There's a million kids up there, I don't know if anybody drove by this week, but we did pretty well this week at the stand.

She's an executive chef, she has all of her licenses. She's fantastic. She's been involved in the community for years. She used to cook down at the little league and make her famous wing bites, which she's going to have, I

1 believe, next week. So, it's something that's been 2 3 sorely missed at Schautz because we have a state of the art kitchen up there that nobody 4 5 uses, and we've all been trying to get somebody to do it for years, so finally we have Sara. 6 7 So, she's going to be there every 8 Sunday from 11 a.m. until about 5, 6:00 p.m. 9 We're lucky to have her and can't wait to see. MS. BRIER: Yes, it's great. We're 10 11 thrilled that she agreed to do this for us. 12 So, all those in favor? 13 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 14 MS. BRIER: Opposed? 15 (No response.) 16 MR. WOLFF: Number eight, motion to 17 appoint Sarah Brodowsky as a part-time 18 firefighter. 19 MS. BRIER: Okay. 1 MR. WOLFF: Yeah. Sarah Brodowsky was approved by the Chief, they did the 2 3 background check, so she will be the part-time as-needed status. 4 5 MS. BRIER: That's great. We need All those in favor? 6 that. ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 7 8 MS. BRIER: Okay. Opposed? 9 (No response.) 10 MR. WOLFF: Number nine, motion to 11 promote Justin Taffera to the classification of 12 truck driver with the DPW. 13 MS. BRIER: Can I have a motion to 14 promote Justin Taffera to the classification of truck driver with the DPW? 15 MR. HALLINAN: I'll make that 16 17 motion. 18 MS. ZANGARDI: I'll second. 19 MS. BRIER: I have a motion and a 20 second. On the question? 21 MR. WOLFF: We had a driver leave, a 22 CDL driver, leave in the springtime. 23 Mr. Taffera was good enough to step up. 24 kind of got us out of a bind and got a CDL. 25 we had the opening and Justin applied and meets

1 all the requirements. 2 MS. BRIER: Great. All those in 3 favor? 4 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 5 MS. BRIER: Opposed? (No response.) 6 MR. WOLFF: Number ten, motion to 7 8 approve the 2024 paving project with Pennsy 9 Supply in the amount of \$538,910.95. 10 MS. BRIER: Okay. Can I have a 11 motion to approve the 2024 paving project to 12 Pennsy Supply in the amount of \$538,910.95? I'll make that motion 13 MR. DEMPSEY: 14 but it's pending any sort of reduction that we 15 see fit once we figure out what the liquid 16 fuels situation is, and I think we budgeted 17 \$100,000 to this project. 18 MR. WOLFF: Correct. 19 MR. DEMPSEY: So, I'll make that 20 motion but I want it subject to any 21 subtractions that we would need to make to fit 22 our financial budget. 23 MS. BRIER: Thanks, Mike. So we 24 have a motion. Can I have a second? 25 MR. LOUGHNEY: Second.

MS. BRIER: Yes. You know, we have 1 a list, a paving list, paving is incredibly 2 3 expensive, and we can use some of our liquid fuels funds but not all, so we really have to 4 5 look at this a little bit closer. We did not anticipate that it would 6 come in this high, and this was the lowest 7 8 bidder. We had how many bids, Greg, three? 9 MR. WOLFF: A total of three. MS. BRIER: 10 Three. Yeah. 11 This was roughly \$80,000 MR. WOLFF: 12 less than the next highest. 13 MS. BRIER: Than the next highest, 14 So, it's a tough situation. veah. 15 anyway, I have a motion and a second. A11 16 those in favor? 17 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 18 MS. BRIER: Opposed? 19 (No response.) 20 MR. WOLFF: Number eleven, treasurer 21 financial report. Mark. Good evening, Council. 22 MR. BURTON: 23 Brief analysis for the month of August. 24 anticipated and budgeted, we had a large 25 monthly loss for the month of August, a net

loss of 1.7 million dollars, again, to the details shortly, which brings our year-to-date net income \$575,000.

