16	MR. WOLFF: Number five, motion to

4	MS. BRIER: Opposed?

6	MR. WOLFF: Number six, approve a
7	\$500 donation to Griffin Pond Animal Shelter.
8	MS. BRIER: We have a motion to
9	approve \$500 donation to Griffin Pond Animal
10	Shelter?
11	MS. ZANGARDI: I'll make that
12	motion.
13	MS. BRIER: Okay. Do we have a
14	second?
15	MR. HALLINAN: I'll second it.
16	MS. BRIER: Thanks. We have a
17	motion and a second. On the question. We do
18	donate \$500 typically every single year to the
19	animal shelter. Does anyone else have anything
20	on this question?
21	(No response.)
22	MS. BRIER: All in favor?
23	ALL MEMBERS: Aye.
24	MS. BRIER: Opposed?
25	(No response.)

1	MS. BRIER: The ayes have it.
2	MR. WOLFF: Number seven, treasurer
3	financial report. Mr. Burton.
4	MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.
5	This is my brief analysis for the month of
6	December, 2023. The month brought a financial
7	loss of \$540,000 which brought a year-to-date
8	net loss of \$564,000.
9	As far as income is concerned, real
10	estate there was minimal collections as
11	anticipated in the month of December. We did
12	receive our 2022 recycling performance grant,
13	\$15,000. Miscellaneous revenue, we received
14	\$230 (sic) for the PMIC 2022 surplus
15	distribution. That was \$230,000.
16	As far as expenses are concerned,
17	employee benefits, there was a down payment of
18	\$148,000 for a down payment for the 2023 work
19	comp. Storm water flood control, \$15,000
20	balance of the Swinick storm water project.
21	The retirement and pension, \$50,000,
22	the UFCW pension fund penalty. That was three
23	quarters. They hadn't billed us during the
24	year. And a final MMO payment of \$44,000
25	brought us up to date.

1	And just a couple brief notes on the
2	yearly loss. As you know, we're cash based, so
3	there was a bleed over from the 2022 paving
4	projects which were paid. The moneys were
5	received in '22 but paid in 2023. That
6	represented the bulk of the \$540,000 net
7	loss or 560 net loss for the year. So it's
8	more of a timing issue
9	MS. BRIER: Than an actual loss.
10	MR. BURTON: We paid for it in '23
11	but we received the money in '22.
12	MS. BRIER: So, Mark, could you just
13	explain to the folks what the MMO is because a
14	lot of people
15	MR. BURTON: The minimum monthly
16	obligation. Our actuator determines what we
17	are to contribute to the employees' pension
18	fund, and it's based on the four different
19	departments.
20	So, we have a number typically from
21	\$900,000 to 1.1 million dollars depending on
22	the actuary's calculation, which we are
23	required to pay by the end of the year.
24	We also do receive state funding,
25	approximately half from the state. So, we're

1	on the hook for the balance. We've made that
2	the past several years.
3	MS. BRIER: Thank you. Does anyone
4	have any questions?
5	(No response.)
6	ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Mark.
7	MS. BRIER: We'll wait for public
8	commentary.
9	MR. WOLFF: Mr. Kearney.
10	MR. KEARNEY: Good evening. Over
11	the past week we've returned to our busy
12	schedule here after the holidays. Biddy
13	basketball has resumed their weekly practice
14	schedules and weekend games along with various
15	school teams practicing here, as well.
16	Pickle ball is being held here on
17	Tuesday and Thursday mornings, and we have
18	continued with our party schedules on the
19	weekends in this room.
20	Upcoming events include a biddy all
21	star tournament here the second week of
22	February; Jog for Jude, Saturday, April 20th;
23	and the election, April 23rd, which is a
24	Tuesday. I figured I'd bring up some spring
25	events here to get everybody looking forward.

ı	And that S are I have.
2	ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Chris.
3	MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge.
4	MR. JUDGE: Hello there. The snow
5	storm, we had a lot of trucks break down. In
6	fact, today we were down to one truck. We sent
7	them up to Morgan's and we'll have four back
8	tomorrow. And those two are still down at
9	Scranton Dodge. I think we should try to get
10	them out of there. They're there since June.
11	MS. BRIER: Yeah, we talked about
12	that.
13	MR. WOLFF: Yeah, we can talk about
14	it.
15	MR. JUDGE: Yeah. Greg, I talked to
16	somebody today. After the meeting I'll talk to
17	you, all right?
18	MR. WOLFF: Okay.
19	MR. JUDGE: And we're collecting
20	Christmas trees. Put them out any day. Just
21	leave them in front of the house, they won't go
22	bad. Just put them out and they'll be picked
23	up. Other than that, right now we're cleaning
24	the streets.
25	MR. HALLINAN: Okay. And just so

1	the audience knows, the two trucks that are
2	down, it was a recall.
3	MR. JUDGE: Right.
4	MR. HALLINAN: So, it's kind of out
5	of our they have a union strike and
6	everything that went on with the UAW, and
7	getting parts off of them was obviously
8	we're still waiting. It's terrible. So, don't
9	think we're just waiting on two trucks and
10	leaving them there.
11	MR. JUDGE: Yeah. So, tomorrow
12	we'll have four trucks on the road. We'll get
13	the rest of the all the main streets are
14	open but the
15	MR. HALLINAN: Yeah. We got a lot
16	of cleaning up still to do.
17	MR. LOUGHNEY: Didge, did you make
18	sure that some of the drains are cleared?
19	MR. JUDGE: Tomorrow we're going to
20	clean all the drains off for this rain. Good
21	idea.
22	MR. HALLINAN: Well, I brought up
23	definitely the Drews and Valvano property down
24	on
25	MR. JUDGE: Down there.

1	MR. HALLINAN: Make sure that gets
2	cleaned up.
3	MR. JUDGE: I know where the water
4	usually
5	MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.
6	MR. JUDGE: And we'll make sure
7	they're all opened up.
8	MR. HALLINAN: Yep.
9	MR. JUDGE: All right?
10	MS. BRIER: And, Didge, we want to
11	thank you and your crew.
12	MR. JUDGE: Okay. Thank you.
13	MS. BRIER: Because I know you were
14	out all night on Saturday night.
15	MR. JUDGE: Yeah. I'll let the guys
16	know.
17	MS. BRIER: We really appreciate it.
18	MR. JUDGE: I'll let the guys know.
19	And tomorrow we'll have it all cleaned up, all
20	right?
21	ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.
22	MR. WOLFF: Chief Marchese.
23	CHIEF MARCHESE: Monthly report for
24	December. Our calls for service during the
25	month, we had 724 calls for service. This

