So we're in 16 good shape with that with Chestnut Street 17 stormwater stuff. 18 MS. OVEN: Thanks, Greg. All in 19 favor? 20 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 21 MR. WOLFF: Number seven, motion to 22 adopt Resolution No. 6 of 2025 establishing 23 guidelines for public comment at Borough 24 Council meeting. 25 MS. OVEN: Can I have a motion to

1 adopt Resolution No. 6 of 2025 establishing guidelines for public comment at Borough 2 3 Council meetings? 4 MS. ZANGARDI: I'll make that 5 motion. MR. DEMPSEY: Second. 6 MS. OVEN: Anyone on the question? 7 8 All in favor. 9 ALL MEMBERS: Aye. 10 MR. O'MALLEY: Greg, do you want to 11 just kind of give an overview of that? 12 MR. WOLFF: For the meeting? MR. O'MALLEY: Yes. 13 14 MR. WOLFF: Sure. For the 15 guidelines for public comment, just general 16 rules, guidelines. People go to the podium --17 this is many things that we do all the time. 18 But it's just being memorialized here with the 19 resolution, go to the podium, address -- state 20 your name, a maximum of five minutes per 21 individual, cannot pass their time to other people. 22 23 Some other highlights, the five 24 minutes is a big thing. It discusses audio 25 visual equipment, stuff like that. They can't

stand up there. They can't put their microphones up there unless the presiding officer of the meeting allows it. That is some of the bigger stuff.

MR. DEMPSEY: Greg, maybe we should, number one, post it out here on the window and then maybe publish it on our website and the Facebook page so people will have a chance to review it.

MR. WOLFF: Yeah, and we'll Chris or someone, we'll just maybe leave copies of this all out there so it's there all the time once we get -- well, it's already passed. But those are the highlights. It's just pretty much what we do, just memorializing it so we have this in order for future meetings.

MR. O'MALLEY: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Number eight, motion to adopt Ordinance No. 4 of 2025, Residential Rental Unit Occupancy Ordinance.

MS. OVEN: Can I have a motion to adopt Ordinance No. 4 of 2025, residential rental unit --

MR. HALLINAN: On the question? Can we just -- is this the final passage of this?

MR. WOLFF: Correct.

MR. HALLINAN: Okay, so the fees are in there are set. They can't be discussed later because I have an issue with some of the fee structure.

MS. ZANGARDI: Can I speak on that?

I talked to Greg about it. And this is the final, however, subject to change as time goes on.

MR. WOLFF: So we put this in appendix so just like we did with pave cut or the fees, come December you guys -- we evaluate obviously. This is the first time we're going through this. We look and we say, you know, we over -- you know, it's too much or we need to increase it which we'll have to do from time to time. But for right now, this will be the final passage.

MR. HALLINAN: Again, I'm one thousand percent in for registering, you know, rental units. My other issue is also somebody on that half double that lives in one half of the unit and rents out the other side, are they subject to the fee themselves?

MR. WOLFF: No, only the one unit.

1st.

Only the places that they are renting out.

They won't have to pay for half a double, no.

And then again, we will evaluate these -- we'll get rolling on this. It will take effect -- if it passes tonight, it will take effect July

The notices will be sent out sometime in June to the homeowners. We'll send out a huge blast, Facebook, get word out and maybe even do a contact the media because we do have a preliminary list. But it may or may not be accurate.

But everything will be sent out to all of the known landlords and everything is laid out for them. We have been attending, myself, Mike Brazil and Faith from the office have been attending pretty much weekly trainings for the online program.

To register, will be all online.

They could do it if we need to paper, but for the most part there will be a portal set up.

You could go online, register, do what they need to do. It's a pretty sleek system. So we want to make it as easy as possible because we want to encourage people to get registered.

MR. LOUGHNEY: On the question, if I can, we said the rental fees were 75 -- 75, 55, and 45.

