MR HALLINAN: Before we sit down,
I'd like a moment of silence for firefighter
for Bill Fetsko. He was with our department
over 30 plus years and he passed away just
recently. Thank you.

MR. WOLFF: Roll call, Mayor Conway.

MAYOR CONWAY: Here.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Loughney.

MR. LOUGHNEY: Here.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. O'Malley.

MR. O'MALLEY: Here.

MR. WOLFF: Mr. Dempsey is absent.
Mr. Hallinan.

MR. HALLINAN: Here.

MR. WOLFF: Mrs. Mackrell Oven.

MS. OVEN: Here.

MR. WOLFF: Mrs. McDonald Zangardi
is absent. Mrs. Brier.

MS. BRIER: Here.

MR. WOLFF: Public comment on agenda
items.

MR. HALLINAN: Mr. Smith, do you

1 have any public comment? Next?

2 MR. WOLFF: Number four, motion to
3 approve the minutes from the June 8th, 2026
4 meeting.

5 MR. HALLINAN: Can I have a motion
6 to approve the minutes from the June 8th
7 meeting?

8 MR. O'MALLEY: So moved.

9 MR. LOUGHNEY: Second.

10 MR. HALLINAN: On the question? All
11 in favor?

12 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

13 MR. WOLFF: Motion to approve and
14 pay open bills.

15 MR. HALLINAN: Can I have a motion,
16 please to pay the open bills?

17 MR. LOUGHNEY: So moved.

18 MS. OVEN: Second.

19 MR. HALLINAN: On the question? All
20 in favor?

21 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

22 MR. WOLFF: Number six, motion to
23 approve Resolution Number 5 of 2026, DCED grant
24 funding for Enterprise Resource Planning, ERP
25 software.

1 MR. HALLINAN: Can I have a motion,
2 please for that?

3 MS. BRIER: I'll make a motion.

4 MS. OVEN: I'll second.

5 MR. HALLINAN: On the question?

6 MR. WOLFF: Sure. This is part of
7 our stamp funding Phase 3 through DCED. This
8 is for accounts payable, basically financial
9 software. There will also be module in there
10 to accept for scheduling for here, Schautz and
11 other things that we do within the Borough.

12 We are eligible for a minimum of 50
13 percent from DCED with the potential up to 90
14 percent. So we'll only have to pay 10 percent
15 instead. There's a good possibility. And
16 we'll hear about that in September.

17 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. All in
18 favor?

19 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

20 MR. HALLINAN: Against? The ayes
21 have it.

22 MR. WOLFF: Number seven, motion to
23 approve contracting Total Grant Services, LLC,
24 to perform grant writing services pending
25 contract review.

1 MR. HALLINAN: Can I have a motion,
2 please to accept the Total Grant Services grant
3 writing services?

4 MR. O'MALLEY: So moved.

5 MR. HALLINAN: Second?

6 MS. BRIER: I'll second.

7 MR. HALLINAN: On the question?

8 Katherine, would you like to --

9 MS. OVEN: Sure, yeah. Total Grant
10 Services is a company that is going to assist
11 us in grant writing for the Borough. At this
12 point we've been trying to individually do it,
13 which has worked out well in some instances.

14 But this is a professional company
15 that all they do is grant writing. And they
16 work with other municipalities and had great
17 success with getting large sums of money. So
18 we have a quite a few projects that we would
19 like to get some grant money for so we don't
20 have to burn the taxpayers. So we're going to
21 enter into a contract with Total Grant
22 Services.

23 MR. O'MALLEY: I just think it will
24 pay for itself in no time. I think it's money
25 well spent on our end.

1 MS. OVEN: Yes, same.

2 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. All in
3 favor? Aye.

4 MS. BRIER: Aye.

5 MR. LOUGHNEY: Aye.

6 MR. O'MALLEY: Aye.

7 MS. BRIER: I just want to add
8 they're out in Harrisburg too.

9 MS. OVEN: Abstain.

10 MS. BRIER: So they have connections
11 to the folks that grant -- the money.

12 MS. OVEN: Yes.

13 MR. HALLINAN: That's four for and
14 none against and one abstain.

15 MR. WOLFF: Number eight, a motion
16 to approve CBIZ Benefits and Insurance
17 Services, Incorporated for pension actuarial
18 services.