1	number is down 15 calls from November. For the
2	year of 2023 we responded to 11,030 calls for
3	service. This amount is up from 2022. 2022 we
4	had 8,964 calls.
5	Our arrests for the month of
6	November, we had six criminal arrests, four non
7	traffic, 15 traffic arrests.
8	We have one officer still off on
9	heart and lung long term. Training, Officer
10	Burgette took part in his monthly SWAT
11	training. All officers completed their yearly
12	legal updates. They're online, 12 hours of
13	yearly training required to keep our
14	certifications.
15	Our Christmas with the Cops program
16	was a success. We'd like to thank the public,
17	everybody who donated. We were able to help
18	over 40 families this year for Christmas. And
19	that's all I got.
20	MS. BRIER: Chief, are you going to
21	address the situation on Adams Avenue?
22	CHIEF MARCHESE: No, not in the
23	public. Not right now. I mean, there's only
24	so much I could say. I mean, it's an
25	investigation, it's ongoing, you know what I

1	mean? We're kind of limited in what we could
2	say.
3	MS. BRIER: Okay. Well, if there's
4	some folks here
5	CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah, if they have
6	questions, I'll be able to answer some
7	questions, but not
8	MS. BRIER: Okay. When it comes
9	time for the public
10	CHIEF MARCHESE: I can't get too
11	specific.
12	MS. BRIER: Okay. Thank you. Is
13	Chief DeNaples here?
14	MR. WOLFF: He's not. He's off.
15	Chief DeNaples is off today. Number nine,
16	public comment.
17	MS. BRIER: Would anyone from the
18	public like to comment? If you do, please just
19	state your name and address for Michelle.
20	Ralph. There's two Ralphs here tonight.
21	MR. MARINO: Ralph Marino, Adams
22	Avenue. Thank you very much for assisting with
23	the calls recently. Janet just addressed it.
24	We had an incident on Adams Avenue New Year's
25	Eve, shots fired in the Borough of Dunmore.

1	So, when I was a kid, the only
2	people that had guns were cops, criminals and
3	hunters. I don't think these people were out
4	small game hunting New Year's Eve.
5	Sal, anything that you can do,
6	greatly appreciate it. Do we have a zoning
7	officer or somebody that can go out and check
8	on this house? I don't know that we do
9	anymore.
10	MS. BRIER: No, we do. His name is
11	Mike Brazil.
12	CHIEF MARCHESE: I do have a list of
13	the actual calls in the last two years to the
14	house, and they're minimal. We have two
15	reportable calls and maybe four calls for
16	service in three years, and they were somebody
17	saw a light on, they went to tell the resident
18	they left the car lights on, one was an
19	assault, one was a vehicle repossession. I
20	mean, that's what we've been dispatched for the
21	last three years at the house.
22	MR. MARINO: Right. Okay. That's
23	past history. This is current.
24	CHIEF MARCHESE: Correct. We did
25	talk to the landlord.

1	MR. MARINO: Okay. Can you send
2	somebody down to have the house inspected? I
3	don't know how many families are there, I don't
4	know who is there. We have no contact with
5	these people at all.
6	But I'm concerned for the new
7	neighbors that moved in, little kids in the
8	neighborhood, elderly people in the
9	neighborhood. I'm one of the young guys, so
10	you could imagine what this neighborhood is
11	like, you know.
12	And we've never had, you just said
13	it, we haven't had any trouble at all ever.
14	All of a sudden there's a shooting, and one of
15	the neighbors said return fire. He's
16	ex-military, and he's telling me shots fired
17	and return fire. I'm really concerned.
18	MAYOR CONWAY: Mr. Marino, I know
19	Chief Marchese has been sending out guys on
20	foot patrol
21	MR. MARINO: Thank you.
22	MAYOR CONWAY: as well as driving

by every night multiple times a night and

running traffic in that area, too, because if

we're running traffic and things look a little

23

1	bit off, we can maybe, you know, see a problem
2	coming ahead of time.
3	But, again, awful incident that
4	happened New Year's Eve, totally unacceptable
5	in that area.
6	MS. BRIER: Or anywhere.
7	MAYOR CONWAY: Anywhere.
8	MR. MARINO: And while I have a
9	couple of the officers here, once the calls
10	were made, and, Sal, the officers did come
11	down, I saw the cars go by, everybody
12	disappeared, they're back. I just wanted to
13	tell you, they're back today. So, the cars are
14	back.
15	Didge picked up the garbage the
16	other day, it was a disaster. It looked like
17	they were cleaning out the house. I don't know
18	that that's the case, but today they're back.
19	So, anything that you could do, you guys,
20	greatly appreciated.
21	MR. HALLINAN: Yeah. And on that
22	point, as I said earlier, and I'm not going to
23	get into, I know it was an isolated incident,
24	as it's called, an isolated incident up at Penn

State, I just want to make sure that these so

1	called isolated incidents, we want to be
2	proactive, Chief, on trying to stop these
3	things from happening other places in the
4	borough.
5	CHIEF MARCHESE: We do have a
6	meeting, myself and Detective Lydon, with the
7	county and the state and the DA's Office. So
8	we're going to be working on this.
9	MR. HALLINAN: Thank you very much.
10	I appreciate that.
11	MR. O'MALLEY: One of my goals
12	coming into Council two years ago was a rental
13	registration ordinance, kind of like what
14	Scranton has. So then we would know who's in
15	the apartments, who owns the apartments, who
16	the manager of the apartments are throughout
17	the borough.
18	But the only thing is how to fund it
19	and, you know, who are we going to put the work
20	on. So, those logistics have to be
21	straightened out, but that's one of my goals.
22	MR. MARINO: Thank you very much.
23	And, again, thank you for the response that
24	I called a lot of people in this room, thank

you very much for the response. I appreciate

1	it.
2	ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.
3	MR. MARINO: Thank you.
4	MS. BRIER: Would anyone else like
5	to address Council? Sure. Barbara. Just
6	state your name and address, Barb.
7	MS. WEBER: It's Barbara Weber. I
8	live at 1743 Adams Avenue in Dunmore. My only
9	question is this, to date, you have no code
10	that you have looked up to see how many units
11	are rented in that house and if all the units
12	have bathrooms and kitchens, is that what
13	you're saying, that that's not part of the
14	investigation right now?
15	MR. WOLFF: No, ma'am. We did send
16	out our zoning the other day and we are working
17	on that. We haven't neglected that, we are
18	looking into that.
19	MR. HALLINAN: Yeah. The rumor
20	we're hearing is it's a three unit when it
21	should only be a two unit. So it'll be looked
22	into by our zoning officer.
23	MS. WEBER: So, what you're saying
24	is three

MR. HALLINAN: If there are three.

