And this funding will be coming from the landfill fines that we received from the consent order agreement from DEP. We have about \$63,000 left in that account out of the 108,000. This will leave us with about \$53,000. So we'll be able to work on that door access.

MR. WOLFF: It took a while -- we got a couple quotes. It took a while to find another quote to get these cameras done. That was the delay.

financial report, Mark.

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.

My brief analysis for the month of November, we recorded a net loss for the month of \$583,973.

We had some very large expenses which I'll get into momentarily. It brings our year-to-date net loss at \$369,000.

As far as income was concerned in November, business licenses and permits we received 49,000 for Comcast franchise cable fee for the third quarter of 2024 and special assessments of 25,000 for the CEP, the Community Environmental Project which is the landfill fees.

Expensewise, it's been the CEP donations which is a wash from the revenue side of \$25,000. Financial administration 21K in for our 20023 audit fees. Buildings and plan, the Borough Building improvements, the concrete work and the new pillars, landscaping.

Police there was \$63,000 of final payment for the 2000 police cruisers. So that payment is now paid in full. The cars are paid in full. Fire, there was 42,000 for the Volunteer Fire Relief Association which we

received the funds in September. So that was a wash.

And highway construction rebuild, 225,000 for the 2024 paving project. And government, our retirement and pension there was 15,000 in actuarial fees that we paid in the month of November. So we had some pretty large expenses which gave us a net loss for the month.

ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Mark.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: The past several weeks we've continued to host parties here in this room. The various senior groups, painters, yoga, bingo, the board game players, they're all going to have individual Christmas parties coming up in the next couple weeks in here. It's just during the week.

And then on the weekends we continue with the parties. Biddy basketball is also continuing along with the grade school team practices. And Biddy will be taking a pause during the Christmas break. And we'll be open during the holiday week like we'll open like 11:00 in the morning so the kids can come down.

The only days we won't be open is Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and New Year's Day. We're going to be open until 3:00 New Year's Eve and then Biddy resumes Thursday, June 2nd. That's it.

MS. ZANGARDI: We're going to try to start painting in here on the 26th and 27th. I marked it up at the Borough Building. So I talked to Allison today. They're going to have everything in the center of the room, walls taken, cleared off.

Can we try and get some kind of a contractor agreement with the people who rent about taping -- putting tape on the walls, only puddy can be used?

MR. KEARNEY: You mean for the parties. Okay, yeah, I'll tell the girls in the office because they book the parties. They can just tell them you can't hang stuff because your destroying --

MS. ZANGARDI: Right. Exactly. But my other question is -- it just flew right out of my head. So the girls -- the fees, how much do we charge to rent this room?

MR. KEARNEY: It's 50 an hour if you

are from Dunmore and 75 an hour --

MS. ZANGARDI: Okay. That's what I wanted to know. Thanks. That's all -- I think that's all for now, right?

MS. BRIER: Yeah. Thanks, Chris.

MS. ZANGARDI: Thanks, Chris.

MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge is not present. Chief Marchese is not present. Chief DeNaples.

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening,

Council, just have a couple expenditures. The one that was pretty steep for the month of December, kind of came out of nowhere we had a leaky fuel tank on the ladder truck. The ladder truck is a 2016.

So we noticed when we were training the new firefighter out on the side of the building that there was a puddle underneath it. There was a big puddle of fuel. So that tank had to be replaced. Luckily we were able to get it taken care of within 24 hours in the building.

It didn't have to go anywhere. But that was \$3,500. That was for the part and to

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have two people come in and install. I spoke with the folks from Gleck and I said is there a better type of tank we can get, and they said that's the tank for that truck. That's pretty much -- they see that a lot in the northeast with the grime and stuff.

So that was our biggest expenditure besides for the firefighting turnout gear, which is a little over \$7,000 for our new firefighter. However, the purchase order was approved. We're putting it aside just until he finishes a couple mandatory training requirements just so we are sure everything is good before we actually order that gear. But again, that was all signed and approved within the last couple.

MS. BRIER: Right. Last month, yeah.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Chief, is there a warranty on that gas tank?