19 MR. HALLINAN: Can I have a motion,
20 please?

21 MS. BRIER: I'll make a motion.

22 MR. HALLINAN: Second?

23 MS. OVEN: Second.

24 MR. LOUGHNEY: Second.

25 MR. HALLINAN: On the question?

1 MR. WOLFF: This is our as we have
2 been doing, seeking out different pricing and
3 services for some of our professional services.
4 We reached out to a couple different
5 organizations for actuarial services.

6 CBIZ came well recommended and had
7 very competitive pricing, especially related to
8 what we have been paying and the services we've
9 been getting. So again, highly recommended,
10 out of Philadelphia and they have local
11 services.

12 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you. All in
13 favor?

14 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

15 MR. HALLINAN: Those opposed? The
16 ayes have it.

17 MR. WOLFF: Number nine, Treasurer
18 Financial Report. Mark.

19 MR. BURTON: Good evening, Council.
20 Report for the month of June, I'll be brief
21 because there is, quite frankly, not much to
22 report for the month, typical slow summer
23 month.

24 We had a net loss for the month of
25 \$587,000, which brings our year to date net

1 income to 1.8 million dollars. On the revenue
2 side, like I said, typical slow summer month,
3 limited revenues. We did receive a \$10,000
4 DCED Strategic Management Planning Grant. And
5 a \$9,000 Lion's Club Fire Department grant.

6 On the expense side, we had our
7 standard operating expenses and a \$25,000
8 payment for the fire truck. That's all.

9 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you.

10 MS. BRIER: Mark, the Tax
11 Anticipation Note, has that been paid off?

12 MR. BURTON: We still have 200 --
13 we're going to pay it this month once we get
14 the landfill fees because next month we're
15 going to have the bond issue -- million dollar
16 bond issue that --

17 MS. BRIER: Okay.

18 MR. BURTON: -- in the next week or
19 so we should get that taken care of.

20 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you, Mark.
21 Anybody else have anything for Mark?

22 MS. OVEN: Thanks, Mark.

23 MR. WOLFF: Thanks, Mark.

24 Mr. Kearney.

25 MR. KEARNEY: This past month we

1 continued having weekend parties in this room.
2 We've seen an increase in the elementary
3 schools who are starting to practice in here.
4 There's, like, five teams that have started
5 practice already.

6 And we got a coach who did a clinic
7 in the spring. He's doing one in the summer.
8 So he's for the month of July. He'll be here
9 every Thursday. The floor replacement project
10 is nearly complete. They're coming very early
11 tomorrow morning and finishing up whatever it
12 is they have to do.

13 I'd like to recognize Jordan Seamon
14 for his help in moving all of this stuff with
15 me. There's stuff that had to be moved from
16 here to there and then back again and all over
17 the place. If Jordan wasn't here, it's not
18 getting done. And I'd also like to thank Greg
19 for his help moving the vending machines back
20 in because that was a project. So thank you,
21 Mr. Wolff.

22 And the Summer Program started last
23 Monday. We had close to 180 kids at the three
24 parks last Friday. So thanks, Mr. Hallinan,
25 for his work in securing the sponsor for the

1 pizza and the drinks. And I was asked to add
2 two more trays for next weeks' order because
3 they were running a lot -- tight.

4 MR. HALLINAN: No problem. Okay.

5 MR. KEARNEY: And that's all I have.

6 MS. OVEN: Chris, thanks for all of
7 your help too. I know it was a lot, the
8 floors.

9 MR. O'MALLEY: Thanks.

10 MS. BRIER: Chris, thanks.

11 MR. HALLINAN: Thank you, Chris.

12 MR. WOLFF: Mr. Judge.

13 MR. JUDGE: I guess we got about --
14 I'm trying to think. What do we got, Tom?

15 MR. HALLINAN: We were talking about
16 maybe a refuse truck we're looking at with
17 maybe could pick up on the side. But that's
18 for a future date. How are we doing with
19 patching? Are we doing any curbs or anything
20 like that?

21 MR. JUDGE: We're patching. Mainly
22 all we're getting up is the garbage. And when
23 they come in, we send them out on patching. We
24 haven't used any hot stuff this year. It's all
25 cold patch. I don't have the guys for the hot

1 stuff.

2 MS. OVEN: Should we be using hot
3 stuff now?

4 MR. JUDGE: Hot stuff is better.
5 But you need more guys, you know, you don't
6 want to lose it or -- you know what I mean?

7 MS. OVEN: Yeah. Is it easier to do
8 the cold patch?

9 MR. JUDGE: Yes, and quicker. But
10 other than that --

11 MR. HALLINAN: I don't know, maybe
12 we got to look at something with temporary
13 employees for the summer like maybe the Borough
14 of Throop does or something where we only put
15 them on for seasonal work, you know, even
16 college kids might want to do stuff.

