Great job, girls, you did awesome. You know, the families are all proud of you. But all of Dunmore is extremely proud of you guys. You did awesome. My husband and I got out to watch a few of the games, you know, but great celebration for all of you. Thank you.

proud. It was -- it's just an incredible run. I've never been more proud to be a Buck, just the electric feeling at school. That Friday was probably my favorite day I've had in my 24 years there, but just an incredible run.

These girls, they're not only great basketball players but they get it done in the classroom as well. I have a number of you in class right now seeing you get the job done. You are the true epitome of student athletes.

MR. DEMPSEY: The last time we did this $I$ was able to sign them as President. Vince gets the pleasure to now. I think it was '18 and '19 right, Mike? Was it '18 and 19? So, I think, Lisa, you have a day, right? Does anybody else have --

MR. DEMPSEY: Oh, you have one too.
This one was incredible. This team 2020 -- was it quarter finals that they shut the season down? So you lost that opportunity. 2021 there was no season, right?

MR. DEMPSEY: So you got screwed that season. And then your injury. Am I

No, but you had an amazing run.
You're an amazing group of girls. As Trip said, you're not just athletes, you're student athletes and great role models particularly for the young girls in the community and boys too. You're so lucky to have Carrie coaching you and I think you're going to have a great future.

MR. AMICO: Mrs. Brier.
MS. BRIER: I want to say
congratulations and thank you to the Lady Bucks who through their hard work and dedication brought immeasurable joy to the entire town, from COVID shortened seasons to horrible
injuries, the team overcame enormous obstacles to achieve victory in the state finals.

I want to thank Coach Toomey for her wisdom and leadership and guiding the team throughout the season, but also for her bravery in watching her daughter who had gone through so much physically get mobbed under the basket time after time. She never lost her cool. And we wish her dad had been here to see it.

We owe a huge debt of gratitude to Coach Mike O'Malley, the lone male in a sea of females whose great trove of basketbal 1 knowledge and obvious delight in the game sets the tone for the younger girls for their whole high school careers.

It's been an incredible year and incredible pleasure to watch this team throughout the 2022, 2023 season. My husband and $I$ are certified groupies and can't wait to see what they do in 1 ife and on the court. Thanks, girls.

MR. AMICO: Wow, that's tough to
follow. I kind of say the same thing every meeting. And it's old. I'm sure it's old for everybody that on I'm the stage with is being
the last person speaking -- it's my job you just say or repeat what everybody else said. And I don't want to do that. I want to personally thank you guys for, again, making the community proud.

Me, as a father of three girls, I'm super happy when girls accomplish great things. Again, it just makes me happy that you guys are where you are. I know as a few of us said, I did have the pleasure to coach some of you when my daughter played softball a few years ago.

And it's nice seeing her friends, you know, at the peak. And again, it makes me very happy. I wish this part wasn't on the record but $I$ guess $I$ don't really care. I don't think there's a better place that you could grow up than in the town of Dunmore.

If you guys played for a different town or $I$ guess I'11 say a Catholic school -- a private school, you would not have the celebration that we had for you. It's a wonderful community. And seeing how everything was put together two weeks ago after your championship within 24 hours, you know, we had a big celebration, a stage, EJ the DJ. It was
just wonderful.
And it makes me proud to be here. And you may not always think that Dunmore is a great place to be because it's not always the most fun place to be but you'll never ever find a place that cares more for their people than this town.

And for that, you know, you brought a little more pride to this town and $I$ want to say thank you. That's all I have. So congratulations. On that --

MS. BRIER: Thanks, girls.
MR. AMICO: Treasurer's report.
MR. WOLFF: Yeah, so, Mark, you're up.

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council. Your brief analysis for the month of March we had a net income of $\$ 567,000$ for the month bringing the year-to-date net income to \$895,000. The income side, real estate we had a large uptick in tax collections. Over one million dollars was collected in the month of March.

Donna, who did a great job processing all the payments and giving us a
quick turnaround. Business and licenses, we had received 25,000 for the Adams billboard 1ease for 2023. State shared revenue, 421,000 for the liquid fuel funds. And we had miscellaneous revenue of $\$ 48,000$ in escrow for the fire on 316 Mill Street which we turned around and pay the owner this upcoming month.

