25	ATTY. CUMMINGS: Item number four is

a motion to approve the final 2015 budget. The budget was advertised for the 30 day review period. And it was open for inspection at the Borough Building.

MR. NARDOZZI: I'll make that motion, Mr. Chairman.

MS. SCRIMALLI: I'll second that.

MR. MCHALE: I have a motion and a second. On the question. Okay. I'll go through on the question. Some of the highlights and if anybody does have any questions we'll remain afterwards.

I could give you my e-mail, cell phone or probably call anybody and they'll be able to answer as well. The highlights of what we're going to do tonight to pass the budget that has 44 mills which is a 10 mill reduction from last year.

Also included in this budget is the elimination of the \$150 garbage fee. That is being offset obviously by the additional landfill revenue that we negotiated in the agreement several weeks ago. So that on the revenue end that's the large thing.

We do have details I think that was

left at the door. There is other ones here if anybody would like to take a look at it. Or again, afterwards please ask any questions.

I'm not going to sit and bore you by going through line by line of accounting jargon.

But on the expense side of things, we do have our union contracts with all four of our unions for the next several years, I believe. Right, Sal?

MR. VERRASTRO: I believe three more.

MR. MCHALE: Three more. We negotiated over the past two years with all of them. So they are pretty structured. Most of the expenses as you could imagine are payroll expenses. Our debt service expenses are about 1.8 million dollars. It's inclusive of interest.

That's a large portion of it as well. But obviously between payroll and benefits and pension expense, that takes up large majority of our 10.2 million dollar budget. For -- or well, we'll talk about our TAN in a little bit. So I won't talk about that too much.

But our TAN note even though we are putting a TAN note on tonight at an interest rate of 1.64, we are hoping that we may not have to use that. To give you an idea, we did end the year with a cash position. We're going to end the year of with cash position of about half million dollars.

So you could imagine where we were in last several years, we've been growing to the point -- it's conservative amounts. It's half a million dollars. It's well north of that. But just in case anything comes up over the next ten days we'll be covering.

So what else do we talk about, anything? We do have as has been quoted in the paper a budgeted amount for additional cops.

And the comments that come with putting five additional cops on -- we're down about six or seven cops over the last several years. We never filled the positions.

So we have been using a lot of part time which are becoming more and more difficult to fill. But we tentatively put five positions on for our police force. That doesn't mean we're going to hire them. We could hire one,

two, three based on where we are with our money.

To give you an idea of what the reduction of the taxes are, the net increase it was received from the landfill was approximately 1.5 million dollars. It may be a little bit less than what was anticipated. But we are -- this budget is on a cash basis.

So for the two months October and November we get paid every quarter. So the fourth quarter of 2014 will be made in January of 2015. So we have two months that we're going to be at the 41 cents. And then we're going to change to the \$1.20 come December 1st.

So there's a little bit of lag there that we are still at the lower amount for the two months there on a cash basis. So we'll have 10 months at the \$1.20 this year. And then every year thereafter it will change again based on cash basis.

So the 1.5 million dollars that is the net difference -- a little bit more than that is being returned in the 150 and the 10 mill reduction takes out the entire amount of the increase that was received on the revenue

side on that end.

There's been comments that we need to address some of our debt. To give you an idea if you were at the last meeting we talked about a structural -- we had a surplus in that we were projecting. And we are going to have a surplus at the end of this year.

I told you our cash position on a conservative end. That will -- what this Council wants to do is use any -- we had planned on doing a modest tax decrease without the landfill revenue. We're going to use that money to invest in our infrastructure.

We have firefighters back there who are using some antiquated equipment that we're looking into as we speak. We did put a lot of money on a cash basis into the DPW. Didge over there will tell you that most of his trucks have been replaced and his heavy equipment has been replaced.

That's been on a cash basis and our police cars are relatively up-to-date. So investing in our infrastructure and having to pay down debt that's what we're going to use the surplus that we've achieved in the past

several years. We're going to keep our nose to the grindstone, keep our expenses in check and, you know, not spend like we have so much money because we don't.

