Mrs. Brier, before you start, again, we advertised for this position. 6 7 is to help assist ramping our rental 8 registration. 9 And we also have a vacancy. It was 10 advertised. We interviewed, myself, Katherine 11 and Mrs. Zangardi and Mike Brazil interviewed. 12 And we recommend Faith Canavan. 13 MS. BRIER: So I have a motion to 14 appoint a code enforcement administrative assistant Faith Canavan. 15 MS. ZANGARDI: I'll make that 16 17 motion. 18 MS. OVEN: I'll second. 19 MS. BRIER: I have a motion and a 20 second. Anyone on the question? 21 MS. ZANGARDI: Yes, we had three 22 candidates, all very strong candidates. 23 believe by far we chose the best candidate to 24 help the Borough move forward with among other 25 things our rental registration.

And she's just very knowledgeable and very smart. Greg and Mike and Katherine and I all agreed unanimously that she was the best candidate for the Borough. And we welcome her and welcome aboard Faith Canavan.

MS. BRIER: Anyone else on the question? All those in favor.

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.

My brief analysis for the month of October. We had a net income for the month of \$83,000 which brings our year-to-date net income to \$141,000.

As far as income highlights, the state capital and operating grants we received a \$50,000 grant for the police body cam.

Miscellaneous revenue of \$19,000, Express

Scripts rebates for second quarter of 2024; and special assessments of \$681,000 for the third quarter 2024 landfill fees.

On the expense side, it was a pretty standard month. The only highlight would be our insurance premium. We made our fourth and

final installment for the quarter auto and liability insurance. So that has been paid in full for the year. And most of my other time was wrapping up with the budget prep.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you, Mark.

MR. WOLFF: Number 11, Chris

Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: Hello. The past several weeks have been pretty busy here. We continued hosting parties pretty much every weekend. We just had the election here. And a couple days after that we had the senior pasta dinner.

Biddy basketball has started and their preseason practices are ending this week and the season starts Saturday. They are scheduled to finish near the end of February. We're also trying to put in several grade school team practices along with Dunmore High School girls and boys teams are coming next week.

I guess they are having trouble with the auxiliary court over there, whatever, but other than that, that's all I have.

MS. BRIER: How often do the Biddy

1 people come? I know it's Saturdays. 2 Sundays too, right? 3 MR. KEARNEY: Well, those are the 4 But then they're here four other nights games. 5 so six out of seven. MS. BRIER: Thanks, Chris. 6 7 so much. 8 MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you, Chris. 9 MR. WOLFF: Michael Judge, Didge. 10 MR. JUDGE: We're ready to go for --MR. LOUGHNEY: Don't say it. 11 12 MR. JUDGE: No, the snow we're not 13 ready to go. We got three trucks out. There's 14 a lot of work that has to be done on some of 15 these trucks. He's got them. He's taking 16 another one up tomorrow. 17 Usually we try to keep them in and 18 they're getting older, like, five or six years 19 old. The plowing kills them. But he says we should have when he's done with them six, five 20 21 550s and the big one. So we just hope we don't 22 get any snow. I don't think they're calling 23 for any. 24 MR. LOUGHNEY: Didge, do us a favor,

please, just check with them frequently.

1 MR. JUDGE: Check with what? MR. LOUGHNEY: Check with the 2 3 trucks --4 MR. JUDGE: I'm up there every day. 5 I was up there before I came here tonight. it's not him. He's -- two of them are down at 6 Scranton Dodge that they are recalls. Recall, 7 8 when they take a recall in, that should be done 9 immediately. 10 So he's going to make calls 11 And I'll have someone make a call. tomorrow. 12 And we'll see if we could get them -- at least 13 worked on them. I drove down today to see if 14 maybe they were -- if they were parked outside 15 I was going to flip out. But there's nothing 16 outside. So they must have them in at least. 17 But I'll check every day. All right? 18 MR. LOUGHNEY: Thanks, Didge. 19 MS. BRIER: What were you going to tell us about, the Christmas decorations? 20 21 MR. JUDGE: They're ready to go. That's what I thought 22 MS. BRIER: 23 you meant by ready to go. 24 MR. JUDGE: Tomorrow I guess they're

It's hard to do without 12 the ladder. 13 MS. BRIER: It's very high. 14 MR. JUDGE: But we'll get them all 15 straightened out tomorrow. 16 MS. BRIER: Thank you, Didge. 17 MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you. 18 MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples. And 19 Chief Marchese is not present. 20 CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening, 21 Council. I'd like to welcome Nathan to the 22 department and wish him a long healthy career. 23 Welcome aboard my friend, Nathan. 24 MR. WARNER: Thank you. 25 CHIEF DENAPLES: As far as for the

Fire Department report as far as for expenditures, we didn't have very many expenditures on the report that I submitted earlier this month.