As far as expenses are concerned, there was a three pay period month. So obviously our employee benefit -- or the earnings were up for the month. Debt principal we paid $\$ 10,000$ on the TAN, which we borrowed 200,000. So it's halfway paid. We'11 be able to pay the balance this month. And retirement and pension, there was a $\$ 60,000$ partial MMO payment paid this month.

MS. BRIER: Mark, that was the first MMO payment.

MR. BURTON: That was the first one.
MS. BRIER: Okay, thanks.
MR. AMICO: Thank you.
MS. ZANGARDI: Thanks, Mark.
MR. WOLFF: Chris.
MR. KEARNEY: These past several weeks we've continued with our party rentals on
the weekends. We've seen both weekend days being used for parties pretty much every weekend except 1 ast weekend we were closed for Sunday for Easter.

Spring is one of our busiest times for parties. And I expect the same this year. We continue renting the gym to Riverfront Sports every Thursday for AAU practices. And that will continue until the first week of May.

Little League has also been using the batting cage frequently. Little League, they will also utilize this room for pictures the last Saturday in April.

Jog for Jude is coming up. And we continue with preparations and meetings here. The event will take place Saturday, Apri1 22 at 6:30. And there will be activities pre and post race here. As usual for this event we'11 be ordering, like, we have to get extra garbage bags, soap, paper towels, all of that stuff.

And then we'11 be closing the
building for the event, Thursday, April 20th at 3:00 because there's a lot of stuff that goes on with that. That's all.

MS. BRIER: I have a question.

Someone approached me about when we're having a meeting, the people who are doing the painting have to leave at three? Can they stay until four?

MR. KEARNEY: They leave at 3:30. We have this set up and then -- I mean, they could stay until four. It just takes a little while to put the room --

MS. BRIER: The turnaround, yeah.
We have an hour then. They just wanted to stay until four. Is that okay?

MR. KEARNEY: Yeah, that's fine.
That's fine.
MS. BRIER: The pickleball thing, the pickleball net's here.

MR. KEARNEY: They can play tomorrow.

MS. BRIER: But there's no kitchen.
MS. OVEN: Did tape the thing yet?
MR. KEARNEY: No, nobody has
contacted me. I need them to come down and look because the markings in there that are already on the floor are volleyball markings.

Some pickleball tournaments, it depends on what type of pickleball. There's
casual pickleball. There's whatever kind of pickleball. The markings are different on different courts. So I need to know what they want to play. Do they want tournament pickleball, do they want whatever?

MS. BRIER: I think just regular.
MR. KEARNEY: Our markings are set up for tournament pickleball. So if they don't want to do something else, then we'll go get tape and all of that stuff. We have the net. I just need someone to contact me and --

MS. BRIER: She'11 have somebody.
MR. KEARNEY: Do you know your
specifications?
MS. OVEN: I don't have dimensions but I play it. So if I look at it and then I could find out if it's -- I don't think we need high level tournament play. It's just regular.

MR. KEARNEY: I don't know. That's
the thing. So whoever is going to run it needs to tell me what they want in there. Do you know what I mean?

MS. OVEN: I'll take a look. We
have a net though, right?
MR. KEARNEY: Yes.

MS. BRIER: People could just come for pickup games 1 ike they do for basketball; is that correct?

MS. OVEN: You probably have to reserve a court --

MR. KEARNEY: It's really busy here.
So if we -- it would be a lot better if you say six to eight Tuesday night is pickleball on court three. And that way we could make sure that we don't have --

MS. BRIER: Yeah, can you give us some dates and times when it's free, Chris?

MR. KEARNEY: Yeah, pretty much during the week right now.

MS. BRIER: During the day it is free.

MS. OVEN: You want it at night though.

MS. BRIER: No, a lot of people want to play during the day.

MR. HALLINAN: How about in the beginning just designate one court one time and then let's see how it moves forward. Like you said, Tuesday at whatever or whatever day you come up with.

MS. BRIER: If kids come and play basketbal1, a pickup game they could -- it's stands to reason that people could come and pick up a pickleball game.

MR. KEARNEY: Right. But it's a lot easier to, 1 ike, the basketball the courts are a11 set up. That picklebal 1 net is pretty extensive. There is wheels. It's pretty heavy. It takes a while to set it up.