17 MR. JUDGE: Then we could get a
18 blacktop crew together.

19 MR. HALLINAN: Or even painting the
20 cross walks --

21 MR. O'MALLEY: Painting the
22 crosswalks -- I think is something that's
23 urgent, especially with --

24 MS. OVEN: Are we doing the
25 crosswalks? Did we set up a plan for the

1 crosswalks?

2 MR. JUDGE: No. I really don't have
3 anybody to do it. They are on trucks everyday.

4 MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, we got to look
5 at it.

6 MR. JUDGE: Gam used to do all the
7 painting and Gam retired.

8 MR. HALLINAN: And we have some guys
9 that are hurt too, right, three or four guys
10 that are hurt.

11 MR. JUDGE: Four guys hurt and Gam's
12 gone. So there's five guys we're down now.

13 MR. HALLINAN: Okay. Didge, we'll
14 talk about it and thank you very much.

15 MS. OVEN: Thanks, Didge.

16 MS. BRIER: Thank you.

17 CHIEF BARTH: I'm going to try to
18 keep my comments brief tonight. This will be
19 the monthly report for the month of June.
20 During the month we responded to 1,226 calls
21 for service. We're up slightly by 36 calls
22 from the month of May.

23 Major incident breakdown, 137
24 traffic stops, 20 physical domestics, 4 fights,
25 35 crashes, 17 burglar alarms, 2 confirmed

1 burglary calls, 2 overdoses, 3 assaults, 4 DUI
2 arrests, 11 harassment incidents, 3 drug
3 arrests, 11 criminal mischiefs, 151 business
4 checks, 19 thefts, 1 weapon slash gun call.
5 And a new one I had to add for the month of
6 June, we had five stolen vehicles during in the
7 month of June primarily down in the 16, 17 of
8 Monroe, Madison in that area.

9 We had multiple videos that popped
10 up -- surfaced of three to four younger males,
11 like, high school age to early 18 to 20 age
12 walking through the neighborhoods mostly
13 checking door handles, rummaging through cars.

14 But when they were finding -- which
15 is unfortunate, they were finding peoples' key
16 fobs in the cars and then taking the cars.
17 Four out of five have been recovered so far.
18 All four are recovered down all around Weston
19 Park -- Weston Field, down that way. So
20 somehow, it's affiliated to that area with
21 these kids.

22 MS. BRIER: No kids were found or
23 anything.

24 CHIEF BARTH: We don't have no
25 arrests yet. They are wearing Covid style

1 masks on their face, hoods, latex gloves and
2 stuff like that.

3 It's unfortunate. Just for a
4 comparison, in the year 2025, we had four
5 stolen vehicles for the whole year. We had
6 five just in one month. So it's kind of crazy.
7 For the month, we had 17 criminal arrest, 10
8 non traffic citations, 33 traffic citations and
9 13 written traffic warnings.

10 There was no state money out this
11 month for any type of aggressive driving
12 protocol so it's a little bit down. And we had
13 some vacation issues and stuff. Personnel
14 matters, Officer Redmon was released from Heart
15 and Lung, returned to duty on June 24th and is
16 currently back on midnight shift.

17 On May 26th, Officer Jordan went out
18 on a work-related injury and remained out of
19 the entire month of June. He has since
20 returned in early July. Officer Hallinan went
21 out on a work-related injury on June 17, is
22 currently still out.

23 Officer Feliciano which was a
24 part-time officer, I believe some of yous had
25 the opportunity to interview, she completed her

1 training early June. And she, as a matter of
2 fact, this afternoon she came in and resigned
3 her position.

4 She accepted a full time position
5 with South Abington Police. So we really
6 didn't get anything out of her. So we are
7 still massively down on officers.

8 Fourteen shifts were sent out for
9 the month for overtime. Four of them were
10 taken for pay and 10 were taken for future
11 comp. The part time officers worked a total of
12 422.5 hours which equates to 52 shifts for the
13 month.

14 During the month we took part in our
15 mandatory firearms qualification. This year
16 the Borough did purchase this new Glock
17 handguns for all full-time officers. All
18 officers are required to qualify with their new
19 duty weapon, shotgun, rifle, and taser in order
20 to keep their yearly qualification
21 certification intact.

