MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.

Here's my brief analysis for the month of

December. We operated a net loss for the month

of \$838,000 which brings our year-to-date net

loss a deficit of the 1.2 million.

As far as income is concerned, it was very limited revenue. We did receive 68,000 in CFA grant for the improvements to the Dunmore Borough building and a miscellaneous revenue of 163,000 which was our insurance surplus distribution number two of two.

Expenses, obviously we had quite a bit at the end of the year, two very large year end in payrolls. We had to pay \$240,000 for a down payment for 2025 workman's comp. And we had a final MMO payment of \$157,000. And that's about it.

ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Mark.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: Good evening. The past several weeks we've continued with the party rentals here every weekend. This weekend Biddy Basketball is using this room. They do

pictures for a couple days. You know, they take all of those pictures.

So the following weekend we have parties again Friday through Sunday. We're in the middle of Biddy Basketball and the school team season. So practices are continuing nightly as you could see if you walk over there and games and practices are on the weekends.

Biddy All Star team practices are also starting. So and I also anticipate hosting a Biddy All Star tournament here in February, although the dates haven't been given to me yet because we do it every year. So that's all I have.

ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Chris.

CAPTAIN BARTH: Good evening,

Council. I'm going to start out with just

doing our monthly report for the month of

December, 2024, the end of our year. During
that month, our department responded to 686

calls for service.

We are down slightly 191 calls from

the month of November. December is primarily a little bit slower in the month because a lot of full time guys use up their vacation, the whole nine years. So it's usually -- the numbers will be a little bit lower for December.

During that period we did have 8 criminal arrests, 6 nontraffic arrests, 15 traffic arrests, 9 written warnings and 21 verbal warnings were given out for the month.

During the month of December, there was seven overtime shifts that were sent out. Overtime shifts again are filled -- only used at last priority if part-time officers are not available. From the start of the year until December 31st, we collected \$11,567 in our parking meters at the Dunmore Corners. That includes coin, credit card and pay by phone transactions.

Just to touch briefly on that, our numbers right now for November, December are way lower than they had been. We ran into an issue that me and Greg addressed. We realized that half of the batteries when the weather got colder, our batteries were going dead. We reached out to the company.

Apparently we didn't know this ahead of time, but they only have a life expectancy of 12 to 18 months, the batteries. So we don't know how long they were in storage prior to us purchasing them. They may have been sitting for two, three years, we don't know.

So essentially we got like a year out of our batteries. So we did have to go ahead and order all new -- not all, but we order a good amount of batteries that have to be replaced now. They still have not come in yet.

MR. WOLFF: I was going to say, between the two of us, we could remember to follow up tomorrow. They might have been delivered. We'll have to follow up.

CAPTAIN BARTH: Okay, absolutely.

Absolutely.

MR. HALLINAN: The breakdown of the numbers, do we have more in credit card or cash?

CAPTAIN BARTH: It seems to be cash.

What I've heard out there is when I'm up there collecting meters, a lot of people have been coming to me and saying they are having issues

with using the app. They're having issues with using their credit cards.

So the way that we have the parking meters set up is, if there's an issue with a machine, if we have a coin jam or if it's full, myself and Greg get an e-mail right from the company saying, hey, meter number 231 is having an issue.

So then either one of us will go up the following day and address the issue. What we've been coming across is, a lot of times people are putting pennies in where the quarter slots are and essentially is jamming it up.

And it's just creating all kind of havoc.

Essentially, you have to take the whole meter apart just to get the nickel or the penny out of it where it's designed for a quarter. So the slot isn't quite -- you know it's not made to take a penny.

And then I've also been noticing that the coins have been freezing in the cups. I don't know how, but they're getting water inside there. And when we go -- literally when we're dumping them, they're solid. I mean, we have to smash them off the ground just to get

the coins out. So I don't know what the issue is of that as well.

MR. O'MALLEY: I had trouble the last couple times I was up the corners. I can't see anything on the screen. I can't put a quarter in.

