had the privilege of serving on Council for four years in the 80s. And I always when I talk, I always thank Council because it's a thankless job.

Your social life, your personal life is remarkably changed. Your husband and wives are probably going to kill you, your children. But it's the most rewarding job too. So I thank you as a citizen for you stepping up because we all love this town. And it's the greatest town in Lackawanna County in my opinion.

I thought there would be more people because I read in the paper that you're going to raise taxes. And when I was on Council I was president. And I was the top. And unfortunately we had seven people. And it was four-three and I always was the tiebreaker.

And I just want to tell you that I'm here to support raising taxes. When we raised taxes I think they were 33, 35. My brother-in-law Tucker Hennigan came to Council and said, look, it's Christmastime. We need to pass this budget. I'm going to make a motion that we raise taxes to 53 mills.

And I gasped. Okay, I knew the minority was going to vote no so I was going to be the tiebreaker. And people complained and we all know what happened. We raised taxes and people grasped. But they paid them because we're Dunmoreans. We didn't lay anybody off at Christmastime. And that was the right thing to do.

I look at this Council and you're a team. You're working together. And that's what this town needs. We have a lot of smart people in this town, very successful business people. We need to start coming together as a community, start brainstorming how we could raise money.

I'm volunteering my time. And I have a lot of time on my hand these days. And so I'll be the first one to volunteer and help you. I have a lot of ideas, some good, some bad, some crazy, believe me, the stuff I come up with at night. But I'm asking you the best thing that happened to me was not winning the election because my life improved tremendously.

I miss the people. I miss the workers. But I didn't miss the headaches. So

I applaud you. I hope each and every one of you votes yes today because it's for the best thing for Dunmore. And we have time to fix it. Thank you.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Melanie, really appreciate it.

MR. AMICO: Chief DeNaples. And I don't know what headaches you're talking about.

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening,

Council. I just want to bring some commentary and some concerns I have about item number 13 on the agenda, motion to appoint Fire Chief Chris DeNaples as a code enforcement officer.

So here's my perspective. I've been with the Borough as Fire Chief for 15 years back when Melanie was the President of Council. And I take great pride in this job. I'm trying to do an effective and efficient job every day coming in here from the day I started and I'll continue to do that.

I just have some concerns, you know,

Joe Lorince is currently the zoning and code

enforcement officer. And, you know, I had a

discussion with him today. Today was the first

day I chatted with him. We looked at a couple addresses and showed me some paperwork. And one of the questions I posed to him was, I said, "Joe, how much of this job is code enforcement? How much of it is zoning?

And the majority of that is code enforcement from what Joe was telling me, probably about 75 percent. Joe is in a full-time position. Me and Greg had a couple discussions today. And Greg point-blank told me, you know, you'll have somebody help you with the secretarial duties like Joe does and, you know, you're going to have Attorney Perry to help you with the other stuff like Joe does.

And, you know, we'll look at this as it goes. My concern is that something is going to be lacking. It's a full time Fire Chief position. It's a full time zoning and code enforcement position. It's 75 percent of it is code enforcement.

Again, I know there's going to be that secretarial help. But Joe was even looking for somebody else from what he told me for quite a while for that code enforcement component. So what I'm here to say is, that

there may be something lacking somewhere.

I'm not saying definitely but I want this panel to know that from me directly. And again, I did have a couple conversations with Greg today. And he did say, you know, we'll offer you the help that we could, okay, as best as we possibly can. We'll look at it as it goes.

And I acknowledge and I appreciate that. It's just I believe it would be a monumental task to do two full time very important jobs, especially -- I want to add a couple more things. When I met with Councilman Amico and Greg back on the 18th of November, besides from that code enforcement component thing, the Fire Department, myself, and Vince and Attorney Perry was involved worked very, very hard to get this fire safety inspection program together, okay?

We started it. We got it in motion. And then there was some issue with it, the personnel issue that I really don't think this is the forum to get into. However, that was stopped and the union was no longer interested in doing that.