1	I don't know the background on that.
2	MS. WEBER: Not four?
3	MR. HALLINAN: I couldn't tell you.
4	If there are four, then
5	MR. WOLFF: We don't know for sure,
6	so, you know, we don't want to speculate on
7	that.
8	MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, we don't want
9	to say something that
10	MR. LOUGHNEY: If I may, Mr. Wolff,
11	that was checked and there's three apartments
12	in there?
13	MR. WOLFF: We don't know.
14	MR. LOUGHNEY: We don't know?
15	MR. WOLFF: We don't know.
16	MR. LOUGHNEY: When was it checked?
17	MR. WOLFF: Mike went by Thursday, I
18	think.
19	MR. LOUGHNEY: Okay. So, if he's in
20	violation, he could be shut down?
21	MR. WOLFF: Yes. But we obviously
22	need there has to be something there for us
23	to
24	MR. LOUGHNEY: Well, how does
25	someone get in to inspect it?

1	MR. WOLFF: That's what they're
2	working on now. And we're tracking down
3	NEIC's working on it, our third party, so we
4	are doing everything we can on that end.
5	MR. LOUGHNEY: If he is in
6	violation, he will be shut down, just so the
7	residents know?
8	MR. WOLFF: If he's in any
9	violation, we will pursue it to the fullest.
10	MS. WEBER: And the second question
11	I have is it a Section 8?
12	MR. WOLFF: That I don't know.
13	Again, there's things there, too, that you
14	can't just prohibit that. So there's a whole
15	lot going on there, so we'd have to just
16	MS. ZANGARDI: He can have Section 8
17	if it's approved and if it's inspected.
18	MS. WEBER: That's not the question,
19	though. Can you have Section 8 and have guns
20	and drugs? That's my question.
21	MS. ZANGARDI: But it's still an
22	open investigation.
23	MS. BRIER: But if it was a Section
24	8 situation then they could become involved. I

don't think it is, Barb, but we can look at

1	that for sure.
2	I didn't even think of that, because
3	if it was and there's those types of issues,
4	that's a whole different story because that
5	would be under the feds, basically.
6	MS. ZANGARDI: Right.
7	MS. BRIER: So, we'll look into that
8	because that might be an avenue.
9	MS. WEBER: If you understand, I'm
10	standing up here and I'm afraid.
11	MS. BRIER: And we do understand
12	that.
13	MR. HALLINAN: Rightfully so.
14	MS. ZANGARDI: Absolutely. Right.
15	MS. BRIER: Thank you. Thanks for
16	coming.
17	MR. ROGATO: Good evening. Ralph
18	Rogato, 703 Smith Street in Dunmore. You spoke
19	about grant money, \$5,000, did they allocate
20	that for anything? The person that spoke about
21	the grant money, the finance director.
22	MR. BURTON: Was it allocated for
23	anything? Not particularly.
24	MR. ROGATO: No? So it could be
25	used for almost anything?

1 MR. BURTON: Yeah.

MR. ROGATO: Okay. I think if somebody from the borough drove around the borough, you could tell who the normal residents are and who the renters are. Most of the older people, including myself now that I'm one of them, have one garbage can out, one recycling container out and a box for the cardboard and the paper, and all the rentals have bags of garbage piled up this high because they do not recycle.

So, maybe an avenue to find out how many units are in place, make it mandatory that they report everything for recycling purposes and use the \$5,000 towards that. You'd have to know the owner's name, not an incorporation, and this way here you have someone to go after.

Down in North Carolina, if you recycle your papers and you don't take the little plastic window out, the road department puts a sticker on the side of your bin and it says you're in violation. It has a big one on it.

And the second one, that's a five dollar fine, and it keeps going up every five

ı	dorrars every time you do it. Then after so
2	many times, get the owner of the property
3	involved. But you know where the rentals are.
4	It's very easy to pick them out.
5	And just so everyone knows this,
6	I've lived in Dunmore a long time, there's beer
7	very few incidents with guns. You are right,
8	New Year's Eve, people shooting guns off to
9	celebrate the New Year's Eve, and like the
10	Chief said, and I'm a retired police chief, I
11	was asked one time, How many gun incidents have
12	you responded to? If we had 20,000 calls last
13	year, Sal, you said 20,000?
14	CHIEF MARCHESE: Seventeen, I think.
15	MR. ROGATO: Seventeen? They
16	responded to 17,000, because every time one of
17	those officers walk into a domestic and stuff,
18	they have a gun with them, and they could be
19	very easily taken off of them and overpowered.
20	I know the police department's doing
21	the best they can on that one, and they're very
22	limited on what they could say.
23	I questioned, I sent in two acts of
24	information. Mr. Wolff, do you have either one
25	of those?

1	MR. WOLFF: I mailed them to you,
2	actually I handed it over to Mickey, but I
3	mailed them to you because you didn't have a
4	phone number or an e-mail on there, so it was
5	actually an extension, because we need more
6	time to work on it.
7	MR. ROGATO: Okay.
8	MR. WOLFF: If it didn't come in the
9	mail today, it was mailed out Friday.
10	MR. ROGATO: Okay. The other thing
11	I asked about was saving the borough in the
12	terms of saving the borough money. I was
13	looking at the different departments, who's on
14	salary, who's on hourly, what are our working
15	hours, because I came in a couple times just
16	before 4:00 because I have things to do, and
17	you weren't available.
18	I have to go over to the fire
19	company, and if the fire chief isn't around, I
20	have to go bother the police department
21	secretary, and then you have to come over from
22	your office, the fire chief has to come over.
23	We talked about the fire
24	extinguishers, that's part of that, and those
25	companies involved. And you mentioned to me,

1	you asked me a question, then you asked the
2	borough secretary to get the police about an
3	attorney and about something that happened with
4	your son, but I'm not gonna bring that up now,
5	but we will take it up just so you know.
6	MS. BRIER: That's not a subject
7	that we could speak about.
8	MR. ROGATO: Well, now he requested
9	the borough secretary to contact the police to
10	come in to make me tell him where I heard
11	something, which is unethical.
12	MS. BRIER: That's not appropriate
13	for this meeting, Ralph. And I think your five
14	minutes are up.
15	MR. WOLFF: It's close. He's got
16	another minute.
17	MS. BRIER: Okay. Go ahead.
18	MR. ROGATO: I think that's it.
19	MS. BRIER: Thank you. Anyone else
20	would like sure.
21	MR. CROTH: My name is Jeremy Croth
22	(phonetic). I live at 523 South Blakely
23	Street. Mine is more of a concern than
24	anything. The alley behind my house, which I
25	believe is First Street, I don't know why to

get it either, one, plowed after or during a storm, or to get potholes repaired I have to contact a Council member or the borough manager.

I've lived there four years and I can count almost every time that when we've had a major snowfall, I've had to call to get the road plowed. It's completely 100 percent unacceptable.

I understand things break down. I plowed snow for 17 years. When I would come home, and I've come home in major snow storms in the past with a chained crew cab and had to push snow down the alley, that should never ever happen.

