MR. WOLFF: Number six, CDBG public hearing, Joe Rovinsky, Lackawanna County DCED.

MR. ROVINSKY: Good evening,

Council. Thank you for having me here this evening. The purpose of me being here tonight is to go over the CDBG Program for the County and just give a basic overview of what the program entails and just some basic figures.

Just to give a current update on the project, '23 and '24 allocations are currently not available for funding usage yet. We do not have the budget from each. I will not be as accurate as it will be towards hopefully by the end of August. We're basically two years behind at the state level in terms of their getting the funding to the municipalities.

The Lackawanna County Department of Planning and Economic Development is the administering agency for the CDBG Program in

the County. CDBG funds are federal funds from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development which are administered by the PA Department of Community and Economic Development.

There are eleven entitlement communities of which Dunmore Borough is one of twenty-seven non-entitlement communities in Lackawanna County, PA. To be considered an Entitlement Community, the community, the community must have a population of 4,000 or more and meet the current minimum standards of physical and economic distress of the Federal Urban Development Action Grant Program.

Again allocationwise, the '23 and '24 allocations are not available currently for usage. But Dunmore does have balance of an estimated \$174,521. I believe there's been discussion with our office and engineer about continuing the Chestnut Street improvement Project phases.

And that's really what's on -currently that money will probably be allocated
towards as far as most recent discussions I've
been made aware. More money will be coming

1 down within the next two years. 2 MS. BRIER: When you say '23, '24, 3 that's fiscal July 1st. 4 MR. ROVINSKY: Yes. 5 MS. BRIER: It's not September. Not September, no. MR. ROVINSKY: 6 7 The '23 application is still under review. So 8 they are a complete year behind on '23, so --9 MS. BRIER: Yeah, because we're in 10 '24. 11 MR. ROVINSKY: Yeah, you're looking 12 at probably '24 in '25 and '24 beginning -- and 13 that's at a state level. We have a new grant 14 manager now. We've had several turnovers. 15 really once it's out of our hands, there's not 16 much more we could do to push it along. 17 it's in the state level to be reviewed. 18 And as soon as that money is 19 released, it will be released to the Borough the current updated budget information. 20 21 actually doing '24 hearing probably will not be 22 in your hands until '25. MS. BRIER: We'll get '23s in 23 24 August, maybe? 25 MR. ROVINSKY: We hope. Last year

it came in October, which is again a year behind anyway. So hopefully August is the goal from what the --

MS. BRIER: Can you explain the 11 how Dunmore is part of that 11 versus the rest of the --

MR. ROVINSKY: It goes on population. It's 4,000 people. They have -- that is population based. You're a larger borough than the municipalities of Vandling, Greenfield Township, etc. You get the larger piece of the federal allocation.

I'll just go over the objective of the program. The CDBG Program aligned to assist communities in preparing for Community Development Plans, designed to address significant needs of the low and low to moderate income individuals; assist communities in administering community development activities to address a number of community development needs identified in the Community Development Plan; to encourage and assist communities to focus upon and address housing and community facility problems and to pursue economic development and commercial

revitalization activities through public/private investment that will result in the development and expansion of job opportunities within the Commonwealth.

HUD has numerous examples of eligible activities. Some qualified projects we have done in the past two years are:

Water/Sewer Improvements, street improvements, ADA improvements to Parks and Recreation and ADA elevators and accessibility to senior center facilities. There is also numerous activities that we looked at and approved by the state depending on the project.

There's also restrictive programs.

There's numerous ineligible activities. They include General Government expenses, political activities, purchase of construction equipment, purchase of fire protection, income payments, purchase of furnishings and personal property.

