at 5:00. That's my fault. Vito was out of
11	town.
12	My fault. So it wasn't up because
13	of me. There was an error because of me. But
14	I usually don't do the agenda. So we're
15	trying. I promise.
16	MS. CUFF: Okay. And just lastly, I
17	know the last time I was here I think we talked
18	about the draft letter which Michael did send
19	me regarding the odor issue. I don't believe
20	it went out.
21	MR. MCHALE: It did go out and we
22	got responses from both. I could post those
23	tomorrow as well. We sent them to the Sewer
24	Authority and to the state the DEP.
25	MS. CUFF: I didn't know. I reached

27 out to Michael. But there was some issues that 1 2 prevented --3 MR. MCHALE: We already got 4 responses. 5 MS. CUFF: Okay. I thought you said you were going to send me a final one if it 6 7 went out. That's okay. Thank you. Yeah, and 8 the other thing is Scranton Council has been in 9 the paper, you know, headlines twice at least that I know of, you know, just pushing --10 MR. MCHALE: We sent the same exact 11 12 letter and we were not in the paper, same exact 13 letter. And we got responses right after. Ιt 14 wasn't in the paper. We can't control what they write. 15 16 MS. CUFF: Thank you. 17 MR. MCHALE: Anybody else tonight? My name is Brian 18 MR. FETSK0: 19 Fetsko, 234 West Drinker Street. I have a 20 question about does Dunmore still own the 21 property in Dickson where --22 MR. MCHALE: We do. 23 MR. FETSKO: Is there any plans for 24 that? 25 ATTY. CUMMINGS: Not as of right

	28
1	now, no. There's a lot of restrictions on it.
2	MR. MCHALE: Yeah, a lot of
3	restrictions.
4	MR. VERRASTRO: Last thing we were
5	trying to do we're talking about doing a solar
6	park. But that fell through also.
7	ATTY. CUMMINGS: Correct.
8	MR. FETSKO: What was that?
9	MR. VERRASTRO: We talked about a
10	solar park but it fell through.
11	MR. FETSK0: Those people that
12	don't know me in Dunmore, I have been involved
13	with DGR Soccer for the past 13 years I think.
14	One of the things was realized over the last
15	couple years, especially the last five years,
16	there's a huge boom in the growth of soccer,
17	youth soccer, not just in our area or not
18	just in Dunmore but the whole area of
19	Northeastern Pennsylvania.
20	I was actually thinking it might be
21	a good idea to look at, you know, maybe
22	building fields there. If you could, like,
23	basically make almost like a centralized
24	location maybe you have 10, 12 fields full
25	size fields, that could actually start pulling

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1	in revenue in a couple years doing tournaments
2	like with different leagues and stuff like
3	that.
4	It's just a thought. I just
5	soccer seems like it's growing more and more
6	every year. I just know in our league alone we
7	have we went from 156 kids six years ago to
8	560 kids this past year. I'm also president of
9	NEPSAY which is it does like the greater
10	area from Mountain View to Wallenpaupack,
11	Honesdale, down to Old Forge, Riverside area.
12	There's 14 or 15 leagues right now
13	with just about 4500 kids in all of those
14	leagues. And that's just for a rec soccer
15	program. If you got to the part where we
16	started pulling in tournaments that have travel
17	programs, then you could start charging higher
18	fees for the tournaments.
19	And eventually you will start to be
20	able to do yearly, like, tournaments you could
21	actually start generating a ton of money for
22	the Borough and surrounding businesses.
23	MR. MCHALE: Tom, if I'm speaking
24	out of turn, please tell me. I think one of
25	the restrictions there's a lot of

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1	restrictions on it is we're allowed to do
2	recreation facilities like that that he's
3	talking about, correct?
4	ATTY. CUMMINGS: I'd have to look at
5	the Dickson City current zoning ordinance
6	because we're bound by the restrictions in the
7	deed which are voluminous and very restrictive.
8	We're also bound by Dickson City zoning
9	ordinance and what's allowed in that particular
10	category.
11	So it may be something that a deed
12	restriction allow but then we would have to go
13	in for curative amendment under Dickson City's
14	ordinance. And everything we've looked at is
15	cost prohibitive. And I agree with you, soccer
16	has blossomed. It was a long time coming.
17	It's a great sport. I think there's less
18	injuries.
19	There's opportunity for more people
20	to participate. And I would say that it may be
21	doable. But I would also say that I know that
22	some of when we first acquired it 10 years
23	ago or so and we addressed it with local
24	representatives, they came in and said, you
25	know, we can't really just do something for

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1	Dunmore against Dickson or Dickson against
2	Dunmore or like leave Throop out, so if you
3	wanted to do something on regional basis then
4	they would look at funding for that.
5	MR. MCHALE: And I think that's
6	where your biggest obstacle will be funding.
7	We'll help in that regard, not necessarily
8	giving you money but using our contacts with
9	the Senator's office and the representative
10	here. I'm sorry, go ahead.
11	MR. FETSKO: The one with U.S.
12	Soccer, U.S. Youth Soccer, they do do a lot of
13	grants in funding to help develop, like our
14	area every all those leagues that we play,
15	they'll have one Dunmore just has Sherwood
16	Park to play.
17	We're looking into building another
18	field at Crowley Park over right below
19	Marywood. But like Valley View has three
20	fields in three locations. Mountain view has
21	two fields behind the school. So it's very
22	scattered how everything is. So like part of
23	my thinking is, you know, some of the local
24	leagues will come there.
25	And, you know, they have they

