Thank you. 6 7 Anyone have anything on the agenda items only? 8 MR. WOLFF: Number four, a motion to 9 approve the minutes of the meeting from the 10 February 10th, 2025 meeting. 11 MS. BRIER: Okay. I need a motion 12 to approve the minutes from the meeting from February 10th, 2025. 13 14 MR. LOUGHNEY: So moved. MR. O'MALLEY: 15 Second. 16 MS. BRIER: We have a motion and a 17 second. Anyone on the question? All those in 18 favor. 19 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 20 MR. WOLFF: Number five, a motion to 21 approve and pay the open bills. MS. BRIER: Can I have a motion to 22 23 approve and pay the open bills? 24 MR. LOUGHNEY: So moved. 25 MS. OVEN: I'll make that motion.

1 MS. BRIER: Okay. MS. OVEN: I'll second. 2 3 MS. BRIER: Okay. I have a motion and a second. Anyone on the question? Mark is 4 here if anyone has a question about them. 5 Ι don't see anything. All those in favor. 6 7 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. MR. WOLFF: Number six, a motion to 8 9 approve a Memorandum of Understanding with the 10 Dunmore School District. 11 MS. BRIER: Okay. So we have a 12 motion to approve a Memorandum of Understanding with the Dunmore School District. Can I have a 13 14 motion first? MS. ZANGARDI: I'll make the motion. 15 16 MS. BRIER: Can I have a second? 17 We need a second to approve the Memorandum of 18 Understanding with the school district. 19 MR. O'MALLEY: I'll make the motion just to get it on. 20 21 Okay. So I have a MS. BRIER: 22 motion and a second. And we do need to talk 23 about this. On the question? Greg, do you 24 want to explain this, what's going on here? 25 MR. WOLFF: Sure. This Memorandum

of Understanding is the school district reached out to us expressing their interest in -- I don't know if you want to call it creating their own police department but using a force that they hire using their own people to provide the school resources officers.

This Memorandum of Understanding is -- you could chime in too a little bit if you would like, Trip, but to basically state we will work with the school district in any way that we can, give them any support that we possibly can. And that's what the gist of this --

MS. BRIER: Yeah, if situations arise where they would need more help than just a --

MR. WOLFF: Right. And we'll keep open lines of communication.

MS. BRIER: Meet with them.

MR. WOLFF: Meet with them.

MS. BRIER: That's part of the memorandum as well.

MR. WOLFF: So this was, you know, given to us and we're reacting to it.

MS. BRIER: Yeah, the school board

has decided not to use the Dunmore Police for their school resource officers. They are going to hire their own basically. And they needed this Memorandum of Understanding so that they would have, in fact, in effect a backup.

And, of course, we're totally willing to do that with our Dunmore Police
Officers. So I have a motion and a second --

MR. O'MALLEY: On the question? I have always been in contention I want Dunmore cops in our schools. I am going to vote yes simply because it's the school district that these are their wishes. So but I prefer to have Dunmore cops in our schools.

MS. BRIER: Right. And it's not up to us, you know, it's up to the school board to decide what kind of security they need. So I have a motion and a second. All those in favor?

MR. DEMPSEY: I'm going to speak on the question too because this was -- back in, I think it was 2014 or '15, I was on that Council. We decided to put the Dunmore Police Officers in the school district at no charge to the Dunmore School District.

Obviously I would much rather prefer having our police department in that school and I fought for it for years. I always felt like I was fighting an uphill battle. But we kept them there as long as we could. They decided to go into a different direction after -- we really tried to come to an agreement. It's unfortunate that they are going to go on their own separate way.

I think it's a mistake. I think it will end up -- I think they'll end up coming back. I don't know, but we'll see. They are going to hire qualified, you know, people to stay at the school district. I would much rather have our police department there.

They provide more than just protection. When they're in there, they're talking to the kids. They know what's going on. They know all the kids' names and all the parents names. They get more information than just being a body to protect the schools, to protect the school.

They have so much more value than that. I am going to vote yes on it because that's the school district's wishes. We did

work together. We had a great relationship.

We're going to continue that. I don't want any
parents to think that the Dunmore Police aren't
going to be down there anymore.

They are going to be down there. We are going to patrol the school. Chief Marchese is here.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Absolutely.

MR. DEMPSEY: We will patrol the school when we can. We will provide support for those individuals that are hired ultimately by Dunmore School District. We'll provide them with whatever support they need. We're going to be in constant communication.

We're still going to work all the football games, the basketball games, the soccer games, whatever they need us for. So I just want to put that on the record. I don't want anyone to think that it's anything up here that is preventing our police officering there. So I just wanted to put that on the record.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Madam Chair, may I call for a roll call vote on this?

MS. BRIER: Sure. Absolutely. Roll call, Greg.

MR. WOLFF: Sure. Mr. Loughney.

MR. LOUGHNEY: I'm going to vote yes with the understanding that this was as Michael and Trip have said this was brought to our table. We didn't go and seek this. The school board came and they've elected to take this route. We are happy to help out in any way we can. But I want it on record that the school board approached us for this. Thank you.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, and I don't think I said this, but we did provide the school officers in 2015 free of charge. I forget how long it was that we provided free of charge.

At some point, you know, with overtime costs and, you know, guys being off we did have to submit a fee to the Dunmore School District who ultimately paid the fee up and until this school year. So it will take effect at the end of the school year. Yes.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. O'Malley.

MR. O'MALLEY: Yes.

MR. WOLFF: Mrs. Brier.