MS. BRIER: No.

MR. CROTH: And then when it does, like, say springtime, I know how things work, I work for the State, in the springtime I don't call and complain, like, as soon as the snow's gone. I wait until the end of May, the middle of June, because I know we're busy and I know other roads take higher priority.

But when we're two and a half or three months past the freeze cycle, there's

1	just no excuse. And then when I do call and
2	some things get done, it's half done or it's
3	done completely substandard.
4	MS. BRIER: I understand. We talked
5	to Didge about that. Is it plowed now?
6	MR. CROTH: There is a lot left in
7	it, but it's plowed, but that's only because it
8	sat there for 24 hours not touched.
9	MR. HALLINAN: And, again, no
10	excuses, and I will tell you, yes, we did have
11	vehicles break down. As you know, with
12	PennDOT, we prioritize ambulance routes or
13	whatever, bus routes.
14	MR. CROTH: Correct.
15	MR. HALLINAN: And you understand
16	that.
17	MR. CROTH: Yes.
18	MR. HALLINAN: We do that more than
19	anybody with the State.
20	MR. CROTH: That's why this is the
21	first time in four years I've ever showed up.
22	MR. HALLINAN: Yeah. So, again,
23	we'll try and get to you as soon as possible,
24	and thank you for understanding that, because
25	obviously it's an alley rather than Dudley

1	Street.
2	MR. CROTH: Sure. I get that.
3	MR. HALLINAN: So, there is a
4	pecking order. And, please, I will tell you
5	this, any time please don't feel call any
6	time that you feel something, you know?
7	MR. CROTH: I try not to be a pain,
8	I really do, because I know what it's like to
9	be on Didgy's end of it, I've lived it for 17
10	years, it's terrible.
11	MR. HALLINAN: And the other side of
12	it too is if a driver changes drivers,
13	sometimes they don't know about that alley as
14	far as, like, you know, because they do switch
15	routes.
16	MR. CROTH: Sure.

20	Who is our inspector in Dunmore?
21	Who is our inspector? I have no idea. Do we
22	have an inspector?
23	MS. BRIER: Mike Brazil.
24	MR. WOLFF: For Section 8?

MR. LUCIANO: For anything. For

1	anything in
2	MS. BRIER: No, he's our code
3	enforcement.
4	MR. LUCIANO: I beg your pardon.
5	MS. BRIER: Mike Brazil.
6	MR. LUCIANO: Mike Brazil?
7	MS. BRIER: Yes.
8	MR. LUCIANO: Is Mike Brazil present
9	today?
10	MS. BRIER: No, he's not.
11	MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples, the fire
12	chief, helps with it, as well.
13	MR. LUCIANO: Okay.
14	MR. HALLINAN: And Section 8 would
15	be out of Lackawanna County Housing
16	MR. LUCIANO: I understand that.
17	MR. HALLINAN: Yes.
18	MR. LUCIANO: They all connect.
19	MR. HALLINAN: Correct.
20	MR. LUCIANO: I had property where I
21	had Section 8, but at one time Section 8 was
22	controlled. It's not controlled now, okay?
23	I'm not here to blast anybody, please. My
24	wife's going to be pissed that I'm here.
25	She'll get over it. She'll get over it.

1	But the bottom line is what's
2	happening here is our town is dying. I don't
3	know if you realize how our town is dying. We
4	have these people, I'm appalled when I go to
5	the if I grab a coffee at the station right
6	across from the borough building, I'm appalled
7	to see what goes on there, absolutely appalled.

And then we have a shooting, you know, down on Clay Avenue. Unacceptable.

Totally unacceptable.

We have a town here, I know every one of you, except you, young lady, I apologize, but I know every one of you and every one of your backgrounds, you were my kids, you were in my house, all great. That's Dunmore.

We have a base in Swinick that we have such a neighborhood in Swinick that it's phenomenal. People are lined up to buy our homes, even though DeNaples is in our back yard. We accept that. We pay the money to accept that.

But the bottom line is what I can't understand is how these absentee landlords could come in and buy up properties and not

have any accountability to our borough. It's
bewildering to me.
You know, I could go on and on, you

You know, I could go on and on, you don't have enough time in your lifetime for me to keep going on and on about this, but I have three -- I mean, I'm on the other side of the hill, I'm rolling down the hill, but I have three beautiful grandchildren and two children that I care a great deal, and the rest of my family, but we really need to get a Section 8 committee here.

I mean, 20 years ago, if you remember Tucker Hennigan and Mike Cummings, they put a moratorium on Section 8 and it worked phenomenal, absolutely phenomenal. Within three years we had no Section 8s. We had no Section 8, and every one was monitored, was monitored through our borough inspector. Our borough inspector, what's his name again?

MR. HALLINAN: Mike Brazil.

MS. BRIER: Mike Brazil.

MR. LUCIANO: I'm going to write that down, because I don't know who the hell he is. But the bottom line is he's got to be accountable. He's got to be accountable to us,

1	the taxpayers.
2	You know, our dollars are being
3	spent, you know, I mean, I have a large
4	investment that my wife and I busted our butts
5	to live in Swinick, to live comfortable in a
6	beautiful section, and to have this all around
7	us, to have a cancer, is beyond me. It's
8	beyond me.
9	So, it's your job to take care of
10	this, you know. And I will apologize, I don't
11	mean to sound emotional, but it's an emotional
12	thing for me when I see Dunmore, what's
13	happening to it. It's very emotional. But
14	thank you for your time.
15	ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.
16	MR. LOUGHNEY: Joe, just on that.
17	MR. LUCIANO: Yes, sir.
18	MR. LOUGHNEY: And I appreciate
19	Mr. O'Malley what he said before with the
20	landlord or however you're going to put it,
21	Tripp
22	MS. BRIER: Rental registration.
23	MR. LOUGHNEY: to get a
24	registration, and I think, even like that,
25	maybe a committee together where people have to

1	be they have to submit who's the owner,
2	who's maintaining that lot.
3	MR. LUCIANO: Absolutely.
4	MR. LOUGHNEY: Because I used to get
5	calls and people would say who you can't
6	find them. And we're sending our DPW or our
7	young summer program help to maintain the
8	grass. That's not their job.
9	MR. LUCIANO: No.
10	MR. LOUGHNEY: We should be able to
11	get in touch with whoever the owners are, just
12	like that incident down on Adams Avenue, we
13	should know immediately who they are without
14	any question.
15	So, I applaud Mr. O'Malley for doing
16	what he's doing. I'd like to help out with
17	that, Tripp. I'd like to help out with that.
18	MR. ROGATO: I'll volunteer from the
19	civilian side to be on that committee.
20	MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you.
21	MR. LUCIANO: That could go as far
22	as even as to work with some of these realtors.
23	I'm not trying to steal your shoulder. I don't
24	want you to live in Section 8 housing, I'm just

trying to help here. We want to take care of

1 this.

