MR. WOLFF: Number six, recognition of Dunmore firefighters for rescue efforts at a recent fire on Drinker Street. Chief DeNaples?

CHIEF DENAPLES: Good evening. Or Monday, July 29th at 21:45, Station Six was dispatched to 760 East Drinker Street for reported structure fire with one victim reported entrapped in the house.

The on-duty firefighters Lieutenant
Kyle Stanton, Firefighter Larry Waters,
Firefighter Amanda Piere, Firefighter Maurice
Menichetti who are here joining us tonight
responded with Ladder Six and Rescue Six. When
Ladder Six arrived on scene, they found a two
story mixed use occupancy with a business on
the first floor and residential dwelling on the
second floor.

They found one victim hanging from a second floor window on the parking lot side.

Two firefighters extended a ground ladder and made the rescue. The victim was brought down with next to no injuries and was treated by EMS

on the scene and was released there shortly thereafter.

When Ladder Six officer stretched an attack hose to the rear of the structure entered with almost zero visibility and high heat within the structure. Approximately 20 feet in they found the fire. It was knocked down.

A primary search was done to look for any further victims and that came up negative. This is a true tribute to having a paid Fire Department staff by well trained professionals at the ready. And this victim, you know, wouldn't have survived in minutes if it didn't happen the way they did and, you know, them tasks weren't performed.

It was a well-oiled machine. You know, everybody worked together and that was a good result. There was a -- you know, a lot of bad things could have happened there real quick. So I would like to congratulate and thank Lieutenant Stanley, Firefighter Waters, Firefighter Piere and Menichetti.

Also like to thank the second shift police officers that were on scene there. They

MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council, my brief analysis for the financial report for the month of July. We have a net loss for the month of \$39,000 which brings our year-to-date net income to 2.3 million. It was a typical slow summer month. Real estate tax collection has steadily declined.

Miscellaneous revenue, we received \$25,000 from Express Scripts for the second quarter, 2024 rebate; special assessments, \$711,000, the second quarter '24 landfill fees.

As far as expenses were concerned,

MR. JUDGE: Close to it, you know, because you got the vacations for the summer and stuff. Every day is an adventure. We'll be all right. Okay. Thank you for the hiring.

ALL MEMBERS: Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Chief Marchese.

CHIEF MARCHESE: Monthly report for July. Calls for service, we responded to 801 calls for service. The number is down 19 calls from the previous month. Arrests for the month we had 11 criminal arrests, 7 non-traffic, 59 traffic arrests, 30 written traffic warnings and 48 verbal traffic warnings.

We have two officers returned from Heart and Lung. We had ten overtime shifts for the month. Officer Burgette took part in his annual SWAT training on July 9; Officer Grunza, Burnetti, Igoe took part in a four day street crimes training along with members of the Scranton Police Department on July 29th to August 1st. It was a great training.

New business, from start of collection to the end of July, we have collected 7,899 including coin and credit card

1 and pay by phone transactions. During the 2 month \$150 was collected in parking tickets and 3 two citations have been filed. 4 We have taken delivery of our new 5 body cams. We're in the process of finalizing the policies. We actually had a four hour Zoom 6 7 today with the administrators. We're looking to hopefully start the training within the next 8 9 month or so. MS. BRIER: That's great. 10 11 Chief, when do you think MS. OVEN: 12 that will be up and running completely -fully? 13 14 CHIEF MARCHESE: I think within a 15 month or two months we should be good. Yeah, 16 it's a little complicated. So we did the 17 administrative first and then we'll start 18 training the officers next month. 19 MS. BRIER: Then we have the 20 policies in place in terms of how --21 CHIEF MARCHESE: Yes, Mr. Perry 22 approved everything. 23 MS. BRIER: Oh, good. Thank you. 24 CHIEF MARCHESE: That's all I got. 25 ALL MEMBERS: Thank you, Chief.

MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples.

CHIEF DENAPLES: I'd like to congratulate the three new sergeants, best of luck with moving forward in your supervisory roles.

I'll start with the Fire Department report and then we'll switch into the Code Enforcement. So as far as expenditures and purchases for August projected, the only steep expenditures we had projected when this report was written was we purchased a fire blanket as we continue to build on this electric vehicle fire issues that are, you know, pretty imminent all over the country.

