MR. RUGGIERO: Number eight is the Treasurer and Financial report. Mr. Burton.

MR. BURTON: I'll be pretty brief with this. I've been focusing on preparing the budget for next year. But basically the month of October was pretty cut and dry. There was nothing extraordinary incomewise or expensewise.

There was three payrolls in the month of October. So that was offset mostly by the landfill fee for the third quarter which we received in the middle of October. But as far as being on track as far as the budget, if you look at the final numbers, we're 33,000 ahead.

And the budget has us at just about breaking even. And through the month of October, we're still 33,000 on the positive side. This upcoming couple months we're going to have some larger expenses, the pension

1 obligation will be due the --MS. BRIER: Mark, I don't mean to 2 3 interrupt you. But we took \$350,000. We took 4 a loan for 350,000 to make this 33, correct? 5 MR. BURTON: Right, because --MS. BRIER: Yeah, I mean, I think 6 7 everybody needs to know that. We took a 8 \$350,000 from a TAN to make this come out like 9 So we weren't really in good shape. 10 have to borrow to pay, you know? 11 MR. BURTON: But I mean as far as 12 the budget, the TAN was actually in last years' -- or this years' budget so that was 13 14 calculated into --15 MS. BRIER: How much was the 16 landfill fee; do you know? 17 MR. BURTON: At this point it looks 18 like it was \$833,000. It was calculated into 19 the budget. So as far as the budget is 20 concerned, we're still --21 MS. BRIER: And we got that money, 22 the landfill money. 23 MR BURTON: We did get the third 24 quarter landfill fee, yes. 25 MS. BRIER: And what was it again?

1 MR. BURTON: I believe \$612,000. 2 MS. BRIER: Okay. Thanks. 3 MR. BURTON: But we may have to look 4 into making some additional borrowing from the 5 TAN in the next two months to satisfy our obligations. 6 7 MS. BRIER: What's our pension 8 obligation today -- like, how much do we have 9 to pay the pension by the end of the year? 10 MR. BURTON: Approximately 700,000. 11 12 MS. BRIER: 700 grand. Aren't we 13 going to get some of that money from the state? 14 MR. BURTON: We did. 15 MS. BRIER: Oh, We already got it. 16 Okay, sorry. So we have four more payrolls. 17 MR. RUGGIERO: It's 400 and some 18 thousand because we received a half million 19 dollars in state aid. That's what I thought. 20 MS. BRIER: 21 MR. RUGGIERO: It was 875 or 22 something. So you're talking another \$400,000, 23 not 700,000. 24 MS. BRIER: Okay. So pension we're 25 going to owe another 400 by December 31st?

MR. BURTON: 1 Yes. MS. BRIER: And then four more 2 3 payrolls, yeah, four more payrolls, two in 4 November, two in December. Okay. All right. 5 I was just wondering. What other outstanding, like, individual big payments do we have? 6 7 MR. BURTON: Couple larger loans. 8 MS. BRIER: Oh, you had said a loan 9 that -- is it twice a year loan? MR. BURTON: 10 Biannual. 11 MS. BRIER: How much is that, like, 300, right? 12 300,000 and another 13 MR. BURTON: 14 100,000 to Fidelity for another loan. MS. BRIER: For all the other loans. 15 16 MS. BURTON: It's a once a year 17 It's an annual payment in addition to payment. 18 the normal loans we have. 19 MS. BRIER: So we haven't had to borrow from the Sewer Authority. We had to 20 21 borrow from the TAN. That we have to pay back. 22 MR. BURTON: Correct. 23 MS. BRIER: And do you anticipate 24 borrowing from the Sewer Authority money? 25 MR. BURTON: Possibly.

1 MS. BRIER: Okay. I was just wondering. 2 3 MR. DEMPSEY: The other that we are 4 hopefully expecting -- knock on wood is that --5 I can't hear you. I don't know if you said the healthcare reimbursement. 6 7 MS. BRIER: That's next March. 8 MR. DEMPSEY: I just didn't know if 9 you said that. 10 MS. BRIER: Yeah, no, no, no. 11 MR. DEMPSEY: I didn't hear you. 12 MS. BRIER: We're anticipating, in 13 effect, a refund for our health insurance. 14 MR. BURTON: It will be surplus of about \$600,000 that we'll receive. 15 16 MS. BRIER: But not until next 17 I'm just trying to think how we're March. 18 going to get to the end of the year. 19 MR. BURTON: We probably won't see 20 that until sometime next year. 21 MS. BRIER: That's what the Cummings 22 said -- Mike Cummings said next March he hoped. 23 But the good news is, the increase in the 24 health insurance for next year wasn't what he 25 had anticipated.