2	MAYOR CONWAY: I see it from my
3	business. What I see happening is, again, with
4	out-of-town buyers that aren't from Dunmore, we
5	don't know who they are, and they buy in these
6	LLCs under really ambiguous addresses that you
7	can't track down. The problem that I see as a
8	seller of a property in the borough, people
9	want to live here, and that's phenomenal.

MR. LUCIANO: Right.

MAYOR CONWAY: But if you're going to sell your house for \$200,000 and somebody from Dunmore says, I want to buy your house for \$200,000, somebody from New York comes in and says, I want to buy it for 250.

MR. LUCIANO: Well, sure.

MAYOR CONWAY: Cash. No inspection.

Like, basically 250 -- 50,000 more in your

pocket. The problem I see is, how do you then

tell that Dunmore resident who they can and

can't sell the house to.

So, again, it comes down to rental registrations, you know, penalties for absentee landlords. We're working on that. I want to see, outside of a registration, which would

take a very -- it would take a long time to implement because there are so many rental properties in Dunmore, not that it can't be done, I would like to see not the good landlords be, you know, penalized, I want to see the bad landlords be penalized.

And I think there's ways where we can do that in a faster manner where, whether you want to call it a slumlord ordinance, or you could call it whatever you want, where, you know, in you're a tenant living in a property that's run by a slumlord and you want to call the borough and complain because you can't go to your landlord, because, again, you don't know where he is, you can't get in touch with him, you can call the borough, the borough can send an inspector, and if the inspector deems that the heat doesn't work, the plumbing doesn't work, the electrical is shot, then, you know, the borough can then fine that landlord and then we could put, you know, we could have a public list here.

It can be some sort of public shaming too where if I'm a tenant and I want to rent in Dunmore, I can go to the Dunmore

borough website and see who the slumlords are.
If that's a property owner in the borough
that's on the slumlord list, I'm going to, you
know, not rent from that person.
And, again, we could fine them, lien
them, whatever we could do, but there's ways we
can try to mitigate this.
And the thing that happened on Adams
Avenue, I mean, I live two blocks away, I have
a seven-month-old daughter, it's shocking that
happened. It shouldn't happen anywhere in
Dunmore. And I know the Chief's working on it,
I know Detective Lydon, I know Officer Grunza
and Burgette are over there, they're doing foot
patrols
MR. LUCIANO: Well, it's the world
we live in unfortunately, you know, and it's
with or without these people, unfortunately
everybody's armed today, for good reason.
MS. BRIER: You know, Mr. Luciano, I
was thinking, maybe we can talk to the County
and they've got to have a list of which houses
are Section 8 houses. So, I would give them a
call tomorrow.

19	drove by. How would he know who's in the house
20	if he drove by?
21	One big deal about new rentals is
22	they throw electrical boxes on the house. It
23	used to be one, now it's four. Well there's a
24	sure hit that somebody else is living in the
25	house.

1	He rents to the people at night, he
2	takes the if you want to meet him, go the
3	first of the month right at dusk because that's
4	when he comes to collect all the cash payments
5	for the housing. And knowing who's in that
6	house, if it's Section 8, Lackawanna County
7	Housing Authority has a list of who's in the
8	house.
9	MR HALLINAN: Absolutely

MRS. MARINO: The plates in front of the house would tell you who's in the house. At one time we had 20 cars in the driveway. Most of them were out of state plates. It's been a problem for 50 years.

Mr. O'Malley, I give you credit for trying to do the thing. Why is it taking two years? You can apply for grants, can't you?

MR. O'MALLEY: I don't know about grants for that. It's just the thing is with the rental registration, see, Scranton, it would kind of be modeled after Scranton, everybody, we all have copies of that, but Scranton has so many rentals that it pays for itself. With Dunmore, it would be adding

6	MR. O'MALLEY: That would be part of
7	it.
8	MRS. MARINO: years, I never
9	rented to the low lives he's renting to. Vince
10	Amico who used to sit on this panel has two
11	rentals in the back, he doesn't rent to low
12	lives. There's another one in the back, not
13	great, but it's not as bad as this one.
14	So, there are people that are
15	renting on my block that aren't renting to the
16	low lives. He's the only one that's doing it,
17	but he doesn't live in Dunmore. He lives in
18	Dickson City. Nowhere shots were fired by his
19	house Friday night on New Year's Eve, I bet.
20	Besides the fact I mentioned to
21	Mayor Conway, there's two children living in
22	that house that are about seven years old. I
23	don't know what apartment they're in. Somebody
24	picks them up for school, somebody drops them
25	off at night. Did anybody call CYS the night

1	of the shooting to see if those kids were dead
2	or alive? No, I guess not. By the looks on
3	everybody's faces, no, nobody did.
4	MR. HALLINAN: Well, I don't want to
5	interrupt, they did tell us the kids, if I'm
6	not mistaken, weren't there that night.
7	MRS. MARINO: That night.
8	MR. HALLINAN: Well, when the night
9	of the shooting you're asking about
10	MRS. MARINO: Right.
11	MR. HALLINAN: they weren't
12	there.
13	MRS. MARINO: Okay. So, did we go
14	into the apartments that night? Because it was
15	the state police that were there. It wasn't
16	our locals. When I woke up at 6:30, there was
17	all state cops there.
18	MS. BRIER: No, our police were
19	there.
20	MR. HALLINAN: Okay. And, again,
21	there's only so much he could say.
22	MRS. MARINO: I get that.
23	MR. HALLINAN: It's an active
24	investigation.

MS. BRIER: But we were there,

1	Theresa.
2	MRS. MARINO: But how long is it
3	going to take to get the report?
4	MR. LOUGHNEY: Theresa, if I may,
5	the bottom line is Mr. Wolff is going to
6	inspect that house, and if he's in violation,
7	he's going to be shut down immediately.
8	MRS. MARINO: They've never shut him
9	down. they've never shut him down.
10	MR. LOUGHNEY: I am begging you to
11	do that. If he's in violation, shut him down.
12	MRS. MARINO: I asked Joe Lorince, I
13	can't tell you how many times I called little
14	Joe Lorince when he was the code inspector, I
15	don't think he ever even went out. He drove by
16	again, just like the rest of them do.
17	A couple months ago we had the whole
18	Lackawanna College basketball team living in
19	the house. They stayed maybe a month. They
20	moved out at 9:30 at night with a Ryder truck.
21	Like, what would you guys be doing if this was
22	at your house?
23	MR. HALLINAN: I'd be sitting here
24	like you.
25	MRS. MARINO: Right.