22 During the month we did roll out two
23 new policies. They were completed by all
24 officers. At this point we're about 40 percent
25 complete on our new policies, hopefully have

1 all the new revised policies in place by the
2 end of the year.

3 Now onto new business, from the
4 start of the year to the end of June, our
5 collection for parking meters was at \$6,497.
6 That includes coin, credit and pay-by-phone
7 transactions.

8 For the month we collected 140
9 parking tickets and five citations. That
10 number is down because of the fact that a lot
11 of the meters aren't currently working. We did
12 assist with traffic at Dunmore High School
13 graduation. We've been assisting at the
14 Dunmore Music Festivals on Sundays.

15 And an advertisement was put on our
16 Dunmore Borough Facebook page seeking part time
17 officers. We did get four applicants that did
18 apply. One of the applicants unfortunately
19 didn't have Act 120. I spoke to him on the
20 phone. And he's looking to get it in the
21 future. So I told him once he completed that
22 to obviously reapply.

23 The other three applicants I'm going
24 to forward to Greg to be for the hiring panel
25 for the interviewing process. I'm just a

1 little bit behind. I just came back from
2 vacation so I'm a little behind the eight-ball
3 here.

4 So just another quick thing here,
5 we're still seeing an upswing in electric bikes
6 and scooters driving on the roads. Several
7 local departments -- I'm sure you've seen on
8 the news and the paper, they've investigated
9 accidents recently where operators of these
10 scooters have been seriously injured.

11 One little boy in Clarks Summit
12 ended up losing his leg because of it. Clarks
13 Summit police recently enacted an ordinance in
14 regards to the operation of electric scooters
15 and bikes.

16 I'm in the process of getting two or
17 three of these different ordinances, maybe to
18 critique it to what we would be looking for.
19 And I'm going to submit it to Council to see if
20 we can possibly get an ordinance put in place.
21 Now, just so e-bikes and scooters are covered
22 under the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code.

23 The problem you have is, if I get a
24 12 year old and doesn't have a license, I'm
25 citing him. That's going to follow them into

1 the future. When they do turn 16, a mistake
2 they made at 12 years old, it's going to cost
3 them a year suspension on their driver's
4 license.

5 So maybe looking at the ordinance
6 wouldn't follow them, at least, it will be a
7 deterrent and maybe that will be step one. And
8 then if you get them a second time, then maybe
9 we go with the fine. So I'm going to put that
10 together. I know if you get caught on one it's
11 a \$25 first fine.

12 Clarks Summit just appointed a new
13 chief, so they're a little bit behind too. But
14 they're going to forward me a copy of their
15 ordinance and we could --

16 MS. OVEN: You don't know what their
17 ordinance says though?

18 CHIEF BARTH: No, not yet. We have
19 one of our officers that also works there. He
20 knows the violation if you get pulled over, he
21 knows the first offense is a \$25 fine, not
22 necessarily looking to kill these kids but --

23 MR. HALLINAN: We don't want to see
24 them get killed.

25 CHIEF BARTH: I don't want them to

1 do anything that is going to cost them any type
2 of harm.

3 MR. O'MALLEY: I've gotten a ton of
4 complaints about the scooters and e-bikes,
5 particularly up in the Sherwood Park area.

6 CHIEF BARTH: It's amazing how many
7 go up and down the O'Neill Highway too. These
8 kids on these little scooters and there's cars
9 passing them by at 50 miles an hour. I'm going
10 to look into that by next month or even before
11 that if I could get an ordinance together, I'll
12 forward it to Greg for review.

13 Our blue envelopes we talked about
14 last month, they did arrive. I'm going to have
15 out Facebook page updated later on to let
16 people know how to come up to the station and
17 get one if they are in need of one.

18 Lastly, I do have a parking meter
19 update. I was reaching out to different
20 departments that were listed on the POM website
21 that they were buying through. And I ended up
22 meeting a really nice lady by the name of Sara
23 from the -- she was the director of parking in
24 the city of Rochester, New York.

25 They have 1400 and some of their

1 meters up there and they ran into the same
2 issue we did, not being able to get parts and
3 batteries. So they were able to find a local
4 business to start to build the batteries for
5 them. The business they contacted is located
6 in Rochester but was not on their list of
7 certified providers I guess the way that the
8 bigger cities do it.

9 So they couldn't buy directly from
10 this gentleman. So they're actually -- this
11 gentleman is now selling them to Grainger who
12 is then turning around and selling them to the
13 city. So they are a few bucks more.