When the states get a project, it has to meet one of the three national objectives. It has to meet to benefit low to moderate individuals, prevention or elimination or blight which is on a case-to-case basis or addressed to be an immediate threat to the

1	health and safety of the community. And those
2	are the three national objectives that qualify
3	a project for CDBG eligibility.
4	And as I mention currently, I
5	believe we're working with the engineer to do
6	initial phase on Chestnut Street which was been
7	the focus for the past several years since I've
8	been around at least.
9	MS. BRIER: So that 174, is that
10	drawn down yet?
11	MR. ROVINSKY: That's still
12	that's available projects that has not been
13	spent yet.
14	MS. BRIER: Where does it reside
15	with the county or is that
16	MR. ROVINSKY: We administer that
17	money, yes.
18	MS. BRIER: So we haven't drawn that
19	down in Dunmore yet.
20	MR. ROVINSKY: No. It has not been
21	spent yet. I do believe there's plans in place
22	for being developed for a phase three or
23	Chestnut Street.
24	MS. BRIER: Okay. Thank you.
25	MR. ROVINSKY: That's all I have.

MS. BRIER: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Number seven, school resource officer Memorandum of Understanding with Dunmore School District for the 2024-2025 school year. Quickly, it will be for the 2024-25 school year. Dunmore Borough will receive \$120,000 to be paid quarterly. And that is to provide two school resource officers.

Financial Report, Mark.

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.

I have a brief analysis for the month of April.

We had a net income of the month of \$747,000,

which brings our year-to-date net income to 1.9

million. As far as the revenue highlights, the real estate collections remain strong.

This past -- our April was \$900,000. So miscellaneous revenue, 17,000 in Express Script rebate for the fourth quarter, 2023, special assessments, \$634,000 in landfill fees for the first quarter of 2024. As far as expenses, solid waste another 28,000 in truck repairs; debt principal \$100,000 to the 2024 TAN which is now paid in full.

And the insurance premiums another \$70,000 is our second quarterly installment for liability, property, and auto policies. And that's about it.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Kearney, in the past several weeks we wrapped up our six week rental with Riverfront Sports for AAU practices. They were here for six weeks every Thursday night.

Last week weekend we hosted a

weekend tournament, a Biddy tournament that was also sponsored by Riverfront which they rented the gym from us for two days. We also have entered into an agreement to rent a court to newly formed Dunmore Men's Summer Basketball League.

This is a group of mostly Dunmore guys who will play here Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons for the majority of the summer. They are going to rent one court and they will be here for two hours. It's a bunch of Dunmore guys.

We also continue to host practices for several Dunmore AAU teams and we also have a lot of parties in here on the weekends. And the seniors recently held their pasta fundraiser here on Thursday. There was a lot of people. That's all.

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Chris.

MS. OVEN: Thanks, Chris.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge is absent.

Chief Marchese.

CHIEF MARCHESE: For the month of April we responded to 914 calls. This number is down 32 calls from the previous month. I

have attached a breakdown of all the serious calls for you. The arrest for the month, we had 11 criminal arrests, seven non-traffic arrests, 56 traffic arrests, 15 written warnings and 23 verbal warnings.

We had 13 overtime shifts that were sent out for the month for overtime. Officer Burgette took part in his monthly SWAT training April 16th. During the month of March, the meters collected 1,640 including coin, credit card and pay by phone transactions.

During the month \$145 was collected in parking tickets and one citation has been filed. We took delivery of a body worn camera as a trial run for officers to familiar themselves with. We're waiting our order to come in. Officers are getting used to which clips to use, how to become familiar with it, how to upload the stuff. So we'll be ready to go when they get here.

April 7th, officers assisted the Scranton Police Department with traffic control for the half marathon. April 20th, multiple officers assisted with traffic and crowd control for the annual Jog for Jude.

This year nearly 1,900 runners took part of the event. Officer Richardson took that over for Captain Barth this year. He did a great job. It's a lot of planning, a lot of time to keep a lot of people safe. That's all I got.

MS. BRIER: Thanks.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Chief.

MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples is absent. It brings us to public comment.

MS. BRIER: Anyone in the audience want to come up? Sure. You just have to come up to the podium and state your name and address, please.

MR. FAZIO: Okay. My name is Andrew Fazio. I live at 606 Shirley Lane in Dunmore. I'm here tonight because the Borough received \$180,000 from that fine that was impended DeNaples' landfill. Now, as a resident of Dunmore my whole life and all my children live in Dunmore, I'm very concerned about that money how it's been spent because I'm with the understanding they are going to take that money and put a pocket park in the Dunmore Corners, which I think is the stupidest thing in the

world. That's my opinion. I think that that money can be used to help the residents that live in that area because the smell is still there.