We're going to run a tight lean budget and use anything extra to pay down the debt. In the next several years as has been explained a hundred times in the Scranton Times we do have increases coming in the landfill fees and the next Council will be able to adjust accordingly to whatever -- you know, whether it's a further reduction in taxes or reduction in debt or infrastructure whatever the case may be that will be for the next Council to decide. So I think I've spoken enough. Does anybody else want to chime in?

MR. VERRASTRO: I think we're also going to roll some of it into a special fund for the -- a landfill account for an inspector and/or if we need an engineer, anything of that sort to double-check anything in the future if need be.

MR. MCHALE: Sal is talking about we're going to restrict a portion of the revenue that we are getting from the landfill

for anything -- for hiring any professionals to inspect, any testing, so on and so forth every year. We're going to restrict that cash in a separate account for use for that basis.

Anybody else?

MR. NARDOZZI: I just want to -Mike, my hats off to you for all the hard work
you did and the rest of Council. You worked
throughout the year and Vito you manage a great
staff in the office. But in reference to the
budget here, you know, a lot of this is your
work and I just want to tell you thank you so
much.

MR. MCHALE: I appreciate that.

Vito deserves a lot of -- he's the one who pulled all this stuff together. I thank you again, Vito, for everything you've done.

Anybody else on the question?

MR. BURKE: Mike, are we going to do like we were talking about like a penny a ton maybe for the --

MR. MCHALE: That's what he was talking about. That's the amount we were talking about a penny a ton.

MR. VERRASTRO: You don't trust me?

1 MR. BURKE: No, I didn't hear a 2 penny. 3 MR. MCHALE: That's okay. That's 4 about \$25,000 a year to give you an idea. 5 Anybody else on the question? (No response.) 6 7 MR. MCHALE: I have a motion and a 8 second. All those in favor signify by saying 9 aye. 10 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 11 MR. MCHALE: Opposed. 12 (No response.) 13 MR. MCHALE: The ayes have it and so 14 moved. Some months passed you authorized Martin and Martin. But they held off pending certification from DEP that it was a final application -- I'm sorry that is was a complete application. That having been done, they set forth in the agreement those areas where they will concentrate. The documents are very voluminous.

Some are redundant and just reprints of everything from the past years. They saw no reason in their professional opinion to scrutinize every page. That would be time and dollar prohibitive.

They addressed in the agreement the areas where they will concentrate which I think they glean from, you know, questions posed by the Borough of Dunmore. They are capped out at \$20,000; 10 Throop, 10 Dunmore. It's taken as a combined document because it was getting very difficult to separate out each item where Dunmore would take half and Throop would take half.

So we basically combined and we're each in for 10. And it is my understanding that now that the application is deemed

2	from DEP for the review up to \$10,000.

And, Carol, I spoke to you 30 seconds before the meeting. If you do get an e-mail account that is working -- I just feel bad about leaving you out of the conversation and sharing the information with you.

I did send a copy to the e-mail address I had but if you could get me a new one I'll certainly include you or I'm sure one of the gentlemen will. I just want to go over a couple things. Didge is here tonight.

And first off, I just want to thank a few people quickly. First and foremost I

want to thank the members of the Dunmore

Neighborhood Watch and Dunmore community who
have been with us from August of 2013, made all
the meetings throughout 2014 and going forward
into '15.

So I want to thank those people who started out coming to the Neighborhood Watch and they come to Council. And that's what community is all about. So I thank those people first and foremost.

Our last meeting I want to -- I want to specifically thank the Councilmen that came. I know you folks had meetings that night. So Sal, Mr. Hallinan, Mr. Dempsey thanks for showing up. Tim Burke for the previous meetings. Tim's been at meeting after meeting. We appreciate that.

And after the weekend in New York

City with the assassination of two police

officers I have to say, Thank God I live in

Dunmore. We either have Bill Springer or Rich

Barth at every meeting. Tom Richardson never

misses a meeting.