However, we're go having a little bit of a steep expenditure for some gear for Nathan. So we have to outfit him and personal protective equipment and a face mask and get him a pager and that. So we're probably looking at all said and done probably around 8,000.

The gear -- just the turnout gear itself, the jacket, the pants, the boots -- we have two brand new helmets so we're not going to have to buy them. They're probably between 6 and 7,000. The face piece is about \$450. The pager is about 400 and some dollars.

We're going to have to get him two new uniforms because the uniform allowance doesn't come out until July. So that is going to be the biggest expenditure. We're having one issue with the brush truck. I'm not sure if it's the transmission or the rear end is going in it.

So we have to get that evaluated.

I'm waiting to get that scheduled in. They're supposed to call me back tomorrow. So I'm not really sure what that is going to be price range, but that was not on here.

We had a 356 hours of overtime scheduled for the month of November. Hopefully that starts to decline with Nate coming on and getting through orientation on a shift. Fifty-seven part-time shifts put out. We completed orientation with our newest part-time firefighter.

And she was put on the schedule. So she could start working. There is one other part timer that's been intermittently doing orientation. However, he's having some family issues. So he was unable to come back right now to finish that up. My training officer is in contact with him.

Brindlee Mountain, the fire apparatus equipment repair and refurb company gave us an update on the truck. So that is moving along. And we have some stuff that we need to get approved, some stuff they found wrong in addition to what we initially thought.

So I spoke with Greg and I know

Katherine was copied on that today. So that is pretty much the Fire Department report besides for the call volume. So to current, we did 28 calls for this month from November 1st, 2 fire responses, 10 rescue and EMS type calls, 2 hazardous materials, 4 service calls, 3 good intent calls, and 7 false alarm type calls.

We do have smoke detectors available at fire headquarters. So if anybody that you know is interested, alls they need to do is call fire headquarters at 570-347-2592. That's my office or 570-348-1730. We'll go out and install them. So maybe we could even get that on the website. I know we did last year.

MS. BRIER: Yeah.

MR. WOLFF: I'll do a Facebook post.

If you want to give me all the wording you

want, I'll --

CHIEF DENAPLES: I'll just e-mail you that tomorrow and maybe we could put that on there.

MS. BRIER: Okay. Thanks, Chief.

CHIEF DENAPLES: We put in for two
grants, so one \$20,000 through the State Fire

Commissioner's Office. That's for rescue tools

for the engine when it comes back. There is no max to that or anything. Usually you are guaranteed that every year if it's applied to properly which it was.

And then a \$500 grant to the

Pennsylvania American Water Company for some
hose appliances. That's usually a guaranteed
one as well if it's put in before the deadline.

For code enforcement, we only had two code
enforcement inspections scheduled for this
month so far, myself and Mike and NEIC did them
last week.

There may be more, but that's all we have for right now. So that's all I have if there's no questions. Thank you.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Number 12, public comment.

MS. BRIER: Anyone have any public comment?

MS. NOLE: Kim Nole, address is 319
Oak Street, Dunmore, Pennsylvania. I'm here
under the cat issue again. I want to thank
Katherine and Beth because they have been up in
our neighborhood and just talking to my former

student in the hallway and I said something about the cats.

And he said, oh, yeah, you have that cat house next to you. It's extremely apparent when you drive down the street and there's this person is feeding between I'd say 10 to 15 feral cats, has eight cats in her own house as pets and recently had to get rid of everything out of her house because of cockroaches, beetles and fleas.

I mean, none of us should have to live next to that, let alone, you know, not even be informed. So it's frustrating. She comes home. She opens cans, flicks food everywhere. And, I mean, we're animal lovers, you know, but something has to be done.

MS. OVEN: Yeah, we were contact -Beth and I were both in contact. I was up
there on Sunday night. She has said that all
of her -- so under the ordinance, the feral cat
ordinance if you're feeding the feral cats you
have to TNR them or you are in violation of the
ordinance because initially we tried to fine
people for feeding.

And that didn't work because if

someone is going to feed them, they're going to sneak and they're going to feed them. So we felt if we put the ordinance in that you have to TNR them when you were feeding them, we could get control on the population.

MS. NOLE: But recently there were three kittens. So somewhere there is not --

MS. OVEN: So one of the people that helps trap is going to trap that mother and she's going to take the three kittens. So the three kittens could go to rescue because they're young enough. I did talk to her at length about, you know, this is becoming a public nuisance.