I mean, I was out -- I mean, 5:00 in the morning -- I'm out all hours of the day and night. 5:00 Friday morning, I was coming down the highway and I counted them, 32 garbage trucks in line waiting to get in the landfill, okay.

Now, I'm not here to buck the landfill at all. We need it. I understand it. It's a necessity. I think it's a necessity because if you had to haul that garbage somewhere else, it would cost a fortune and we would have to pay for that. So I understand that.

What I'm looking for, part of that money or whatever it takes is it to get some kind monitors now that we could put up in the surrounding areas to monitor that odor, the germs that are in the air. Sometimes you smell nothing but there's still that problem in the air.

And I think that that money could be

used for that. I mean, they are going to put that money towards the pocket -- the ink wasn't even dry on the check yet and I heard they're going to do. I thought it was ridiculous, seriously, when you have a park right here infested with snakes that the kids can't even play T-ball.

I have two grandsons that play
T-ball that are afraid to come down here
because of all the snakes up here.

MS. BRIER: Snakes?

MR. FAZIO: Snakes. I could show you right now. They are all infested in the wall. It's unbelievable. I was here to a party. My granddaughter was christened two weeks ago. We had a party here and the kids went up there to play and they all come running inside from all the -- I went up and I physically saw it myself.

And the one part there, there was like eight snakes laying in the mulch all sizes. And when I ruffled it up, they all went in the wall. I told Nibs about it. He said he was going to take care of it. Maybe he did. I don't know. And I'm not here to buck Nibs.

Nibs is a great guy.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ HALLINAN: This is the first we heard about this.

MR. FAZIO: I'm thinking they're going to invest money up there that really could be used towards those monitors to monitor the air, you know, to protect the people. I mean, we live there. Our lives are in that area. I mean, there's a lot of new people moving in there and houses that older people lived and that passed away, a lot more kids coming into the Swinick's Development.

And we are not being protected.

This money can be used for that. We would put these monitors up in different parts, I mean, just to try to monitor the air. I know other areas where they bought these monitors and they mounted them on poles or on people's homes.

They were agreeable to it.

It's just to keep track of the air, what's going on because this is something that's going to be there for a long time, a long time, long after I'm gone, maybe long after my kids are gone. But I have grand kids that I'm worried about.

MR. HALLINAN: Mr. Fazio, I'm not here to correct you. The 600,000 I think we only get 180 and out of that. I think there's restrictions. I don't disagree with you about monitoring. But I don't know if we can. There's certain restrictions of what we could use it for and it has to be which is for the good of the community, which is right. But I don't know if monitoring -- if we could have Greg check into that.

MR. O'MALLEY: I know there was an effort to put monitors out in our neighborhoods. I signed up to do it but never heard back.

MR. HALLINAN: This money he's talking about, I don't know if that could be used for that. I could be wrong.

MR. FAZIO: The money had to be used in a way to monitor that, not for -- can't be used foolishly, like, you couldn't go out and buy new police cars, something like that. You couldn't use for that. But it could be used for something that has to do with the betterment -- protect people from the landfill.

MS. BRIER: Were you able to call

1 DEP, DEP has --2 MR. FAZIO: How many times did I 3 call? There's been times, like, years. That's 4 why I'm upset. 5 MS. BRIER: Do you get a response? MR. FAZIO: Oh, yeah. 6 7 MS. BRIER: Do they come to your 8 house? 9 MR. FAZIO: Oh, yeah. 10 MS. BRIER: Did they smell it? 11 MR. FAZIO: We can't open the 12 windows. We can't go on our porches. I mean, 13 it's every year. 14 MS. BRIER: I know I called too. 15 MR. FAZIO: 180,000, that's great. 16 Throop got 180, we got 180, they got 180, okay? 17 And the people got nothing. We're the ones 18 suffering. We're the ones that are dealing 19 with this. Do you know what I mean? And it's 20 terrible when you come home from work or you 21 want to go out in the morning before I go to 22 work and have a cup of coffee on the porch, you 23 can't. 24 I mean, you can't open the windows. 25 If you don't have an air conditioner in your

house in the summer, you're going to die because you can't open the windows.