CHIEF DENAPLES: So there is not,
Mayor. That gas tank is, you know, they don't
warranty that. They warranty the work to put
it in, the actual labor. But as far as the
tank itself just because it hangs underneath

1 the truck, it's exposed to everything. So 2 that's pretty much that. 3 As far as overtime for the month of 4 December when this report was completed, it was 5 540 hours, a lot of people on vacation for the holiday season here. Sixty-seven part-time 6 7 shifts went out for December. So that is 8 pretty much where we're at with that. 9 As far as events that the Fire 10 Department participated in, we were up the 11 corners yesterday doing some hot chocolate. 12 The hot chocolate was donated by the union. 13 They actually paid for that. 14 MS. BRIER: Oh, that was really 15 nice. 16 CHIEF DENAPLES: And Mr. Kearney 17 gave us the thermos from down here we used and 18 we returned them today. 19 MS. BRIER: And even the sirens 20 going, the kids loved it. 21 MS. ZANGARDI: Oh, I know. 22 CHIEF DENAPLES: Yep, absolutely. 23 It's all good stuff. 24 MS. BRIER: It was great. It really 25 Please thank everyone. was.

CHIEF DENAPLES: I sure will.

MS. BRIER: It was a wonderful event. You guys always to the job.

CHIEF DENAPLES: I'll send a message out to our staff tomorrow. As far as smoke detectors just for the month of November, we installed 107 smoke detectors. And that was after we put that message out which we usually do every year. It was just for one month. And they are all free.

MS. BRIER: That's wonderful.

MS. ZANGARDI: Do you have more?

CHIEF DENAPLES: We do. I could get as many as needed. So once our supply gets down to about 20 on hand, the Red Cross sends more. Yeah, so if anybody knows anybody, have them call fire headquarters and get them installed.

Our orientation is ongoing with

Nathan our new full timer. So that's pretty

much where we're at. As far as calls from

December 1st at the close of business today was

20. Responses, one fire type call, four rescue

and emergency medical services, seven hazard

materials type calls and gas leaks and stuff of

that nature, one good intent call and seven false alarms. That is where we get the number 20 from.

MS. BRIER: What is good intent again? I'm sorry, Chief.

CHIEF DENAPLES: So good intent is let's say we get a call -- and I always use this as an example. There's a car fire out on the interstate and you get out there and it was an overheated car or there was nothing found, something of that nature. So that's what the good intent coding is for.

MS. BRIER: Okay. Thanks.

as the code enforcement, we have two inspections scheduled for the 12th. I was unable to get into the computer today because Jean left half a day. By the time I got over there she was gone. So I think there is one or two more that are scheduled as of now. But there is two, definitely two for the 12th. And that's pretty much all I have at this point.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Number 16, public

comment.

MS. BRIER: Anyone here tonight who would like to -- yeah, please -- would you just come and state your name and address for Maria? Thank you.

MS. STRAUSKULAGE: My name is Ellen Strauskulage and I live at 231 Erie Street in Dunmore, S-T-R-A-U-S-K-U-L-A-G-E. Back in the end of 2021 I came and did not speak, but I came with some of the neighborhood ladies who were very concerned about the Bunker Hill bridge. It was at the end of 2021.

In 2022 in March I sent a letter to Representative Kyle Mullins who did reply and said that he was meeting with Representative Marty Flynn and that he would get back to me. Well, I've had a two and a half year anniversary and I have not heard from Representative Mullins. So I was wondering if you, ladies and gentlemen, might have an update on the Bunker Hill bridge.

MR. WOLFF: Sure. Actually, the funding is in place. We were approved for funding last year. It's through the federal -- they call it Tip Funding, Transportation

Improvement Plan funding. But the Borough is

on the hook for 5 percent of it. It's estimated to be between a 15 and 20 million dollar project.

So we're going to have to come up with some scratch for it. But the state is covering 15 percent, federal is 80 percent and we're 5 percent. But it is a go. But don't get your hopes up too much. It's a three to five year process.

So occasionally I'll get e-mails from PennDOT stating, hey, you need to fill this form out again or the engineers made this change. But the last time I got an update I believe it was put out to engineer. So we're proceeding. It's just going to take a while.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Ellen, not to interrupt you, I dropped the ball on you last month or so.

MS. STRAUSKULAGE: It's okay. I was ready to call you on it. I actually --

MR. LOUGHNEY: You should have.