On the income side, real estate remains slow in the summer as usual. Business license and permits, we received a \$50,000 second quarter Comcast franchise fees and miscellaneous revenues of \$13,000 from Express Scripts for our second quarter of '24 rebate.

On the expense side, it was a three pay period month of August. The police did \$25,000 installment for the body cams and \$19,000 for the arbitrator's fee, and the big expense was the 1.3 million dollar debt principal, 1.2 million dollars towards the debt and \$104,000 towards the interest. That's the one time annual fee that we pay for our bond issue, so that's completed for the year, the biggest expense we had.

MS. BRIER: Mark, we paid 27,400 to Braddock Excavating?

MR. BURTON: That was for the three blighted properties.

MS. BRIER: Oh. Oh, okay. That's good. And so they're done?

1 MR. WOLFF: They're done. 2 MS. OVEN: They're gone, yeah. 3 MS. BRIER: Okay. 4 MR. HALLINAN: And, Mark, this 1.7 5 that, you know, we took in this as loss, that happens every year and then we'll balance out 6 7 towards the end of the year, correct? 8 MR. BURTON: Correct. 9 It's not like MR. HALLINAN: Yeah. 10 we're --11 MR. BURTON: In March we might have 12 had a two million dollar surplus, so it'll --13 MS. OVEN: Even out. 14 MR. HALLINAN: We'll straighten 15 ourselves out. 16 MR. BURTON: Yeah. 17 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. 18 MS. BRIER: Thanks, Mark. MR. WOLFF: 19 Chris. 20 MR. KEARNEY: These past several 21 weeks we've just seen a continuation of the 22 party rentals in this room and a resumption of 23 the basketball practices in the gym for the 24 elementary school teams. Biddy basketball has 25 scheduled their player evaluations and coaches

meetings beginning the first week of October, so that's going to be starting up again soon.

The Indo-American community has scheduled their annual fall events here the first and second weekends of October. They've been doing that for the past several years. They rent the whole place and they pay for it. So, that's kind of a big deal, and it's really busy here.

And then the seniors are also having their purse bingo Sunday, October 6th, the day after this thing. So that's going to be a little hectic.

So, because of all these events, I've scheduled the annual floor finishing in mid October, but last year we had to schedule it earlier and then they were coming in and kind of, didn't wreck it, but this way we'll let them wreck the floor and then we can refinish it so --

MS. BRIER: Is the purse bingo in here or over there?

MR. KEARNEY: It's both.

MS. BRIER: Both? Okay.

MR. KEARNEY: Yeah. All these

things are all over the place. 1 2 MS. BRIER: Okay. 3 MR. KEARNEY: 0kay? 4 MS. OVEN: Wow, that's great. MR. KEARNEY: Yeah. And that's all 5 I have. 6 7 ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Chris. MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge. 8 9 MR. JUDGE: How's it going? Going 10 as usual, patching and paving and picking 11 garbage, you know? So what else could I say? 12 If you have a pothole or anything on your 13 street, call the DPW, we'll get them 14 straightened out. Okay? 15 ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Didgy. 16 MR. WOLFF: Chief Marchese is 17 absent. Chief DeNaples. 18 CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening, I'll start out with the fire 19 Council. 20 department report, move into the code 21 enforcement. 22 So we don't have any projected high 23 expenditures this month for September. About 24 the highest one at this point is \$275 to 25 replace a 50-foot section of fire hose that

needs to be replaced.

As far as overtime, when this report was completed on the 6th, we had 240 hours of overtime scheduled for the month of September.

So that goes from the first right to the end of the month as of this time. Fifty-three part-time shifts were put out.

As far as events that the fire department is going to participate in is the last junior bucks football game, EMS standby on September 29th, from 11:45 until about 4, approximately, we're down there.

As far as the new part-time hires, the one part timer completed his orientation about a week or so ago and has been placed on the schedule. He picked up quite a bit of time from when he got signed off to work.

He went through the orientation fairly quick, he put a lot of time in, so it wasn't sporadic.