MR. HALLINAN: I don't mean to speak for the President. But I have no problem putting monitors up if that money is allowed to do that. If not, we could probably look somewhere for money to protect that area.

MR. FAZIO: That's all I'm looking for. Miss Oven here wanted to bring -- like check for VOCs which is the most dangerous things that you are inhaling. You don't even know you're inhaling it.

MS. BRIER: There is a program out in Philly that will put monitors on your house. And I could give you that information and they do it for free. I have one on my house. We wanted to -- we asked the Y if they would put one up because I smell it going into the Y a lot.

MR. FAZIO: Go up the Casey in the morning. I'm on the Casey in the morning.

MS. BRIER: And in the evening.

MR. FAZIO: They are covered. I'm not bucking -- they're doing everything they could do. I'm not bucking them at all because

I think they are really trying. But I think when you uncover garbage that's been laying -- they're making the mountain higher, you got that --

MS. BRIER: Well, they made them close that. They capped that again. Thank goodness.

MR. FAZIO: Yeah, that was awful.

It would burn your eyes.

MS. BRIER: They should have never permitted that. That being said, I will give you the information about it. They will come to your house and they'll put a monitor on.

Again, it's up to DEP to do something about that. And they're the enforcement people.

MR. FAZIO: They've been great. I know every time I've ever called and I only call when it's really, really bad. I'll deal with it because it is what it is. But when it gets really, really bad I'll call because you're breathing that. You know that smell is beyond that. You got all this -- who knows what you're breathing.

MS. BRIER: Who knows, that's the problem.

MR. FAZIO: Like I said, I have four grand kids from seven to six months old that live a block away from me. And I have my daughter that lives two blocks away from him. And she don't have any kids. My son, he lives up by -- they are all in Dunmore. I made sure when my kids were going to buy that they all bought houses in Dunmore, you know, I really did.

I made it my mission because I wanted to keep them. I want the kids to stay around because so many kids move out of the area. You lose them. So I did everything I could do to keep them here. Now I'm wondering did I do the right thing, you know what I mean? I was born and raised in this town, my father and mother, my grandfather.

MS. BRIER: You're Dunmore people.

MR. HALLINAN: Dunmore.

MR. FAZIO: Yeah, you know, and I understand the landfill. I used to work for a garbage company before I went into business.

And I'm in business 44 years there. And I was in the garbage. I worked for them. I understand that it's a necessity. It really

is. It's like water, if you don't have no place to bring this stuff, you know, what are you going to do?

I used to haul out of {inaudible}

Pennsylvania to bring it all the way down here
because, you know -- and these people had to
pay heavy to have their garbage taken away. If
we had to pay to have our garbage taken down
the line down south, down by Allentown area or
whatever, we might be paying 2 or 3 dollars a
bag.

And some people have eight, nine bags a week. You know, we couldn't afford it. We're very lucky that we could take our garbage to the curb and not have to worry about it. So I think it's important. But I think it's important that our health is monitored too because you can't put a price on that. That's why I was concerned.

MS. BRIER: Thank you. I appreciate you coming. I really do.

MR. FAZIO: I was hoping that we could do something if we're able to with that money just to keep an eye on what's going on to know that they are safe. And then I wanted to

1 mention about the snake situation up here 2 because obvious --3 MS. BRIER: Can we get our animal 4 control guy? 5 MR. WOLFF: I don't think he handles snakes. 6 7 MR. HALLINAN: How about Pest 8 Practice --9 MR. FAZIO: There's not just one or 10 two. 11 MS. BRIER: You know, it's funny. 12 My daughter lives on Marion and there's snakes 13 there. 14 MR. KEARNEY: I contacted the Pest 15 Practice and they -- it's in the retaining --16 the snakes were originally in the retaining 17 I had no idea they were up there. pond. But 18 they were down here to do the retaining pond 19 because we had a couple that got into the gym. 20 So I got them out of the gym and we 21 called -- I called Pest Practice but I didn't 22 know anything about --23 MR. FAZIO: You could walk right up, 24 right in the wall. I couldn't believe it. I'm 25 telling you just that little area I walked up

and I went right to the mulch and --

MS. BRIER: Were they garden snakes?