MS. BRIER: So if you could give us some dates and times. One day a week is probably not sufficient.

MR. KEARNEY: It's not or it is?
MS. BRIER: It's probably isn't, especially during the day because there are a lot of people who are retired who are doing it.

MR. DEMPSEY: I think what Chis is just trying to say is -- I assume there's a specific group of people that want to use it, right or no?

MR. KEARNEY: I just need to know whoever is running it -- 1 ike, the way we do things --

MS. BRIER: Like, nobody's running it though, Chris. That's the problem. It's
like anybody that shows up.
MR. AMICO: Why don't we get back so we're all on the record now and Maria is having a tough time. Let's circle back.

MS. BRIER: Okay.
MS. OVEN: Yeah, okay.
MS. BRIER: We'll figure it out.
MR. KEARNEY: I mean, it's
available. If someone wants to run something with me I have no problem. And I could give you any days that you need.

MS. BRIER: Thank you.
MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chris.
MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge and Chief Marchese are not present. Chief DeNaples.

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening,
Council. I'll start out with the Fire Department report for the month of April. The only steep expenditures this month projected was the annual service for our AMKUS hydraulic rescue tools, basically the jaws of life.

They're serviced every year. That was
\$1,478.10. There was no major issues found with them during the service.

The only other steep expenditure was
a new pair of boots, structural firefighting boots for Firefighter Waters and we purchased two helmets to have on hand, two spare helmets.

That came out of the rescue billing account, okay. And that was $\$ 980$. That was including shipping. As far as the overtime for the month of April, it was 96 hours was projected. When this report was completed on April 3, there was 53 part-time shifts put out for the Fire Department.

The only events that the Fire
Department was scheduled to participate in was the Easter egg hunt that we participate in every year up at St. Anthony's. We participated this past Saturday. We went up on the fourth to help fill bags. The on-duty staff went up and remained in service. There was no calls during that time period.

As far as call volume for the month from the first to today, currently there was 13 calls, 3 fire type calls, 2 EMS and rescue type responses, 2 hazardous conditions, non fire related calls, 2 service calls, 2 good intent calls. And combined false alarm false calls there was a total of 3 bringing that to 13.

That's it for the Fire Department side.
MS. BRIER: And, Chief, thanks for the escorts for the Lady Bucks too. I mean, that was so fun for the kids, especially the elementary kids the next day, oh, my gosh, they had a ball.

CHIEF DENAPLES: That's good stuff. Absolutely. As far as for the code enforcement end of it for the month of April, there was five new inspections that took place up to current. There may be more coming up. As far as reinspection there is 6 scheduled for a total of 11 currently between the new inspections and the reinspections.

So that's kind of where we're at. I'm sure that will pick up now with grass complaints, etc., with the spring coming up. So that's all $I$ have if there's no questions.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chief.
ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Chief.
CHIEF DENAPLES: One other thing I do have, I'm sorry. I just looked at Ted there. I met with Ted and Mike Zayac this past Friday. So we measured some areas up on the other side of the property here for the
fireworks for the Jog for Jude event.
So to stay in the perimeters of the code that we're following for consumer grade fireworks, there's a primary and secondary location that we were able to find. And the only way that would change is if we had a windy night. So they -- Ted and Greg did speak with the Little League that the secondary would be in Field C. And they did get approval.

So I'm good to -- if we're able to use them two locations. The only thing we'll need to do is keep a fire truck down here during the fireworks. They'll get here a little bit earlier. And once they're all done they do a walk around to make sure there is no hotspots and we'll break them out of here, okay?

MR. DEMPSEY: Chief, the primary will be in Field C of the outfield?

CHIEF DENAPLES: That would be the secondary. The primary is just where the dirt area meets the grass up at the parking lot. We actually marked it with some spray paint. And I know that Ted spoke with Chris about possibly having some of the cars moved during the event
in the Clay Avenue apartments just to keep them out of the way to maintain that 150 feet.

MR. DEMPSEY: Okay.
MR. O'MALLEY: That's great. Thank you.

CHIEF DENAPLES: Sorry about that.
MR. AMICO: No, perfect. Thank you.
MR. WOLFF: Number nine, public comment.

MR. AMICO: Would anyone in the public like to address Council this evening?