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1	don't have to worry about cutting the grass,
2	getting everything done themselves. Everything
3	is there. They'll play. It makes life easier
4	for all the parents, the players, the leagues
5	just go to a centralized location. And I think
6	like one of the big things I'm sorry, I got
7	off topic.
8	Like I was saying, U.S Youth Soccer,
9	U.S. Soccer they both do grants that you could
10	get like a couple depending on how much
11	how big of an area and how like their overall
12	plan is, you could actually get like a couple,
13	you know, like up to a million dollars to do a
14	project like this.
15	And Adidas does do donations for
16	this. And there's a couple other programs like
17	I think one is called footprint fields or I
18	can't remember off the top of my head also
19	helps with that. Musco Lighting I think is
20	another one that, you know, that does grants
21	and stuff for lights.
22	And plus with all the business
23	around it, the car dealerships and stuff like
24	that, they are all big into donating into
25	programs like this because that's, you know,

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1	you go to any location where you have 5,000
2	kids going for a weekend that means you have
3	2,500 parents at least there, 2,500 cars. So,
4	you know, everybody is going to be looking, you
5	know, you have people looking to do
6	sponsorships for the field and stuff like that
7	just to have their name there. And so like I
8	do think it can be really a good idea to do
9	with the land there.
10	MR. VERRASTRO: I agree with you.
11	MR. MCHALE: I think it's a great
12	idea.
13	MR. VERRASTRO: When I mentioned the
14	solar park, there was a certain percentage of
15	it at the time that was going to be for
16	playgrounds and fields and walking trails.
17	MR. MCHALE: That's where I was
18	thinking.
19	MR. VERRASTRO: And we were trying
20	to get something to coincide with that so that
21	there was a revenue source to maintain it
22	because that's a big undertaking. I would love
23	to see it. And if we can figure out a way to
24	do it, I'd help for as long as I can.
25	MR. MCHALE: Likewise.

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1	MR. VERRASTRO: But that's a very
2	big thing to have done. And being that we
3	don't like Tommy was saying, it's not in
4	our in the Borough itself. Everything we do
5	as soon as we come up with an idea the first
6	thing we do is we have to ask Dickson City if
7	they will entertain it.
8	And then we go from there. So maybe
9	it's something that we can work with the county
10	to help with it. I don't see anybody up here
11	that would refuse to do something like that.
12	MR. FETSKO: Like you're saying
13	with the solar park, there was I was just at
14	the field I think it was I don't know if
15	it was Long Island or somewhere in New Jersey.
16	I travel with my daughter plays highly
17	competitive travel soccer. So I travel, you
18	know, everywhere from North Carolina up to
19	Massachusetts this past year going to different
20	types, you know, different fields, different
21	locations.
22	But there was one that did have
23	solar fields or like solar farms right next to
24	the fields that I asked them about that and
25	that's what they said they did with it to

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1	offset the cost to maintain the fields.
2	MR. MCHALE: Yeah. Tommy, again, if
3	we can make sure that this is a possibility
4	before we before he or anybody goes down the
5	road, see if it's a possibility that we could
6	do this and maybe form some type of an
7	authority that will oversee and try to go get
8	grants.
9	I know we'll definitely be included
10	again as Sal said I don't think anybody would
11	go against it and maybe get Dickson City
12	involved as well and the surrounding
13	communities and start an authority where
14	everybody can go to their municipality and get
15	some money or get to the state government and
16	even, you know, the grant opportunities you
17	spoke of.
18	I know major league baseball helped
19	the little league over here years ago and put
20	up one set of lights. So similar in the soccer
21	arena it sounds like the same opportunities
22	exist as well. So I think the first step we
23	would have to do to first see if we're allowed
24	to put fields there because again, it's highly
25	restrictive because it was Dickson City's land.

And it was before me, before we bought it. So we'll have Mr. Cummings take a look and see if it's doable, we can get in contact with you and go from there, all right? MR. VERRASTRO: The cost would be enormous. The land is very raw. It's wooded. It's hills. There's pits. There's a lot of internal infrastructure there. There's no utilities whatsoever up there in that area. It's going to be a big undertaking. MR. FETSKO: Like, I don't see this being done like next year. This is, like, you know, five or ten year plan. I just do think, like MR. VERRASTRO: You have to start it to get there. MR. MCHALE: Thank you. MS. SCRIMALLI: Thank you. MS. HALLINAN: Kelly Burke Hallinan,	6
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18 MS. SCRIMALLI: Thank you.	
19 MS. HALLINAN: Kelly Burke Hallinan,	
20 1723 Madison Avenue, so as to not to offend any	2
21 Council members this evening, the history of	
22 the issue I have been presenting to them since	
23 May can be read online on the Borough's new	
24 website. That's dot gov except for the	
25 omitted minutes meeting from May. They are	

1 still not posted. MR. MCHALE: Again, we're not 2 3 omitting anything. If you let us know that 4 there's one not there, I went through all --5 she has every single one probably saved herself. I went through my e-mails and sent 6 7 them to the web company. So that's not on 8 purpose. 9 MR. HALLINAN: Is that the May, 2015 10 minutes? Is that the one's that aren't up 11 there? 12 MS. HALLINAN: May's. 13 MR. HALLINAN: May's of this year. 14 MS. HALLINAN: Yeah. In return. I will be offended if I'm interrupted during the 15 16 time allotted to me the public to address 17 Council with my concerns. Aside from the 18 multiple ordinances that I've informed you of 19 that remain broken and not enforced in my 20 neighborhood, I've covered yet another fact 21 that should not be ignored. 22 It's an ordinance stating that any 23 unit within a building can have no less than 24 850 square feet of living space. Once again, 25 Google MLS you could find a lot of information.