1	MR. HALLINAN: Absolutely.
2	MRS. MARINO: Right. So, can you
3	give me a tentative date of when we're going to
4	have the company in, because I was told it was
5	an outside code company?
6	MR. WOLFF: So, we coordinate with
7	an outside code company, so between Chief
8	DeNaples and Mike Brazil, they're looking. And
9	NEIC, the third party, they're looking into it.
10	I mean, we can't just enter buildings.
11	MRS. MARINO: Well, I was told on
12	Monday they were giving him notice, then they
13	had to give them notice. Has that been done?
14	MR. WOLFF: Well, I don't know who
15	told you that. I know that we're in the
16	beginning stages of it, so
17	MRS. MARINO: Well, Chief Marchese
18	met with them on Tuesday, I was told. Right,
19	the landlord?
20	CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah. I talked to
21	him.
22	MRS. MARINO: Okay. So, did you
23	give him notice at that point that you were
24	going to come in and inspect?
25	CHIEF MARCHESE: I don't know who

1	does the inspections.
2	MR. LOUGHNEY: How do we get in the
3	house to inspect?
4	MR. WOLFF: Well, there's legal
5	things, we can't that's what I'm implying.
6	Like, in driving by, there's no visual things
7	to say, Hey, the roof is falling in. There's
8	nothing. So, that's what we're working on,
9	find a way to get in there and inspect the
10	place.
11	MR. LOUGHNEY: There were how many
12	people in the house that night, fifty or so?
13	Isn't there a violation there, Chief?
14	CHIEF MARCHESE: The names we have
15	when we were there, 30.
16	MR. LOUGHNEY: Thirty?
17	(Inaudible crosstalk.)
18	MRS. MARINO: This is the neighbor
19	that lives across the street from us, he was
20	home that night, and Barbara. I was not home
21	that night it occurred.
22	All I'm asking is when are you going
23	to give him notice to give his tenants notice
24	that you're going in to check?

MR. WOLFF: I will follow up with

1	that tomorrow. We just got some of this
2	information, because I'll be honest with you,
3	we don't have, from the code enforcement side,
4	Mike Brazil checking on it, we don't have one
5	single file on this place.
6	MRS. MARINO: That's because they
7	never went and looked after I called several
8	times.
9	MR. WOLFF: I can't speak for the
10	past, and I apologize for that, but I could
11	tell you that we are extremely aggressive in
12	our code enforcement in our blight that we're
13	doing.
14	At one of the meetings last year I
15	mentioned that between our office staff who
16	helps with the clerical stuff and our
17	inspectors, we sent out 60-some letters for
18	code and blight violations, 40-some of them
19	came in compliance right away.
20	So, 60-some for this small town,
21	that's a sizable amount, and 40-some responded
22	and corrected it. The other 20 or so, you
23	know, we're following up on.
24	I just spoke to Council, they gave

me the go ahead, we're going to put bids out to

1	tear down some blighted buildings. So, we are
2	doing everything we possibly can in the code
3	enforcement side of it, but we do obviously
4	have to follow the rules and fall within the
5	law.
6	So, we are working on it as
7	diligently as we possibly can, and just
8	understand, and this is the we have no
9	record of that place, and I apologize if you
10	MRS. MARINO: You have no record of
11	the building?
12	MR. WOLFF: We do not in the code
13	MR. LOUGHNEY: He means violations.
14	MRS. MARINO: Oh, violations. Oh.
15	MR. WOLFF: I mean violations.
16	Yeah.
17	MRS. MARINO: Does he pay his taxes
18	on time? Did anybody look at that?
19	MR. WOLFF: I have no idea.
20	MRS. MARINO: Does anybody know
21	that?
22	MS. ZANGARDI: That would be county,
23	but, yeah, we could certainly look at it.
24	MR. WOLFF: So, we are working on
25	it.

1	MRS. MARINO: Can't somebody look
2	that up?
3	MR. LOUGHNEY: You can't go after
4	him for that, Theresa.
5	MRS. MARINO: For tax evasion?
6	MR. LOUGHNEY: The county could,
7	but, I mean, we could put a lien against his
8	house, but we can't
9	MRS. MARINO: Yeah.
10	MR. LOUGHNEY: The thing is we got
11	to get in to see what's there, and once we get
12	in and deem if it's a three or a four, if he's
13	on the books for a three and he has four, you
14	shut him right down. No question.
15	MR. WOLFF: And that will happen.
16	Like I said, we are extremely aggressive in
17	what we can do in those matters. We obviously
18	have to follow the rules and regulations, but
19	we are as aggressive as we possibly can.
20	MRS. MARINO: I mean, I only heard
21	this secondhand, were the people that were
22	taken out of there that night Dunmore
23	residents? Kids? From what I heard
24	Detective Lydon said to me he thought it was a
25	big beer party. Were they Dunmore kids having

1	a beer party or was it Hazleton and Scranton
2	and
3	CHIEF MARCHESE: Not all Dunmore.
4	MR. LOUGHNEY: Were there any
5	arrests made?
6	MR. HALLINAN: Were they juveniles?
7	CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes.
8	MR. HALLINAN: Were they under age?
9	CHIEF MARCHESE: Between the ages of
10	18 and 20.
11	MRS. MARINO: So, I work at the
12	county and I know you said you're having a
13	meeting with downtown, they have more grants
14	down there for opoid abuse, drug, gang, you
15	know, they might be able to help you out with
16	all the grants they have right now, or the
17	detectives in the county, maybe.
18	CHIEF MARCHESE: That's what we're
19	working on.
20	MRS. MARINO: Okay. Well, I'm going
21	to come back next week and see if maybe we know
22	when we're going to get into the house again
23	and look it up.
24	MS. ZANGARDI: Next month.
25	MRS. MARINO: No. Let's do it one

1	week and see if we could get let's try
2	another week.
3	MS. BRIER: Barb, did you want to
4	speak again?
5	MS. WEBER: Yes, I do.
6	MS. BRIER: You have to come up.
7	MS. WEBER: I understand it's an
8	investigation. I want to know why a shooting
9	in Hanover Township gets into the paper and on
10	the news. There was one report, which wasn't
11	accurate on this, and then the veil fell and
12	not a resident here heard about this.
13	MRS. MARINO: I just had somebody in
14	the parking lot ask me about it. How come that
15	didn't make the paper?
16	MS. WEBER: It did not make the
17	paper.
18	MS. BRIER: We have no control over
19	the paper, Barb, or the news. We have no
20	control over the news or the paper.
21	MS. WEBER: I'm not saying you
22	control it, but I don't understand how a
23	shooting gets passed up.
24	MS. BRIER: Well, they choose what

they report; we don't. We don't choose that.