MR. WOLFF: It's 75 for up to four units on the premises. And then 5 to 10 units, \$60 per unit and then 11 and over is 45.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Yeah, I would like to and if we could pass this and come back to it, amend it or somehow make it a \$50 fee across the board, this way everybody pays the same. I got calls from people that have two apartments and they're saying we're paying 75 and somebody that has more than me ends up paying 45.

My recommendation would be 50 across the board and everybody pays the same. But if we could do that at a later date if everybody is in agreement, that's fine.

MR. WOLFF: That would be my recommendation so we could roll this out in July. If this gets held up another month, you know, that starts muddying the waters for when we could get this out. This was -- I did this by design, the appendix. So all we have to change is the fee schedule.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Okay.

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MS. OVEN: Perfect.

MR. WOLFF: So we look at it and by September, October and say you guys have more input or we say we really fell short because, you know, they're educated guesses, you know, looking at the census bureau numbers and things like that we have a rough idea of how many rentals we have. But obviously we really don't know.

MR. O'MALLEY: It has to pay for itself too.

MR. WOLFF: It has to pay for itself. So, you know, we could look at all of those as we start seeing the registrations come We could see what we have. And if we say, yeah, we definitely fell short if there is something like you said, whatever recommendations you guys are comfortable with, then all we have to do is amend at the appendix, the fee schedule, so we don't have to redo --

MR. LOUGHNEY: The whole thing, okay.

MR. WOLFF: It's just the fee schedule we have to amend.

MR. HALLINAN: And on the question,
I just want to make sure I'm reiterating what
Janet said I think last meeting that this money
doesn't go into the general fund. It only
supports the rental unit, like --

MR. WOLFF: Correct. That's where these numbers are based off of. They are based off of to support our inspector, Mike Brazil and Faith who amongst other things supports. She's the admin support for all of this. So she's been typing in all the known landlords and rental units and we'll be processing it.

You know, so the rental registration will come in online. She'll have to go on the portal on her end, approve it, look it over, do her thing, approve it; and then at that point it will generate an invoice they could pay online and everything like that.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Greg.

MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you, Greg.

MR. HALLINAN: Thanks, Miss Vice

DEMPSEY: I'll make a motion to 12 adopt Resolution No. 4 of 2025 Residential Rental Unit Occupancy Ordinance. 13 14 MR. O'MALLEY: I'll second. All those in favor? 15 MS. OVEN: 16 MR. O'MALLEY: Well, on the 17 question, I just want to say officially on the 18 question --19 MR. DEMPSEY: Now that we're 20 actually on the question. 21 MR. O'MALLEY: So, Mr. Wolff, Mr. 22 Brazil, Mrs. Canavan, thank you for all of your 23 hard work on this. I think this is really a 24 nice step for the Borough to kind of get a

handle on these rentals that we have throughout

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the Borough, especially those that are owned by out-of-state landlords so we get a better handle of the whole thing. So again, thank you for all of your hard work in getting this done.

MS. ZANGARDI: Agree. Thank you.

MS. OVEN: All those in favor?

ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

MR. WOLFF: Number nine, Treasury Report. Mark.

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council. Financial snapshot for the month of March, we get a net income of 1.1 million dollars which brings our year-to-date net income to 1.4 million.

As far as revenue is concerned, real estate, we had a major uptick in collections.

Donna did a bang-up job turning collections over and getting the money to the fund.

Business license and permits, we received 26,000 for the Adams billboard lease.

State shared revenue, 416,000 liquid fuel funds. And miscellaneous revenue, Express Scripts rebate of \$14,000 for the fourth quarter of 2024. Expenses are pretty general.

On the Code Enforcement side, we did

purchase rental registration software for \$9,000. We had a major repair for solid waste collection of 45,000 and highway maintenance snow and ice, our final rock salt purchase of 38,000 and that would be it.

ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Mark.

MR. WOLFF: Chris.