MS. BRIER: Yes. And in terms of the fee, you know, we did some work in terms

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of, you know, how much it cost the Dunmore Borough to put one police officer there. what we were asking for -- we were not asking to be made whole. We were not asking for reimbursement.

You know, the fee that we were asking for was roughly a third of the cost to the Dunmore taxpayers. So we thought that was pretty fair. I'm voting yes.

> Mrs. Mackrell Oven. MR. WOLFF:

I'm going to vote yes. This is something that the school requested and ask the Borough that we would agree to it. Obviously, as a parent I think the most

important thing is the safety of children.

MS. OVEN:

So I was told that they will be hiring people that are retired state troopers or police officers to ensure that these people that are protecting the kids are competent. And we are here to support in any way that we So I will be voting yes. can.

MR. HALLINAN: I want to be on the

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record also as saying that when we spoke about this, we'll be there any time they needed us, whether school opening, school closing, any event. We're there to help calls during the day.

I would even like to see them, you know, get out and walk around the school district property every so often. You know, we're not going to leave them high and dry. This is brought on by the school district and we're just answering their request. So I'm a yes.

MR. LOUGHNEY: I'll second.

MS. BRIER: I have a motion and second. On the question?

MR. WOLFF: Yes, Mrs. Brier, so we have -- we use IWDA. It's a Dunmore firm.

They're what's called our pave cut inspectors.

So that anybody that wants to cut our roads for utility work or any other type of work is required to get pave cut permit.

And with that comes fees for our inspector to come and make sure that they are doing it properly. It's a, you know, roads are obviously an investment. So we're doing our best to protect them. And obviously we're catching up. There's some out there that aren't there.

But IWDA does a fantastic job of staying on top of the utilities and the other contractors that are doing the work. So this would just amend -- it's been since 2022 to update fees.

MS. BRIER: And again, just so everyone knows, these fees are a passthrough.

Dunmore Borough does not -- you know, we pay them but we pass them through to the utilities

1 and the utilities reimburse us. 2 MR. WOLFF: Correct. IWDA bills us 3 and then in turn we bill the contractor or the 4 utilities. 5 MS. BRIER: Right. So I have a motion and a second. Anyone else on the 6 7 question? 8 MR. HALLINAN: On the question, I 9 just want to make sure everybody understands 10 too, for years the utility companies have not 11 been through their subcontractors doing the 12 pave cuts correctly. 13 And this way we have somebody 14 watching to make sure they are done instead of 15 coming back a year later and there's a belly in 16 the road because it wasn't done properly. 17 that's what we're reassuring here. 18 MS. BRIER: Thank's Tom. Anyone 19 else on the question? All those in favor. 20 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 21 MR. WOLFF: Number eight, a motion 22 to adopt Ordinance No. 3 of 2025 governing 23 collection, separation and recycling of Dunmore 24 Borough solid waste. 25 MS. BRIER: May I have a motion to

adopt Ordinance No. 3 of 2025 governing collection, separation and recycling of Dunmore Borough solid waste?

MR. O'MALLEY: So moved.

MR. DEMPSEY: Second.

MS. BRIER: I have a motion and a second. Anyone on the question?

MR. WOLFF: Just briefly, Mrs. Brier applied for a grant for recycling bins. We were basically told our ordinances are out of date. So our solicitor did some work and got this ordinance together to get us compliant with current DEP regulations.

MS. BRIER: Right, and then we'll be able to resubmit the grant. The ordinance was a pretty small part of the grant process, but apparently an essential part. We needed to update anyway. So it's now updated. And I'm going to submit that again in the spring. So all those in favor.

ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

MR. WOLFF: Number nine, a motion to approve a five year proposal from Murphy,

Dougherty and Company to conduct financial audits.

1 MS. BRIER: All right. I need a 2 motion to approve a five year proposal from 3 Murphy, Dougherty and Company to conduct 4 financial audits. MS. ZANGARDI: I'll make that 5 motion. 6 MR. O'MALLEY: 7 Second. 8 MS. BRIER: I have a motion and a 9 I'd like to explain this one as well. 10 We've used Murphy and Dougherty and Company for 11 a number of years. The increase over the five 12 years is really miniscule. And they do a 13 really, really good job for us. 14 They also do the tax claim audits 15 for us that weren't being done prior to two 16 years ago. So they have been -- they know us. 17 They know our system. They work really well 18 with Mark our Treasurer. So, you know, we're 19 feeling pretty good about hiring them again. Anyone else on the question? 20 21 MR. WOLFF: And they are a 22 professional service just for the record. 23 Yes, it is a MS. BRIER: 24 professional service. All those in favor. 25 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

17	whole application process. Captain Barth
18	performed a background check, criminal history
19	check and driver's license check. They were
20	both cleared.
21	MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you.
22	MS. BRIER: Does he have prior
23	training as a firefighter?
24	CHIEF DENAPLES: He does. He has to
25	go through our orientation, our department

1 orientation. He does have many years experience. And he meets all the credentials 2 3 that we require. 4 MS. BRIER: Thanks, Chief. 5 CHIEF DENAPLES: No problem. MS. BRIER: Anyone else on the 6 question? 7 All those in favor. 8 9 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 10 MS. BRIER: Opposed? (No response.) 11 12 MS. BRIER: So moved. 13 MR. WOLFF: Number 10, Treasurer 14 financial report. Mark. 15 MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council. 16 Here's our numbers for the month of February. 17 We had a net income of \$236,000. It brings our 18 year-to-date net income to \$236,000. As far as 19 the income is concerned, our real estate 20 collections have begun. They're underway right 21 now with the bills mailed in February. So that 22 is starting to pick up. 23 Our business license and permits, we 24 received 47,000 for our Comcast fourth quarter 25 2024 franchise fee. Miscellaneous revenue,

\$60,000 for our quarterly SRO reimbursement which was discussed earlier; \$20,000 insurance received for the total -- the police cruiser.