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1	How true it is, you know, it can't be that far
2	off in other words because they are
3	advertising. That would be false advertising.
4	But the home on Madison Avenue that
5	I did report to you that was a single
6	Kernan's house, five people that could not live
7	in a one bedroom apartment was advertised as
8	having 1,008 square feet. That was for the
9	single family home.
10	Well, if you divide that by two, it
11	comes out to 504. Now, that's before the
12	partition walls are put up, another stairway,
13	everything else. So this is what I'm trying to
14	get across to you. These are tiny apartments
15	of being altered illegally within family homes.
16	This is an ordinance that doesn't
17	have to go through zoning. It doesn't have to
18	be proven. It's fact.
19	Families don't rent one bedroom
20	apartments. We're losing our families. We
21	have lots of apartments. And your diligent
22	efforts, you know, to get the Borough
23	financially sound and to keep taxes low is very
24	much appreciated by parents raising children
25	that own homes in Dunmore.

What you're doing now is being greatly appreciated by the growing amount of apartment building owners that don't even reside in Dunmore that are collecting three and four rents and paying tax on one property, which I've investigated they're paying lower taxes than me even though they are next door to me, down the street from me where they don't belong. Another thing is, we've had to hire additional police officers. I feel that that only proves that our town now has a problem because of if more protection is needed, from what and because of who? Not the Borough families. Sting operations aren't done on Borough families that I'm aware of. And any time I Google someone that is the Dunmore man as the Scranton Time calls them, they are renters, which is fine. But they are living in tiny one bedroom apartments. Where if the houses weren't converted, a nice family would be at that address, my point with proof.

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As a taxpayer, I'm asking Council once again make enforcement of our zones and

ordinances a priority and to address the properties that I have informed you of multiple times that have been illegally altered. Your lack of attention to this issue will be noted. It it noted online on the new website as the direct cause of our one safe family oriented community's demise. Also, since the petition that I

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presented the first week of June disappeared, no one wants to speak about it, comment on it, look into it, address the issue. I do feel since Council asked me to get the petition and I did do it and the property owners on my block that are taxpayers signed it, they do deserve a letter from Council explaining why this petition is not being taken care of, addressed. I think they're owed that.

18 They're concerned. They don't have 19 to be here. They signed their names to a 20 petition that I told them that Council -- and I 21 have the meeting's minutes where Council 22 suggested that I get a petition. Got it, 23 handed it in, disappeared, resubmitted, never 24 heard a thing about it.

So can we get a letter to the people

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1	that signed the petition and explain to them
2	you're not going to address it or why you're
3	not going to address it or
4	MR. MCHALE: I'm not being wise,
5	but you said not to speak. Do you want me to
6	answer that?
7	MS. HALLINAN: Oh, yes. I'm asking
8	a question. Thank you.
9	MR. MCHALE: That was received and
10	noted. We talked about it the last couple
11	meetings I think. To my knowledge and Joe jump
12	in if I'm wrong. A lot of the things that you
13	brought up are on the other side on the zoning
14	side. They think it's defensible.
15	I'm not taking we're not a
16	legislative body here. But, I'm sorry, we're
17	not a judge here to say yes or no. Joe and his
18	attorney have made us aware of their standing.
19	You don't agree with it. So we've spoken to
20	the petitions. They're asking for enforcement
21	of the ordinances. We spoke to Joe. Joe has
22	support on the other side.
23	I'm not saying you agree with it or
24	I agree with it. And then the attorney who is
25	a very learned zoning attorney opined on it. I

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1	feel for you. I told you this the last 10
2	meetings. I feel for you. I just don't know
3	where we're where we go. I wish I had an
4	answer for you.
5	MS. HALLINAN: Well, that's another
6	thing. No one but Michael Dempsey cared to
7	look
8	MR. MCHALE: Cared. That's not
9	I'm going to interrupt you. I have stuff going
10	on every single night, okay, personal problems.
11	MS. HALLINAN: I didn't say Mr.
12	McHale. I said no one other than
13	MR. MCHALE: Cared enough. You said
14	nobody cared enough. I sat with Joe for an
15	hour and a half. I told you I would try to get
16	down to you. I know other people too. We
17	care. You know that. That's not fair to say.
18	MS. HALLINAN: Well, it's not fair
19	for you to say that a very good lawyer for
20	MR. MCHALE: He is.
21	MS. HALLINAN: Well, if you saw what
22	I was presented, I don't think you'd feel the
23	same way.
24	MR. MCHALE: I did see it. I read
25	everything that was given to me. And that was