MR. KEARNEY: Good evening. These past several weeks we continued with our weekend party rentals in this room as well as the gym. We have several coming this weekend. We have a thing on Friday to Saturday. But we're closed Easter Sunday.

As for the gym, Riverfront Sports added another weekly rental. Right now they're going to rent the gym on Monday and Thursday night. You might have seen them when you came in tonight until the first week of May.

We also have the Electric City Blitz which is another AAU outfit. They are here on one court every Wednesday until June. So they're paying for all of this. So we're making decent money. There are several of our Dunmore Youth League coaches that are continuing with their off season practices.

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And we don't charge them.

This weekend -- I'm sorry, this
Wednesday we'll be meeting with Jog for Jude
people for the final wrap-up meeting before
next weekend's event. It's not this weekend.
It's the coming weekend. That's it.

MR. DEMPSEY: Chris, can I get an update on the vending machine, the snack machine? Did we purchase that yet?

MR. KEARNEY: I have an upcoming order. We just had to -- Mark and I are working out the arrangements. But it's actually -- it went down another \$500. So it's down --

MR. DEMPSEY: It's going to have the credit card machine on it?

MR. KEARNEY: Yes, has a credit card machine. That's with delivery. The only thing is, I'm going to have to get DPW guys. They deliver curb side. They won't bring it in.

So the last time when we brought these machines in, we had DPW who had the dollies and we kind of manhandled them in.

It's kind of going to be the same thing. But I'm pretty sure we'll have them first week of

18	But there's no credit card reader on that.	
19	MR. DEMPSEY: Right. Okay, we'll	
20	have to think about replacing that too. Thank	
21	you.	
22	MS. ZANGARDI: Thank you, Chris.	
23	MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge.	
24	MR. JUDGE: How's it going?	
25	Basically we're patching and that's about it	

right now until we get everything off the trucks. Next week we'll take them off, the spreaders and the -- next week we'll take them off. I don't want to get caught, you know? Believe it or not they are calling for snow tomorrow night. So I don't want to get caught. Do you know what I mean?

Monday we're going to strip all the trucks down. And everything's still dressed up. We're doing cold patch. So if you have any big ones, call them in.

MR. O'MALLEY: Were you able to get that stop sign at Jefferson and Marion?

MR. JUDGE: It's done.

MS. OVEN: Thank you.

MR. HALLINAN: Can you give us an update on the bucket truck?

MR. JUDGE: I don't know what's up with that.

MR. WOLFF: He brought it to -Bobby Morgan worked on it. And there's a
phantom problem basically. There's a fuel
problem. So one last ditch effort I had was
Howie Moss from Wayne County Ford does a lot of
work on our police cars.

Actually I have to call Aronica -- and take it to the dealership to take a look at it. It's just to -- not to do anything, just to see if they could diagnose it. It's like a gremlin. It's fine and then it's not.

MR. JUDGE: The truck is 25 years old. I wouldn't go nuts putting any more money into this. Do you know what I mean? It's an old truck.

MR. HALLINAN: It's time to look for one. Okay, thanks, Didge.

MR. JUDGE: If you have any potholes, call them in.

MS. OVEN: Okay.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Chief Marchese.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Monthly report for March, during the month of March our department responded to 1256 calls for service. That is up 186 calls from the previous month. Arrests for the month, we had 14 criminal arrests, 9 non traffic, 34 traffic arrests, 34 written traffic warnings and 41 verbal warnings.

We only had one shift go out for overtime for the whole month. Officer Burgette

took part in his monthly SWAT training, March 11th through 31st. March 27th, several officers took part in the yearly refresher FSSD. Standard field sobriety recertification is required yearly for them to keep their certifications.

From the start of the year until the end of the year we collected \$2,209 including coin, credit card, and pay by phone transactions. For the month of March we collected \$295 in parking tickets. Seven citations were sent out for failure to pay.