As far as expenses are concerned, highway, snow, and maintenance another 37 grand in rock salt and another \$50,000 in repairs.

We made our annual bond interest only payment.

That was \$92,000.

And our first quarterly auto
liability installment was \$75,000. That's it.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Mark.

ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Mark.

MR. WOLFF: Number 11, Chris

Kearney.

MR. KEARNEY: Good evening. These past several weeks we've continued hosting of weekend parties here. And we also had the finish of the official Biddy Basketball season. We're still hosting several school team practices weekly there. They're advancing postseason stuff.

Today we started a three week rental with a local basketball coach that is going on out here that will culminate in a couple of 3 on 3 tournaments later in the month. Thursday,

It's

1 we start our annual seven weeks of River Front 2 Sports comes here every Thursday night. 3 have an overflow down there. So we provide 4 them. They rent. 5 We also have a weekly rental starting April 2nd and continuing until June 6 7 with the Electric City Blitz team. 8 Friday, we host the Indo-American community. 9 They have their annual spring celebration. 10 It's called Holi. This is a spring celebration 11 consisting of bonfire, dancing, and food. 12 MS. BRIER: In this room and then 13 outside? 14 MR. KEARNEY: It's everywhere. 15 there, here and there. 16 MS. BRIER: Nice. 17 MR. KEARNEY: There will be 800 18 people. So and we've also started preliminary 19 meetings with Jog for Jude. Their event is April 26th, Saturday. So we're starting that. 20 21 MS. BRIER: Are they going to do 22 fireworks again? 23 MR. KEARNEY: I would imagine. 24 don't know. 25 Chief? MS. BRIER:

1 MR. KEARNEY: They've done it the last two years. I don't know. 2 3 MS. BRIER: They haven't approached 4 you? 5 CHIEF DENAPLES: They haven't but if at all they would do a light show just --6 7 it's a concern every year. And we saw what 8 just happened down in the city with that last 9 I know they're beautiful, but --10 But they haven't MS. BRIER: 11 approached you yet. 12 CHIEF DENAPLES: They haven't. 13 MS. BRIER: What's the date, Chris? 14 MR. KEARNEY: The 26th. Yeah, so, I 15 mean, as we get closer into the next couple 16 weeks they start doing weekly or biweekly 17 meetings here. We'll get everything. They've 18 been here a long time. But every year they try 19 to add something so that is always a little cause for concern. 20 21 MS. BRIER: Well, you do a great job 22 with that and with the 800 folks coming in this You've done that before. 23 week. Thanks, Chris. 24 ALL MEMBERS: Thank you, Chris. 25 MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge.

1	MR. JUDGE: We're patching. The
2	roads are the roads are in rough shape.
3	Call them in. We have a list going. We're out
4	every day. They are out now, in fact, and they
5	worked all weekend.
6	MS. BRIER: I saw them on Saturday.
7	MR. JUDGE: Yeah, so we'll get out,
8	caught up on them. It's not just Dunmore.
9	It's everywhere.
10	MS. BRIER: Is it cold patch?
11	MR. JUDGE: It's cold patch now.
12	But once we get the big ones done on the main
13	roads, we'll start running the hot stuff. I
14	need more guys.
15	MR. O'MALLEY: When is the hot stuff
16	usually ready?
17	MR. JUDGE: It's ready now. But the
18	thing is, I have to get a crew together. You
19	need a lot more guys once you start with the
20	hot stuff, you know? It has to be rolled. It
21	has to be
22	MS. BRIER: So what's the timeframe
23	do you think for that, Didge?
24	MR. JUDGE: We could probably do it
25	starting next week, you know? We'll make

1 arrangements for it. I'm trying to get the big 2 ones for right now, Janet. 3 MS. BRIER: I saw your guys out over 4 the weekend. 5 MR. JUDGE: We've been out every day and we worked the whole weekend. So they got a 6 7 pretty good job on it. So anybody looking to get a hole filled, call it in. 8 9 MR. O'MALLEY: You had two crews out 10 there Saturday. 11 MR. JUDGE: Two crews Saturday, all 12 day Saturday, yeah. And there's two crews out 13 now. 14 ALL MEMBERS: Thank you. MR. WOLFF: Chief Marchese. 15 16 CHIEF MARCHESE: Monthly report for 17 February. During the month of February, our 18 department responded to 1,070 calls for 19 service. The number is up by 155 calls from 20 the previous month. 21 Arrests for the month, our 22 department had nine criminal arrests, 5 23 nontraffic, 37 traffic arrests, 7 traffic 24 warnings, and 22 verbal warnings. 25 MS. BRIER: Chief, are you stepping

up the traffic stops? It seems like that number is higher than typical.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Weather started breaking and the guys are out. It's a little easier to run traffic when the weather cooperates a little bit. We should have some grant money coming in too for, like, the click and ticket and --

MS. BRIER: And how about our parking meters?

CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah, they're on them.

MS. BRIER: Yeah? Do you have a number?

CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah, I have a collection here for you. We still have one officer off on long term heart and lung. We only had one shift go out for overtime the whole month.