14 But she did tell me that the
15 experience they've had with them, they are
16 lasting longer than ones we were buying from
17 China -- from POM were coming out of China.
18 And you don't know how long they were sitting
19 in a warehouse for.

20 This guy is building them fresh.
21 And I reached out to him today, and they are --
22 they are willing to sell them to us. We can do
23 it directly. We won't have to go through
24 Grainger. They have to go through Grainger
25 because of the way their bidding process is in

1 Rochester, so they have to. And Grainger was
2 charging them \$111.

3 MS. BRIER: What was the timeframe?

4 CHIEF BARTH: I could probably get
5 them by the end of the week. I just need to
6 get -- yeah, yeah, I mean, I don't know what
7 the shipping -- the problem we have is with
8 these batteries with being the batteries that
9 kind of catch fire and all that -- lithium
10 batteries, they're not able to be shipped.

11 Like, you can't just throw them in a
12 envelope and send them. You have to really
13 pack them and stuff.

14 (Cross talking.)

15 CHIEF BARTH: If the shipping is
16 going to be -- I know when we were buying them
17 from POM, we were paying about \$10 additional
18 for shipping on each battery. So I'm thinking
19 that maybe -- because we're going to need
20 probably 20 right out of the gate.

21 And Rochester was paying \$111 per
22 battery. Now, this gentleman told me that
23 Grainger was marketing them up significantly.
24 So he didn't give me the exact price yet
25 depending on the amount we're going to buy.

1 So we were paying about 80 -- I
2 think we were paying 84, \$85 from POM. So I'm
3 thinking if even for a couple dollars more,
4 it's going to be worth it. We have to get them
5 regardless.

6 MR. HALLINAN: Yeah, we don't have
7 to send an officer up there. We can send other
8 guys.

9 CHIEF BARTH: Yeah, right, so I will
10 look into that and see if that's a possibility
11 that rather than have them shipped if we can
12 save money -- I mean, if we're going to do 20
13 batteries and it's \$200 savings, it's worth it
14 to send a guy, you know?

15 MS. OVEN: Agreed.

16 MS. BRIER: Do we only need 20?

17 CHIEF BARTH: Well, right now I
18 would say 20 to get us back up and running, and
19 then if we want to get extras to keep.

20 MR. HALLINAN: I'd buy extras.

21 MR. WOLFF: They're going to be
22 sitting around. Don't get too many.

23 CHIEF BARTH: The problem you have
24 with them lithium batteries, the longer they
25 sit, the longer, you know, I have ones in my

1 garage right now that were in the meters we
2 weren't using. And I went to look at them
3 after last meeting and they were all dead.

4 So I think the longer you sit
5 around, so we might be better off just, you
6 know, get 20 at a time or something, you know.

7 MR. LOUGHNEY: Chief, we have a
8 Grainger up on the top of the O'Neill Highway.

9 CHIEF BARTH: Oh, they're out of
10 business. That's where the Penn State Security
11 Building is now. So this gentleman's up in
12 Rochester, super nice guy. The name of the
13 company -- I thought I had it in here.

14 Yeah, it's called Hazlow,
15 H-A-Z-L-O-W. That's the battery manufacturer.
16 That's the guy up there that's making them
17 locally up in Rochester. I spoke with him
18 today so we shouldn't have an issue.

19 (Cross talking.)

20 CHIEF BARTH: I was just going
21 through the POM website. I saw a big article
22 on there how the City of Rochester had got a
23 federal grant to pay for these meters. So just
24 for the heck of it, I reached out to the lady,
25 and she's super nice and provided me with all

1 the information. So, yeah, that was --

2 MS. BRIER: That was really great.
3 I was asking Greg about them today.

4 CHIEF BARTH: Hopefully I can get
5 them here by the, you know, depending on how
6 fast we get somebody up there or where he's
7 going to kill us on shipping. We might be able
8 to get that running by the end of the week.

9 MR. HALLINAN: I got a question for
10 you before you go. You know, we have the body
11 cameras. I was just looking, do we have any
12 police cars with cameras equipped in there?

13 CHIEF BARTH: We don't. We don't.
14 And we just -- me and the Mayor have been
15 recently going through the process of what I
16 wanted to get was the body -- or the car camera
17 packages. And then for an extra fee every
18 month, we would be able to get the license
19 plate readers.

20 It's a software that goes into
21 camera. And if you notice up in Dickson City
22 that guy's always sitting on the median as
23 you're going up to Lowe's, that's what he's
24 doing. Every car that comes down, he just
25 reads their tags. They're making a boatload of

1 money.