MR. RUGGIERO: And actually we received word today on the workers' compensation that our premium on our workers' compensation is decreasing by \$115,000.

MS. BRIER: Awesome. And our health insurance is only going up 1 percent.

MR. RUGGIERO: Right.

MR. BURTON: Plus we'll have the \$600,000 surplus, which will be a one-time check that we receive probably early next year which we budgeted into next years' numbers.

MS. BRIER: Thanks.

MR. RUGGIERO: Number nine, public comment.

MR. DEMPSEY: Anyone else on the financial report? Public comment, would anyone like to address Council tonight? Mr. Duncan.

MR. DUNCAN: 117 Barton Street, just that we will not have a neighborhood watch meeting next week. As you all know, our numbers are going back up again exponentially just based on people that I deal with -- in good conscience, I can't have a meeting next week. So we're going to cancel that.

And folks will still get in touch

with me and I'm just going to pass it along. That said, I had a few things from different folks. I talked to Didge earlier. I gave Didge the addresses. I don't know if the signs have to be ordered or anything. But just for the record I'll give them to everybody. I'll go slow, Mrs. McCool.

At the corner of Exchange Court and Delaware, it's Coleman's house. It's the house with all the masonry as you come down the alley. You're probably familiar with it if you come through that. We have that area, you know, no parking here to corner. But if snow comes, nobody could see that. We're hoping we could get a sign up in there.

I know we talked about it in the past. And I did mention it to Didge tonight. Like I said, I don't know if the signs have to be ordered or if we have to get approval from the police department or whomever.

Also, the stop sign at the corner of Tripp Street and Delaware, that was the one that got hit by a truck. That sign is still bent. I don't know if we could straighten it out or if we need a new post and everything.

And then, if you're coming down

Tripp Street and you take a right onto Delaware

Street, we also had a sign with a post up

there, no parking here to corner. And another

truck -- the post is there. The sign is gone.

They took that off.

So again, if we could get those things replaced before any bad weather gets here because somebody will get hurt over there. That's a tough intersection on ice and snow. So with that -- hold on. I just have a few other things if you bear with me.

Mrs. Zangardi, on the Sewer

Authority, I did -- I got a little bit lucky
today. I couldn't get through to everybody but
they do have a final fairness hearing on

November 19th. And that's with Judge Mazzoni.

So maybe we'll have some updates then because we have no Sewer Authority meeting in October. And here we are in November. So I called down. We are having a final fairness hearing November the 19th with Judge Mazzoni.

MR. DEMPSEY: Please state your name and address for the record.

MS. NOLE: My name is Kim Nole. I live at 319 Oak Street. I have concerns for two properties -- definitely two properties on our street. So I'm here on my behalf, my parents and some of our neighbors. 321 Oak Street which is right next to me is a breeding ground for cats, skunks, possums.

The lady that owns the house is constantly feeding all the stray animals. She stands on her porch, opens the can and flicks the food from the lid. It goes on her property, kerplunks it on the porch. But twice she's already flicked it into my driveway.

I asked her not to do that and, of course, comments went back and forth. But she's -- it's like a never ending thing. She's feeding them daily. I know Joe Lorince had

been at the house and was totally appalled with the porch.

Our mailman has filed a report with the post office last year that he refused to go on the property on the porch because of how disgusting it is. I've spent close to \$200 this summer trying to reenforce our backyard so that the cats stop going in it cutting through to go to her property.

My neighbors, some of them are here, they had to buy boxes to put their porch furniture in, the cushions, things like that that the cats get on and rip them apart.

There's cat crap everywhere. My other neighbor has a puppy. They let their dog out. The dog came outside, slid in cat crap just as soon as the dog hit their own grass.

MS. BRIER: They are all feral cats.

MS. NOLE: They're all feral cats.

Inside her house she has seven cats. So, I mean, last night my mother went to take my dog out and couldn't get outside because there was a skunk, you know, eating the cat food over there.

It's a constant, constant problem.

We've tried to reenforce our flower beds, things like. They are using them as, you know, their own litter box. It's just -- it's not a pleasant environment in any way, shape or form.