Officer Burgette took part in the monthly SWAT training February 11th and 24th. February 27th, Sergeant Richardson and Sergeant Igoe took part in our Cobra training which is a data sharing program that allows us to view and share information with other police departments

statewide that uses our recording system. It's very good for us.

On the 19th, all officers took part in the mandatory First Aid CPR training here at the Community Center. From the start of the year to the end of February we have collected \$1,135, including coin, credit card, and pay by phone transaction for the meters.

For the month of February we collected \$170 in parking tickets and one citation was sent down for failure to pay. February 27th, we began the process of integrating our coding reporting system into our patrol cars.

This will enable our officers to complete reports in the patrol vehicles. This will keep officers on streets longer and cut down on the need to return to the station.

MS. BRIER: Great.

CHIEF MARCHESE: And that's it.

MS. BRIER: There's going to be more installed, the park meters that are missing like in front of --

MR. WOLFF: Yeah, we'll get with --

MS. BRIER: Because we couldn't

1	install them before. It was frozen. You know
2	the parking meters that we missed?
3	CHIEF MARCHESE: We're going to get
4	some of those fixed.
5	MS. OVEN: Chief, we have in front
6	of the on the corner of where Clarks is and
7	Clay, we have those no parking the white
8	lines. Do you guys ever check those because a
9	lot of people are parking on top of them. And
10	it's just so dangerous coming around the
11	corner.
12	CHIEF MARCHESE: I'll mention it to
13	the guys. We have some issues down there.
14	MS. OVEN: Yeah, coming around that
15	corner so it's very dangerous.
16	CHIEF MARCHESE: Yep, take care of
17	it.
18	ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.
19	MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples.
20	CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening,
21	Council. So for the month of March as far as
22	expenditures, we had two fairly steep
23	expenditures. We had annual ladder testing
24	which is our aerial device and all our ground
25	ladders get tested. That was completed today,

\$1,350.

Some items were found suspect on it, not necessarily with the ladder, but the suspension. So they're going to need to be evaluated to find out if that's really an issue or maybe there was just something that the inspector was looking into. That will be verified very shortly.

Some other issues with the ladder truck were found during its annual service that are being corrected. That cost is \$1,273.50. Again, that truck is a 2016. So they are pretty much the expenditures for the month of March.

As far as overtime, we're at 228 hours scheduled overtime; 40 part-time shifts for the month of March. Firefighter Warner who was hired in November at the full-time status completed his testing process today in order to be counted as part of staffing.

So he's no longer an extra person.

He's still completing his EMT training. He completed it. He just needs to get a successful score on the test. So that's ongoing. We hired our firefighter -- another

part-time firefighter tonight. So tomorrow he'll be contacted and orientation will be scheduled.

MS. BRIER: Will that help with the overtime?

CHIEF DENAPLES: It will. It will.

Once he completes his orientation. Firefighter

McLane had to stop the orientation because he

has a sick child. So as soon as that gets

resolved, hopefully we'll be back in the swing.

That's where we are on that.

As far as grants, the State Fire Commissioner's grant we were awarded in the amount of \$15,246.13. That is a non-match grant. We're going to be replacing a e-draulic rescue tool and a gas detection meter. We're waiting for the funds to be deposited in the account before we order that. I'm just waiting to hear back from Mark when that's deposited.

The FEMA grant on the gear, that's the review process. So we haven't heard any updates on that. The refurb project for Rescue 6, that truck was initially supposed to be back the first week of March. However, it's been pushed to the first or second week of April and

the other will go out when that comes back. So that's pretty much our report.

I'll go through the call numbers.

Mr. Wolf asked if we could do the previous month's call report instead of the one month we're currently in at the Council meetings. So from February 1st to February 28th of this year, we responded to 53 total calls, 2 fire calls, overpressure and rupture type calls was 1; emergency medical services and rescue was 8; hazardous materials was 6, service calls were 11; good intent were 4; false alarms and false call were 19; and special type incidents were 2. So there is 53 total calls for that month. That's pretty much all I have.

MS. BRIER: So, Chief, the fire truck that is being repaired, did we put a deposit on that? I mean, what is our obligation once it gets back --

CHIEF DENAPLES: So the whole project with the two trucks, Greg, we didn't have to put any money down.

MR. WOLFF: We did not.

CHIEF DENAPLES: We don't have to make payment until it's completed.

1 MS. BRIER: Okay. Thank you. 2 MR. HALLINAN: One thing, smoke 3 alarms, how are we doing with that? Do we 4 still get a lot of calls? CHIEF DENAPLES: So that kind of 5 slowed down a little bit. However, we did get 6 7 a call today. We're doing an install tomorrow. 8 We still have quite a bit. We have -- we're 9 the leader in the Red Cross program in 10 Northeastern, Pennsylvania by far. 11 MS. BRIER: Wow. Congratulations. 12 MS. OVEN: That's great. 13 MS. BRIER: Do we have them? Last 14 month we didn't have the smoke alarms. 15 CHIEF DENAPLES: We got them. We 16 have another shipment. We have 55 on hand. 17 MS. BRIER: If you could just repeat 18 that? 19 CHIEF DENAPLES: The banner is down 20 because that was for fire prevention month. 21 But it's still on the website. And we still 22 try to pass the word around as much as 23 possible. So if anybody knows anyone, you 24 could just call fire headquarters and we'll --25 MS. BRIER: Can you just repeat for

the folks here that it's a free service?

CHIEF DENAPLES: Yes. So there is a free smoke detector install program through American Red Cross. The only thing is, the Dunmore Fire Department must install them.