The other part-time firefighter who come back, he was a part timer at one time, he requested to come back, so June 11th he started. He's only putting about one shift a month in, so it's probably going to take

forever unless that picks up, as far as his availability for the overtime -- or the orientation time.

So, I'm excited to get Sarah started. The training officer is back to work on the 15th, so I'll notify her tomorrow and we'll start the orientation as soon as he comes back based on her availability. So, that's pretty much it as far as that goes.

As far as the calls from September

1st to today at the close of business, 5:00, we had 15 total responses. Eight emergency medical services and rescue-type calls, hazardous materials was two, good intent calls was two, false alarms and fire alarms was two, special-type incidents was one. That's where the 15 came.

I just wanted to acknowledge Chris
Rinaldi. He did a great job. He was up in the
area of that bus accident and he pulled that
bus driver off. And the police department, I
believe Sergeant Igoe and some of his second
shift staff were up there quick, and by the
time the fire department got up there, they had
already had the AED on him and they assisted

with some emergency care.

But if that all didn't happen that quick, that man probably wouldn't have had the outcome he had, and the doctor from Pennsylvania Ambulance was on scene there and he even acknowledged then when he came back to the firehouse to get his -- we brought his vehicle back, he went in the ambulance, and he acknowledged that.

So, I just wanted to congratulate the folks. And I belive Chris's wife was on there and helped that, helped stopping the bus and that, so great job on that. I just wanted to mention that.

MS. BRIER: Thank you.

CHIEF DENAPLES: As far as the code enforcement, there was 12 scheduled inspections from the first until today when Gene ran the numbers. A couple of them, a handful of them are reinspections.

So that's pretty much all I have if there's no questions. Thank you.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you, Chief.

MR. WOLFF: Number thirteen, public

comment.

MS. BRIER: Does anyone in the public have a comment tonight? Sure. Just state your name and address. Just come up so she can hear you.

JIM O'MALLEY: My name is Jim
O'Malley. I'm a resident of Dunmore. I'm here
tonight representing Dunmore little league on a
land issue with the Borough.

MS. BRIER: Where do you live, Jim?
JIM O'MALLEY: 802 Cooney Street.

MS. BRIER: Thank you.

JIM O'MALLEY: So, just to kind of give everyone a back story that I'm sure doesn't know, Dunmore little league was moved from the complex where the high school is now to where it currently sits some 20-odd years ago.

The little league, recently we paid off a loan that they had taken out originally to build the complex and come to find out once we paid it off that we're not really sure who owns the property. Right now it is still borough property.

MS. BRIER: Right. So, you're pretty sure that --

1 JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah. Yeah. 2 MR. DEMPSEY: It is. 3 JIM O'MALLEY: I'm sure the Borough 4 is, yes. 5 MR. DEMPSEY: It is. MS. BRIER: Yeah. 6 7 JIM O'MALLEY: We don't have 8 anything in place as far as a lease 9 agreement --10 Okay. MS. BRIER: 11 JIM O'MALLEY: -- with the Borough, 12 or if back when the decision to move there was 13 made, was there the property to be switched 14 over to Dunmore little league or anything like 15 that. 16 So I reached out to Greg Wolff about 17 two months ago to kind of start researching 18 some old borough council minutes to find out 19 exactly what took place or if something was 20 supposed to and never got done or whatnot, so 21 we're kind of looking for Council's help on 22 that. 23 MS. BRIER: What are you looking 24 for? 25 MR. DEMPSEY: So, Jimmy, what it

1	was at least, you know, this is obviously
2	before my even before my time
3	JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah. Well before
4	all of our time.
5	MR. DEMPSEY: It's a lifetime lease
6	and it does exist.
7	JIM O'MALLEY: Okay.
8	MR. DEMPSEY: Of a dollar.
9	JIM O'MALLEY: Okay.
10	MR. DEMPSEY: So, there is a lease,
11	it exists. Where the physical copy of it is,
12	I'm sure it's at the Borough building, I just,
13	I don't know. I'm sure
14	MR. WOLFF: So roughly 2002?
15	JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah.
16	MR. WOLFF: We've had discussions
17	JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah.
18	MR. WOLFF: but I didn't just
19	roughly 2002?
20	MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah. I would say in
21	and around there. But it was, you know, the
22	Borough's going to own the land and then we
23	would lease it to the little league for a
24	dollar for life.
25	JIM O'MALLEY: Got you.