Luckily, we only had the one battery up to this point. But inevitably, I'm sure we'll have more up the interstate, Tom Hesser, Nissan, up there they work on these vehicles. So we purchased a blanket. It's coming out of the rescue billing.

It's a fire blanket that you cover the car with. That is \$1,069.47. Our annual service on our eDRAULIC rescue tools, basically the jaws of life, \$1,097. We purchased some blowers, DeWalt leaf blowers to clean up after

motor vehicle accidents to put on the apparatus to make it a little easier for the crews, a little more efficient, \$318. Again, that came out of rescue billing.

Besides from that, the only other potential steep expenditures are gear dryer. We have some issues going on with it. So the technician is coming out tomorrow to evaluate that. It could be anything as simple as from something blocked up and into a potential burn motor. So we're not really sure on that.

As far as overtime scheduled, it's still pretty steep this month, 432 hours scheduled. So 54 part-time shifts put out. That's again, when this report was prepared. I'm hopeful after we get this Civil Service list settled and we get some of these positions replaced, I'm very hopeful an optimistic that it's going to be reduced dramatically.

As far as the events that the Fire

Department is participating in for the month of

August and some extra duty assignments was the

St. Rocco's fireworks. We did standby with

extra duty folks last night. And we're

participating in the National Night Out

tomorrow night, the Fire Department parade and thereafter.

And Holy Cross High School is having a bonfire on August 18th at St. Anthony's Park. So we'll have the brush truck go up there with some extra duty on staff to stand by for that.

Councilman Hallinan requested that we do a washdown after the Music Fest on August 18th. He requested we go up on the 19th and wash the sidewalk and street down. So that's also listed on here as out of the ordinary.

The Fire Department union is doing that glow ball that we talked about a couple months ago during my report on Saturday, August 31st at the Marjon Country Club up in Roaring Brook Township. The only other out of the ordinary event that we're participating in as of this point is the EMS standbys for the Junior Bucks down at the school from 11:45 approximately until 4 p.m., on August 18th, 25th, September 1st and 29th.

The apparatus will remain in service down there for any other calls if they come in.

As far as the orientation process for the couple part timers, we have one that's put in

very limited shifts to come in and do orientation. So that's going a little slower than we hoped for.

The other gentleman is doing pretty well. He's pretty much completed besides for a final test and getting a couple more calls for orientation policy. I'm thrilled to hear that we're replacing that ramp finally. That was pretty bad. So we got that grant. Great work on that for the application of that.

As far as the code enforcement, we had 25 inspections scheduled for the month of August as of this point. Again, there may be some more. As far as calls from August 1st to the 12th, the Fire Department responded to 34 calls, one fire-related call, eight EMS and rescue, one hazardous material, five service calls, six good intent, 10 false calls, one severe weather call was put in.

But again, we respond to many more than that. It's just the way the coding was put in and two special type incidents. As far as the Code Enforcement, the only other thing that I think we need to get resolved sooner than later, we're trying to get a meeting

scheduled. There was some schedule conflicts with NEIC.

I'm a little concerned about their response to doing inspections in hotels. We got a complaint and Kathryn and Greg are aware of it. And again, we're trying to get a meeting scheduled for the -- up on the O'Neill Highway the Wyndam Hotel behind Wendy's for a smoke detector covered.

That's a very well kept establishment. However, there's some issues in the rooms with smoke detectors, some plumbing issues. NEIC is basically telling us we can't go in the room and do the inspections. To me, that's the most important part when people are in there sleeping.

So we need to get that hammered out and figure something out with them. So they gave us a written response in an e-mail, but I think we need to have a sitdown with them and get this resolved as soon as --

MS. BRIER: Definitely, yeah.

MS. BRIER: Attorney Perry's son is here today. So, Matt, would you like to address that?

ATTY. PERRY: Yeah, sure. If your attorney does, in fact, have evidence by way of

documentation that the Borough does, in fact, own the alley, there could be a conversation about what can be done. Without that conversation happening, we really can't say anything of a definitive nature on the issue.

So once the conversation between your attorney, Mr. LaBelle and Michael Perry happens or our office happens, we could have a more informed conversation about if it is, in fact, a Borough owned road, okay?

MR. CAMPBELL: And from the time of my grandparents, it was a Borough owned alley in Dunmore.

ATTY. PERRY: Okay. Well, if that's the case, there should be some documentation out there supporting that. And if that document exists, please provide it to your attorney or he could get it and get to us and we could talk about it, okay?