So if anybody's a resident or owns property in Dunmore is looking to get them installed, it's a ten year battery on the smoke detector. They could just call fire headquarters at 570-348-1730. And we'll come out and install them at your convenience.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, chief.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Number 12, public comment. And, Mrs. Brier, just a reminder, we have our five minute --

MS. BRIER: Yeah, it's for the folks to come and comment. Thanks for coming everyone. We just need you to come up to the podium and state your name and address and just realize that, you know, so everyone could get a chance to speak it's a five minute limit.

Anyone interested in speaking coming up?

MR. LYNOTT: Everybody is looking at me so I guess it's me. I'm not much of a

talker, Miss President, just so you know.

Good evening, Council, Mayor, my name is Kurt Lynott. I actually am a resident of Olyphant. However, I have been involved in a business here in Dunmore Borough for 18 years now.

So I think I could consider myself part of the community. Most people mistake me as a resident of Dunmore, probably to your detriment unfortunately and to my benefit. I'm here on behalf of all the folks that are sitting over there. So we're here as parents.

We're not here as politicians.

We're not here as anything else. We're all parents of students at Holy Cross High School.

What we're asking tonight and, again, from what I understand is that we pay a rental fee in order for our soccer teams to use Schautz Stadium.

We're not asking for a free ride.

We're not asking to wipe the fee away. We're
just here tonight to ask this board if you
could give us a discounted rate. Our teams do
not practice there. Our teams only play their
home games there.

We don't use any concessions. The only thing that we have access to is the scoreboard and the bathroom as I understand it. Additionally, our baseball team would be looking to use your indoor facility when available.

Again, we do have some members of the team that are residents of Dunmore. Most of them are not. But as I look at it, this is one of the only towns or the only town that has two schools -- if you count St. Mary's, three schools in one city.

Scranton is an exception. But, you know, Dickson City has La Salle. But Mid Valley is in Throop. Valley view has elementary. There is no -- there's no school there. So and again, as I said earlier, I'm a businessman here in the town. I consider myself part of the community.

I think the parents do too because, you know, our kids are here. And we've chosen to put our kids here. And so we're here for our kids. We're not -- we're not here as I said business people. And so you know, it comes out of our pockets.

1 The Diocese isn't paying the bill. The school isn't paying the bill. All the 2 3 fundraising that we do, Night At The Races, if anyone was there, was a great time. 4 They just 5 had a comedy show, all of those things that we do are so that we could pay that fee. 6 7 And again, all we're asking for is 8 just a little break on behalf of our kids. We 9 want to keep them here. They love it here. 10 want them to be part of your community as much 11 as we are. Thank you. 12 MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you. 13 MS. ZANGARDI: Thanks, Kurt. 14 MS. BRIER: Thank you. 15 MR. LYNOTT: I got notes. Can you 16 hold on a second? 17 MS. BRIER: Sure. 18 MR. LYNOTT: Nope, I'm good. 19 MR. HALLINAN: Kurt, that was for 20 milk, eggs, and bread. 21 MS. BRIER: Just state your name and 22 address. Thanks. MS. URBAN: 23 Jenna Urban, 221 24 Sherwood Avenue in Dunmore. Good evening, 25 Council and Mayor. My name is Jenna Urban.

And I'm here as a Dunmore taxpayer and parent of a Holy Cross and St. Mary student.

I want to address the unfair treatment of Holy Cross and St. Mary's student athletes regarding access to the borough facilities. According to Dunmore dot gov website, it clearly states there are three schools in the Borough of Dunmore, Holy Cross, St. Mary's and Dunmore High.

However, our Holy Cross and St.

Mary's students are not being recognized as part of the Dunmore community when it comes to the facility usage. It was reported in the Scranton Times that a member of this Council stated the training facility is free of charge for all Dunmore residents and borough sports teams.

If that is the case, I ask you, how is a borough team -- sports team defined? Holy Cross is a school in Dunmore with many student athletes who are Dunmore residents -- I believe 33 in our school and even some Dunmore business owners.

Yet, our teams are being charged excessive fees to use the borough facilities.

I will also state that I am a business owner -multiple business owner in Dunmore as well as
other parents as Kurt just mentioned, owning a
business, owning residential houses and renting
them out.

We understand that some administrators and coaches do not take issue with paying these fees. However, they aren't the ones paying them. The financial burden falls directly on the parent doing fundraisers and I do appreciate some of you on Council that have supported the number of fundraisers that we have.

But ironically, you're supporting a fundraiser we're trying to raise money for our kids to play soccer at a field in Dunmore. So the parents are forced to raise thousands of dollars. For example, the Holy Cross soccer team is charged \$425 per game.

The boys' team paid over \$3,800 this season to play at Schautz Stadium, same thing with the baseball. I know that the facility was donated by someone in the community. And from what we were told, it was supposed to be used for the kids, all of the students or

student athletes in the Borough of Dunmore.

So if this is truly a taxpayer issue, let's be clear. There are many people living in Dunmore who do not own their houses, and, therefore, they do not pay property taxes. And yet, there are children not being excluded for the borough services.

Additionally, while we did choose to send our children to a private school, that choice does not negate the contribution that our students and families make to the Dunmore community.

For example, our students, we feed our students with Dunmore businesses, half days, days after -- they get out of school early. They're walking down to the Dunmore corners. Parents are going to eat at Dunmore businesses.

Our fundraising is coming from -we are supporting Dunmore businesses to do the
fundraising to support our soccer team. It's
not just about money. It's about fairness.
Holy Cross and St. Mary's students are part of
this community. They live here and spend most
of their time here.