In her backyard I call it a cat condo contraption. Behind her house at the back door to exit the basement, she has a contraption of boxes, cinder blocks, tarps that she's keeping back there so that the cats can have a place to go or whatever.

But if we're on our deck, that's all we see. It's a constant annoyance. The neighbors behind her are fed up with it. All of us in our area keep the yards nice, presentable. So that's what we're dealing with. Then she obviously is fed up with us.

So she's also put private property signs right -- everywhere, you know, directed towards us. The -- sorry -- I told you about the post office and all of that. Along with her at 305 Oak Street and 230 Oak Street, those are two other cat feeders. I mean, you come down our neighborhood at any point and you see cats everywhere.

The woman at 305 actually had the

nerve to put cat food on plates to go across to the neighbor's house across the street at 308 and put the plates under her bushes to feed the cats. I mean, we're basically all fed up with this. So that's 321 Oak Street.

MAYOR BURKE: That one you said is 321.

MS. NOLE: Yes.

MS. ZANGARDI: 321, 305, did you name another one?

MS. NOLE: 230, 305, and 321 are the cat feeders.

MS. BRIER: Would Dunda go --

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, I mean, on your -- obviously we have a -- I don't know what you call it, I guess pest control, animal control, Karl Dunda. He'll come to your property. He has traps and traps the cats and either takes them either to the Humane Society and find places that will take them.

You have every right to do that on your property. I'm not saying you could go on someone else's property.

MS. NOLE: Right. I'm hoping that we kind of kept them out. But, I mean, you

1 know, you can drive down our street when it's close to dinner time and you'll see cats coming 2 3 from all over the place. Literally at one 4 count there was six cats, two kittens and four 5 skunks that were basically around that all night long. They come and go and come again. 6 7 MS. BRIER: You can't put traps on 8 someone's property. 9 ATTY. PERRY: Not on someone else's 10 property. 11 MS. BRIER: Unless they give you 12 permission. 13 ATTY. MR. RUGGIERO: They release the skunks back into the woods.

Okay. And they can't do

MR. RUGGIERO: The feral cats, there's no place to technically release the feral cats. You can't put them in the woods. You have to bring them to the Humane Society. They're not taking them because there's too

There was a place I believe at Nay Aug was taking them as well. But I believe

to take the dog out at night and you have to go 1 out with your flashlight. 2 3 MR. RUGGIERO: Miss Nole, did you speak with Mr. Lorince? 4 5 MS. NOLE: I personally have not spoken to him directly. He knows about this. 6 7 I know Officer Bonivolgia{sic} had mentioned it 8 to him. 9 MR. RUGGIERO: Because he lives 10 there too. 11 MS. NOLE: He's the one with the dog 12 that slid in the --13 MR. RUGGIERO: Right. If I could 14 get your phone number before you leave and then 15 we can follow up with you as well once we 16 address this tomorrow. 17 MS. NOLE: That's fine. The other 18 address is 324 Oak Street. This is owned by 19 Roswitha Nogan. And this house was bought 20 recently last year, I believe. And it has been 21 a never-ending issue. It somehow is a business 22 in a residential area. 23 She rents rooms on the top floor, 24 the second floor of the house. And there is 25 usually three to four women who live up there.

At the end of every month there's, like, new cars coming from New Jersey, New York. Apparently this is some type of a drug rehab house that none of us ever found out about. The neighborhood was never informed. I mean, I had to come before Council when I built a garage on the street.

And she's conducting a business and we never knew about it. So apparently after people get out of treatment or something like that, they move into the upstairs apartments.

And --

MS. BRIER: Are they apartments or rooms?

MS. NOLE: They're rooms. Our friend used to live upstairs on the second floor. And he lived up there by himself. So now it seems like there are rooms because I don't see how you could possibly have four people living up there comfortably.

Let's just say within a year of her owning the house, there have been five overdose calls to that house, two times, two of them in one day. A couple weeks ago, I went home from work to have lunch and there was an overdose

where, you know, the street gets blocked up.

Luckily I texted my neighbor to tell her because her son who's working on driving was coming down and they would have been stuck in the middle of the alley because we're a small two-block street. So, I mean, five overdoses. We know nothing about the property. We've never been informed.

And it's just the parking also on the street if you have four people upstairs who drive, she drives, and now she moved her sister into the basement which when they were remodelling it was supposed to be a family room. And now there's the sister and two kids living in the basement.