MS. NOLE: It is. Like I said, anybody could drive down the road and see, you know, the horrible condition. And the condos, yes, the cat condos that are now put out in the yard -- feral cats are not going to go in to begin because they don't want to feel confined or trapped. So this is just being put out to kind of stick it to the neighbors.

MS. OVEN: Right, so I did ask her to move them to the back of the property on the other side. So Mike Brazil and I are going to

go up on Thursday and meet with her and try to come up with some type of a solution that, you know, is fair to you because honestly I did say to her we're going to get to a point where you have to be fined because it's falling under more of a public nuisance issue.

MS. NOLE: And truly it is because these cats every time you look at them, they are scratching. And you feel bad for them. If she wants to feed them, then throw a flea collar on them or something.

They've infected the dog across the street. And all those people do is take the dog for a walk and it goes back up in the apartment. They just got a brand new couch and they were infected with fleas.

MS. OVEN: Yeah, I'm sorry for what you are going through. I know I've said this before. So we're going to work with, you know, our ordinances and our zoning regulations and try to come up with a solution because it's not fair to you and your neighbors.

MS. BRIER: How many cats does she have?

MS. NOLE: She has eight in her

house as her own pets that are in the house and they don't get out. And when I'm telling you the people were in there cleaning the house out are with their hazmat, you could smell the odor coming out that front door and the poor guys in their hazmats had to come out and keep taking breaths of fresh air.

You know, I mean, I offered them clean water. The guy came out and he was even on the phone and said what is an hour job is ten hours in this house, you know, and the poor garbage guys who were picking up the trash that she's putting out are picking up garbage with bugs that are then being transported down the street, like, if they crush, you know, like, it's a hazard for everybody.

MS. OVEN: It's a public health issue.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Let me ask a question. Chief, could that be inspected, that house?

CHIEF DENAPLES: Yeah, it could be.
We could schedule an inspection through NEIC.
Is it a rental property?

MS. NOLE: No. She owns the house.

1 CHIEF DENAPLES: That might be a little harder. I thought it was a rental. 2 3 MS. NOLE: No, trust me, I would 4 have loved for you to have seen it when she was 5 at work and the guys were in there emptying it I have pictures of everything. 6 CHIEF DENAPLES: I'll check with our 7 8 third party inspection agency. When you sit 9 back down I'll get the address from you. 10 MS. ZANGARDI: Chief, we have the 11 information if you need it. We have pictures, 12 everything. 13 MS. NOLE: I tried to send pictures 14 of the cat so that, you know, Beth and Katherine could see about the ears. 15 16 MS. BRIER: Right. That's what I 17 was asking, are they TNR'd. 18 MS. NOLE: I tried. I'm not walking 19 all the way over. I removed a screen out of my one thing so I could get clear pictures through 20 21 a window. 22 MS. OVEN: She has said that all of 23 her outdoor cats have been fixed except for 24 one, which then had kittens which we're going 25 to trap and relocate the kittens. This would

1 fall under a public nuisance if she, in deed, have them all TNR'd. Again, it's throwing the 2 3 cat food out the window, placing the cats --MS. NOLE: I know. We haven't 4 5 spoken in six years because of her standing and literally throwing cat food in my driveway that 6 7 time and then I've been directed to not engage. Mrs. Brier, I know we're 8 MR. WOLFF: 9 back and forth but we're over the five. 10 MS. BRIER: All right. Thanks, Kim. 11 MS. OVEN: We're going to be up 12 there on Thursday, Kim, and I'll let you know 13 what we come up with. And again, it's going to 14 come down to, you know, she's going to start 15 getting fined if she's not cooperating. 16 MS. NOLE: Sorry, I'm over my limit 17 but as the teacher, they all know I talk. 18 Thank you. This is the first time I did the 19 pledge since June 6th. 20 MR. WOLFF: I just want to say my daughter McKenzie, you're still her favorite 21 22 teacher. 23 MS. NOLE: Give her a kiss for me. 24 Tell her thank you. 25 MS. OVEN: Thank you, Kim.

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Kim. State your name and address.

MR. MCDONALD: Rick McDonald, 1502
Clay Avenue in Dunmore. Good evening, Council,
and thank you for allowing me to speak here
tonight. This won't be long. I originally
had a lot of paperwork to give you. I do have
some pictures that I do want to leave with you
guys.

I want to give you background on my property. My property is the property on Council Street. And how this all came about -- I know I've contacted many of you about the concern with the water running off into it. So let me just go over -- I bought this property in 1989.

In the mid 90s, I don't know exactly when Monroe Park, Monroe bridge -- Monroe Avenue bridge was closed. So they opened up -- extended Clay and they opened up Council Street. At the time I purchased it, I believe it was a dirt road. I remember it being a dirt road. I don't know when they did pave it.