1 MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah. And that 2 document does exist. I know I've seen it 3 actually. 4 MS. BRIER: Oh, really? 5 MR. DEMPSEY: Because I had the same inquiry years ago. 6 7 JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah. 8 MR. DEMPSEY: So I'm almost certain 9 that --10 MS. BRIER: And are you okay with 11 that? 12 MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah. 13 JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah. I mean, if 14 that's something that obviously that was put 15 in place back then, it's just -- and I know 16 Greg and I have talked -- like, recordkeeping 17 with the Borough with the little league has 18 been nonexistent for a long time and there's 19 things we're trying to get straightened, you 20 know, turned over when we leave here. 21 We have a new board of directors and 22 everybody on there is new, and a lot of us have 23 young kids, we're gonna be there for years. 24 We've kind of bounced around. 25 might have somebody, their kids are there for

1 two years and then we got a new president that comes in, everybody's trying to find stuff out, 2 3 so --MS. BRIER: 4 Okav. 5 JIM O'MALLEY: Yeah, if we could get that document so we have a copy of that, too? 6 One of the things we're worried 7 8 about is obviously if we know this is in place, 9 not saying it would ever happen, you know, the 10 Borough could come tomorrow and say, Hey, we 11 want the property back and the little league 12 wouldn't be there. 13 MS. BRIER: Right. 14 JIM O'MALLEY: So we're all just 15 trying to protect ourselves and find out what 16 the right thing to do is. 17 MS. BRIER: No, it'd be good for all 18 of us to know exactly what's going on. 19 MR. HALLINAN: If we can't find that 20 document, could we write a new one up? 21 ATTY. PERRY: Yeah. 22 MR. LOUGHNEY: Jim, just let me say, 23 wearing that top tonight, you took a chance 24 here. 25

JIM O'MALLEY: All weekend I've been

1 taking a chance, trust me. All right. 2 Thank you. 3 ALL MEMBERS: Thank you. MS. BRIER: Anyone else like to 4 5 address Council tonight? (No response.) 6 7 MS. BRIER: Okay. Seeing none. MR. WOLFF: Number 14, public 8 9 officials. The only thing I have is starting this month we're back on our regular schedule. 10 So second and fourth Mondays of the month. 11 12 MS. BRIER: Great. MR. WOLFF: We're off summer 13 14 schedule. Back to work. 15 MS. BRIER: Yep. Mickey? 16 ATTY. PERRY: Nothing. 17 MS. BRIER: Mayor? 18 MAYOR CONWAY: Just congratulations 19 to Councilman Hallinan, awesome job with the 20 Music Fest this year. I know everybody had a 21 blast and I know a lot of work goes into that, 22 so everybody involved, just great job. 23 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. 24 MS. BRIER: Mr. Loughney? 25 MR. LOUGHNEY: I would just like to

1 congratulate the mayor and the police 2 department on that drug bust. That's 3 fantastic. And it's good to get the publicity 4 5 it's gotten, because people have to be aware of what's taking place and the action that they're 6 7 doing. And, also, Chris, good job. Thank you. 8 I'd also like to ask, Greg, one 9 thing, I don't know if we could get in touch with PennDOT, but when you come off of Drinker 10 11 Street, 81, and you get off the top of Drinker 12 Street, that side over there is a mess. And I believe it's PennDOT's. 13 14 MS. BRIER: Like, litter? 15 MR. LOUGHNEY: The grass is just you 16 can't even see the sides, the weeds are so 17 It just looks terrible. high. 18 MS. BRIER: Whose is that? Ιs 19 that --That's PennDOT. 20 MR. HALLINAN: 21 MS. BRIER: Is that PennDOT? 22 MR. HALLINAN: Yeah. 23 MR. LOUGHNEY: I don't know if we 24 could --25 MR. WOLFF: The top of Drinker

Street?