We provided several escorts for the girls' basketball team for the state playoff run. We purchased Lifevac units were purchased for all police vehicles. It's a lifesaving device that's used for choking victims. All officers had to watch a video to be certified and they're going to be put in service. That's all I got.

MS. ZANGARDI: Sal, how much did you say there was for the parking meters?

CHIEF MARCHESE: For the month of March we collected \$295 in tickets and 7 citations were sent out.

1 MS. ZANGARDI: Oh, okay. So that's under the parking meters -- oh, right, right, 2 3 right, okay, because I noticed in at the 4 corners there's about -- right in front of 5 Wasco Insurance, there's a big gap --CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah. 6 7 MS. ZANGARDI: Okay, good. 8 CHIEF MARCHESE: No, we know about 9 We're working to get it fixed. it. 10 MR. HALLINAN: And one got knocked 11 over -- ran over I should say. 12 MAYOR CONWAY: Chief, were you able 13 to review the names that were on the -- I 14 e-mailed them the --15 CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes. Yes. 16 Perfectly fine. I actually know most of them. 17 MAYOR CONWAY: Okay. Good thank 18 you. 19 MS. OVEN: Thank you. 20 MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples. 21 CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening, 22 Council, as far as purchases for the month of 23 April, the projected purchases, we're getting 24 our American Health and Safety Training Center 25 status back. That was 1,791.79. So what that

will allow to us to do, several years ago we were able to do our own CPR certification training.

We're going to be able to do that again inhouse and certify our firefighters with CPR, first aid for those who aren't EMTs.

There's a couple part-timers that aren't EMTs.

Stop The Bleed Training, NARCAN training, we're going to be able to do that all inhouse again. And there was mannequins that came along with that training, mannequins and the trainer AED. So that particular amount is coming out of the rescue bill. So that is where that is coming from.

The only other sort of steep expenditure for the month of April was \$421.82 for replacement battery for an AED that is on the Engine. That AED is probably about 12 years old, roughly.

As far as overtime when this report was completed, 216 hours for the month of April, 38 part-time shifts put out. As far as events with the Fire Department will be participating in, the Easter Egg Hunt at St. Anthony's Park on April 19th at 10 a.m.

nature.

The apparatus remains in service.

They go up and, you know, they start the Easter

Egg Hunt and they help out there. But

everything is in service if a call comes in.

So there won't be a delay or anything of that

As far as personnel, Sam Snyder started his orientation for part time. He's doing well so far. We had another interview today for a part-time applicant. There is another couple things we need to work through with that particular applicant that I could bring up at another time, probably not the best setting.

As far as for calls -- and then I want to get into one other -- one other item.

For April from March 1st to March 31st, we had 77 responses; 2 fire type calls, overheated equipment was 2 and over pressurized equipment, 19 emergency medical services and rescue type calls; 13 hazmat calls; 13 service calls, 6 good intent; 18 false alarms and false type of calls; 1 severe weather and natural disaster type call.

That was the incident on the O'Neill

Highway. We were out for several hours when that storm came through and three special type incidents.

So the only other thing that I'd like to bring up I know Council had asked me if I heard anything on the fireworks for the Jog for Jude. At that point I didn't have any information on that. And Greg sent myself and Chief Marchese an e-mail that, you know, they are looking to do fireworks.

And there's a meeting as Chris mentioned on Wednesday. So every year, you know, I get out there with them and we measure that back parking lot off of Clay Avenue. And we do it and we try to follow perimeters and the guidelines set by the state, okay, the fireworks ordinance.

And we have the fire truck come down here with some extra duty folks. But it's the same story the last couple of years. And Chris could even allude to this. The next day I get several, several calls from residents over there at the Clay Avenue Apartments, the building owner that there is ash and debris all over the roof, all over the cars.

Over on the Clay Avenue Complex I even got a call last year from Swartz that owns the landscaping company over there. So in my opinion based on what happened down in Scranton when they had the event down there, it went kind of haywire.