In around '94, '95, we had a heavy

rainstorm that went into the 2 Webster Drive house, right into their living room. Their names are Joe and Donna Bouser{phonetic}. They went up to the Dunmore Borough Council meeting and sent them letters and pictures.

The Dunmore Borough contacted me.

Your Aunt Lois came down to the property.

Leonard Verrastro came down and two other

people. They asked me if I would let them go

trench through my property to alleviate that

house being inundated with water all the time.

I agreed to do that. I had my attorney, Armand Olivetti, go and meet with their attorney. We made an agreement that they would give me that land in the back which I thank you for doing that and they put in a catch basin to get rid of the water.

So I never had one drop of water on my property ever. So that's why, you know, there was nowhere for me to get the catch basin put in. So my son-in-law and my daughter are going to build a house there next year.

They're going to start in August.

And now it's very urgent for me to take care of this water problem. I'm asking

you to reconsider -- I know some people are telling me they can't do -- whatever the reason may be, I believe there's a way to do it.

I'm going to leave you some pictures. I'm going to show a 2018 picture where the water goes and it does not go into my property right now. It goes into the neighbor's property, the same house that was flooded.

And by the way, she was flooded in 2018. And she went before Council. And the Council came down, told her DPW would build up the curb so they built up the curbs about 4, 5 inches which is putting more water onto my land. So I'm kind of -- I did the Borough a favor.

I did them a favor. I'm just looking for an answer to come up with some solution to get rid of this water. They are going to start next August. It's going to be a very nice home. Let's say the taxes are \$5,000 between the Borough and the county and the school.

In 10 years, that's \$50,000. In 20, 30, 40 years, that's a lot of tax revenue

coming in. I don't know if we could build it unless we take care of this water problem. So I'm asking you to consider it.

 $I'm\ going\ to\ leave\ the\ pictures\ with$ Greg or somebody if you could give them -- I have one copy for each one of you.

MS. BRIER: Rick, do you have that document that they -- that said we put a catch basin in -- that Dunmore would put a catch basin in?

MR. MCDONALD: You guys have an easement that was signed by Mary Rice in 1999 that says the Borough will install and maintain the catch basin and the stormwater collection system. You have a copy of that. And by the way, five years ago, six years ago I gave nine copies to the former solicitor up in our Borough Building.

And then two years ago, four years ago, I gave some copies to the Borough Manager then and I asked him to give it to Council. I know none of you guys were there back in the 90s. I know that. I know you for a long time. Sometimes I call you. I don't like to call you guys at home. Katherine, I didn't call you and

Janet, I didn't call you.

I don't like to call people. You know, I was superintendent. I didn't like when they called a school board member. Just call me directly. So I decided to come down here tonight to talk to you directly. I think we could find a solution to this.

MS. BRIER: What are you looking for?

MR. MCDONALD: The catch basin put in. I gave an easement so they could run the water down my land, which I lose 15 feet, 7 and a half on each side and turn it over, go out toward Clay Avenue. First of all, when it rains there's a very small amount of water.

It's 70 feet of this road and 70 feet of that road, down the middle of my land, my land that I could never build on because that was part of the agreement when you gave me your land because I could never build on this 15 foot by 160 foot piece of property. That's a lot of square footage.

I believe it could run out to the corner near the parking lot which is inaccessible to most people. Like, no one goes

over there. It's all overgrown in knotweed by the way, yeah, knotweed.

So I think there is a way they could release it there. And it's not very much. And I think they could even get it out to the road if you have some people take a good hard look at it and see what type of price it would be and what you could do with it.

For now -- and you're going to see these pictures and you're going to see how much water is running onto my property now. And I'm in mediation with the PUC over what they did to my land. Since they -- they just redug that whole street again. But that's another issue. I'll give these to Greg or -- I just would really like you to consider -- unless you want to take them.

MS. OVEN: Yeah, we can take them now.

MR. MCDONALD: There is nine in each. I have a clip on it. One thing I would like you to look at is that first picture is taken in 2018 or '19. And you could see where the water is going. It's not going onto my property. If you look at that very first

picture, that water is not going onto my property.

It's going onto my neighbor's property. Now, it's all going onto my property. I had them clipped. I have little notes on them too. The very first picture was 2018. That water is going down the property of 2 Webster Drive. That is 5 or 6 feet off my property line. I'm not affected.

Since PG & W came in, I am now affected. They did put a curbing in last week because they redid that whole sewer line there. And I don't want to say too much because I'm in mediation with them. But it's a big concern. And I really need it to be addressed. I think if everybody sits down, we could work it out.

MS. BRIER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. MCDONALD: Okay, you're welcome.

MS. BRIER: Thank you so much.