They put their lives on the line all the time in big towns, small town. I certainly

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wouldn't want to be a policeman. You know, I bow my head and ask for 30 seconds for the two gentlemen that got ambushed this weekend if we can do that as a group, please.

(Moment of Silence.)

MR. DUNCAN: Thank you. I want to thank the firemen, especially with everything that happened recently up the street and you guys too. You're out there trying to save everybody and anybody. You put your lives on the lines.

We thank all the first responders.

Neighborhood Watch, I'm speaking for all of us.

We know what you do for us. We know you're out there. And after this weekend, I can't say thank you enough.

Some questions, Vito or whomever, if there is any way we can maybe have Joe Lorince come back to a meeting. We get questions about some concerns with property and things. If I could just put it on the record formally and if Joe could make our January meeting is going to be January the 19th, which

is the third Monday of the month.

So if Joe could free up some time.

He doesn't have to spend the whole meeting.

I'll let him go first but just to answer some questions from the folks. Didge, I know you're here tonight.

One of the complaints that came up from the last storm, Ferguson Court they said that was a sheet of ice. So I know you guys are busy and you're doing your best. I just wanted to bring it your attention. I'm so happy I got to see you tonight.

I talked to the people that own
Christ The King church. There was concerns at
the last meeting the gentleman that was there
can back me up on that. They said there was a
lot of ice and everything on the sidewalks down
there.

There's school kids that go through there. There's Country Day Apartments. I spoke to one of the principals involved. They said they're going to look at it. So I hope, you know, hopefully that won't happen again.

I don't know if there is a dumpster ordinance in the Borough. But 1215 Clay, one

of the people that came to our meeting said there was a dumpster there for about six months, which is -- seems like an ungodly length of time.

MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, I asked Joe about that. And he said they are still working on it. When I did go by, they are working on an apartment. It's a home. It's not an apartment. So they are remodeling the whole thing. So it's a working container. It's not like it's just -- it's not abandoned.

MR. NARDOZZI: And, Tom, they are dumping it.

MR. HALLINAN: Yes, they are dumping it.

MR. NARDOZZI: It's not like the trash and whatever else they are throwing in is sitting there forever. It's being emptied.

Actually what they do, they're bringing back another container. They haul that one off and bring another one.

MR. DUNCAN: Okay. Thanks a lot.

And if you'll all just review the minutes of the meeting that I sent you. I'm not going to go through everything. But they were some of

the issues that we were concerned about. 1 2 And then you folks seemed -- one of 3 the other issues from the people from the Neighborhood Watch, they can't always hear. 4 The microphones I'm sure they are working and 5 everything. But that's a concern just in terms 6 7 of communication. 8 That said, I want to thank everybody 9 for your support from the beginning. 10 Christmas to everybody. Happy New Year to 11 everybody. And thanks to the police and fire 12 for everything you guys do for us. 13 MR. NARDOZZI: Thanks, Gary. 14 MR. MCHALE: Thanks, Gary. MR. DUNCAN: 15 January 19th is our 16 next meeting so everybody is welcome. 17 ATTY. CUMMINGS: Item number nine is 18 public comment on non agenda items. 19 MR. MCHALE: Anybody like to speak 20 tonight? 21 MR. CLARK: Pat Clark, Jefferson 22 I missed the first part. But have we Avenue. 23 received the signed landfill agreement? 24 MR. MCHALE: We did. 25 MR. CLARK: Have we issued the --