Years ago in Pittston -- and I know it's a great event. The fireworks are great. I'm not in favor of it personally as the Fire Chief for the reason that I just mentioned. So what I'm looking for from Council is maybe some commentary, some guidance on this to get into that meeting because I know this is Borough property.

It's the worst thing for me to come up here and say I'm not in favor of this fireworks display, especially for this event.

I'm very sensitive of this event. My wife and myself give a donation to it every year.

But I know it's on Borough property and based on everything that I just mentioned, I would look for some guidance from Council or at least open up some discussion here on it.

MR. DEMPSEY: Is the meeting Wednesday?

CHIEF DENAPLES: The meeting,

Michael, is Wednesday with the committee and with, you know, Borough officials. So I'd like to have something to give them. But that's my opinion on it. And again, it's on Borough property.

We tried to do it and measure everything out. But every year it's the same thing. I know Monday morning I'll have voicemails and everything else. I know me and Chris even talk about this quite a bit. He lives back there.

Last year a lady called me up and it kind of went away. She said, "Is the Borough going to replace the paint on my car?" And I said to her, "Give me some photos. Give me some information on it." And I was actually going to forward them to Greg and Katherine and Attorney Perry to review.

And then she called me a week later and I said I still never got them. You could drop them off at the Borough Building and I'll get it and review it. But we never got it. But we kind of lucked out with that.

MS. OVEN: There was damage?

CHIEF DENAPLES: She claimed there was damage. And one of the firefighters come back that night and said that she went over to them and said that her car was damaged.

However, they did not go over and look at it.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Chief, will you be at the meeting Wednesday night?

CHIEF DENAPLES: I will be, yes.

MR. LOUGHNEY: This is my take on this. You are the Fire Chief. The event is a great event without fireworks. And I'm sure that the people involved and the decisionmakers involved in the Jog for Jude would not want any negative connotation coming out of this with the fireworks.

Your perfect example down in the City of Scranton, that was chaos. That was just a fiasco. I think the people involved in this would have that sense about them and listen and adhere to what your decision. And that's just me. I would back your decision if you -- whatever you choose.

CHIEF DENAPLES: And I'll have a discussion with them if that's -- regarding that. I think that is a good route to take.

1 MR. LOUGHNEY: It's a great event 2 with or without them. 3 CHIEF DENAPLES: Absolutely. And I 4 even brought up last year, I know there's some 5 areas that do light shows. And that may be something that they could look at. I know it's 6 7 kind of late to do that. And we really didn't 8 know if they were having them. I know I was 9 asked about it last meeting. 10 MR. O'MALLEY: I agree with 11 Mr. Loughney. You're the Chief. It should be 12 your call. 13 CHIEF DENAPLES: Okav. 14 MS. ZANGARDI: But we'll back you up 15 with what you're saying. 16 MR. LOUGHNEY: Chief, we're going to 17 go through this every year. So make your decision and Council seems like they'll back 18 19 your decision. We're for the safety of 20 everyone that attends that. We don't want any 21 problems. 22 CHIEF DENAPLES: So I'll have that 23 discussion and circle back --24 MS. ZANGARDI: The meeting is here. 25 MR. KEARNEY: 5:15.

CHIEF DENAPLES: I believe it's in 1 2 this room, right, Chris? 3 MR. KEARNEY: Yeah. 4 CHIEF DENAPLES: That's all I have. 5 Thank you. ALL MEMBERS: Thanks, Chief. 6 7 MR. WOLFF: Number 11, public 8 comment. 9 MS. OVEN: Anyone from the public want to comment? 10 11 MS. ZANGARDI: That's you, Mark. 12 MR. CORDELLI: Good evening, 13 Council, Mayor, everyone. Mark Cordelli, 14 Lackawanna County. I'll try to make this as 15 brief as possible. I'm not trying to blow 16 through it but I know there's a time limit on 17 here, 5 minutes. 18 MR. WOLFF: Follow the rules. Ιt 19 passed. MR. LOUGHNEY: Mark, for county 20 21 officials, it's two minutes. 22 MR. CORDELLI: All right. This will 23 be an addendum. Here we go. All right. 24 Spring has sprung and so have a lot of 25 activities here in Lackawanna County. For

example, our Arts and Cultures Department has a theme for the month of April.