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1	given to me. I don't disagree with you. Don't
2	take it that way. There is defense on the
3	other side. I don't know we're not judge
4	and jury. That's I wish I could do
5	something for you to ease your pain. You made
6	note of my mother's problem and, oh, that's not
7	too close. You know what, they drive right
8	next to the house every single day.
9	MS. HALLINAN: I didn't say that's
10	not too close. I said how close I don't
11	know where you live. I said how close are they
12	to your
13	MR. MCHALE: The car has hit our
14	house several times. That's how close it is.
15	MS. HALLINAN: I don't know where
16	you live.
17	MR. MCHALE: But you made that
18	comment though. That was my point. I don't
19	I don't disagree with you. But there's a
20	defense on the other side. And I'm not trying
21	to be argumentative with you. I feel for you.
22	I just don't know what we can do.
23	MS. HALLINAN: Well, this is not a
24	zoning issue. This a black and white issue.
25	MR. MCHALE: The 850? Is that what

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1	we're speaking of the 850? Joe, do you have
2	anything
3	MR. LORINCE: I'll check the
4	building ordinance. But I don't think that
5	stands. These are properties that are already
6	been there.
7	MS. HALLINAN: No, they weren't.
8	This house was bought in 2011. It was a single
9	home. It's advertised as a single home.
10	MR. LORINCE: I talked to Paula
11	Kernan myself.
12	MS. HALLINAN: Yeah, and Paula and
13	her daughter lived there.
14	MR. LORINCE: Paula said in 1960 she
15	bought the home her family bought the home.
16	Her they bought it as a two family home in
17	1960. Then they converted it to a single
18	family. And in 1974 her dad died and converted
19	it back to a two family for the extra income.
20	And it's been a two family since 1974. I got
21	an affidavit from Paula Kernan and she gave it
22	to me.
23	MS. HALLINAN: That's not true.
24	MR. LORINCE: Do you want me to call
25	her a liar?

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1	MS. HALLINAN: Well, do you want to
2	look at what about the relator that went
3	through the home in 2011 and advertised it as a
4	single family home? Where did five Kernans
5	live in a one bedroom apartment?
6	MR. LORINCE: I have the names and
7	everything. I could give them to you who lived
8	there.
9	MS. HALLINAN: Well, I live right
10	there too. So it didn't happen.
11	MR. LORINCE: She even told me in
12	2007 you were in the apartment when she was
13	building her own because
14	MS. HALLINAN: Because she lived
15	there. And I took care of her mother for
16	her
17	MS. LORINCE: calling her a liar.
18	She gave me an affidavit, Kelly.
19	MR. HALLINAN: I don't think this is
20	the forum to be going back and forth like this.
21	MS. HALLINAN: Okay. Well, there's
22	an ordinance. There's an ordinance.
23	MR. HALLINAN: I understand what
24	you're saying. And you understand what we're
25	saying too. We've got direction from a lawyer

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1	on our side also. So I don't know personally
2	where you go with this. But I know I don't
3	know what you're looking for us to go in and
4	throw them out of their house? Is this what
5	you want us to do?
6	MS. HALLINAN: No, I want the
7	ordinances followed.
8	MR. HALLINAN: I understand that
9	moving forward, but you're bringing up the
10	stuff from the past. And I wasn't involved
11	with it. I don't know how many people on
12	Council were. I know I'm talking too much now
13	as it is because I don't want to see anybody
14	get sued here.
15	And then but it's I don't know
16	what to tell you. You're showing us this.
17	We're hearing from a lawyer. Joe told you he
18	has an affidavit. Do you see the picture here
19	what's going on?
20	MS. HALLINAN: I see what's going
21	on.
22	MR. HALLINAN: In your mind and also
23	what we're saying also but you don't want to
24	hear us.
25	MS. HALLINAN: You do realize I

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1	lived in this home all my life.
2	MR. HALLINAN: You're talking about
3	the Kernan home that he's telling you has an
4	affidavit. The lawyers are already telling us
5	things. Kel, nobody's we're sympathizing
6	with you. I want to bring in an ordinance
7	where I could and I shouldn't even say it
8	now. I want to stop rental properties. But I
9	don't know if I could move forward with that.
10	ATTY. CUMMINGS: May I caution you,
11	you're getting into areas you're going to
12	cause problems for yourself by making
13	representations as a city Councilman.
14	MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.
15	ATTY. CUMMINGS: May I ask while I
16	still have this right, the 850 square feet,
17	what ordinance is that from?
18	MS. HALLINAN: Dunmore's. It's
19	right there. Did you get a copy?
20	ATTY. CUMMINGS: No.
21	MS. HALLINAN: Okay, well, here's a
22	copy for you. It's 5441 conversions of year
23	round dwellings in an R2 zone and they have to
24	have 850 square feet. These properties that
25	were single family homes now have three