Your dad was one of the best cops we had. I

would never want to go against him at all.

MS. STRAUSKULAGE: Thank you.

MR. LOUGHNEY: But I didn't get to

anybody after I talked to you that night. It's on me.

MS. STRAUSKULAGE: Well, I spoke -- I have to say Sally and Jean in the Borough office, they walk on water. Every time I call they are wonderful, so polite, so understanding, kudos to them. I called them with a suggestion once.

And this is what I spoke to

Mr. Loughney about. On the Myrtle Street

bridge in Scranton so I know the signs exist,

they have a yield sign on each end of the

Myrtle Street bridge which is far shorter than

the Bunker Hill bridge that says yield. The

second sign says to oncoming traffic. Seems

like an easy fix.

The yield right now on the Bunker

Hill bridge -- I wouldn't say no one listens,

but few listen. If I'm coming up on that

bridge -- probably I shouldn't take it but I do

because it's the shortest connection to the

mainland.

So I take it and I will get halfway across and there have been times where I will just back up because obviously somebody else

1 who was not listening to the yield sign is 2 coming. 3 I just called -- I think I spoke to 4 Jean the other day. I said, "Where are we on 5 adding to oncoming traffic?" She said, Ellen, I did speak to the -- I thought she said the 6 7 office manager. I'm not sure. But she said if 8 you want to go to the board meeting go. Here I 9 am. 10 Could we please at the end of each 11 end of the Bunker Hill bridge add to oncoming 12 traffic. Perhaps that would be a better 13 deterrent. The yield sign is not working. 14 MR. WOLFF: Yeah, so Jean and Sally 15 did pass that onto me. To keep up their good 16 will, yes, they did pass it onto me. 17 follow up to see where we're at with that. 18 MS. STRAUSKULAGE: Okay, great. 19 really appreciate it. 20 MR. HALLINAN: Greg, I have 21 another -- can we look into and we brought this 22 up on Friday --23 MS. STRAUSKULAGE: Thank you. 24 MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you. 25 MR. WOLFF: You're welcome.

1 MS. BRIER: Thanks for coming. MR. HALLINAN: 2 We brought this up 3 one time before about maybe be putting 4 temporary lights because even if this project 5 is five years out, I think we got to look -- I don't know how much it would cost but like stop 6 7 light on each side to just --8 MS. BRIER: Yeah, I think that's a 9 great idea. 10 MR. HALLINAN: -- use them on a lot 11 of other projects. It would be a better 12 deterrent but, you know, people are still going 13 to try to do what they do. But it's better 14 than what's there now because it's a free-for-all. 15 16 MR. O'MALLEY: Yeah, it's a bad 17 spot. 18 MS. BRIER: It's really bad. 19 MR. WOLFF: I could certainly check 20 into it. 21 ATTY. PERRY: Is it. 22 MS. BRIER: I think the light is a 23 great idea. 24 MR. WOLFF: But the project is in 25 process.

1 MS. STRAUSKULAGE: Thank you. 2 MS. OVEN: Thank God. 3 MS. BRIER: Anyone else want to 4 speak tonight? 5 MR. WOLFF: Public officials. MR. GENOVESE: Nothing to report. 6 7 Everything's all done until tomorrow. 8 MS. BRIER: Thanks, Andy. 9 MR. WOLFF: I have nothing, just 10 Merry Christmas if we don't see everyone. 11 ATTY. PERRY: Merry Christmas. 12 MAYOR CONWAY: I just want to thank 13 everyone who helped out yesterday. It was a 14 great event between people who donated, volunteered. 15 DPW did a great job this morning. 16 I went up and the place was spotless, Fire 17 Department, Police Department. It was a great 18 event. Everybody seemed happy. So thanks 19 everybody for all your help. MR. LOUGHNEY: I would just like to 20 21 commend the Mayor and his committee. That was 22 outstanding. It really was. It's a positive 23 thing for the Borough and to see all of those 24 kids, everybody enjoying it. Plus your wife 25 helped out with the weather.

So the weather participated and that was a great thing. And we won't see anybody now until after Christmas and after New Year's, so Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to everyone.

MR. DEMPSEY: I'll just echo what
Nibs said. Max, Cara Lowe, Chris Lowe.

Dunmore Business Association was fantastic. It
was unbelievable seeing that many people there.