1	MRS. MARINO: We don't send crime
2	reports to the paper?
3	MS. BRIER: No.
4	MS. WEBER: But news was there.
5	MS. BRIER: Well, I don't know, we
6	didn't report it because we have nothing to do
7	with the news, you know?
8	MS. WEBER: Okay. I just find it
9	hard to understand.
10	MS. BRIER: I mean, you'd have to
11	call the Times and
12	MS. ZANGARDI: It was on TV. I saw
13	it myself on TV.
14	MS. WEBER: One clip, and that was
15	taken off, and it wasn't accurate.
16	MS. BRIER: And, once again, we have
17	nothing to do with how things get reported or
18	what gets reported in the news.
19	MS. WEBER: Okay. And I get it. I
20	get it, it just is very curious.
21	MS. BRIER: Yeah, it is curious.
22	Does anyone else have a comment from the
23	audience? Yes?
24	MR. BARRETT: Hello. My name is

Colton Barrett. I live on 1728 Adams Avenue in

1	an apartment house. I just want to say that
2	almost every week there's a conflict over
3	there, whether it's a fist fight on the porch
4	or if the cops were called the one time and
5	three cops surrounded the house, and I think,
6	I've been speaking to the neighbors, we're all
7	very scared.
8	And I was having a New Year's party,
9	too, it was so nerve racking that we all had to
10	take our friends out there together to their
11	cars to go home, and my one friend wasn't even
12	able to go home because it got so violent out
13	there, and I just please ask, I'm just asking
14	that this doesn't get covered up and we do
15	something to be proactive about the situation.
16	MAYOR CONWAY: Mr. Barrett, if you
17	do see anything like fist fights or anything,
18	please call the officers.
19	MS. ZANGARDI: Call the police.
20	MAYOR CONWAY: Please call the
21	officers. Like that night, if you see
22	anything, like, please. Again, we have
23	officers here, they're very pro like, if you

MS. BRIER: Nothing's getting

call, they'll be there.

1	covered up.
2	MAYOR CONWAY: Yeah. If you see
3	anything like that, please just call and
4	they'll come down and check it out.
5	MR. BARRETT: Thank you.
6	MR. LOUGHNEY: I've talked to your
7	dad
8	MR. BARRETT: My grandfather.
9	MR. LOUGHNEY: and after talking
10	to him, I've talked to the mayor, and the
11	mayor, without question, he told me, he says,
12	Nibs, I have foot patrol and I have cars going
13	by. And I applaud the mayor for doing that.
14	And as far as anything else, I mean,
15	we can't station a guy there, this is what I
16	told your dad, we can't station a guy there,
17	but it's part of the patrol that is now
18	incorporated in the daily shift.
19	MR. BARRETT: Okay.
20	MR. LOUGHNEY: So, I mean, if you
21	see something, call.
22	MR. BARRETT: I will also say that
23	I've had a couple other issues at the house. I
24	don't know if they're related. Somebody keeps

coming to my house, I'm going to start calling

1	the cops over this because it's getting
2	ridiculous, somebody keeps coming to my house,
3	ringing the doorbell, banging on the door.
4	I've had my Christmas lights cut. I've had my
5	car egged. I have filed reports, I do not hea
6	back, and I just, I'm a little disappointed no
7	that
8	MR. LOUGHNEY: Keep doing it.
9	MR. BARRETT: for the few years
10	that I've been there how bad it's gotten. And
11	it seems to be every tenant that moves in.
12	MR. HALLINAN: How close are you to
13	that other
14	MR. BARRETT: Directly across.
15	MR. HALLINAN: I wonder if they're
16	mixing you up with that apartment, you know
17	what I mean, like they have the wrong side of
18	the street.
19	MS. BRIER: Have you filed reports?
20	MR. BARRETT: I have, twice.
21	MS. BRIER: With our police
22	department?
23	MR. BARRETT: Correct.
24	MS. BRIER: Okay.
25	MR. HALLINAN: Please call 911 any

1	chance you get. They'll respond and then, you
2	know
3	MR. BARRETT: I just didn't want
4	MR. HALLINAN: There's nothing too
5	small. There's nothing too small.
6	MR. BARRETT: to bother them if
7	it was something silly.
8	MR. HALLINAN: It's not silly. You
9	call 911, okay?
10	MR. ROGATO: There's a nonemergency
11	number.
12	MR. LOUGHNEY: Colton, they got
13	17,000 calls last year, one more, it might be
14	the one that you need, you call them.
15	MR. BARRETT: Okay.
16	MR. LOUGHNEY: One thing, our
17	department responds in seconds, in minutes,
18	so
19	MR. BARRETT: Well, thank you for
20	listening to me.
21	MS. BRIER: Thank you.
22	MR. BARRETT: Thank you very much.
23	MR. O'MALLEY: I'm so sorry that
24	you're going through that.

MR. ROGATO: Sir, if you dial

1	342-9111, it's still through comm center, it
2	still tapes, but if you dial 911, they think
3	it's a shooting or something serious. If it's
4	somebody cutting Christmas tree lights or
5	anything like that, you don't want that person
6	calling 911. You want them calling the
7	nonemergency number. It's the same thing but
8	342-9111.
9	MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.
10	MS. BRIER: Are there any other
11	comments tonight? Can you come on up?
12	MS. WILSON: I'm not a resident.
13	MS. BRIER: That's okay. You could
14	still speak.
15	MS. WILSON: My name is Abigail
16	Wilson. I live at Ridge Avenue, 1005. I was
17	there for the party on New Year's Eve. I would
18	like to just say that it wasn't just 30 people.
19	It might have been who came out; however, at
20	12:00 there was about hundreds of people
21	fleeing.
22	I have no idea how they all fit in
23	that house; however, I would like the record to
24	be shown, there wasn't 30 people.
25	CHIEF MARCHESE: Right. That was at

1	3:00 in the morning when we got there.
2	MS. WILSON: That's understandable.
3	CHIEF MARCHESE: Earlier in the
4	night nobody called us and told us that there
5	was a party going on. We weren't there at that
6	time.
7	MS. WILSON: That's understandable.
8	However, I think the record should reflect
9	there was a lot more than just 30 people, and
10	afterwards there was blood on the street that
11	was being cleaned up by the fire department. I
12	think that should also be reflected.
13	And in general, there's always a
14	strong aroma of pot coming from the house. I
15	was there one of the nights when someone was
16	knocking on the door rather violently. There
17	have been screaming matches. Like, those are
18	just some of the few instances
19	MS. BRIER: Are you visiting the
20	property?
21	MS. WILSON: I'm a friend of his. I
22	don't live very far from this place, from his
23	home, just across the street.
24	MS. BRIER: Who's him?
25	MS. WILSON: Colton Barrett.