And as a parent who switched from public school at Dunmore to private school in the Catholic schools, I will tell you there is a wall between both students, the Catholic school student and the public school student.

And that wall starts at the top.

It's something that goes back to if you talk to people that went to Catholic school, they will tell you the feeling of feeling not welcomed in Dunmore. And I'm just trying to take down that barrier and help you recognize the importance of our students in the community. Thank you.

MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you, Jenna.

MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.

MS. BRIER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. KENNEDY: Good evening. My name is Lisa Kennedy and I reside in Scranton even though our bed is just in Scranton. My son left for school this morning and has not yet been home because of school, after school practices. And what does he do in between practices? He's out there supporting all the Dunmore businesses, all our team eats.

All of our fundraisers are strictly

supported through Dunmore. And, yes, you know, we may not reside but we're spending more money in Dunmore than we do in our own hometowns.

And I would just appreciate if you guys can look at both sides of that.

You know, just the other night for our basketball team or for our soccer -- after soccer parties, we come, you know, there's so many pizza places, so restaurants that we could go to. But we choose Dunmore. We do consider it to be our hometown.

Our fundraising is strictly just so we could play soccer. And, you know, our boys, they don't even get a T-shirt out of our fundraising money because every penny of it strictly comes, right, so we could have a field to play in.

And again, you know, it's strictly coming out of ours. If we don't raise enough money, then the parents have to put the money in themselves so we have a field to play in.

And I just want you to, like, to think about that, yeah, you know, like, you know, we have some of our players here.

But they don't -- they don't even

get a T-shirt that says Holy Cross Soccer on it because our funds are being constantly pushed. So if there is any way in the budget or anywhere where, you know, again, if there is some type of a discount that we could be given considering we are located in Dunmore and we are constantly supporting Dunmore businesses.

MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you.

MS. BRIER: Thank you.

MS. OVEN: Thank you, Mrs. Kennedy.

MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.

MS. BRIER: Anyone else? Mike, would you like to address --

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, I'll address. I was just going to wait for public -- but I'll address a lot. If I don't hit something, please come back up.

But, yeah, this is strict -- I think you said, Jenna, strictly a taxpayer issue. The kids who get that place for free are the ones whose parents pay property tax here because the place as many people think was free. The building was free. The field itself we paid a very large amount of money to build that place. We have a -- I don't know, Janet,

at least a million and a half number -
MS. BRIER: We paid 3 million
dollars.

MR. DEMPSEY: We have a note that we're paying on every month. Kurt, you hit up a lot of the expenses. You know, we have kids that work up there. We have lights. You know, bathrooms, all of that. There's expenses every single day that we have that we have to pay. And Dunmore taxpayers are paying those expenses.

So that's why most teams other than the Dunmore teams and, Jenna, you're right again, it's poorly worded in the -- however I was quoted borough teams or whatever the fees say on the website. It does say Dunmore teams. You're correct.

MS. URBAN: Dunmore residents and school teams on the flier.

MR. DEMPSEY: On the flier. What is says, you're right. So it's meant to say

Dunmore School District teams which it does not say. So Dunmore School District teams are allowed to play there. Dunmore youth programs are allowed to play there for free. Dunmore

Little League, for example, Dunmore Missy League, for example.

But that's not to say I don't -I've given or we have given Holy Cross -- if
anyone comes to me that has a Dunmore resident
on your baseball team, whatever team it is, we
give a discount. If you have a Dunmore
resident on your team, I give a discount. I
just gave Holy Cross a discount.

If I'm aware that you have a Dunmore kid on your team, you get a discount. I just gave Sandy Menakenny {phonetic} one at the building when he wanted to use it for the batting cages. But everyone else pays rent. Every one else pays to use the field because it costs a lot of money to operate it, you know, and the upkeep.

It's expensive. You know, Penn
State is in Dunmore. They pay. They pay full
bill. Lackawanna -- well, it's not in Dunmore,
but they pay full bill. Marywood is in
Dunmore. They pay full bill when they rent it.
And to say, like, Holy Cross is not welcome in
Dunmore, you're more than welcome in Dunmore.

I bend over backwards getting them

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time to rent that field. I'm up there 10:00 at night when everybody is -- after a soccer game, everybody is out front talking. I'm there at night at 10:00 at night waiting to lock the I don't force anybody out.

I welcome Holy Cross in. I have a great relationship with all the coaches as far as I know. The administration called me last week saying we're fine with our arrangement. So this is the first I've ever heard that they're not welcomed in Dunmore because I welcome them with open arms.

They just have to pay a certain amount of rent. We give a discount for Dunmore And we give a discount any time Holy Cross plays Dunmore. So if Holy Cross has a home game versus Dunmore, I think that soccer game was actually one of the best games we've ever had up there, they don't pay for that game.

So that's an immediate \$425 off of their rent. I'm just trying to think of what else I didn't hit on.

MS. URBAN: Well, the taxpayer -- I mean to say it's a taxpayer issue, not

everybody in Dunmore pays taxes. So, like, there are people that are benefitting from using that facility that they can't really be classified as a taxpayer and there are people that have businesses and rentals.

So to go down the list and say everybody at Holy Cross that pays taxes, like, when you call the school to ask how many students and there were 33 students, you know, and you're taking the discount off of that -- first, I don't think -- the only discount given to soccer was -- there were never -- there was never a discount --

MS. KENNEDY: It was just the Dunmore games.

MR. DEMPSEY: If I didn't know there were Dunmore residents, I didn't give it.

UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: What is the discount if you have a Dunmore resident?

MR. DEMPSEY: I normally base it off of how many, you know, if there's two kids on the team 10 -- whatever that is.

UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: So it's \$10?

MR. DEMPSEY: No. If you have -- if
the whole rental fee was -- I think you said

was \$3,800. If you have two kids on that team, which I don't think they did or at least I wasn't aware of it -- I would discount it based on the number of kids.

When you say Dunmore kids don't pay taxes, they go to Dunmore school. They lay their head on a pillow in Dunmore. They live in a house that's owned by a Dunmore taxpayer. Their rent goes directly to that homeowner whose homeowner then pays taxes.

So they live in that home. That home is contributing to the tax base and it's contributing to the fees.

MS. URBAN: Some people that own businesses and they own houses in Dunmore that their kids -- they don't live in Dunmore so -- that go to Holy Cross. It just seems tedious to go down the list and say who's paying taxes and who's not paying taxes.

MR. DEMPSEY: Yeah, it's a headache.

MS. URBAN: Yeah, we're asking for a more generous discount.

MR. DEMPSEY: I'm not saying no.

I'm just explaining --

MS. URBAN: Well, you're comparing

us to like --

MR. LOUGHNEY: Let me ask you this.
What would you consider a generous discount?
You said 3,800 is what you paid last year.

(Cross talking)

MS. ZANGARDI: Okay, excuse me one minute, please. She's recording. So one person at a time. And you probably really should come up to the podium.

MR. DEMPSEY: Actually if -- no one addressed Council at the public comment. So if you want to address Council, please come up.

MR. LOUGHNEY: I'll hold my remarks until --

MR. HALLINAN: I think that's a great question from Mr. Loughney to think about, you know, whether to answer tonight or whatever. But what would you think is fair also? So at least we have a starting point.

 $$\operatorname{MR}$.$ WASP: I'll leave the question what is fair to somebody else to take on.

MS. BRIER: Could you state your name and address, please?

MR. WASP. Sure. My name is John Wasp. I too am an Olyphant resident. Some of

you may actually know me as somebody who contributed a lot to the downtown Dunmore community. Right down to the road is Fidelity Bank.

For years Jenna would be running the Downtown Business Association thing at the holidays. My business Popscience which was in Jessup at the time would do slime and all kinds of activities with the kids right here in Dunmore at no charge to any Dunmore child, right, it was something that I always volunteered to this community, not even as a person who lives here, right, because I do believe that that is what we have to do as Northeastern, Pennsylvanians.

We all try to work together. But, no, what I wanted to say was that that \$3,800 is one sports team. That's the boys' soccer team. But the girls' soccer team, the softball team, the baseball team, all of them are paying these fees. And so I want you to think about it this way.

When you see here a fundraiser that says Holy Cross Girls Soccer car wash, more appropriately we should say Dunmore Borough car

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wash, right, because we literally take the dollars that we get, 10 bucks per car and turn that into a fee for us to use at Schautz Stadium.

There is no extra money. That's just how it's set up. We literally raise exactly what we need to pay the fees. And I think that there are people here who have also said and looked at this, you know, we've talked about this.

We have St. Anthony's field, right, that's something we have. If we could save money on this, could we be raising money to do things with bleachers there? Is there something else that we could be doing that could be more advantageous to the Borough?

That's what we're talking about here. It's about what we've done. What we can do and what we can get from you guys in terms of a concession to help us get that done.

MAYOR CONWAY: Do you pay to use St. I'm just asking. I don't know how Anthony's? that works.

MR. WASP: I believed it's Diocesan Yeah, I don't think they pay. owned.

MR. HALLINAN: I might be a little out of turn here. But I think everything that we're kind of discussing, maybe Michael sets up a little instead of this back and forth and everything, like, we get maybe two or three people from your group and then maybe Michael has one or two and maybe we could come up with something amicable for everybody.

I mean, I think you got a valid point on a lot of things. And other things, I hope you see what we have to pay also to maintain. We have a maintenance guy up there. We have teams walk out -- and it's not on you. It's every team that we have to clean up the next day.

Nobody sees this stuff. We have the lights on. The bill comes. I mean, we got notes that we have to pay on it. So I get where you're coming from. You are not getting support from Holy Cross fundraisers. And the kids that live in Dunmore, I don't think they should be charged anything, any kid from Dunmore that goes to Holy Cross.

But to give it away for free, which you are not asking for, you have to see our

point also. And to say that -- again, I grew up in a project. So when you say that somebody doesn't pay, we paid rent. And when they charge us rent, it went towards the Dunmore -- owners collected money.

They knew they had to pay their tax bill and it came through rent. So to say that renters aren't paying, they're paying. And we're all part of the Dunmore community. I know that kind of hurt a little bit. I know what you meant and we're all good.

But I think if we come up with something with just a little group of two or three, two or three here and let's see what we could do because obviously this is very amicable. I love it. It's great you're saying your side and we're saying our side. I think we could come up with something better.

MS. BRIER: Do you have an idea -does anyone have -- Kurt, did you come prepared
with a number?

MR. LYNOTT: I did not. And again,
I think I just want to reiterate on behalf of
the parents. We're not here challenging what
you guys do. You guys have a job to do. And

we are in no way, shape, or form here to challenge Dunmore's operating procedures. All we're looking for is what everybody said is a little bit less.

MS. BRIER: If you could come up with a number that would be helpful, okay?