CAPTAIN BARTH: Yeah, the batteries are dead, probably 75 to 80 percent right now are completely dead. So we're just in a holding pattern right now.

MS. BRIER: Captain, we have some other parking meters up in the DPW that maybe we could just take the batteries out of them for now?

CAPTAIN BARTH: Well, I think the way it is, the battery is glued into the machine. So we do have plans for those. We actually went and ordered a bunch of more poles. We were able to get them locally for a third of the price is going to be from the company. And as soon as the weather cooperates, we're going to get more meters installed up there.

There's a couple on the right-hand side near Two Brothers that need a couple. And

then I advised that we should probably put some more in the two hour free lot. It was called the two hour free lot. It's not free anymore.

But there's a bunch of spots in there that people just park and they stay there all day because there is no meter. So we're going to get some more up there. I think we'll probably put roughly 12 to 15 more up now as soon as the weather breaks.

We did have -- we did straighten out the ones -- there was a couple on Chestnut Street that were almost bent over. You literally had to go, like, to put your quarter in. So we had those -- the DPW came down and straightened those out for us.

We actually unfortunately lost one right where the construction site is on Chestnut. It looks like a tractor-trailer made the turn too tight and ran it right over. It was in a million pieces up there. So we are definitely down one meter.

MS. BRIER: We do some extra ones.

CAPTAIN BARTH: We do have extra ones. We're going to be allocating them to certain spots. We'll get the poles in now and

stuff like that. So as soon as the weather breaks, we're going to get that moving and hopefully in the next week or so we'll get the batteries installed.

MS. BRIER: Yeah, if you could do that if you check on the batteries. You guys don't know if they are up there, do you?

CAPTAIN BARTH: I'm sure somebody will have to sign for them at some point. But I will definitely reach out in the morning to that company.

MR. WOLFF: We'll figure it out.

CAPTAIN BARTH: A couple other quick things, during the month of December, I'm sure you are well aware that we do our donation of monetary, clothing and toys we collect for our Christmas with the Cops Program.

We distributed endless amounts of stuff to multiple families that were in need at that time like we do every other year. One more quick thing, during the month of December we were granted approval through PennDOT for the installation of a safety zone in the 300 block of Chestnut Street.

The signs had been delivered last

week. And we were hoping to get them up today, but the DPW ran into some other stuff. So hopefully by tomorrow or Wednesday we'll get the signs installed.

Just so the public is aware, once these signs do go in place, the 300 block of Chestnut Street will be a 15 mile an hour school zone during the times of 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and again from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m..

I tried to get that a little bit more broader for times of mass and times of CCD. But unfortunately, PennDOT has strict regulations that you are only allowed so many hours per week. So we kind of spoke with the principal up there and allocated those would be the best times for the children going in and coming out.

So it will be -- it's essentially going to be from Potter Street up to Willow, that whole 300 block will be a 15 mile during those time periods only. One last quick thing, I'm sure most of the public is aware that it's been shared all over social media we're having a lot of car break-ins.

It's happening probably a year and a

half now. So we're just reminding please lock your door at night. It's happening sometime between 2 and 4 a.m. It looks like at this point it looks like it's going to be two separate people that are working together just by videos that we got.

So hopefully we could either catch them or they will run out of open doors and they'll move on. So like I said, reminder again make sure your doors are locked before you go to bed. And if anything suspicious, you see anybody, you hear anything, please call us.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. HALLINAN: Greg, can we get both of those things on the website about the 300 block and the break-ins? It's on social media enough.

MS. BRIER: Chief DeNaples.

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening,

Council. Start out with the Fire Department report and I'll get into the code enforcement. As far as expenditures for January, scheduled expenditures, the steepest one there was four new tires put on the ladder truck today. So that was pretty steep, \$2,096.20. That was

completed today.