1	MS. BRIER: Oh, okay. Oh, so you
2	were at you weren't at the house in
3	question?
4	MS. WILSON: No.
5	MS. BRIER: Okay. I'm sorry. I
6	misunderstood you.
7	MS. WILSON: No. That's okay. I
8	was at the house directly across from there.
9	MS. BRIER: I see. Okay. Thank
10	you.
11	MS. WILSON: I do think, however, it
12	should be noted that, like, I think there
13	should be more of an open dialogue. However, I
14	understand it's an open investigation, but
15	considering the immediate residents around that
16	house have been having to deal with shootouts,
17	I think you should probably keep them in the
18	loop, at least to a very minimal degree just
19	because it is a very big safety concern.
20	MS. BRIER: Well, thank you. Thank
21	you. We appreciate it.
22	ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.
23	MS. BRIER: Is there anyone else?
24	(No response.)
25	MS. BRIER: Okay. Then

1	MR. WOLFF: Public officials. I
2	have nothing.
3	ATTY. PERRY: I have nothing.
4	MAYOR CONWAY: Again, just to the
5	Adams Avenue folks, and I know we have a part
6	two of the meeting coming up which is going to
7	be posted, but I have nothing else.
8	MR. LOUGHNEY: It's good to be back,
9	let me tell you, it's very good, and it's
10	enlightening to see this many people at the
11	meetings. This is how it used to be. But
12	you're here for a reason, that's the most
13	important, and the individuals up here before
14	you, we're all here to do our best to help.
15	We ran for these positions, we're in
16	the positions, and you're the constituents that
17	have the needs that we have to address. So,
18	I'm glad to be part of it and I'm looking
19	forward to hearing from the individuals from
20	not only from Adams Avenue but from the Swinick
21	development, and hopefully we can get some
22	answers for you all. So, thank you.
23	MR. ROGATO: Welcome back.
24	MR. LOUGHNEY: Thank you.
25	MR. DEMPSEY: Very briefly. I just

1 thank everybody for coming tonight and voicing those concerns. We are working on them. 2 3 know Greg and the mayor and the Chief work on 4 these things tirelessly, but I know we have a second half of the meeting here tonight, so I 5 do want to get to those Swinick folk that came 6 down here to voice their concerns, as well. 7 8 So, thank you all for coming. 9 MS. BRIER: Mr. O'Malley. MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you everyone 10 11 for coming. We are listening, okay, and we are 12 working on your behalf. Also, Mr. Judge, I 13 want to say thank you to you and your DPW crew 14 for your great job taking care of our streets. 15 I know you were down three trucks, so it made 16 it more challenging. But, again, thank you, 17 and if you can please pass our thanks along to 18 your staff. And that's all I have. 19 MS. BRIER: Thanks. Mr. Hallinan. I'd echo that with 20 MR. HALLINAN: 21 Thank you. I drove you out of your Didge. 22 mind, I'm sure, with constant phone calls. 23 Mr. Luciano, you couldn't be any 24 more correct, we got to do something to reel

1	love. I mean, families, we got to keep an eye
2	on this Section 8, if not even try and
3	eliminate it. I don't know if we can because
4	of federal laws or whatever, but I know we got
5	to do our best to reel it in and stop it.
6	And I look forward to talking to
7	people in Swinick. Thank you all for coming.
8	That's all I have.
9	MS. BRIER: Ms. Zangardi.
10	MS. ZANGARDI: Greg, if you could
11	just put on our web page about the Christmas
12	trees or somebody from the office.
13	MR. WOLFF: I will do it again, but
14	I did put it out a few days ago I think.
15	MS. ZANGARDI: Right. And everybody
16	share it. We can recycle the Christmas trees.
17	The other thing I have is one thing about the
18	stench up at the landfill, is everybody kept
19	saying, share, complain, call. You have to
20	call. You have to let us know. I didn't know
21	it was that I live up on the other side of
22	Blakely Street, so you have to call, because I
23	have no idea.
24	I received Theresa's e-mail, we
25	discussed it here, so we had no I had no

idea that that house was such a nuisance, but
every time something goes wrong or you don't
like something, you have to call, because
otherwise we don't know, and there's nothing we
can do about it unless we get on it and stay on
it.

The other thing is, Joe, part of the reason, you know, we all ran was to bring back Dunmore to a beautiful town it was, you know. That being said, I'm just going to piggy back onto Tripp's, one of Tripp's things was registering the rental properties.

I called around and I called
Wilkes-Barre, Kingston, Throop, Plains, Dickson
City, Clarks Summit, Clarks Green, a plethora
of towns to see how they did their rental
properties, and the only one that doesn't have
a rental property ordinance or registration fee
is Dunmore and Dickson City because they don't
need it.

So, that is definitely, I would agree, you know, on the forefront of where we're going and eventually it will pay for itself, we just have to sit down and buckle down and get on it, but we have been looking at

the rental fees and the rental charges, and we have discussed it more than once. But Dunmore and Dickson City, Dickson City doesn't need it because they have all the commerce up there.

So, that's all I have. Oh, and the blighted properties, if you see a blighted property, feel free to call me or anyone up here or the borough and let us know, because that's a big pet peeve, I think for all of us. And that's all I have. Thank you, everyone, for coming.

MS. BRIER: Ms. Mackerel Oven.

MS. OVEN: I would like to thank everyone for coming. I apologize, I was late. I had to drop my daughter off at school. I was supposed to take her yesterday and then the snow derailed us, so I'm sorry that I missed the beginning of the meeting, but I have received messages about the Adams Avenue issue. I live a couple blocks from there, so it's concerning to me for the safety of myself and my family. So, that's a top priority.

As Greg said, we do have to go through certain protocol when we're doing the inspections, but we've talked about it at

length and blighted properties and these out of town landlords are a huge priority for us for this year.

So, I thank you for coming. Please, if there's anything, we want you to call us. I get messages on Facebook, I get texts, and that's why we're up here is to help and we also want to make Dunmore safe and family friendly, so thank you.

MS. BRIER: Thank you. Once again, I really appreciate everyone coming here tonight, because it's important and it's helpful to us to find out what's really going on in your neighborhoods or just on your block.

I just want everyone to know, you know, Didgy and his crew did a great job, but Greg was constantly in touch with Didge, and Tripp and Tommy Hallinan are the Council liaison to the DPW, so they were working it, too. They worked it over the weekend. They didn't stay up all night like you guys did, but they were available. Greg's always available to you for the truck issues.

So, it's a group effort, and Tommy did a great job, Tripp did a great job and Greg

1	and Didgy. And, I mean, we're going to get
2	snow, I think, again Friday so, you know, it's
3	not over. Thanks everyone for coming. Could I
4	have a motion to adjourn?
5	MR. LOUGHNEY: So moved.
6	MR. O'MALLEY: Second.
7	MS. BRIER: I have a motion and a
8	second. All those in favor?
9	ALL MEMBERS: Aye.
10	MS. BRIER: Opposed?
11	(No response.)