has the Borough issued the zoning opinion 1 letter? 2 3 MR. MCHALE: I spoke to Joe on Saturday. He was formalizing it. He has up to 4 5 90 days to do so. Vito, do you know if he's formally given it? 6 7 MR. RUGGIERO: It was supposed to be 8 by close of business today. So I'll find out 9 first thing in the morning. 10 MR. CLARK: Was there any -- did we get any feedback from the landfill on a 30 day 11 window of signing a piece of paper -- the 12 13 contract itself -- why it took so long? 14 MR. MCHALE: No. MR. CLARK: Was it ever tied to 15 16 the opinion of the zoning letter? 17 MR. MCHALE: No. 18 MR. CLARK: Formally or informally? MR. MCHALE: 19 No. 20 MR. CLARK: If the opinion of Martin 21 and Martin goes over that amount, is there a 22 contingency plan in place for that? 23 MR. MCHALE: We'll pay it. 24 So we have -- I wasn't MR. CLARK: 25 clear on Attorney Cummings. It's up to 20,000

1 for the initial contract we're splitting with 2 Throop 10 and 10. 3 MR. MCHALE: It's 10 and 10 because 4 that is what DEP will allow us to be refunded. 5 So although Martin and Martin didn't believe it would be much more than that if at all, we made 6 7 a commitment that we'll pay. We'll pay our --8 definitely our share. 9 MR. CLARK: So DEP will refund each 10 borough --11 MR. MCHALE: Up to 10. ATTY. CUMMINGS: May refund subject 12 13 to their review. 14 MR. CLARK: And it's up to DEP subject to their review. 15 16 ATTY. CUMMINGS: But at a prior 17 meeting, Dunmore Council already authorized the 18 10 regardless of reimbursement. So that's 19 already comitted. Then we'll attempt to get 20 the reimbursement. That's why this document is 21 dated subsequent to the determination complete. 22 That's when it kicked in where we would be 23 eligible. 24 MR. CLARK: Okay. And, I'm sorry, 25 the zoning opinion we should hopefully have it.

MR. RUGGIERO: I should have it by tomorrow morning. From what I understand by close of business today Mr. Lorince was going to issue his opinion.

MR. MCHALE: I'll e-mail it to you, Pat.

MR. CLARK: All right. Thank you.

MR. HALLINAN: Mike, again, I've said it from day one since I've been elected. You're amazing with the numbers. And I don't mean to over -- you know, blow your head up; but you did a great job of saving this town and pulling it up out of, you know, it was in dire straits there.

And again, I appreciate it. And I want to say it on the record. And I'm sure the towns people really -- when they know and they sit down seriously they'll know what a good job you've done. Again, thank you again. To our firemen, our policemen, what happened in New York, I mean, everybody's got to realize every day you go to work and you don't know whether you're coming home.

And what can I say to, like, thank you. It's the only words I have. I really appreciate what you guys do. Our DPW guys, they do a phenomenal job. You don't know how many times we've talked about the budget, I get threatened on the street. Don't you touch our DPW. So they are doing a great job.

But for you guys that put your lives on the line, like I said, you know, 911 everybody was running away and you guys were the only ones running in you and the police. And we saw what happened in New York today. That was really sad.

I'm happy for the 10 mills. I'm glad that the refuse fee is done. I'm happy that the Bucks -- I wish they won. And I wish everybody a Merry Christmas and happy holidays. Thank you for your service, gentlemen.

MR. MCHALE: Thank you, Tom. Paul.

Chairman. First, I'd like to wish everybody
here and everyone in town Merry Christmas.

Second of all, I reiterate what Tom said. It
was a dream season we had this year with the

Dunmore Bucks. I just want to take my hats off

to Coach Henzes, the staff, all the players.

Hopefully sometime in January, Mr. President,

we can do some kind of presentation for the

team and the band and the cheerleaders.

They were -- I'm going to tell you,

I don't really watch much band or crimsonettes.

But ours were one of the best. I did watch
them this year. They were excellent. So right
from top to bottom, everybody did a great job.

No one -- we all appreciate the job our police, DPW and particular the firemen do. Smith Street incident was really big. You guys, thank you very much for your response and the job you did up there was phenomenal.

But on that point, I know Sal -Mr. Verrastro and myself, we've been approached
by residents in the area that are looking to
have a sit-down meeting maybe sometime after
the holidays, Mr. Chairman. I spoke to you
briefly today about it.