MR. LOUGHNEY: Top of Drinker

Street. When you get off the Drinker Street
exit, at the light, it's just all overgrown.

If you would. That's all. Thank you.

MS. BRIER: Mr. Dempsey?

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah. Again, I'd love to congratulate the Dunmore Police Department.

They continue to do a fantastic job. I don't know if Igoe and Sargent Burgette are here.

Another job well done.

MS. BRIER: Oh, yeah.

MR. DEMPSEY: Oh, there they are.
Being modest. Earning those promotions.

And, also, thank you to Justin and Chris, you know, again, going above and beyond what you guys have to do. So, we appreciate it. Thank you. That's it.

MS. BRIER: Tommy?

MR. HALLINAN: I'd like to thank the DPW and the police for Music Fest. I mean, at some venues we had close to 450 people and the next day you didn't know anybody was there.

So, kudos to the DPW for cleaning up, the police for maintaining order.

I'd also like to thank -- Chief wasn't here -- Anthony Cali, I want to say Thursday, I was sitting on my porch and he kept driving around, and he finally pulled over and asked me if I smelled gas.

And I said, Yeah, I smell it. But, you know, I didn't know what it was. I thought it was more down by the corners.

So, he got out of his car and he smelled, you know, gas coming up out of one of the, it seemed like a pothole or something.

So, the fire department came down, they did their gauges on it, you know, found it was natural gas.

The gas company came out all that night. I didn't sleep well because they were digging, but it was fantastic because it was a potential problem or it could have been something even worse.

But kudos to Anthony Cali for doing what he did and protecting our neighborhood.

So, another thing by the police.

I'd like to thank, you know, thank you, Chris, for doing a great job there with that accident up at the bus. That was

fantastic.

So, thank you very much. That's all I have.

MS. BRIER: Okay. Beth?

MS. ZANGARDI: Yeah. Just a couple of things. Frank Street drug bust was in my neighborhood and I'd like to thank the Dunmore Police Department and everybody who participated in it.

However, I'm gonna stay on it until it gets fixed. There's a problem back there, they're out-of-state landlords, Scaritelli (phonetic) owns an eight-unit apartment with zero parking. Parking all over the place, in and out, and the ordinances say and the zoning says, Greg and Mike and Max, if it's more than two units, you have to provide parking.

Scaritelli has done nothing, and this is the fourth month I've asked. Rinaldi has -- I'm sorry, Ferguson, done nothing.

There's four units, one parking spot.

There is a three unit down at 108 and a half Frank Street, three units, zero parking.

Landlords are getting better spots

than the homeowners are, and when I talk to anybody about it, they say, Well, if we go after the parking on the sidewalks, we have to go after the landowner, the homeowner. Okay. But then do something about the parking.

That being said, I do want to say thank you to the police department for that drug bust.

And if we could also do something about still getting complaints about the Amendalaro house on Drinker Street in Dunmore? I don't care what he does with it. If he cleans it up, that's awesome, but, again, blighted properties in Dunmore.

So, that's all I have. And thank you to the DPW for all the work you did on the Music Festival.

I have a neighbor who asked for a curb, they did awesome on that. Thank you again for the entire DPW department. And summer fest was awesome. We enjoyed it. I don't think we missed one. But thank you to everybody. Thank you, Tom, Brian McGurl, Hosey (phonetic) Lavelle. So, thank you. That's all I have. Thank you.

MS. BRIER: Katherine?

MS. OVEN: I would just like to reiterate, Congratulations, Hal, on the Music Fest.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks.

MS. OVEN: It's a wonderful thing for the Borough. And thank you to DPW, police and the fire that protect us and clean up and keep the Borough safe. And we appreciate it.

MS. BRIER: And Katherine was able to go out and get a grant for the cats, you know, to trap the cats. It was a -- is it Spitz?

MS. OVEN: Yeah.

MS. BRIER: Spitz from the Scranton Area Foundation for \$4,000, which is huge. It really will help because she does such a great job with that. How many cats have we trapped so far?