MR. ZAYAC: Yes, Ted Zayac. Of course we're here based on what Mr. DeNaples said. We're looking for formal approval to use the fireworks as part of our Jog for Jude celebration. So you had deferred to the Chief and he's on board.

MR. DEMPSEY: Ted, did you get approval from the Little League? I wasn't able to attend the meeting Wednesday. I didn't know if they discussed it or not. Did you talk to anybody?

MR. ZAYAC: No, I just last spoke to you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Okay.

MS. BRIER: It wouldn't be the Little League field anyway, right?

MR. ZAYAC: That would be field --
MR. DEMPSEY: Oh, the secondary
location. So you won't be on the Little League field. You're going to use a board I assume and something 1 ike that so nothing will burn the grass anyway, right?

CHIEF DENAPLES: I was under the understanding that they talked to Mr. McCarthy. Maybe I --

MR. DEMPSEY: No, I was going to go to the board meeting. It was 1 ast Wednesday. And $I$ just couldn't make it. I don't know if they discussed it and brought it up with you again.

MR. ZAYAC: They did not.
MR. DEMPSEY: Okay. I'11 take care of that.

MR. HALLINAN: I make a motion that they get approval to use the fireworks in this field here, Monroe Park.

MR. DEMPSEY: I'11 second it.
MR. AMICO: I have a motion and a second. Anyone on the question? Seeing none.

Al1 those in favor.
ALL MEMBERS: Aye.
MR. AMICO: Opposed?
(No response.)
MR. AMICO: Ayes have it.
MR. ZAYAC: And Mr. Hallinan asked at the last meeting to make sure that we not only inform the drivers but inform the neighborhood especially the apartments and we wil1 do that.

MR. HALLINAN: Okay. Best of 1 uck.
MR. ZAYAC: Great. Thank you very much.

MR. AMICO: Anyone else from the public? Seeing none.

MR. WOLFF: Public officials.
MR. AMICO: I think we all spoke tonight. The only thing $I$ did want to add so it's on the record is we do have three gentlemen that retired from service from the Borough, Gene Ruddy retired from the police department. And Joe Bianchi and Jack Sohns, both retired from the Fire Department so I would just 1 ike to want add that on the record and $I$ would 1 ike to thank those three gentlemen
for their service to our community.
MR. WOLFF: Just for the record it was Josh Ruddy.

MR. AMICO: Josh Ruddy, I'm sorry.
MS. ZANGARDI: Are we going to go in order?

MR. AMICO: We're not. We did our public comment.

MS. ZANGARDI: I would like to say a couple things just if you don't mind. I would 1ike to make a push for the rental property registration to get that going. It's a revenue generating moneymaker for the community of Dunmore.

So $I$ would really $1 i k e$ to get that ordinance pushed through if we can get that on the agenda for next -- the first week in May get the ordinance in the paper and advertised. I mean, it's just a no-brainer in my opinion.

The other thing is, Greg, the property at Calabria's, it's a rental property. They have garbage all over the place all the time. I've been on that for quite a few years to get that garbage cleaned up. And then he put a garbage can in the middle of -- I'm
sorry, a garbage dumpster in the middle of the parking lot so the garbage truck can come and 1ift of the dumpster.

However, nobody could park in there and that's fine. However, they have garbage cans in the dumpster and cars all over the place. And the other thing is, it's my understanding that dumpsters are not supposed to be on sidewalks. And so far, Gold Crown Pizza does, Calabria's does and Dom Tomaso's does and $I$ know Jay Cali rents.

So I don't know who owns that. The third thing $I$ would like to address -- or there's two more. One is 962 East Drinker Street is at the top of Drinker Street past the bridge. It's a blue house. No windows. It's an out-of-state owner and he was supposed to get -- he purchased it in 2021, still no movement, no activities.

It should be condemned frankly. But that's -- if we could get on that one, please. And the other thing, $I$ know we discussed it in the past about getting the ordinances in the community updated because some of them are so archaic.

I would be willing to volunteer and work on that with anybody who wants to obviously. But I would like to bring that to the forefront but especially the rental property registration is a revenue generating coup for the borough. And that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. AMICO: Thank you. Anybody else? Seeing none. I'll look for a motion to adjourn.