MR. LYNOTT: Sure. And again, I know what we're paying. I don't know what we're paying for the baseball use of the facility. But I think Mr. Hallinan's idea is great. Again, we're not looking to pay a thousand dollars, but \$8,000 a year for a soccer season gets a little heavy. And I understand that you guys have expenses. But like I said --

MR. HALLINAN: Kurt, can you repeat that I was great. She didn't get that.

MS. LYNOTT: She definitely got it.

MR. LOUGHNEY: There's no one up here on this dais on this Council that is anti Holy Cross. Understand that. I'm a product of both. I'm a product of St. Mary's, a Warrior and Dunmore High School. When I was a Warrior, my parents for basketball -- Paul McGary was our coach. We had to pay for our uniform,

2 pay for their uniform. 3 UNIDENTIFIED MALE: We still do. 4 MR. DEMPSEY: Maybe you should be at 5 the Holy Cross meeting. MR. LYNOTT: We tried that already. 6 MR. LOUGHNEY: We as elected 7 8 officials up here have our diligence to paying 9 our bills, understand, and as you do yours. 10 if there is an amicable solution, again, you're 11 not going up there free. I'll be the first one 12 to tell you that. You're not going to go up 13 there free. 14 But if there is an amicable solution 15 and a fee that we can agree on, then this is 16 the first time we're actually sitting down and 17 getting together with this. 18 MS. KENNEDY: Can we by any chance 19 to help sometimes offset it, use the concession stands? 20 MR. LOUGHNEY: That was something 21 22 that was brought up. 23 MS. BRIER: And again, if you have a 24 question you have to come up because, you know, 25 there's a stenographer.

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MR. LOUGHNEY: That is something that was brought up and that is not off the table. But we have to know -- we just can't say, okay, you got it. You have to know who is going to be working it and what the regulations are.

MR. WOZNIAK: My name is Dennis
Wozniak. I also live in Olyphant. But I did
live in Dunmore for several years, Grandview
Street, Electric Street, a few different
places. My son is going to be a senior on the
soccer team at Holy Cross.

And I'd just like to offer up a suggestion. I love the communication that we're having here. If there is a number, could we agree just that we would cover your costs? We understand that you guys have to pay for it. But is there a number -- I would understand that there is number built in there for profit that you guys have to be able to --

MS. BRIER: We're not making a profit on this. Absolutely not, because we have, like, set expenses, fixed expenses up there. Believe me, this is not a profit center for Dunmore at all.

It just really isn't, sir. I appreciate the suggestion. But we prefer that you come with a number to us that you think is reasonable and we could discuss it at that point.

MR. O'MALLEY: We could work with you.

MS. BRIER: Yeah, we want to work with you guys.

MR. O'MALLEY: Nobody wants to punish Holy Cross.

MS. BRIER: No, I'm a graduate by the way. And, of course, it was Dunmore Central Catholic then. It's been five iterations since then. But I do take exception a little bit to they're second class citizens, because I never felt that way in Dunmore. And, you know, my classmates have never felt that way.

You know, we just celebrated our 50th reunion. And we're proud of, you know, where we went to high school. And, you know, I never had any issue with feeling like a second class citizen.

MR. HALLINAN: I think the idea I

would be open to obviously if you went in with your product and came out with your product at the end of the night and wanted to sell something simple for Holy Cross that night at the games, whatever games I don't have a -- again, I shouldn't be doing negotiating on our side.

I think that would be great. But let's -- that's why I say set up two people, three people and Michael and two people here could sit down. We could go back and forth all night long. And we're not really going settle anything tonight. You all know that.

So at least we have an open negotiation here and a flow of conversation and let's carry it on. And if make the group smaller and come up with something amicable for both sides.

MR. LOUGHNEY: And in all fairness to Michael, Michael takes this upon himself to go up there. And it's a -- thank you for doing that. So I just want to --

MS. BRIER: It's a thankless job.

MS. OVEN: Michael, is there any way we could get because I know for myself I hear

snippets of what the cost is and then what the discount -- is there any way that Council could get the amount that Holy Cross pays per sport?

MR. DEMPSEY: Mark has everything.

MS. OVEN: Okay, and maybe we could sit down with those numbers and sit down with someone from Holy Cross to just to come up with --

UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: I have one of our invoices but it doesn't have all of the games on it.

MR. DEMPSEY: It's \$425 a game.

MS. OVEN: Right, just annual, maybe from last year.

MR. DEMPSEY: Mark has it.

MS. OVEN: I have no idea and maybe we could make a meeting with someone from Holy Cross and then come up with some type of solution. I agree that, you know, you're parents. You spend a lot of money in Dunmore. You understand our situation. We're trying to balance the budget and make sure we're being responsible.

But I appreciate you coming and we don't think Dunmore is any better than Holy

our team. And fortunately we had a few funds left over from previous fundraising. So we were able to cover the cost. It was just a big shock and surprise to us.

MR. DEMPSEY: That's because I realized we were undercharging you. We are still undercharging. You might think so, but we still are. It's still a pretty low amount for what everybody else charges around here but we're happy to work with you.

MS. BRIER: I really think we could work something out for you guys that would be satisfactory, I really do. We do appreciate you coming in.

MR. LOUGHNEY: And good luck tomorrow night. Is it tomorrow night?

MS. KENNEDY: Wednesday.

MS. BRIER: Yeah, so anyone else want to address Council on any other subject? Once again, we really appreciate you guys coming tonight. We really like to hear from folks in the borough and beyond.

MR. HALLINAN: And beyond.

MS. BRIER: And good luck. We were the Defenders. They're the Crusaders now.