1 So now that's going to be on me to do that as well. One other component that may 2 3 come up here next year or somewhere in the 4 foreseeable future is going through some 5 ordinances, okay, and putting better language in ordinances. 6 7 So now we got, you know, the 8 additional duties as reviewing and possibly 9 updating with help of some other people, 10 ordinances, okay, code enforcement, fire safety 11 inspections and being the Fire Chief. 12 So that's all I have to say 13 regarding that. I appreciate your time. Ι 14 just wanted Council to hear that as a panel 15 collectively together. Thank you. 16 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you, Chief. 17 MS. BRIER: Thank you. 18 MR. AMICO: Anybody else from the 19 public? Seeing none. 20 MR. WOLFF: Motion to approve the 21 minutes. 22 MR. AMICO: I'll look for a motion. 23 MR. HALLINAN: I'll make that 24 motion. 25 MR. So I just want to thank both of them for their really hard work on this. And I'll say that we think it's a -- budgets are an estimate. We think that this budget will mirror what we anticipate happening in 2023. And we think it's very realistic. So we're hoping it gets passed this evening. Thank you.

But I hate to say the chickens have come home to roost. We have to finally raise taxes after so many years. And I'm not a fan of it but it's something that is necessary and has to be done. I could live with voting yes on this. Thank you.

MR. AMICO: Thank you, Mr. Hallinan.

Anyone else?

MS. BRIER: I just want to mention too we brought in the Pennsylvania Economic League to help us sort through some of the financial issues that, you know, we inherited. And this was their strong recommendation. We feel like we brought the experts in who know municipal law, municipal organizations way better than any of us do even some of the folks that are here a long time.

It's, you know, it's a difficult task. And we are really appreciative of all the work they did and their recommendations.

It was a come to Jesus meeting that we had with

1 them, you know, again, shocking that, you know, this was their recommendation. 2 But we were 3 going to follow it. We did our due diligence. 4 And we feel like it's the right thing to do. 5 MR. AMICO: Thank you, Mrs. Brier. Anyone else on the question? Seeing none. 6 A11 those in favor. 7 8 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 9 MR. AMICO: Opposed? 10 (No response.) 11 MR. AMICO: Ayes have it. 12 MR. WOLFF: Number eight, a motion 13 to authorize borrowing in the amount of up to 14 \$1,500,000 at the best available market rate 15 for the 2023 Tax Anticipation Note. MS. BRIER: This is a stop-gate measure for us. We do this every year. Some years actually, you know, the borrowing occurred but we were fortunate in the past couple of years that we haven't had to do this. But it's almost like having just something on the shelf in case of emergencies basically.

We hope to not use it. It's a loan that has to be paid back within the same year. So you just pretty much, you know, borrow from Peter to pay Paul. So we try not to use this. It's almost like a line of credit. But we need to be able to have some pot if we needed it for emergencies.

MR. AMICO: It's a nice insurance policy to have. Anybody else on the question? Seeing none. All those in favor.

ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

MR. AMICO: Opposed?

MR. AMICO: On the question, I would like to ask the tax collector Michael Ruddy to come up and just explain what this actually is, please.

MR. RUDDY: Good evening. Earlier in this year the state passed the Act 57 will specifically enable a person who purchases a new property during the course of the year if they're in a situation where they have -- don't get their tax bill, they can request that we do not hit them with the 10 percent penalty.

So it requires a number of things.

We do have a form that we received. The chain of ownership would have to occur in the last year. They would need to provide a copy of the deed. And they would simply pay the face value of their tax bill.

This applies for the borough and the school tax bills. And it's going through the entire state so every city and borough and township is taking this law and making it a resolution just as we are. Any questions from anyone?

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Mike.

And I know Cummings Insurance -- I know

Cummings Insurance I think it's their practice

either three or four months prior to our

insurance renewing does this work for us

already and contacts multiple insurance

carriers prior to December.