1	apartments in them.
2	You know, maybe one of them is big
3	enough. Kernan's definitely wasn't big enough.
4	I mean, I'm not I'm certainly not going to
5	bring a lawsuit up and get and have the
6	solicitors make a lot of money and have my
7	neighbors paying taxes to go through a nine
8	year court battle so the judge could go, she's
9	right or they're right.
10	That's ridiculous. But once again,
11	I'm the one being affected. The equity of my
12	home has dropped incredibly. Life every day is
13	miserable which Mr. McHale's mother can
14	appreciate. So you're Council. I'm a
15	taxpayer. Here I am. I have a right. You
16	have a job. And besides that, we're friends.
17	MR. VERRASTRO: Kel, I agree with
18	you. But I don't know and not pertaining to
19	the house next to yours, but I don't know how
20	many houses that are out there that have less
21	than 850 square feet that went through zoning
22	and got approved for it.
23	MS. HALLINAN: That's my point.
24	MR. VERRASTRO: But there's an
25	ordinance here and if somebody comes in for a

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1	permit and they go in front of the zoning, they
2	might have gotten permission to do it.
3	MS. HALLINAN: That's my point. But
4	I didn't get anything when I requested it
5	showing me that that happened. That's how I
6	started out requesting documentation, didn't
7	get it.
8	MR. VERRASTRO: But we don't
9	we're not in charge of zoning. I can't
10	MS. HALLINAN: This was prior to
11	coming here. This was prior to coming to
12	Council. I had no intention of coming to
13	Council. The only reason I was coming to
14	Council was because the woman on Walnut or Elm
15	or something I got a phone call that another
16	woman was having a problem and they would like
17	me to go because they heard I had the same
18	problem and it was the week before elections.
19	So I thought it can't hurt. So I
20	came. I never came to you before, never had a
21	problem with before. But to insinuate, you
22	know, the police don't do a good job. I never
23	said that. The police do a fantastic job. The
24	fire department does a fantastic job. I said
25	it a million times.

50 1 The problem is there's ordinances that aren't being enforced. We're losing our 2 3 town. We're losing our families. And it's a shame. And I lost a lot of money and a lot 4 5 sleepless nights. You know, my husband and I work like probably most of you have, did two 6 7 and three and four jobs to get that house to be a beautiful family home. For what? We can't 8 9 enjoy it now. 10 You can't -- I showed you the 11 pictures. You don't want me to talk about it. But the people in the audience don't know. 12 13 They haven't seen all the pictures. 14 MR. MCHALE: Who doesn't want you to talk about it? Seriously, who doesn't 15 16 want -- you've talked about it. And we've 17 listened. And we're trying. 18 MS. HALLINAN: I was scolded a 19 little last week for bringing the same thing up 20 when I was -- it was to inform the people that 21 weren't here at the other meetings. 22 MR. MCHALE: Did he scold you? 23 MS. HALLINAN: Yes, he did. Did you 24 miss that? Were you not here? 25 MR. MCHALE: He's trying to explain

51 exactly our part. You may not agree with me. 1 2 And again, I don't want to apologize because I 3 didn't do anything wrong. We listened to that side of the story. You have a definite side of 4 the story. I don't disagree with that. 5 It's just a matter of -- I don't know if this is the 6 forum. 7 8 And you agree. I don't want to 9 spend a lot of money on lawyers and everything 10 either. I'm just trying to get a happy medium 11 to make everybody happy. If the ordinance 12 stands as they are if there's a problem and if 13 Joe's not doing it so be it. 14 I went up and looked up at every one of those houses. And there is sworn 15 16 affidavits. There's support in there for just 17 about everything, not saying that I agree with 18 it. Maybe some of it you claim it was 19 doctored. Maybe that's true. I don't know. 20 But there's one side of the story and there is 21 your side of the story. 22 And we have legal opinion on that 23 side to back up a lot of the stuff that Joe has 24 that incidentally -- and I said this last time 25 A lot of the stuff that I saw was not on too.

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1	Joe's watch. That was the five years he wasn't
2	here. His name gets thrown a lot, just in the
3	defense of Joe.
4	MS. HALLINAN: Not by me.
5	MR. MCHALE: I'm not saying that.
6	But his name has been thrown a lot. I just
7	I wish I could do something for you today to
8	make you happy. I really, really, really do.
9	MS. HALLINAN: The matter of the
10	fact that you're saying you have this, you have
11	that. That was where I started here. I
12	started requesting proof of why they were
13	allowed against ordinance. I still haven't
14	gotten anything.
15	MR. MCHALE: Joe, have you sent a
16	lot of the stuff that you showed me?
17	MR. LORINCE: I
18	MS. HALLINAN: No.
19	MR. LORINCE: Her husband was in.
20	MS. HALLINAN: Yeah, and he got
21	building inspections after 2005.

LORINCE: No, I'm talking about all the documents the six apartments you complained about. All the documents are there. MS. HALLINAN: We did not receive
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1	MS. HALLINAN: We did not receive
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10	them. We did not get them. And we did not see
11	them.
12	MR. LORINCE: I'll give you copies
13	of them.
14	MS. HALLINAN: I got building
15	inspections after 2005.
16	MR. LORINCE: I'll give you a copy
17	of them all.
18	MR. VERRASTRO: Joe, you got to read
19	through them and make sure there is no Social
20	Security numbers on them and policy numbers on
21	them just in case, just black that out, okay?
22	MR. MCHALE: Anything else?
23	MS. HALLINAN: No, that's all.
24	Thank you.
25	MR. MCHALE: Anybody else like to