We can get the utilities -- a representative of the utilities, us on Council, you know, our public safety, fire, and police department to have some kind of a town meeting with them. They are scared.

I know our fire department has been going up there since that incident a few times just on the smell of gas. Thank God nothing has occurred. But people up there are having a hard time sleeping. And I think it would behoove us to -- Joe Talutto used to say that. It would behoove us.

It would behoove us to have a meeting for them with the utilities, maybe put their minds at ease. In reference to the budget, Mike, I'll just reiterate again.

You've have done a phenomenal job.

Another point that has not been brought out besides the fact that we are lowering the mills -- 10 mills which is substantial and doing away with the trash fee, we have paid off our TAN the last four years in a row in April.

And that is unheard of. This town in particular, we were lucky if we paid it off in December sometimes, even carried it into the next year. But the last four years with Mike's guidance -- and he is a numbers man. We paid the TAN off in April every year.

And hopefully we will not need the

money that comes from this year's TAN. So my hats off to you again and everybody on Council for their hard work and our staff like I said before. And again, one last time Merry Christmas to everybody. Thank you.

have worked so hard. I just can't say thank
you enough.

Everyone I speak with are amazed at the abilities that you have and everyone else also working together as a team for this Council. So thank you again. And also the firemen and the police, I just want to say thank you so much for your hard work.

I wish you a very Merry Christmas, a safe and healthy Christmas and Happy New Year and a blessed New Year. I also wanted to mention that we lost quite a few wonderful, wonderful people in these past couple weeks, including Paul Straskulich, Thomas Voytek, Joe

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Pinto, Billy Gallagher, and, of course, Mrs. Mecca. So just to bow our heads for just a few seconds and just thank God that, you know, they were able to have wonderful lives in this town, good town but yet we're going to miss them terribly.

(Moment of Silence.)

MS. SCRIMALLI: And that's it's. just want to wish you all a Merry Christmas. And thank you all for coming. Melanie, thank you for your very kind words. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you too.

MR. MCHALE: Mr. Burke.

MR. BURKE: Yes, I'd like to thank you again, Mike, every year with the budget, unbelievable. Vito, thanks for your work on budget too, buddy. All the departments did a great job, fire, police, DPW, especially the accident up Smith Street there.

And I'd just like to wish everybody else a Merry Christmas. And thank you, Gary, too for your hard work with the Neighborhood Crime Watch. I know you put a lot time in

there. And it's been very valuable to the people of Dunmore. I appreciate that. And thank you for coming out, everybody. Merry Christmas to all. That's it, Mike.

MR. MCHALE: Mr. Verrastro.

MR. VERRASTRO: Thank you. First again, Mike, I want to echo everybody with the budget. I appreciate all that you've done with it. You do -- we bark orders out and you put them in a piece of paper try to make the numbers work. And I appreciate that. Thank you very much.

I know sometimes I can be testy when I'm barking them out to you. But it's not in any, you know, there's no disappointment in it. Also I want to wish everybody here a happy holiday -- all their holidays. I hope they're safe. Again I want to thank all the departments.

We had another good year. You know, thankfully everything worked out. Hopefully it will work out in the future. Our budgets have been coming up very good. A lot of it is because of the way we've been trying to work with each other.

We just can't spend money we don't have. And we've been working with that and we appreciate that. To give some people an idea if they are wondering what 10 mills does, I didn't -- I unfortunately forgot to write down what the assessment is.

But if you're in the Borough of

Dunmore right now and your taxes came in this

year and your taxes were approximately \$800.

You were paying just your Borough tax. Your

Borough was \$800, that's probably a little bit

more than the average person is paying. But it

is very close.

At \$800 between your garbage tax and the 10 mills, you are looking at approximately \$300 less you are going to pay this year in taxes. Approximately 150 on the 10 mills, plus the \$150 garbage fee.