So you're looking at sometimes five to six cars that just do not fit. They park partially in the alleyway on this little bit of rock that's there. So, I mean, they should consider themselves lucky they have not been hit by a car coming up and down the street.

MS. ZANGARDI: With regard to this property, Joe Lorince was up there to look into the basement -- or the ground floor apartment, correct?

MR. RUGGIERO: He was.

MS. ZANGARDI: And he did address the second floor apartment, correct, Vito?

MR. RUGGIERO: To my knowledge, yes.

MS. ZANGARDI: Yeah, so --

MR. RUGGIERO: What the results were I can't speak to because I know that he -- I just know that he did go and address it. I don't know what the results were.

MS. NOLE: I know my mother had called. She spoke to him on the phone, voiced her other concerns over, you know, what's going on over there. But my question is, what type of house is this? Where are the checks and balances?

Who checks in on these people if they are a legitimate drug rehab type of thing because obviously, they're not doing their job if you have five overdoses. You know, I mean, we've got traffic that comes, people pick them up. They go.

I mean, there's one person who doesn't seem like she is any problem. She goes to work. We see her where she works. She comes back. She's very quiet and reserved.

But the rest that have been there have not been 1 2 top-notch. 3 MR. RUGGIERO: You said, Mrs. Nole, 4 324 0ak? 5 MS. NOLE: 324, yes. MR. RUGGIERO: What I will do is I 6 7 will have our police department pull the call 8 log from that address and give it to Joe and 9 have him re-followup again with it. 10 MS. NOLE: Okay. 11 MR. HALLINAN: It would have to be 12 registered somewhere or somehow. MS. NOLE: I do believe there is a 13 14 possible recent arrest dealing with someone who lived there too. I'm not sure if it was 15 16 Dunmore Police, State Police. But there may 17 have been a recent drug arrest from someone in 18 that house also. 19 MS. BRIER: Mickey, how many people 20 can live there? How many unrelated? 21 MR. HALLINAN: If it's somebody --22 the rehab, that has to be registered somewhere, 23 correct, Vito? 24 MR. RUGGIERO: Well, from what I 25 understand because I had this conversation --

and again, I'm only paraphrasing what I gathered from it. Apparently there is a -- in a residential neighborhood, you could put a common room and divide it with walls and have people live there as long as you have one bathroom and one kitchen and get somehow tied in with the court system that when somebody gets out of prison, they can go to stay there, pay rent and then move on after they have to do something.

Now, that's about -- it was intriguing on one end but confusing to another end on me because of the checks and balances.

MS. NOLE: We've never seen anybody truly go in there to, you know --

MR. RUGGIERO: No, and I will followup -- it's a prison form maybe Section Eight that they're guaranteed income from this way. So I don't know what it is. But I will followup with Mr. Lorince tomorrow. I know there is -- I believe Councilwoman Brier just said something how many related.

MS. BRIER: Unrelated.

MR. RUGGIERO: I think it's four or is it six?

1 MR. HALLINAN: I think it's four. MR. RUGGIERO: Is it four unrelated? 2 Four or --3 MR. HALLINAN: Above four. 4 MR. RUGGIERO: Unrelated. But there 5 is nothing to obviously related I don't 6 believe. 7 8 MS. BRIER: No, not a sister and 9 But whoever is upstairs -kids. 10 MR. NOLE: But there is so many 11 times that so many people are coming and going, 12 like, you honestly have no idea who it is 13 that's there, how many are there. You see 14 You see people all the time. 15 MR. RUGGIERO: I will get with 16 Mr. Lorince tomorrow and address these concerns 17 for you including the cats. 18 MS. NOLE: Thank you. MR. RUGGIERO: You're welcome. 19 20 MR. HALLINAN: Would it be wrong for 21 the Fire Chief to also to go in there and 22 could you somehow gain access to that building 23 and see if it's safe? 24 CHIEF DENAPLES: There's two ways 25 that we can gain access. If we have an