It's called Shelter For All. They were thinking about birdhouses and spring and birds and everything. But they also morphed it into homeless people and other things like that. So there's a lot of good programs that they have throughout the whole month. I'm not going to go through each one of them.

For example, April 1st through 25th is Build a Birdhouse. Birdhouse pickup, Arbor Day, Earth, a lot of great activities. I'm not going to go each and everyone.

Our Recycling Environmental

CORDELLI: All right. 0ur 23 library system is having American Masters 24 Lecture Series on Wednesday, April 30th at 7 25 This is a free event at the Scranton p.m.

Cultural Center. Apparently this gentleman is very well know, Rick Steves.

On his own little banner here, he has Rick Steves on The Hippy Trail. So I could only imagine what the conversation is going to be about. But it's a big event. A lot of people are raving about his popularity.

All right. We are at the four parks that are open -- not closed, thank you -- looking for lifeguards. If you know of anybody high school age or college age, senior in high school that has a Red Cross certification to be a lifeguard, love to have them apply.

If they are not certified and they go and get certified, the County will reimburse them for the certification for the Red Cross certification. The starting salary is \$18 an hour. If they are elevated to be up to supervisor level, it will be 21.50. That's a heck of a program to be part of.

Our Area Agency on Aging in conjunction with United Way and AARP in Pennsylvania is having a free day to come and -- age friendly at the --

The 8th of July is going to be Merli Sarnowski, the 15th is going to be Covington, the 22nd McDade, the 29th at Ailsworth. It's all on here. It's free. It's a wonderful, wonderful event that they have there.

And lastly, I know this is a repeat from last year, but this program is so important that they extended it through July of 2025. It's a free blood led screening for one year old to six year olds. With all the chemicals and things that are being found in our food and other products that's going on, the Pennsylvania Department of Health is continuing this program.

1 They just ask if you are interested if you know of anybody who -- and it's also for 2 3 peace of mind. They call this number on here 4 to make an appointment so you could have your child or grandchildren tested for possible 5 That's all I have. Thank you so much 6 7 for your time. Any questions for me? 8 MR. HALLINAN: Mark, is a lot of 9 this on the website? 10 MR. CORDELLI: I believe it's 11 through our social media and FaceBook and also 12 Instagram everything is posted on there. But 13 not so much the website. 14 ALL MEMBERS: Thank you, Mark. 15 MR. CORDELLI: And also Happy 16 Easter. 17 MS. ZANGARDI: Happy Easter. 18 MR. WOLFF: Anyone else? Number 12, 19 public officials. I have nothing. ATTY. PERRY: 20 Happy Easter to 21 everybody. 22 MAYOR CONWAY: I have nothing. 23 MR. LOUGHNEY: I'd just like to talk 24 about, I don't know if I have to make a motion, 25 Mr. Solicitor, or not; but we're getting

numerous complaints about these vendors that are going door to door.

And some people have told me that they are being harassed at their door. Now, with the permit, they come in and get a permit, I understand they're legal. But can we -- can we if we get complaints, can we rescind those permits if we get these complaints?

ATTY. PERRY: You could revoke a permit, sure.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Okay, on a base by base case.

ATTY. PERRY: Case by case -MR. LOUGHNEY: We could revoke -ATTY. PERRY: A permit, yes.

MR. LOUGHNEY: We find out who the organization is, who they are representing and then we go from there.