2 Now, I've gotten some prices on it.
3 And we were working on trying to get grants for
4 it to get them. They are pretty expensive.
5 They're about \$14,000 a car down for each car.

6 MR. HALLINAN: Maybe we can find
7 something through the state or something with a
8 grant or something because I'm thinking, just
9 when you're -- I just know with people in any
10 town, when you're following the body camera
11 isn't going to pick it up.

12 When you see some kid going down the
13 O'Neill Highway, you can turn on your camera
14 because first thing some of parents might say
15 is, not my kid. They weren't doing that. And
16 then it would be your word and then at least we
17 have cameras to show what they were doing.

18 CHIEF BARTH: They way they work
19 though too, they're constantly recording on
20 site. And then as soon as you turn your lights
21 on, they start -- it starts actually recording.
22 So you have 30 seconds. It goes back 30
23 seconds before you even turn your lights on.
24 It's already saved.

25 MR. HALLINAN: I think it's a safety

1 thing. I think it's something we should really
2 look into for you guys.

3 MR. O'MALLEY: Maybe Total Grant
4 Services can jump on it.

5 CHIEF BARTH: And I have all the
6 paperwork on it. I got some quotes and stuff.
7 We were trying to get -- there was a small
8 grant up there for 25,000. It was from
9 Firehouse Subs. And we actually submitted
10 paperwork to get two cars done through that.

11 MS. OVEN: We could ask because
12 we're doing -- we're hiring a grant writer.

13 MS. BRIER: -- tonight these grant
14 folks out of Harrisburg.

15 CHIEF BARTH: And the way -- the way
16 this works is the 14,000, so say you wanted to
17 get three cars for say \$40,000. It's broken up
18 over five years. So you only have to pay
19 \$8,000 a year for five years.

20 And after the fifth year for free of
21 charge, they come in and replace all your
22 equipment. So you get -- they call it one
23 refresh. If anything breaks during that five
24 years or the fifth year, you get a brand new
25 camera. So it would be, like I said, is not a

1 tremendous amount of money, you know. All
2 right. Any other questions?

3 MR. HALLINAN: No. All right.
4 Thank you, Chief.

5 CHIEF BARTH: Thank you.

6 MR. WOLFF: Chief DeNaples is not
7 present. Public comment.

8 MR. HALLINAN: Anyone from the
9 public want to address us, Mr. Smith?

10 MR. SMITH: Pat Smith, 1209 Quincy
11 Avenue, proud Dunmorean, just representing the
12 public so everybody in this room will be in the
13 minutes for next month.

14 MS. OVEN: Thank you.

15 MR. SMITH: Thank you. That would
16 be perfect.

17 MS. BRIER: Thanks.

18 MR. HALLINAN: Public officials.

19 MR. WOLFF: I have nothing.

20 ATTY. PERRY: Nothing.

21 MAYOR CONWAY: I have nothing.

22 MR. LOUGHNEY: I'm good.

23 MR. O'MALLEY: I just want to note,
24 Mr. Kearney mentioned the Summer Program, off
25 to a great start. I dropped my son off here a

14 Everything went very smoothly. Thanks so much.
15 It was a good job. And, you know, I just want
16 to thank Chris for all the work he's done here
17 to get this floor done because it was
18 monumental moving even just those vending
19 machines.

20 We didn't know how we were going to
21 get them back. We were able to get them out
22 because we scratched the old floor. We didn't
23 want to scratch the new floor. And then Greg
24 came along and had a piece of equipment that we
25 were able to do that.

1 And it really, really looks nice.
2 And Jordan's been painting the doors out there
3 too. And that looks really great, so thanks.
4 And I just want to mention to your niece and,
5 you know, we all wish her the best.

6 MR. HALLINAN: Katherine?

7 MS. OVEN: I'm good. Thank you,
8 Chris, though. I know you have a lot going on
9 and trying to manage so many different things.
10 And then to throw the flooring in the mix was a
11 lot. So I appreciate all your help. And it
12 looks really spectacular.

13 MR. HALLINAN: I have nothing. I
14 just, again, the place looks beautiful. But
15 besides that, look for a motion to adjourn.

16 MR. O'MALLEY: Motion.

17 MR. LOUGHNEY: Second.

18 MR. HALLINAN: All in favor?

19 ALL MEMBERS: Aye.

20 MR. HALLINAN: Have a good evening.