1 incident there, you know, obviously we can go through the building. And the other way is to 2 3 schedule an inspection if it's being used 4 commercially. MS. BRIER: So let's do that. 5 CHIEF DENAPLES: If it's not being 6 7 used commercially, the only time we could 8 really get into a residential structure is if 9 we have an incident there. 10 MS. BRIER: Like an overdose? 11 CHIEF DENAPLES: Yeah, if we 12 responded to it. 13 MS. NOLE: Do you want me to smell 14 gas? 15 MR. HALLINAN: You're on the record. 16 MS. NOLE: Sorry. 17 MS. BRIER: But an overdose --18 MS. ZANGARDI: If memory is serving 19 me right, Vito, didn't Joe do an inspection at that -- he did definitely do an inspection on 20 21 the ground --22 MR. RUGGIERO: Again, I can't speak 23 to what he did. But I know he did address it 24 and was there. But I could get you answers 25 tomorrow. When I talk to him tomorrow, I can

1 definitely get you answers. 2 MS. NOLE: Thank you. Appreciate 3 it. 4 MR. RUGGIERO: Thank you. 5 MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you. MR. DEMPSEY: Anyone else like to 6 7 address Council tonight? 8 (No response.) 9 MR. DEMPSEY: Seeing none. I'll 10 open it up to public officials, Mayor Burke, do 11 you want to start? 12 MAYOR BURKE: Yes, we started 13 meeting with American Water, myself, Tom 14 Hallinan, Vito and Joe Lorince attended. So 15 we're going to keep that going now again on a 16 monthly basis. We were getting a lot of 17 complaints about dirty water. 18 And I explained that to American 19 And actually I even got a call again 20 this week from Adams Avenue or last rather. 21 But I don't know. The one person asked me to 22 call Representative Mullins' office and I did 23 and I talked to Mr. Davis and explained that 24 we're having a lot of water problems with

American Water.

25

And I asked American Water with the meeting if they could at least call Vito to give us a heads-up and what area if they're working and if they break a line just so we're aware of it. And, you know, especially for the elderly living in a neighborhood if they have broken lines we can warn them.

The lady on Adams Avenue told me she washed clothes and there was all mud on it.

But anyway, we're started up the meetings again. And we're going to have them like we were before having every other month -- I mean, every month.

And also what I talked about last meeting like Mickey did some research and found out we do have access to our stormwater pipe.

We have easements, right, Mick?

ATTY. PERRY: Yep.

MAYOR BURKE: So that's new and that's good because we're going to have to have our own borough workers -- unless we hire somebody to go and check those lines because that is now our property. We'll make sure they are checked every rain storm.

And any other thing too, like, I

asked American Water if they do continue or do any work -- if Scranton does any work on any storm lines to advise us ahead of time,

American Water, because maybe we could piggyback together and do work together.

For instance, if they -- the storm
line on Green Ridge Street if they ever wanted
to work on that, I mean, it would behoove us to
join in on it going down Green Ridge Street
because we don't really have any access to
water other than Lackawanna going down Green
Ridge Street and then our line on Smith Street
goes into the Roaring Brook.

So, you know, I just said, you know, give us a heads up if they are ever working on any lines connected with us that could help us out and maybe we could piggyback with Scranton. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mayor Burke. Vito, do you have anything?

MR. RUGGIERO: Nothing.

MR. DEMPSEY: Didge, do you have anything?

MR. JUDGE: No.

MR. DEMPSEY: Chief DeNaples?

CHIEF DENAPLES: Nothing. 1 Thank 2 you. 3 MR. DEMPSEY: Is Chris in here? No. 4 Mick? 5 ATTY. PERRY: I have nothing. MR. DEMPSEY: All right. 6 7 Mrs. Zangardi? 8 MS. ZANGARDI: Nothing. Thank you. 9 MR. DEMPSEY: Mr. Ehnot? 10 MR. EHNOT: Chief, did you meet with 11 PennDOT on the 900 hundred block of Drinker 12 Street where the fire truck can't get down to 13 those two homes --14 CHIEF DENAPLES: Yeah, so myself and 15 Attorney Perry were up there with the engineers 16 from PennDOT. So we actually brought the fire 17 apparatus that's the issue up there that day. 18 And what came out of that was they said they 19 were going -- we didn't get much further than 20 we did in the e-mail that led me to send all of 21 Council that e-mail. 22 So what they said was they were 23 going to relocate that stop sign, pave up to 24 the mound to the curb and then they were going

to contact Attorney Perry when we're going to

reconvene up there and Councilman Hallinan was up there as well and try to get the truck in there.

I'm not hopeful that that's going to work because I think it's still going to bottom out. So I think there's going to -- need to be more done than that to get the truck in there.