MS. OVEN: Like, 105.

MS. BRIER: 105 cats. Yeah. And it's all volunteer except the veterinarian, so she has to manage that, all the volunteers and then get them to, you know, trap the cats and then get them to the veterinarian. The

1 veterinarian's been really reasonable, too, 2 right? 3 MS. OVEN: Yeah. Griffin Pond and 4 Indraloka have supported our program and the volunteers. 5 MS. BRIER: Yep. And the 6 7 volunteers. It's a great program. I mean, I 8 think we're just scratching the surface. 9 MS. OVEN: No pun intended. 10 MS. BRIER: Sorry. That was a bad 11 And, yeah, and again I know that the fire one. 12 department's always on standby for the Music 13 Fest, too, and I just didn't want to overlook 14 you guys because you're always there for us, 15 you know, your whole department, as well as the 16 police and DPW. So, thanks everyone. 17 Appreciate it. 18 MR. WOLFF: I just need a motion to 19 adjourn. MS. BRIER: Okay. Can I have a 20 21 motion to adjourn? 22 MR. LOUGHNEY: So moved. 23 MR. DEMPSEY: Second. 24 MS. BRIER: Okay. I have a motion 25 and a second. All those in favor?

MR. MARQUIS: My name is Ant

Marquis. I'm a local musician/community activist. I just travel the State of Pennsylvania and stuff like that and I just try to help multiple boroughs and multiple counties and things of that nature.

I'm all over Youtube doing this stuff, so I'm kind of, like, known. Like, I'm well known in Northeast PA. I'm all in the newspapers, all on the news stations, but I didn't come here to make it about that.

I really just came here to speak about the homeless pandemic that's starting to, the word that I can use is migrate out here into Dunmore, PA.

We have a huge issue with this in the State of Pennsylvania, but it's bigger than the State of Pennsylvania. This is all across America, you know what I'm saying?

So, like, I don't know where to start, you know what I'm saying? I'm starting within my state, I'm starting within Northeast PA, but the higher I go up, then eventually I'll sit and I'll talk to, like, the president

1 and stuff like that and hopefully we can do 2 something about this. 3 But right now I want to bring it to you guys' attention just so you guys can 4 5 prepare, you know, ahead of time and do something about this. 6 Maybe we have a shelter or 7 8 something. I don't know if we have a shelter 9 out here. I'm new to Dunmore. All I do is just travel, you know what I'm saying, so I'm 10 11 new to Dunmore. I don't know what's out here. 12 I don't know what's out here, you 13 know, but I do want to bring attention to that 14 because we do have to prepare for this because 15 it's gonna get out of hand if we don't do 16 something about it. 17 MS. ZANGARDI: Sir, what was your 18 name again, please? 19 MR. MARQUIS: Ant, A-N-T, space, M-A-R-Q-U-I-S. 20 MS. ZANGARDI: Okay. 21 22 Well, welcome. MR. LOUGHNEY: 23 MS. ZANGARDI: Yeah. Welcome to 24 Dunmore. 25 MS. BRIER: Yeah. Thank you.

1 ALL MEMBERS: Thank you. MS. BRIER: We appreciate you 2 3 coming. MS. ZANGARDI: Yeah. There are a 4 5 couple of homeless shelters in Scranton. MR. MARQUIS: Yeah, but here's the 6 thing, I've stayed in those shelters, they're 7 8 not big enough for all of the homeless people 9 that are coming to Scranton. 10 MS. ZANGARDI: Right. 11 MR. MARQUIS: Like, I was just 12 homeless out there in Scranton, so I know how 13 it is. Like, it's getting to the point to 14 where it's that whole city is starting to 15 become filled with just homeless people and 16 drug addicts. 17 So, we don't have enough space 18 within that shelter. I've stayed in that 19 shelter. We got men sleeping on top of each 20 other, they're fighting all the time. 21 They only got, like, five or six 22 beds in there, you know what I'm saying? So we 23 need to do something about that, too. 24 I'm trying to raise awareness to 25 where as though we can get, like, a bigger