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1	address Council tonight?
2	(No response.)
3	MR. MCHALE: Seeing none. Number
4	ten, public officials. Chief Marchese.
5	CHIEF MARCHESE: No.
6	MR. MCHALE: Mr. Kearney.
7	MR. KEARNEY: No.
8	MR. MCHALE: Joe.
9	MR. LORINCE: No.
10	MR. MCHALE: Didge.
11	MR. JUDGE: No.
12	MR. MCHALE: Mr. Cummings.
13	ATTY. CUMMINGS: No, sir.
14	MR. MCHALE: Mrs. Scrimalli, do you
15	want to lead us off tonight?
16	MS. SCRIMALLI: I'll just be quick.
17	Thank you. Regarding the Scranton Abington
18	Planning Association, we've had additional
19	municipality who has passed a resolution to
20	adopt with SAPA and that would be Newton
21	Township. So that makes a total of eight.
22	And we just want to congratulate all
23	the members of SAPA for their hard work and
24	thank them all. I also want to congratulate
25	Vince Amico, also Michael McHale, Michael

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1	Dempsey, and Sal Verrastro on your election.
2	Congratulations on that. And I think that's
3	all I have tonight. And, Kelly, I feel your
4	pain. And, you know, that's all I could say.
5	Thank you.
6	MR. MCHALE: Mr. Burke.
7	MR. BURKE: Congratulations to all
8	the candidates. Kelly, I mean if our
9	solicitors could give us a direction to go on
10	on this, right now I don't see a direction
11	either way on where to go with it. I feel for
12	you just like everybody else does.
13	But until we can get a direction to
14	go on this, I don't want to see this repeating
15	itself. But your problem exists. And I don't
16	know how to overturn it without lawyer's advice
17	on how to overturn it. If you get that advice,
18	I'll be behind you. But we have to go by what
19	our lawyers give us. That's what they're paid
20	for.
21	I don't know if we can set up a
22	meeting with the Zoning or with the Borough
23	and the Zoning to get together and with our
24	Zoning Solicitor to try to figure this out.
25	Maybe that's the way to go. I don't know. But

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1	right now I'm saying we have to follow what our
2	solicitor tells us. They're the lawyers, not
3	us.
4	MS. HALLINAN: I understand.
5	MR. BURKE: But I really do feel for
6	you just like everybody else does. We need
7	direction from them where to go with this. And
8	maybe it is meeting with the Zoning and Council
9	and you and Jed and your neighbors going over
10	this. I don't know.
11	MS. HALLINAN: Well, I just wanted
12	to make sure that the neighbors know that I
13	presented that petition and why it wasn't
14	addressed in all of these months. You know,
15	that was the big thing that I wanted to get
16	across. And I appreciate everything you're
17	saying.
18	But like you just mentioned the
19	neighbors, I feel bad because I can't walk up
20	and down the street and report everything. I
21	don't have their e-mail addresses. I don't do
22	that. So I would like them to know what
23	happened to it. You know, they wanted to know
24	everything about it.
25	They signed it. They made an

57 effort. Some of them did come. Some of them 1 2 did ask me to get back to them and I did take 3 their e-mail addresses and reported to them. Ι just wrote them a general report because the 4 5 petition hasn't been acknowledged more or less. MR. MCHALE: It has been 6 7 acknowledged. 8 MS. HALLINAN: See, I don't get 9 anything back. How would I know that? You 10 know, I don't get anything back. 11 MR. MCHALE: I see your point. When we had the petition Joe was informed. 12 And the 13 petition more or less asked for enforcement of 14 the ordinances in no uncertain terms. We met with Joe. We reviewed everything, gave it to 15 16 his attorney. And I'll put together a letter 17 explaining that. I see your point and you want 18 to get something out to everybody. I'll put 19 something together this week. 20 MS. HALLINAN: I'd appreciate it 21 when you get the time. 22 MR. BURKE: The problem too, it 23 seems like -- I guess we have ordinances that 24 we can't even enforce if this is true 25 everything that our lawyer -- like I said, our

lawyer is not coming telling us to go after 1 2 this person or that person. And that's the 3 only person that we can take legal advice from. And we have to protect the Borough too. And I 4 5 see -- I wouldn't want it to happen in my 6 neighborhood what's happening in your neighborhood. I'm sorry it happened. 7 8 But maybe it's time to rewrite our 9 ordinances so we could get -- so they are more 10 enforceable because right now it doesn't seem 11 like to me anyway I could be wrong, but it 12 doesn't seem like they're enforceable. 13 MS. HALLINAN: That's my point. 14 That's why I presented all the ordinances that are visible right there that happen after 2005. 15 16 You have affidavits. I mean, who can fight 17 with that? But you know the Kernans, right, 18 Tommy, Jimmy, the Kernans? 19 MR. BURKE: No, I don't know them. 20 MS. HALLINAN: Well, anyway, it's a 21 family that grew up down street from me. 22 There's five people, lots of cats. They didn't 23 live in a one bed apartment. It's just common 24 These homes the way they were built. Ι sense. 25 have two kitchens in my house. I have two

59 electric meters. I have two water heaters. 1 2 My sister lived there. My brother lived there, 3 you know, they're big houses for the most part. Kernans isn't. But nonetheless, I don't have 4 5 anything to prove otherwise. I bring this because I have proof in here. I could show you 6 but it doesn't seem like the Borough can show 7 8 me. So that's the point. 9 MR. BURKE: I just ask, Joe, if you 10 could bring everything that Kelly says she hasn't seen if you can get that to Kelly and 11 12 Jed and copies to the neighbors that signed 13 that petition. One way we have to try to get 14 this straighten out. I don't know what the 15 answer is. 16 Like I said, we pay our solicitors 17 good money to give us the answers. We give the 18 solicitors good money to come up with these 19 ordinances. And in your case it's -- it 20 doesn't look like it worked. And so maybe it's 21 time for a change. 22 Maybe we got to meet with Zoning and 23 solicitors and write up new laws. Until they 24 tell us how react to yours, I don't know -- I'm 25 sorry about that.