MR. FAZIO: Oh, yeah, I was going to grab them. And sometime I get them coming down from Sherwood Park, you know, because the kids are afraid. And they all -- there was five of them. The longest one was maybe that long (indicating) because I tried to grab that one. But they're quick. There was some small ones too. But they went in the wall. I tried to get them but they wouldn't come out.

MR. WOLFF: Chris, if you could follow up with that?

MR. KEARNEY: Yes.

MR. FAZIO: That's my concern because the kids are afraid to come down and play T-ball.

MS. BRIER: Sure. Thanks so much.

MR. FAZIO: That's my concern. They are afraid off the snakes. But like I said, whatever you could do to try to help now that we have maybe a couple dollars that we could put towards something that the people don't have to keep calling DEP that these monitors will keep an eye on this stuff.

1 MS. BRIER: Right. We're trying. 2 MR. FAZIO: I know it's not an easy 3 thing. 4 MS. BRIER: We have been talking 5 with DEP quite a bit. And we went down and met It's a real process. It really is. 6 with them. 7 They should have never permitted that cap 8 removal. 9 MR. FAZIO: When they took that cap 10 off it was bad. MS. BRIER: Well, it was, like, 11 12 ancient. 13 MR. FAZIO: We couldn't go outside. 14 It would literally burn your eyes. And if this 15 came all the way down here, can you imagine how 16 it was up there? And depending which way the 17 wind's blowing, if you go up the Marshwood Road 18 and this side is okay and then Marshwood Road 19 you get killed. Moosic Lake and everything, they're all getting killed. 20 21 But it's part of that what it is. But if they don't do in a cap deal, like, if 22 23 they just do fresh it's not too bad because 24 they cover it right a way so you don't get it. 25 But when they open it up, it's like getting a

1 bag of potatoes rotting in your garage or 2 cellar or something. 3 MS. BRIER: All right. We have to 4 give other folks a chance but thank you. Sir, 5 did you want to speak? MR. CAMPBELL: My name is James 6 7 Campbell, I live at 214 Olive Street in 8 Dunmore. I'm here to see when you're going to 9 pave the alley at the side of my house going 10 down to Perry's house. 11 MR. WOLFF: Mr. Campbell, we still 12 haven't found anything that shows that that's 13 our road. We're still in the same --14 MR. CAMPBELL: That was always --15 MR. WOLFF: I know you've come a 16 couple times but we can't find anything. 17 know what you're saying. I know what you said 18 to us numerous times. But we can't find 19 anything between the Solicitor, the engineer, 20 we can't find anything. 21 MR. CAMPBELL: Somebody took it off 22 the records. 23 MR. WOLFF: Well, that -- I can't 24 comment on that. 25 MR. CAMPBELL: Without telling

1 anybody that they did it. MR. WOLFF: Yeah, unfortunately, I 2 3 mean, we would like to help you. But we can't 4 start -- if we can't prove that that's our road 5 then other people will say, hey, what about my driveway. We can't take care of private 6 7 properties. It's not --MR. CAMPBELL: It's not private 8 9 property. 10 MR. WOLFF: Well, we can't show that 11 it --12 MR. CAMPBELL: There's nobody on the 13 block that owns that road. So if nobody owns 14 that road, it's the Boroughs. 15 MR. WOLFF: Well, we can't show 16 anything that it's ours. 17 MR. CAMPBELL: Okay, then it's the 18 states. I have to go to the state and ask 19 The state will come down and tell you them? 20 that --21 MR. WOLFF: I know the map you 22 showed me -- you could look at a lot of maps, 23 but that doesn't mean that -- just looking at a 24 map that's online or whatever doesn't mean that 25 it's ours. There's paper roads. There's

1 different -- we can't prove that it's ours. We need to do our due diligence to make sure we're 2 3 not --4 MR. CAMPBELL: The Borough took it 5 off their records. MR. WOLFF: I mean, I can't --6 7 MR. CAMPBELL: When did they? 8 MR. WOLFF: I can't speak to that. 9 MS. BRIER: Is there any 10 documentation to that effect? 11 MR. CAMPBELL: You could ask Paul 12 Nardozzi when he was on Council. 13 MS. BRIER: We would need 14 documentation, Mr. Campbell. We would need documentation to that effect. And we don't 15 16 have any at the moment. 17 MR. WOLFF: Actually I think Nibs 18 talked to Mr. Nardozzi too and he was not -- he 19 was of the same opinion he wasn't -- he didn't 20 believe it was the Borough's property. 21 MR. CAMPBELL: Whose property is it 22 then? You can't find out? You're not getting 23 taxes from it. 24 MR. WOLFF: I know that it's not 25 ours.