ATTY. PERRY: Yeah, well, the way it should be approached is a letter to the organization first saying we're having these complaints, talk to your people. And then if it continues then we revoke their permit.

MR. LOUGHNEY: So there's a procedure we have to follow.

1 ATTY. PERRY: Well, you don't have to, but I suggest doing it that way. 2 MR. LOUGHNEY: Okay. 3 Well, then I 4 won't make that motion. But I would like it 5 addressed in that way. So if we get a complaint or if a resident calls the Borough 6 and has a complaint, then we could address it. 7 MR. WOLFF: Yeah, and I'm not aware 8 9 of any permits out right now. Some people have 10 mentioned one company. But some other 11 companies were mentioned. And I don't even 12 know if they have permits. I'll double-check 13 that tomorrow. So if they don't have permits, 14 then we'll -- they should notify the police. 15 If we get complaints -- if they have a permit 16 they are supposed to have it with them. 17 MR. LOUGHNEY: Can we do this, 18 Mayor, if the police see them in the 19 neighborhood, can they just stop and ask them if -- Chief, if they have the proper permit? 20 21 CHIEF MARCHESE: Yeah, absolutely. MR. LOUGHNEY: And if not if they 22 don't have it, send them on their way. 23 24 MAYOR CONWAY: Yeah, fine by me. 25 MR. O'MALLEY: Today someone was

telling me someone approached their door without any kind of identification or what company they were from.

MR. WOLFF: Yeah, they're supposed to have identification and they're supposed to have their permit that we issued with them.

MR. O'MALLEY: But they are super aggressive and won't take no for an answer.

MR. WOLFF: We do -- like, we take their license. We make a copy of their license so we have it and obviously their company information. I'll see if there are permits pulled.

MR. DEMPSEY: I think what we should too is maybe we should -- I know social media is like the easiest way to get to people, put something on the website that basically a checklist if somebody comes to the house and they don't have a permit or identification that you notify the police department immediately because otherwise, if they are calling us and putting complaints on Facebook, we're not going to know who it is, when it is, what it is.

So I think we should notify the public that if somebody is at their door, they

should notify us immediately and ask them if they have a permit.

MR. O'MALLEY: Are there certain hours they are allowed to be out there? I'm getting told too about people showing up at 8:00 at night.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Somebody said 9:00.

MR. WOLFF: Yeah, I can't recall what the times are, but I would think that would be too late. It's not 9:00.

MR. LOUGHNEY: It's too late at my house. That's for sure. And the other thing I have is April 26th is the cleanup.

Congratulations to everybody. I hope everybody

gets out. I will not be in attendance. My son is getting married that day. So I will be looking my best and Happy Easter to everyone.

MR. DEMPSEY: I don't have anything.

MR. O'MALLEY: Okay, so Nibs just mentioned that we're going to have a boroughwide cleanup on Saturday, April 26th from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. with a rain date of Sunday, April 27th. We'll meet in the Fidelity Bank parking lot.

PennDOT is going to be supplying the

bags, the gloves and the vests for all the people who are volunteering their time that day. So we're hoping to have a big turnout for that. Looking forward to next week's Jog for Jude. It's a great event for our community and the effort to stomp out SIDS.

Thank you to Zayac and Lawless family for all the volunteers responsible for putting it on. And finally, I want to thank Dunmore High School art teacher Cristin Hogan and a number of her students on their outstanding work on the mural in the hallway here. It's going to be finished next week in time for Jog for Jude and Happy Easter. That's all I have.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Trip, on that, can we send a picture of that mural to the Dunmorean?

MR. O'MALLEY: Yeah, yeah, that would be great. So they're going to finish it next Wednesday. I'll tell Cristin to have somebody there to take a picture of them and we'll send it --

She's taking pictures as they -- they have a before and after thing. So she's been doing

the pictures already.

MR. O'MALLEY: I'm just saying with the whole group of kids that are involved.