The rest of the expenditures are very minimal at this point. As far as overtime scheduled, was 144 hours of overtime for just the month of January. There was 53 part-time shifts prescheduled for January as well. No scheduled events.

We still have one part time firefighter. He's been lingering with orientation since June, had some family issues, issues with his son. He comes in sporadically. We're trying to get him in the best we could, as much as we could. But it's been pretty tough.

Nathan Warner the firefighter that was hired full time is still proceeding through the orientation process. We just need to make sure that he's comfortable and good and able to, you know, operate.

MS. BRIER: Did all his equipment come in, Chief?

CHIEF DENAPLES: So the equipment was -- the equipment was held. I don't know if you remember from the last meeting, he still has to successfully complete his EMT training.

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So we have a purchase order that we secured.

We issued him spare gear. And we're just

waiting for him to complete that.

Contractually he needs to complete that so we just don't want to -- because he's an odd size. I'm pretty sure he's going to be good, but we just need to be sure be spend --

MS. BRIER: Is there a timeframe for the completion of the EMS training?

CHIEF DENAPLES: So he's doing a refresher course right now. And then he has three attempts to get it over the course of a year. He has a year to get it.

MS. BRIER: Oh, okay. Thank you.

CHIEF DENAPLES: So that's pretty

much that. I checked on the progress of our

rescue truck which is out for refurb. That is

still scheduled. Initially they said probably

the end of February. They're saying as of

today, probably the first week of March they'll

be bringing that back and switching them out

with the other truck we're currently operating.

So we're kind of on target with that. We had a couple unexpected items that popped up that we had to take care of. So we

had to spend a little more money unfortunately.

As far as for calls from January 1 to the close of business today, total of 27 calls; one structure fire; 12 emergency medical services slash rescue; 3 hazardous materials; 3 service calls; 4 good intent calls; and 4 false alarms.

And unfortunately through the end of December there, we had quite a bit of structure fires. And the long and short of it is, these people don't have smoke detectors. So we have it on our website. We've installed a ton of them, but if anybody knows anybody that needs them.

MR. HALLINAN: We had the big banner.

CHIEF DENAPLES: The big banner out there was out there for Fire Prevention Month. So anybody that knows anybody, call fire headquarters and we'll be more than happy to put them in free of charge.

MR. O'MALLEY: Do we have that on the website?

CHIEF DENAPLES: Yes.

MR. WOLFF: Yes.

MS. BRIER: Thanks, Chief.

CHIEF DENAPLES: As far as for the code enforcement, there was four scheduled code enforcement inspections, probably going to be more popping up. But they are scheduled.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you, Chief.

MR. WOLFF: Number 16, public Comment.

MS. BRIER: Does anyone here today have public comment? Do you want to address Council, the Mayor?

MR. LAWLESS: Could it be about an issue in my neighborhood?

MS. BRIER: Yes, please. That's why we're here. If you wouldn't mind just giving your name and address for Maria.

MR. LAWLESS: My name is Brian

Lawless, 107 Barton Street between Electric

Street and Delaware. There's a property on I

think it's 100 Barton Street. I have to

commend the police and folks here that I've

lived there 28 years. I raised my kids there.

And now I have a grandson who's visiting quite a bit. There's been a lot of suspicious activity, if you will. I've never

seen the police on my block so much this past three months as I have in the 28 years. And I'm not kidding about that. I've never seen the police on our street unless it was for an emergency.

There was a big party there with underage kids, a couple ambulances, bath salts, somebody apparently overdosed. But anyway, I have it on my Ring doorbell two arrests right in front of my house what appears to be drug related. The police I'm sure could shed some light on that.

Cathy was our neighbor there, she's living elsewhere. But she has a property right next door to this facility. They bring cars down and just dump them in her lot. She owns a lot there. They have been towed. The Dunmore Police have had DeNaples come down and tow them out of there. We see activity, again, I said on the Ring doorbell, 2 a.m., 3 a.m., people walking up and down the street.