1 MR. CAMPBELL: You're not getting taxes from it. So whose road is it? You don't 2 3 know but --4 MR. WOLFF: To the best of my 5 knowledge, I know it's not the Borough's and that's what we have to concern ourselves with. 6 7 It not this board's, you know -- if it's not 8 ours, it's not our responsibility. We can't 9 figure out whose property it is. 10 MR. CAMPBELL: You can't figure out 11 whose property it is? 12 MR. WOLFF: We know that it's not 13 ours. 14 MR. CAMPBELL: Why do you know? 15 MR. WOLFF: Mr. Campbell, I could go 16 around and around with you. But I can't prove 17 anything -- we have no evidence that it is our 18 road. That's all I could tell you. I'm sorry. 19 I know your feelings. MR. CAMPBELL: But there is nobody 20 21 that owns it then. 22 ATTY. PERRY: Well, it could be the 23 developers of the property that own it. 24 the point is, Mr. Campbell --25 MR. CAMPBELL: It was part of the

1 street when --2 ATTY. PERRY: Well, it is. It's a 3 road. 4 MR. CAMPBELL: It was part of Helen 5 Street at the time that when Helen Street was put in. 6 7 ATTY. PERRY: It's not a Borough 8 road and the Borough can't spend money on 9 private property because it's not Borough 10 property. 11 MR. CAMPBELL: It's not private 12 You don't make money off it. You property. should --13 14 ATTY. PERRY: I'm just telling you 15 it's not a Borough road and the Borough can't 16 spend money on private property. 17 MR. CAMPBELL: You don't have 18 anybody that owns that road. 19 ATTY. PERRY: The Borough doesn't 20 own it. That's the point. If the Borough 21 owned it, the Borough would take care of it. 22 But the Borough doesn't own it. 23 MR. CAMPBELL: It was taken off the 24 records from when -- the Borough came up and 25 talked to the people that owned --

ATTY. PERRY: I never heard of 1 anything like that somebody taking it off the 2 3 record. You can't do that. It's not possible. 4 MS. BRIER: And if you can get us 5 some documentation to that effect, then that would be great. But we don't have any 6 7 documentation to that effect. 8 MR. CAMPBELL: The documentation 9 that I have shows that it's an alley that's 10 next to my house. MS. BRIER: 11 Okay. Well, we have a 12 five minute limit, Mr. Campbell. I appreciate 13 you coming. I think we have to let other 14 people speak at the moment. Thank you. 15 MR. CAMPBELL: Okav. 16 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. 17 MS. BRIER: Anyone else? 18 MR. CORDELLI: Mark CORDELLI, 19 Lackawanna County representing the 20 Commissioners. Just a few quick brief 21 announcements with regards to what's going on 22 here in Lackawanna County. This weekend is 23 Northeast Pennsylvania's Armed Forces Day 24 Parade, and it will be downtown Scranton. 25 It's a great event. The luncheon I

believe is actually sold out. It's a 5K and then the parade shortly after that. Also this weekend is Reuse Fest 2024, Lackawanna County Recycling Center's from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., up at Montage Mountain Road at PNC Field.

They ask people if they are going to attend or bring items which are listed on here, work boots, sneakers, gloves, please call so that they know and have an idea where the reused items should go to. Otherwise people will be turned away.

Also Lackawanna County Heritage Fair
May 30th through June 2nd at Montage Mountain.
We have a couple of posters over there for
people. Hopefully I'll be back for the next
meeting. But if not, this is an early June
event that is going on sponsored by the
Commissioners. It's a bocce ball tournament
that will be held down in Old Forge on June
8th.