I brought like hundreds of calendars and they
were gone in an hour. It was crazy, so really
a great job. That's all I have.

MS. BRIER: Thanks. Tom.

HALLINAN: So thank you for what 22 you do down there. 23 MS. ZANGARDI: I have a few things. 24 There's a new business in Dunmore Turcatti's 25 Salon and Spa. It's beautiful. If vou

could -- actually Mr. DeNaple's wife works there too. And obviously the Dunmore thing, that was awesome yesterday.

I really just want to mention

Carmela Mataloni, Brianna Demarco, those two
were on committee but great, great turnout,
awesome for the community. Nice job, Mayor.

Back to the -- and the Police and Fire
Department, sorry guys and DPW.

Properties on Frank Street

Scaratelli{phonetic} property was purchased in

2017. He's got over eight apartments there and

zero parking. The rule of law is two parking

spots per apartment. And he doesn't have any.

He provides himself off-street parking but

provides nobody else nor his tenants parking.

I called the state about it. The state doesn't have anything to do with parking. There is no rules or regulations for the state. It has to go back to the Borough. He has to provide parking. It's a mess back there. There is no parking. There is no walking.

They are all parking either on the sidewalks on both sides of the street. Cars cannot get through. It has to be addressed.

right?

And Scaratelli was purchased in 2017. He provides no parking for any of his tenants except for himself. The second one is --

MS. BRIER: Did you ask Mike Brazil?

MS. OVEN: Mike's aware of it,

MS. ZANGARDI: I've been talking about it for a long time. I finally called and it's not -- there's no such thing as grandfathered in either. Ferguson/Summa property, it used to be Dave Lopatka's mother-in-law's house. The front is on Homestead. The back is on Frank Street. They have four apartments.

They purchased the house I think it was September of 2023. They have one parking spot. They're parking everywhere. It's a narrow road to begin with. And again, I called the state, talked to the state. Dunmore made the ordinance. It has to be two spots per apartment.

I don't even care if there is one and a half spots per apartment, but you can't have none. Scaratelli's has one more for himself in the back. Nice guy.

ATTY. PERRY: We just -- Greg and I talked about this earlier. We're going to ask Mike to work with the Zoning Solicitor to come up with an opinion and so that they will be able to cite the people if it's appropriate under the zoning ordinance that we have.

MS. ZANGARDI: Regarding the Scaratelli, he has an empty spot back behind his property. Actually, I wouldn't mind going up to meet you guys. And he doesn't use it. He doesn't maintain it. The grass is -- I'm making it up when I say 3 feet high; but he doesn't maintain the grass or cut back there. But make that a lot for your people -- for your tenants.

Anyway, it's just -- the problem I'm having with it is we are now a neighborhood of children. When my husband and I moved in, we were the youngest people in the neighborhood and there were no children. Now there's children everywhere, bikes and there's nowhere to move a car out of the way.

And Frank Street is I think more narrow than Homestead Street but again, no parking. And nobody's fault, but, you know, we

could go back for years. There's too many apartments in that block, both blocks. There's a lot of apartments.

So anyway, that's all I have. I would like that addressed because it's not going to end up good in my feelings. And the one guy, he's in New Jersey -- sorry, Janet. He's in New Jersey. And he doesn't plow his driveway for his tenants and he has three.

So he has spots but he doesn't maintain the parking lot in the back. So that's my beef for the day. Merry Christmas, Happy New Year, happy healthy blessed New Year for everybody. Thank you so much.

MS. OVEN: I just want to congratulate Mayor Connors -- my God, where did that come from -- Mayor Conway and the business association. You don't look like him. It was a wonderful evening for the Borough. Thank you for the DPW and the fire and the police that helped keep everyone safe and Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

MS. BRIER: Well, I just want to thank my colleagues on Council and the Mayor and our Solicitor Mickey and Greg and Andy, the

DPW, Fire and Police for a great year in

Dunmore. Everybody on this panel works really

hard for Dunmore. And they have Dunmore's best

interest first.

So I just want to thank everyone because it's my first year as Council President. And it couldn't have been more cooperative. I mean, I think we have a very congenial group here. And again, everyone has the same focus. We want to do what's best for our town. So thanks, have a happy Christmas and a Happy New Year as well.