23 hi	is house. Then he, you know, he already had
24 tw	vo family house in the front. He passed away.
25 Hi	is son passed away. His daughter-in-law was

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1	renting it to everybody and anybody.
2	And it got to a point where they
3	were having there was a pitbull on my
4	father's back porch attacking my father's dog.
5	I solved the problem by buying the house and
6	evicting everybody. That isn't everybody's,
7	you know, I'm not saying that's your fix
8	because it isn't.
9	It was just something that we fell
10	into it. And it started out as the guy who
11	owned that house was a friend of my father's.
12	He thought he was doing his friend a favor.
13	And he went and he I mean, when all of that
14	stuff was being done he went, he got an okay.
15	He did it.
16	And now years later it was a big
17	problem for the neighbors. It's unfortunate.
18	It happens. And I don't know how to address it
19	because there is always going to be somebody
20	that will come in and ask for something and at
21	the time he's going to be in good relationships
22	with all of his neighbors and then years down
23	the road, sometimes it turns into something bad
24	and sometimes it doesn't. I don't have that
25	answer.

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1	I did try to address it. I sat with
2	Joe. He showed me all the stuff that was
3	there. I probably spent about half hour, 45
4	minutes. I didn't go through it maybe as
5	detailed as Michael did. But I saw some stuff
6	that, you know, when you were saying things
7	were changed and I started looking at it, I'm
8	thinking, jeez, how many times did I write up
9	something and I'm not defending it because it
10	could have been changed like Mike said.
11	Or I put a three down and scribble
12	it out and I put a two when I was doing
13	paperwork for somebody. And maybe it's our
14	fault for allowing official business stuff to
15	be done like that and not handed back and say
16	do it on a clean sheet, you know, I don't want
17	that there.
18	I can't prove or disprove that stuff
19	was changed on it. So I don't know how to go
20	after it. But it's not for lack of not wanting
21	to help you, if I could. I hope you understand
22	that.
23	MS. HALLINAN: I do understand. I
24	understand the position completely. But you
25	have to understand mine where

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1	MR. VERRASTRO: I do 100 percent.
2	MS. HALLINAN: I requested things
3	and I didn't get anything back.
4	MR. VERRASTRO: And I apologize. I
5	see your point like Mike said about the
6	petition. It's not that we didn't recognize
7	it. I think that I don't think there's a
8	person up here that doesn't want us to get a
9	letter together and send it out to show that we
10	did receive it. And for that, I'm sorry. I
11	wish I could do something more than we're doing
12	right now.
13	I just don't know where to go with
14	it right now. Other than that, the only other
15	thing I want to kind of bring up and I want
16	to maybe start to touch base on it and most of
17	this is probably going to have to come from
18	you, Tom. It's not a problem now. I see it
19	being a potential problem in the Borough years
20	from now.
21	Drones, I think we need to create an
22	ordinance on what they're restricted to do and
23	not do and where you could use them because
24	I've seem them advertised. You could buy these
25	things for under a hundred dollars. They will

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1	become every kid's Christmas gift.
2	It's not like a kid playing with it
3	that I'm worried about. I'm worried about like
4	when people start to use them when they are
5	living next door. And now you're sitting in
6	your backyard and something is floating over
7	your house that you don't know about looking in
8	your window or listening to your conversation
9	on your back porch.
10	Is there a way where you can make
11	restrictions where you can use it that it
12	could only be used in areas or fields? Is
13	there something we can do to
14	ATTY. CUMMINGS: As long as we don't
15	conflict with federal regulations, yes.
16	MR. VERRASTRO: Well, I don't know
17	if that is something that Council wants to
18	start looking into a little bit. But I see it
19	as being a big privacy issue down the road with
20	stuff. And we have nothing on the books for it
21	whatsoever to protect us if something was to
22	start to happen. So I don't know, could you
23	just start to look into it for us?
24	ATTY. CUMMINGS: Absolutely.
25	MR. VERRASTRO: Is anybody against

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1	it?
2	MR. HALLINAN: No.
3	MR. VERRASTRO: It's going to be a
4	problem. There will be an issue with it sooner
5	or later. It's going to be we did nothing
6	about it when other towns were starting to.
7	And thanks for coming out and see you soon.
8	MR. MCHALE: Mr. Hallinan.