As everybody says --

MR. EHNOT: The width of the road, will the truck fit down the with of the road? It's very narrow.

CHIEF DENAPLES: So the truck once you get it on the road it's tight. But it will get down there. The only problem is if that's really not treated, Tom, during the winter and plowed good, if we have a couple big snowfalls and that's not cleaned right to the curb, that's where it's going to be problematic from what I'm seeing.

The big thing is actually getting it in there. The one engineer talked about doing a K-turn. And we've showed them that that can't be done. Like I said, we brought the truck up there that day. So that really -- part of that curb needs to be cut out from what

I'm seeing. We'll go with their recommendation and try to get in there.

They just keep reiterating it's about the curb and the (inaudible.) That's not the issue. We're worried about damaging the truck.

MR. EHNOT: I would make them take the whole thing out.

CHIEF DENAPLES: They really should.

They really should.

MR. EHNOT: That's it. Because when the houses burn, God forbid, and you can't get a fire truck down there, is PennDOT going to say, well, we wanted to save money so we didn't want to rip the whole thing up?

CHIEF DENAPLES: One thing about it, the first house 909, they said, oh, you could drive into the back. And the issue with that is, the grade going upward, the truck will bottom out. You can't even get into that house from the Field Street side.

MR. EHNOT: That's all I have.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you. Thank you, Chief. Mr. Hallinan?

MR. HALLINAN: The only thing is I

just want to say the town really supported the Dunmore's Farmer Market this year, which is done for the season which was a great success at the Fidelity Bank parking lot and thank everybody that went. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Mr. Hallinan.
Mr. Amico?

MR. AMICO: Yeah, I just wanted to reach out and thank Chris Kearney for running a really smooth show on Election Day. For as many people that were here, he and his group ran a really smooth operation.

And tomorrow is November 10th. It's the 245th birthday of the Marine Corp. So if there are any Marines in the audience, Semper Fi and Happy Birthday. That's all I have.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mr. Amico.
Mrs. Brier?

MS. BRIER: And Wednesday is

Veterans Day. I just had a couple questions
about the Williams Street thing. Did we do
anything about that in terms of looking into
speed bumps? You know how we talked at our
last meeting about Williams Street?

1 I'm trying find out how much the 2 temporary speed bumps -- would that be feasible 3 if we could take them out like in the --4 MAYOR BURKE: You mean like --5 MS. BRIER: Like, we have at, like, Moosic Lake, they have speed bumps that they 6 7 could take out. Like, they're not permanent. 8 Can we do anything? 9 ATTY. PERRY: I don't know if you 10 could take them out. Didge, you would know 11 better than I. 12 MR. JUDGE: They're illegal. 13 can only put them in front of schools and 14 playgrounds. They can only go in front of 15 schools and playgrounds like Sherwood Park, 16 Monroe Park. 17 MS. BRIER: How about Schautz? What 18 about Williams Street on the way up to Schautz? 19 MR. JUDGE: We might get away with 20 that. 21 MS. BRIER: There you go. That's a 22 big playground up there. 23 MR. HALLINAN: The only thing I did 24 look into -- and I still think if it does, it 25 might jeopardize our liquid fuels tax money.

There could be something there that, you know, I was talking to a PennDOT guy. And he said you better be careful what you do calling them speed bumps, you know, so --

MS. BRIER: What kind of money would it jeopardize?

MR. HALLINAN: Our liquid fuels tax money.

MS. BRIER: Okay. So how can we find out if that's the case if it, you know --

MR. HALLINAN: I don't think a temporary like pick them up and put them out speed bumps would work. I think if you did anything, I mean, I think we should look at maybe a one way from maybe Irving up to Prescott or maybe we could look at not even a speed bump, but we could put in rumble strips, like, coming up the hill because you can't -- I don't want to put a -- from what I was looking at, I don't want to put a stop sign coming up the hill because then in the winter there's going to be a big problem.

MS. BRIER: It's very steep.