MS. ZANGARDI: Is it a rental property, sir?

MR. LAWLESS: From my understanding it was a home that was owned -- it was a few

folks -- remember Evelyn Brower, it was her house. Evelyn sold it to a young man. The young man made it really nice and sold it to a woman from out of state.

I'm told she's incarcerated at the moment. And now her kids were taken away and there is young men just coming in and out of here all the time. Certain vehicles I see all the time. Volvos, I could ID them. We've had I think your daughter in law has taken pictures of their driver's license.

The police have been doing a great job. They've been stopping by. Is there anything that could be done since the owner of the home is not there? She's incarcerated. Is there anything we can do to shut this place down?

MS. OVEN: Her children are gone too, right?

MR. LAWLESS: Correct. My understanding is they're gone.

MS. OVEN: The owner is incarcerated.

MR. LAWLESS: I'm told she bought the home from the previous owner, a young man

who had built it up and now she's incarcerated.

ATTY. PERRY: Is she renting it to someone?

MR. LAWLESS: I have no idea. These guys come in and out all the time, different faces all the time.

MS. DESMARAIS: She's supposedly in the Bronx right now. We don't know if she's in jail there or staying there. She's not in her house on Barton Street.

MR. LAWLESS: That's accurate.

MS. DESMARAIS: And, therefore, there are at least two men who claim that they are friends of Melissa -- that's her first name, Melissa. And they were told to please come in and clean up the house. It was -- they gave the story that her daughter who is about 14 had a party with high school kids or whatever and wrecked the house and that the mother told these gentlemen to stay at the home, clean the house up.

And as far as we know, that should have been done by now and they should have left. But it's being a drug house -- turned into a drug house.

MS. BRIER: Our sergeant said he could comment on it if you'd like. Thank you.

OFFICER BURGETTE: So in regards to 100 Barton Street, they are correct. There is a lot of narcotics being dealt in and out of the house, various people coming there from Scranton, all over.

We had an arrest right in front of the residence when we sit there for drugs. The cars in which she's speaking about right now.

I got them towed out of the area. The problem we have here is we arrested the owner. I'm not going to say her name directly.

But we arrested the owner and she sent us a Facebook message whether she did it from jail or rehab or whatever, stating that no one is to be in her house and these people are trespassing, which is fine. But when we showed up, these two individuals had mail there and they were routinely getting mail there.

So they established residence. So now, we just can't just make them -- it was her friends who she let live there. Now she's incarcerated, she doesn't want anyone there. The problem is now it's a civil issue because

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they've established residence.

So we don't really know how to go about that the right way because she would technically have to evict them. We can't evict them from her residence. We did get a male that was wanted there just the other day in the basement.

Really the only thing we could do again is when we had problem houses in the past, we just had target enforcement on the house. It sounds like harassing but it's not in nature. You could sit a car there directly in front of that house and you could put an unmarked car there and you could stop every single car that comes there.

You could stop anybody going into the house and it's all for what we're claiming, I mean, she's stating no one is supposed to be there and we're checking every time someone goes there.

MR. HALLINAN: Is this something that the zoning and you could go to the magistrate with or something --

OFFICER BURGETTE: Another thing is,

I don't know how -- not just zoning but, like,

17	calling me personally to be there with you when
18	you for safety reasons.
19	MR. WOLFF: Yeah, let's go over it
20	with Mike.
21	MR. LAWLESS: Should I call any time
22	if I see something happening?
23	MS. BRIER: Every time.
24	MR. HALLINAN: Call anytime 911.
25	MS. ZANGARDI: 911, because it's

been on the record and eventually hopefully someday we'll be able to get it as a nuisance property.

MS. BRIER: Well, if the owner says you can't live there, does it matter that they have established residency?

ATTY. PERRY: They are squatters apparently. But she is the only one that has the right to evict them out of there.

when she's nowhere to be found. She sent us, again, a Facebook message on our department Facebook. I can't confirm that that's actually her.