11	MR. HALLINAN: First of all, I

23	percent from the census as renters in our
24	Borough here.
25	And I want you to know I did look

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2now because what I'm getting also is that is3the census numbers and that our tax rolls are4showing a different number because census might5come into the high rise and count every one of6those as a rental.7It goes up to St. Mary's Villa up8there, every one of them, St. Joseph's.9Everyone's a single they are all considered10units as rental units, not just one. Count11them all up, the high rises. I don't know,12Joe, was it the dorms, also.13MR. LORINCE: Marywood and the14sisters15MR. 16	does seem a little high.
17	I'm checking into your numbers just
18	so you know. Also, the soccer field, good
19	luck. Whatever we can do I know on my part to
20	help you see that forward or keeping don't
21	drop the ball. I don't know if it would be a
22	viable time to go to a Dickson City Borough
23	meeting also to bring it up, Tom?
24	ATTY. CUMMINGS: They can, yeah.

70 you oppose. You know, as Hal said I think last 1 meeting, there's one side. There's the other 2 3 side. And in the middle there's some type of a 4 truce. I really do wish I could do 5 something today. I don't know. I don't think 6 7 this is the forum. But, you know, I welcome 8 you back every single time. We'll talk about 9 We'll try to do everything we can. it. Lack 10 of effort to try to get down to see you, my 11 mother is very, very ill. So every night I'm there. So please forgive me for not coming to 12 13 see you. 14 I do live in your neighborhood. Ι promise you I'll call you one day and say can I 15 16 come down for an hour. Absent that, we'll keep 17 doing what we can. Hopefully you'll see we're not sitting waiting every two weeks to hear 18 19 from you. We're trying. We're trying to look 20 at stuff. 21 Joe had stuff all over the place trying to make sure that his ducks were in a 22 23 row, not to defend against you but to make sure 24 these guys are in compliance. Now some of the 25 stuff from 2005 and forward there's inspection

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1	reports. Again, that stuff didn't come from
2	Joe.
3	I'm not defending him there. But
4	there is some indefensible things that were
5	done in 2005 that were done on these
6	properties, inspections, things like that. I
7	don't necessarily agree with. There is
8	documentation though. Do you know what I mean?
9	MS. HALLINAN: I understand. I do.
10	MR. MCHALE: It frustrates me to
11	have to sit and tell you this stuff because I
12	know what you're going through. I wish I
13	have friends in your neighborhood. I live two
14	blocks away from you. Michael lives a block
15	away from you. We have I don't have all the
16	same problems at my home.
17	My mother is two blocks down from
18	you, same problems. We have to think outside
19	the box to make this go away whether it's law
20	enforcement, shut them down when there's a
21	little thing going on and that. I mean, at the
22	property that I was at, Joe couldn't shut it
23	down.
24	And he'll tell you, I was furious.
25	I couldn't believe this place couldn't be shut

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1	down. It think it's going to fall down
2	eventually. Mr. Amico knows what I'm talking
3	about. It's in his neighborhood too. It's
4	frustrating. I feel your frustration. As I
5	said before, I wish I could do something. And
6	we'll continue to work. That's all I could
7	tell you.
8	MS. HALLINAN: I appreciate it. But
9	if I could just clarify, I have nothing against
10	renters. There were wonderful families that
11	rented. The other side of the double houses,
12	you know, in the neighborhood that I grew up
13	with. And I'm friends with to this day,
14	wonderful people that I miss dearly when they
15	moved. But now there's two more
16	MR. MCHALE: It's a business.
17	MS. HALLINAN: Now it's a business.
18	It's a commercial
19	MR. MCHALE: I agree with you. And
20	I didn't take it that way. Please don't take
21	what I said that way.
22	MS. HALLINAN: I just wanted to
23	clarify for anybody in the audience.
24	MR. MCHALE: I didn't mean it that
25	way. But there's good renters out there who

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1	when my wife and I got married, we were in a
2	rental place. And the guy would only rent to
3	certain people, not college kids, stuff like
4	that. We were a young married couple with a
5	young child.
6	He wanted his house to be perfect
7	like we all do and that makes a better town.
8	We hired five cops not just because of renters
9	and all that stuff. We needed cops. Over the
10	last several years Timmy said it before with
11	the DPW. We couldn't hire anybody.
12	We were not near bankruptcy. We
13	were bankrupt. Now you see hiring a couple
14	people here and there because we have to get
15	back to at least the minimum. Sal is still
16	complaining he wants three or four more cops to
17	make a full time force Sal Marchese, the
18	Chief.
19	So again, please don't take what I
20	say as frustration. I wish I could do
21	something tomorrow for you. I really do. But
22	we're going to keep trying as I think Hal and
23	everybody said.
24	MS. HALLINAN: And I understand that
25	and I appreciate it.

1       MR. MCHALE: Keep coming.         2       MS. HALLINAN: I never got anything         3       back to prove whatever other than what I have.         4       MR. MCHALE: I'll write a letter.         5       Mr. Cummings and I or Joe and I will write a         6       letter.         7       MS. HALLINAN: Other than a few         8       building inspection forms from after 2005.         9       MR. MCHALE: Well, as I said, and         10       probably everyone here went and reviewed, Joe         11       has a file on every one of these properties.         12       And there is substantiation on every one of         13       them. Again, not that I'm defending it, but         14       there is something there. So to go and say get         15       out, we'd get sued the next day.         16       MS. And as Timmy said, we have an         21       attorney on the Zoning that has opined. And he         22       writes a lot. 14	adjourn.