And I believe they've already done that. I'm not certain of it. But when Cummings Insurance goes to all the other carriers, normally they are met with laughter because our claims are so bad. And they normally decline our insurance. So I don't think there is -- first of all, I don't think you could get the general liability insurance a quote in before January 21st.

And Cummings Insurance already does this for us as a matter of course. So I don't think there is a need for that. But that's just on the question.

MS. BRIER: I would disagree. I think we have the obligation to perform our due diligence in this matter. It's an extremely expensive insurance policy. I think Cummings does a great job with it.

But like everything else, we found out that we weren't looking at many of our major expenses. And we were leaving upwards of a million dollars on the table. So this is just -- I think we could still put the RFP out. We could still get some bids.

We can see, you know, what the difference would be. And I think it's really important for us to look at these large providers and every couple years and see what's out there.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, I don't disagree with that at all. I know that they do it already as a matter of course. I just don't think any insurance carrier -- at least in the RFP we're going to have to address that it's got to be done before December 31st.

MS. BRIER: I don't think we have to do that. I don't think we have to do that. I think, you know, we can see what's out there. I think we need the 30 days. There's, you know, we're under no obligation to stay with Cummings for a whole year. You know, we don't have an agreement or anything like.

So I think again, my concern is our

1	due diligence. That's all. Just showing that
2	we're doing what we need to do for some of
3	these incredibly expensive services. And
4	again, I have no problem with Cummings
5	Insurance. They've done terrific work for us
6	for years.
7	It's just that we need as a Council
8	I think to revisit these things from time to
9	time. And that's why I think it's important to
10	do.

24	My brief summary for the November financials,
25	for the month of November he had a net loss of

\$314,000, which was basically anticipated and budgeted for which brings our year-to-date net income to \$411,000 for the year.

As far as the income side of things, the real estate collections remain minimal.

We're currently at 94 percent collection rate.

Business license and permits, we received

\$61,000 from Comcast for our franchise fees for the third quarter of 2022.

We received a \$75,000 grant for the Swinick stormwater project. Expensewise, \$44,000 for the 2022 volunteer fire relief allocation. The revenue was actually recognized in September. It was paid in November.

Our planning and zoning, \$40,000 to NEIC. Revenue from that project was recognized prior month in October. And as far as paving, we had additional \$40,000 highway construction and rebuild for the month of November. That's about it.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Mark.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Mark.

MR. DEMPSEY: Thanks, Mark.

MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you.

MR. AMICO: Mr. Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: In the past several weeks we have continued with our party rentals and biddy basketball season is fully underway. Biddy will be taking a holiday break and that -- the last two weekends of the year. We're going to plan to open early during the Christmas week vacation.

So we'll be open at 11:00 in the morning so the kids could come down. We recently had to replace two actuators in our baskets in the gym. An actuator is the motor that raises and lowers the heights of the rims so we could vary the heights between 8 and 10. That allows the little kids to play also.

Replacing these is not easy. The company that provides us the actuators charges \$1,600 per installation. Thanks to DPW workers Pat Judge, Chris Davis and Jordan Seaman, we were able to transplant and replace the actuators allowing for an uninterrupted Biddy schedule.

Their work allowed the borough to save several thousand dollars and I would like to recognize their service. I know I spoke to

1 Janet and Mike about it and I just wanted to 2 let everyone else know. That's all I have and 3 Merry Christmas. 4 MS. BRIER: Chris, do we put it out 5 on Facebook that the place is going to open early? 6 7 MR. KEARNEY: I will. I do a weekly schedule. Everybody kind of knows to look at 8 9 it. 10 MS. BRIER: Thanks. 11 MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you. 12 MR. WOLFF: Mr. Lorince. 13 MR. LORINCE: How you doing? I just 14 want to let know I gave you the e-mails. 15 e-mailed you my request. We have a couple 16 hearings. We have five hearings tomorrow. 17 did some Planning Commission. I set up all the 18 Planning Commissions for January and February. 19 And I just want to tell you it was fun working 20 with you guys. But it's time to retire. 21 you need me or want any help, just give me a 22 call. 23 MS. BRIER: How long, Joe? 24 MR. LORINCE: 32 or 33, something 25 like that. I stopped counting.