MR. HALLINAN: So maybe some kind of -- I think that would be a last -- I think a

1 rumble strip like you would --2 MS. BRIER: That's a good idea. 3 MR. HALLINAN: You feel them when 4 you come down some ramps sometimes or you feel 5 them on the side of the road. You would want a rumble strip maybe as a last resort. 6 7 thinking maybe we should have our traffic 8 engineer look at it, maybe some kind of one way 9 from Prescott to the first block. Would that 10 be Irving or --11 ATTY. PERRY: Irving is the first 12 one. 13 MR. HALLINAN: Irving is the first 14 Maybe from Irving up or down, whatever one. 15 they see feasible with that, you know, I'm not 16 an engineer. 17 MS. BRIER: She said the issue is 18 from Blakely up. 19 MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, because it's almost from Blakely Street you're getting a 20 21 free run right up. There used to be a stop 22 sign I think at Taylor would be the first one. 23 ATTY. PERRY: Taylor is the first 24 cross street. 25 MR. HALLINAN: Right. And there

1 used to be a stop sign if I'm not mistaken coming up there. I don't think it's there 2 3 anymore from what I've seen. So you get a 4 straight run up that hill. The problem is now 5 when you come up to the --MS. BRIER: 6 Right. 7 MR. HALLINAN: -- there's the hill. 8 You can't see -- nobody could see each other. 9 And when it's too late, you could have a 10 head-on crash. So that's the issue. So then 11 everybody is just scrambling then. When you 12 see another car they're going up on your 13 sidewalks. They're damaging private 14 properties, you know. 15 MS. BRIER: Maybe we could make it a 16 one way. 17 MR. HALLINAN: I think we have to 18 ask our engineer would have to make that 19 decision. 20 MS. BRIER: Who is that? 21 MR. HALLINAN: Reuther Bowen. 22 MS. BRIER: Reuther Bowen. Okay, do 23 we need, like, a motion for that? 24 MR. HALLINAN: No, we can just ask 25 him to look into it. Right, Michael?

MR. DEMPSEY: Yes. 1 2 MS. BRIER: Okay. Vito, would you 3 ask him? 4 MR. RUGGIERO: Yes. 5 MS. BRIER: How about the couple that was here, Mayor, about the water that was 6 7 going right into their --8 MAYOR BURKE: I didn't hear from 9 them since -- I went up to check during the 10 It seemed like it was holding, our last storm. 11 storm. Like, we haven't had any really big 12 storms this summer or spring. 13 MS. ZANGARDI: Can I interrupt? 14 MR. JUDGE: I don't think they are 15 getting anything now. 16 MS. BRIER: That's good. 17 MAYOR BURKE: I know it had to be raised on that side. 18 19 ATTY. PERRY: I talked to them, 20 Janet, when I was walking my granddaughter in 21 the stroller down by their house. And they 22 seemed to be okay with it. 23 MS. BRIER: That's great. 24 ATTY. PERRY: They didn't know

whether or not it would overflow with the new

1 catch basin because we haven't had a huge rain 2 But they seem to be fairly happy with 3 what was done. 4 MS. ZANGARDI: They were going to 5 come tonight but she got sick. So she may be here in two weeks. They may. They were pretty 6 happy about it -- satisfied. 7 8 MS. BRIER: Oh, that's wonderful. 9 That's wonderful. I didn't hear. 10 ATTY. PERRY: The problem is their 11 house is so far below the grade of the street. 12 MS. BRIER: Right. It's really 13 steep there. 14 ATTY. PERRY: It's made for water to 15 come down into. 16 MS. BRIER: I just have one more 17 thing. Parking meters, did we see anything 18 about that, Vito? 19 MR. RUGGIERO: Captain Barth and I 20 met with the company from Scranton. They came 21 up here. They're out of New Jersey. They did 22 correspond and they asked some additional 23 questions. And Captain Barth got them the 24 answers. So we're waiting on a full proposal 25 from them.

1 MS. BRIER: Thanks. That's all I 2 have. 3 MR. DEMPSEY: The last thing I have 4 is the budget. Mrs. Brier and Mr. Burton have 5 been diligently working on that budget. just wanted to say I appreciate that. The 6 first reading of the budget will be two weeks 7 8 from tonight. So we will meet the second 9 Monday of November. 10 And that would be our first reading of the proposed budget for 2021. And then we 11 12 would have our second reading and possible 13 adoption of that budget the first meeting in 14 December which is I believe December 14th. 15 just so everybody is aware that we will meet 16 the second Monday of this month. 17 And that's when the first reading of 18 the budget will be held. With that, I don't 19 have anything else. So I'll look for a motion to adjourn. 20 21 MR. HALLINAN: I'll make the motion. 22 MR. DEMPSEY: I have a motion. 23 second? 24 MR. AMICO: I'll second. 25 MR. DEMPSEY: All those in favor?