And we're still keeping the Borough structurally. The infrastructure itself we're going to be moving on it so it doesn't fall apart. We want to try to maintain it the best we can and improve it because I think Dunmore is a great town.

I think we get, you know, people are

jealous of that. That's why we get so much negative publicity when a big issue comes up. That's just my opinion on it.

I don't know of too many people that leave this town and say they're leaving because they hate this town. They are leaving because they have to go someplace else for either job reasons or school or something of that nature and they don't come back because they found a job somewhere else, which is unfortunate.

But I don't know of anybody that leaves this town because they don't like something that is going on here. We're one of the few towns that have a paid fire department and it's a very good one. Our police department is one of the biggest in the area.

I think Scranton is the only one that is actually bigger than ours right now. That's a lot of weight to put on the shoulders of people that are figuring out a budget. So we do what we have to do to make those things work.

But it's for everybody's safety in this town. So I want to thank everybody for your cooperation with it. And I want to thank

everybody on Council also because even -- we don't always agree on things. We always come up with a solution so it's not a personal thing.

MR. NARDOZZI: Sal -- Mr.

Chairman --

MR. VERRASTRO: Are you going to knock me down to five minutes tonight, Paul?

MR. NARDOZZI: Six. Just on your one point about it being a great town. I don't know if anybody saw after the championship game last week, Timmy Drewes was interviewed on TV. And his comment on TV was, "If you're thinking of moving, move to Dunmore. It's a great town." So I thought it was the quote of the year.

MR. VERRASTRO: I thought you were going to chop me.

MR. NARDOZZI: No.

MR. VERRASTRO: I won't take up any more time tonight. Again, thank you everybody on Council. Thank you, Tom, Vito, Didge I probably forget to mention you. You do a lot of running around to put out the fires that aren't real fires that are nuisance things and

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we appreciate that. So thank you very much.

Have a good year everybody.

MR. MCHALE: Thank you,

Mr. Verrastro. Just to briefly, I appreciate all the kind words. These guys and the predecessors before have worked very, very hard. And I get a lot of accolades because I put the stuff together. But everybody has ideas and everybody works very, very hard.

Although I thank the kind words, it really should go to everybody here. But again thank you. To the guy sitting in the back, you weren't at the last meeting. But we did have some very good comments for you guys and what you guys have done.

The Smith Street fire as I said last meeting kind of puts it into perspective what you guys do every day -- you and the police.

And as I said the last meeting, without you guys and whatever shift was getting there first and getting people out of those houses like you did, there would be a lot more people who passed away.

So you put your lives on the line for others and I can't thank you enough for

that. When anybody ever says anything about a paid fire department when you're there in less than a minute most times, to me it pays for itself 10 times over. So I thank you personally.

DPW too, Didge, any time I call you, 10 minutes later it's taken care of. And even up on the Smith Street fire, you were on vacation and you came in to take care of this. And again, a guy who is dedicated as you is hard to find. So I thank you and your members.

A lot of the stuff that you see that the accolades that we got tonight over how things are has to do with a lot of our union members. When we were in trouble, we did sit down with these guys and they came to the table and understood. So we thank you. We really do.

On a totally side note, there is not a lot of people here. But in my other full-time job other than Council, just to keep an eye on there's a scam going on there with the IRS. If you get a -- ever get a phone call from the IRS, it's not the IRS. The IRS doesn't make phone calls.

A friend of mine -- my mother actually got it recently too. So it's a scam going on. They are saying they are going to sell your house. They're going to lien your house. The IRS doesn't do that. They'll send you notice and so on and so forth.

Please be cognizant of that and pass that along. It's going rampant. I have at least 30 clients who had this happen to them over the last couple months. So -- and that's it. So I'd like to again reiterate what everybody said. Merry Christmas to everybody, happy holidays and we'll see you next year. I'll look for a motion to adjourn.

MR. NARDOZZI: Motion.

MR. VERRASTRO: Second.

MR. MCHALE: We're adjourned.