MR. AMICO: Did you start when you were 18?

MR. LORINCE: I started young.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge is still out. Chief Marchese.

CHIEF MARCHESE: During the month of November, our department responded to 863 calls for service. This is up by 116 calls from last month. For that month we had three criminal arrests, eight non traffic citations and nine traffic offenses arrest.

Personnel matters, we have two guys that were off for a couple months that are back now full time back working. And we have 15 shifts sent out for overtime due to part-time officers not being able to work.

Part-time officers worked a total of 895 hours for the month. We do have our schedule from now until January. All the shifts are filled, the holidays. And unless somebody calls off, that's really the problem we're going to have.

But right now we're full. We have two officers that we hired a few months ago that are released from their field training and

are actually taking shifts now which is going to help us. Our Christmas with Cops Toy Drive kicked off in mid November.

And we're getting a lot of donations. Everything is going pretty smooth. The PEL technology has begun the process of upgrading our server. I don't know how long it will take. Some of the stuff is backordered. But they are in the process of figuring out how they are going to migrate everything over at once. And that's it.

MR. HALLINAN: Can I ask you a question? How are we doing with the part-timers recruiting or whatever? When does the next class come out from down at Lackawanna?

CHIEF MARCHESE: I don't know. They didn't have a class. There was no interest.

This was only one or two cops so they made them go to Hazleton. So there's not a lot there.

And the only thing we did get, one of our guys that -- we have three guys on our full time eligibility list from the Civil Service test, he is getting hired in Old Forge December 20th.

We're down to two.

MR. AMICO: Thanks, Chief.

MS. BRIER: Thank you, Chief.

MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you, Chief.

MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples.

things on our monthly report for December. The report was prepared last Thursday. So we have one more expenditure since then. We had our annual service on our cascade system. That's how we fill our breathing air cylinders that we put on our backs. That was \$850.

Pump generator chassis service on our rescue truck, that's currently being done. The truck was dropped off today. And it's right around \$1,350 provided there's no other issues found during the service and inspection on it.

And we have a \$130 inspection on our engine just a state annual inspection, the DOT. We had one battery go bad for our hydraulic tools -- electric tools. So that was \$696 since the report was generated. However, we purchased that through our rescue billing account because it's the end of year, you know, it was something that was unexpected to come up

so we were able to go that route with all the financials.

So for our overtime when the report was generated last Thursday there was 80 hours of overtime scheduled. However, since then there was a couple call-offs. So we're about 24 hours on top of that approximately on top of the 80 hours.

We have 12 firefighters working.

Two have been out on long term work-related injury. One was out on a non-work related injury that happened at his residence. Not sure how long he's going to be out. It sounds like it will be a little while.

The two firefighters that were hired, I'm hoping by the beginning of January we could get them working. We did post a posting on the union Facebook page for part-timers. I only got one request so far today. And actually the guy -- gentleman is from Franklin County. So I don't know how that will work. But we sent him an application and if he e-mails and if he calls, so we'll see what happens with that. So thank you.

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Chief.

MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you, Chief.

MS. OVEN: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Public comment.

MR. AMICO: Would anyone from the public like to address Council this evening?

Mr. Duncan.

MR. DUNCAN: Gary Duncan, 117 Barton Street, same as always. First off, Joe, before I forget, congrats on the retirement. I'll miss you at Planning Commission. Now I know why you gave me -- I'm the secretary and he dropped off about 12 attendance blanks at my house. Now I know why. So congratulations on the retirement.

Just a few things, I have to thank a couple people tonight. I want to thank the Mayor. I had an incident at my house.

Somebody -- they took it upon themselves to cut our Christmas lights. So I want to thank

Officer Seamons who I don't know. And I asked Sal tonight to please tell him I said thank you.

Max, I want to thank you for the followup with the police department and getting back to me. I told you I appreciate that. But

I just wanted it on the record tonight. And, Mr. Amico, who I reached out to and who got back to me. Thanks everybody. I hope we catch them. I'm having a electrician come in now and put up motion detectors on that side of the house. This is our sixth police report. So somebody is having fun. Christmas lights. It's heartbreaking. So I want to thank all of those individuals.

I have to -- I'm on the Planning

Commission. I very much appreciate that. I

love what we do. It was nice see Mr. Kelly and

his group here tonight. I was his rehab

director when we had 15 facilities. It was

nice to see that project go forward.

But what I want to do, I want to publically acknowledge Chief DeNaples comes to every Planning Commission meeting. I appreciate his input. I have a lot of questions. It's usually, you know, our public safety employees and ingress and egress and how everything goes with the site.

So I look to the Chief as really our resource on that. And sometimes our meetings do -- they're lengthy meetings. And he's

always there with a smile on. He's always very gracious about it. He certainly provides us the input and I think as a commission we need. So for the record, thank you, Chief DeNaples on that.

I would like to ask one question just about the Mill Street -- the bridge and everything. Are we in the process of the grants or is there any update on the bridge or is it still a work in progress? That's what I want to ask.

MR. HALLINAN: I'm sure it's a work in progress.

MR. AMICO: It's a long work in process, yes. It's moving forward but they are not building us a bridge tomorrow.

MR. DUNCAN: No, I understand that. I was just wondering where we were on that. All right. That's it. I just want to wish -- I'm here for every meeting. I'm probably a pain in the rear when I ask questions. But I want to wish everybody here tonight -- I wish we had more people from this town that came to these meetings. But I appreciate what you folks do. Merry Christmas, happy 2023

1 everybody. 2 MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you. 3 MS. BRIER: Thanks, Gary. 4 MR. AMICO: Anybody else from the 5 public? Seeing none. MR. WOLFF: Public officials. 6 7 MR. AMICO: Mr. Ruddy? 8 MR. RUDDY: The only other thing I 16 want to mention was that myself and Mr. Wolff, 17 we have been working on trying to add a web pay 18 feature to the borough website so you could pay 19 your taxes, both borough and school on the 20 website. 21 We met with a couple of vendors 22 about that. And also, we're in the process of 23 upgrading our software. We're still with 24 government -- TSS government services who

provides us with the software.

They're now

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making it a web base system instead of a software that we install on our computer which is better if you have any kind of situation where the computer goes down. It's all logged in on web base so we don't have to worry about any backup computers. Other than that, I just want to say Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

MS. BRIER: Did you -- is there any documentation that if folks are able to do it online that it improves compliance? It seems like it would.

MR. RUDDY: It depends. We're looking at a couple of different vendors and trying to integrate them with the system in the back end so that we will automatically -- there could be a situation where temporarily we just pull a report and balance it on the back end ourselves. But we're hoping that they could integrate everything so that it's already in the process in the system.

And the nice thing too is the vendor that we're using is the same vendor that we're already using for existing credit card payments. So we already have a relationship with them.

So all of those kids have a bike for Christmas.

It was really just a wholesome event. It's was really great everybody that

volunteered. It was really awesome. So thanks to everybody for making that happen. And Chris and Cara Lowe, they were awesome. They really helped out and Maggie Calpin as well. They were incredible so. And Merry Christmas everyone.

And I think the rest of Council did a great job on this. So thank you everybody involved that made this happen. Merry Christmas. Thank you everybody.

I have. Joe, good luck. Good health. And not
everybody lives long enough to see it so it's a
privilege and enjoy your retirement.
